## Blanca busy looking for funding for Monument repairs

Blanca Stransky, the energetic superintendent at Perry's Monument, told islanders at a Spring Soup Supper at the Town Hall she was busy this winter looking for funding to repair the Monument before the bicentennial of Perry's Victory in 2013.

After a complete engineering study of the Monument, she told those gathered the total cost of repairing the shaft, upper observation deck and the upper plaza is in the neighborhood of \$55,000,000. Work being done this winter to rewire the electric motor for the elevator inside the shaft is \$635,000 alone, and further elevator repairs are expected to cost another \$800,000.

Her expectations are high about having the Monument ready for the 2013 celebration, but said without funding soon, the complicated contracting process and actual repairs could mean a delay in reopening the Monument in time for the 200th anniversary of the Battle of Lake Erie. The Monument is scheduled for closing this coming

August 1st.

Blanca said she'll know in April if some of the stimulus money coming out of Washington will be used to help with the repairs.

Aside from looking for funding, Blanca and her staff have been busy planning some new and exciting events for visitors this season. See info about these in other articles in this and coming issues of the Gazette.

## Trustees implement and explain need for "bed tax"

The Put-in-Bay Township Trustees have implemented a 1% "Bed Tax" in the unincorporated portion of

the Township Prastees have implemented a 175 bed flax in the anineorportated portion of the Township effective April 1, 2009. This does not include the Village of Put-in-Bay. We, the Trustees, feel it important to inform you of the reasons for implementing such a "Bed Tax" at this time. Ottawa County took away our share of the County's "Bed Tax" in 2008. This money was being used for such needs of the Township as the Fish Disposal Box, Recycling, and Police Contract to name a few. The Township has incurred extensive legal fees associated with Sanitary sewer and water issues since 2004. These issues continue to be worked on at this time and more expenses will be incurred in the future. The cost of these projects and issues has already exceeded what we had received from the County's "Bed Tax" in 2008. We felt it necessary to implement a Township "Bed Tax" to cover these needed and rising costs. Doing nothing would only put additional hardships upon our residents and businesses alike and could make situations much worse. We are sorry for having to implement a tax in such hard times and hope this answers some questions of reason and need. We thank you for your patience and understanding. - *The Put-in-Bay township Board of Trustees*.

## If only the walls could talk

North Bass is a small island with big history. It's everywhere you turn, in the vineyards, in the woods, along the beaches, and on the paths once trodden by children, some of who would become famous in their own right. However this history extends beyond that, it is soaked into the very walls of every building upon the island. And this is the story of a house that carries a history belonging not just to the two islands it stood on, but also of the people who found themselves within its rooms.

The Lodge, which was a name that came later, began its life not first on North Bass, but actually on Johnson's Island and was one of the many buildings built there as part of the Civil War prison. The role it played during the war is lost in time, but by the design of the main structure it possibly served as a bunk house or a type of meeting place. After the war ended it was torn down board by board and loaded onto a steamer bound for North Bass Island. It was brought here by a man called General William Dell Lindsley. Gen. Lindsley didn't actually participate in the Civil War, but had become a Brigadier General in the Ohio Militia in 1843 and was elected as a Representative to the 33rd Congress in 1853. However, after the war ended, the General purchased eleven acres of island land intending to establish a vineyard. He used it as his island home, but also kept a much larger substantial house in Perkins Twp, just outside of Sandusky. General Lindsley, like most of the islanders enjoyed much success as a result of the fruit of the vine, but as time went on, his popularity with the other islanders declined.

In the 1870's, when the islanders began to raise money for a much needed church, many of those who were wellto-do made generous cash donations and purchased cemetery lots used as a fundraiser. General Lindsley kept promising money, and at one point he even stated he would match "apples for apples." However, he never came through and gave not a dime to the cause. He passed away about 1890, and was not very much mourned by his island neighbors, as he had lost their respect with his empty promises.

After the passing of General Lindsley, the property came under the ownership of the Hallock family, an island name known first on North Bass and later Put-in-Bay as well.

A number of Hallocks were born in this little home, and some are still alive today. The family raised grapes and ran a blacksmith shop which would one day be washed away with the waves, which is why we find horseshoes scattered about the shore on a regular basis. The Hallocks married into the Sanderson family and when they united, fishing became a focus of theirs that carried on long beyond that of North Bass. The families enjoyed their island lives and were certainly respected and an important part of the community. They transported the mail between islands, were postmasters, and always had food to share with anyone who might land on their doorstep. It was Prohibition in the end, like so many, that forced the two families to move off the island. They sadly sold out to Meier's Wine Cellars shortly after the company took an interest in purchasing the small island farms. They reluctantly moved to Sandusky and found themselves living among a number of North Bass families residing on Decatur St. In a way it is as if by living on the same street they were trying to maintain some of the close bonds once established, the type which can only be forged when you share an island way of life.

Henry Sonneman owned Meier's Wine Cellars, and it was he who dubbed the home "The Lodge" as it would permanently be known. He would use The Lodge as a place to work from while on the island as well as a place to entertain his many guests. Anyone who owns an island home understands guests are frequent and here was no exception. So in the 1960's, Henry decided to expand the structure and it took on the basic form we see today. One of the oldest buildings on the island became the most modern and luxurious one there to date. An addition of a number of bedrooms with private baths and a huge kitchen outfitted with the latest appliances, along with a large walk in pantry and a complete redecoration, made it a very comfortable and cozy place to be.

In the early 1970's, the Winery along with much of the island found itself for sale and was purchased by Bob Gottesman, owner of Paramount Distillery in Cleveland, Ohio. Along with his purchase of the island came an overall expansion, extending not only to the island as a whole, but The Lodge as well. Mr. Gottesman enjoyed much success in business and because of this The Lodge has played host to many other successful people, such as Governors, Senators, Congressmen, and many other well-known individuals from all walks of life. However, the building was also his home and he would come here often to fish and relax, to walk among his vineyards, and to enjoy the peaceful island surroundings. It was at The Lodge were Mr. Gottesman would hold a large family reunion,

with relatives coming from all over the country to attend this highly anticipated yearly event. He also had other ideas for the house and not long after he purchased North Bass he started an exclusive hunt club which operated for years upon the island. Groups of avid hunters would enjoy a couple of days hunting and a stay at The Lodge with all their needs attended to.

The Lodge also was used by the island community from time to time. In the late 70's, the school boiler broke in the middle of the winter, so the children and teacher met for classes in The Lodge until a new one could be retrieved across the ice. The building has shared Thanksgivings,

wedding parties, funeral gatherings, birthday parties, plus numerous other events. Many islanders from long ago and the more present share a past with this building; it does and always has meant a lot to those who know the island as home. Then again, a change of ownership took place in 2004 when the State purchased the Winery's interests upon the island. The Lodge is now within their hands. If only the walls could talk; it now stands empty and unused as if waiting at attention for its next command, like the soldiers who once used it so long ago

## **EIC-BSC Native Tree & Plant Sale**

The Lake Erie Islands Chapter of the Black Swamp Conservancy (LEIC-BSC) is now taking orders for native trees and plants to raise money for the newly acquired Lake Erie Islands Nature and Wildlife Center located on Meechen Road that was purchased jointly in 2008 by the LEIC-BSC and the Lake Erie Islands Historical Society.

All native trees for sale are sold in 3-gallon containers and range from \$25 (1-2' tall) to \$40 each (3-6' tall). The ten varieties available are White Oak, Chinkapin Oak, Northern Red Oak, Swamp White Oak, Bur Oak, Kentucky Coffee Tree, Silver Maple, American Sycamore, Sassafras and Boxelder. All the trees are native to the islands and will thrive in this environment. They have been grown from Ohio seed stock by Riverside Trees in Delaware, Ohio.

## Port Authority levy on May 5th ballot

The Port Authority has placed a one-mill tax levy request on the May 5, 2009 Special election ballot. The previous tax levy funding expired on December 31, 2008 and currently the Port is operating without the assistance from any property tax funds. The usage of the levy funds would be to retire the debt of the initial purchase of Put-in-Bay and North Bass Island Airports. The balance of the funds would be utilized for operational expenses which include terminal service employees at the Put-in-Bay Airport.

Through the Port Authority's assistance, the Middle Bass has an improved dock facility. Also, the PIB Volunteer Fire Dept. received reduced insurance rates directly due to the installation of the waterline in the township which the Port Authority help ed fund with over \$1.3 million. A reduced insurance rating has also been extended to all property owners along that line due to the Fire Department having access to fire hydrants. An extended question and answer session regarding the levy will be held on Saturday, April 25th at 10 a.m. at the Town Hall to discuss the levy request.

### Lake Erie Islands Browns Backers donate funds to local charities

The Lake Erie Islands Browns Backers out of Put-in-Bay, spend all year raising money for the local community as well as cheering on the Browns. The fundraising starts with Draft Day in April than their biggest fundraiser, the Lake Erie Islands Browns Backers Rib Burn Off that will be June 20, 2009, to tailgate parties every Sunday during football season. The main events are held at the club's official headquarters, The Skyway Restaurant &

Lounge. The club was named "2007 Club of the Year" by the Cleveland Browns as well as being "Club of the Month" numerous times.

After donating all of the club's emergency money fund last year to the fire chief on the island, the club voted on replenishing this fund for the future with \$1,000.00. Every year the club donates \$500.00 to the Cleveland Browns Foundation as well as three local high school scholarship

The club is working on a new fundraiser for the fall, the Lake Erie Islands Browns Backers Golf Tournament. This fundraiser was suggested to help keep the club's scholarship growing so more local kids can benefit.

Since their inception in 2001, the Lake Erie Islands Browns Backers have been dedicated to supporting their local community, while enjoying their love for the Browns.

### PIB Archery team to compete in Nationals by Susan Harrington

When you think of March Madness, you think of basketball. Put-in-Bay School got a taste of March Madness but in a sport very different from basketball. The Put-in-Bay School Archery Team got a ticket to the big dance and qualified for the NASP Archery National Championships in the high school division.

Teams that qualify for the NASP Archery Nationals at the high school level are normally made up of 16 - 24 high school students. Due to the small size of Put-in-Bay School, putting together a team required some creative thinking outside the box. The Put-in-Bay 'high school team' is made up of one high school student, six middle school students, and ten elementary students.

The team members are also all beginners at archery. The team had their first archery lessons in physical education class in late October. This under-aged, underexperienced team of over-achievers has worked very hard to reach their goals.

The team's first official competition was at the NASP Ohio State Archery Championships on March 6th in Columbus, Ohio. The team finished in 8th place. The team scored a remarkable 2711 points which qualified them for the National Championships. The team also got to see Arnold Schwarzenegger and got autographs from Randy Couture (UFC wrestler).

This is the first time that Put in Bay has competed at a State Championship in any sport. This will also be the first time that Put-in-Bay will compete at a National Championship. The National Championships will be held in Louisville, Kentucky on May 8th and 9th.

The team is really looking forward to taking their game to the next level and competing at the Nationals in Louisville, Kentucky. In the words of the fourth grade team members, "We want to do our best and we want to eat some Kentucky Fried Chicken IN Kentucky!"

In the State Championship, archers shot 30 arrows with a maximum possible score of 300 points. Put-in-Bay individual scores were: High School: Robert Courtney -259; Middle School: Mitchell Blumensaadt 234, Wyatt Auger - 233, Casey Pippert Ladd - 232, Riley Drake - 226, Molly Domer - 213, Victoria Wertenbach - 201; Elementary School: Ian Pippert Ladd - 247, Tyler King -240, Elyse Drake - 233, Meredith Engel - 205, Gunnar Auger - 203, Sophia Schroeder - 188, Tom Chrysler - 184, Matthew Luecke - 177, Carter Pugh - 167, and Ericson Booker - 133.

Advisor Susan Harrington said, "This success could not have come to a nicer bunch of kids. They are the kind of kids who say "thank you' and mean it. Where else but Put-in-Bay do you have kids who say 'thank you for letting us have practice today.' This team's success is due to their self confidence and their ability to concentrate. They can also rebound quickly; if they shoot a bad arrow, it is no big deal, they come right back and get a bullseye on the next arrow. We feel like we are Cinderella, and we are on our way to the NCAA Final Four!"

The Ohio NASP (National Archery in Schools Program) is coordinated by the Ohio Division of Wildlife. The program

LaVina Greunke Salute

LaVina Greunke Salute, 95, of Spring Hill, died Mar 20, 2009, at Spring Hill Regional Hospital. She was born in Milford, Indiana, on April 13, 1913, and moved to Spring Hill in 1986. She worked as an entertainer and did volunteer entertaining at nursing homes. She was a member of First Baptist Church where she sang and played piano.

Lavina will long be cherished for her enthusiastic love of life as well as for her gifted piano playing and singing in the Round House.

She and her late husband, Bill, purchased the Round House and Park Hotel in 1944, creating a thriving business in the post-war years which centered around LaVina's talented, as well as colorful and largely humorous renditions, of old favorites and contemporary songs of the day. Her effervescent presence emanated from center stage in what was originally a round bar, but eventually became a semi circular bar so that more people could crowd in to hear her. Her ready smile and loving wit charmed one and all. She became adept at throwing up her arms and then striking the right keys in rhythm while she belted out "You Can Throw A Silver Dollar," always bringing the house down. Late in the evening, when she sang "The Indian Love Song," there was not a dry eye among the remaining revelers.

In the late 40s and early 50s a large ferry ran daily from Detroit. Each summer, at the end of the season, she would get in the back of a pick up with a group of Island friends, including the McCanns and Duggans, and head for the docks where she played her accordion and serenaded the last ferry, quickly to be answered by the on-board orchestra, with the captain madly blasting his booming steam horn and the passengers cheering. The long gray winter on the island would soon set in. During the ice fishing season she switched from piano to apron and became the chief cook for the Park Hotel's 50+ weekend fishermen guests.

LaVina was born in a farm town in Indiana where her father ran a small bus line. Her three octave vocal range and advanced piano skills were soon evident as she sang opera on the radio at age 10 and in her later teens pounded out honky-tonk piano, for 10 cents an hour, in a theater showing silent films. Three years after her only child, Greg, was born the family began sailing to the island on weekends. This eventually led to the purchase of cottages on the north shore and shortly thereafter the Greunkes settled in a permanent location on the island, acquiring the Round House and Park Hotel.

The family left the Island in 1953 and moved to Clearwater, Florida. After the passing of Bill and her marriage to Ted Salute, she started a whole new life. The Salutes traveled extensively around the US including visits back to the Island. Their big adventure was to Australia via the far east - to see her son Greg and his family who were living in Sydney.

Always the entertainer, her music eventually glided gracefully into the gospel format. She was a featured soloist at her church, her voice still hitting the high notes as only she knew how. Before services she played a healing piano prelude with a smile to all who came to worship. In her 80s and 90s she delighted in entertaining others of a lesser age in rest homes several days a week. She continued volunteering in this way until just a few weeks before her death.

In her 50s, and for many, many years after, she resumed painting and captured the dark mystery of a sunset over a Florida swamp, brooding pines dripping with Spanish moss, as well as the action in sports scenes - especially horse racing - and the quietude of a still life as simple as a piece of bread, on a cutting board, begging to be eaten. Sundays found her cheering the Tampa Bay Bucs - she knew all the players by name - and on Saturdays she engaged in lively hands of pinochle with Ted and his family. She did not like to lose... but always took it gracefully. An extremely verbal commentator on politics to the end, she was overjoyed with the recent national election. Her correspondence included Presidents, authors, newspaper editors and a myriad of friends She passed away peacefully in the early morning of March 20th, Ted by her side continuously. "Stinky," as she became known on the island, will be known by one and all forever and will be truly missed. ## **PIB Island Mayor turns** down stimulus package

Put-in-Bay Island Mayor Mack McCain says he and the town council will turn down any stimulus package money from Washington. At their March meeting, McCain challenged council to come up with ideas on how to increase revenue and save money during these tight economic times without depending on handouts from the Feds.

Members of council were quick to respond with belt-tightening and "revenue-enhancing" ideas.

The first suggestion was to rent cabana chairs at the bathing beach and charge visitors a nominal fee for swimming there. Season passes would be available for islanders and cottagers allowing them to swim there.

Other members quickly followed with suggestions of using the town hall for nightly Bingo games and child care. "We've already got a bingo board in the assembly room, plus plenty of play stuff upstairs which island pre-schoolers use in the winter time and go unused during the tourist season. We could offer "baby-sitting" service for island visitors and seasonal employees," said Judy Bearie.

Bill Jelloson suggested closing every third stall in the public restrooms in the Village park. That, alone, would save 33.3% in operating costs.

Bob Cooked suggested charging tourists 50 cents to walk through the park. "Can you imagine how much money that alone would bring in?" he proudly told the mayor.

Ruth Scampelli reported she already had approached Maizie Cox about renting space in the bath house building for a non-denominational confessional booth. Maizie, who already performs weddings on the islands, would be happy to expand her ministerial serves to those who empty the numerous island bars at night seeking redemption. Instead of saying "Hail Marys," Sinners could simply drop what spare change they have into a collection plate and walk away cleansed. One council person quipped, "A confessional at the bathhouse might bring in more revenue than the showers."

Other suggestions included user fees (taxes in plain English) on potlucks, ATVs, ice shanties, bicycles, snowmobiles, party beads and spud bars.

Head of the island police department, Rick Lampale, said he could cut the police budget by doing away with the harbor patrol boat and getting a jet ski or two to provide emergency service on the waters surrounding the islands. The chief also wants to install an ATM machine in the waiting room at the police station so transaction fees can be earned on folks getting out their bail money. Lampale also wants golf carts for his police officers so they won't waste gas riding around in the police cruisers.

Mayor McCain was so impressed with the ideas, he sent them all to committee where he hopes they will become incorporated along with earmarks in future legislation. "If all else fails, we can mortgage the town hall and sewage treatment plant to raise some quick cash, " said Mayor McCain.

## Skyway to dedicate new women's restroom Apr. 6th

With summer right around the corner, the crew at the ever-popular Skyway Restaurant has been busy remodeling their women's restroom. Plans call for a gala celebration and unveiling on Martini Monday, April 6th. Everyone is invited to come out to the Skyway about 6 p.m. and enjoy the firstever women's restroom remodeling celebration on the island. There may be a crowd, so reservations are recommended. Men and women alike are welcome to attend and see the new facility which has been redecorated from top to bottom. A complimentary toast and poo-poo platter will be served.

The Put-in-Bay Bayzette's nose-to-the-ground reporter has uncovered details about the redo which are printed exclusively here for the first time. There will be one less stall, new soap dispensers, new paint on the walls, "higher commodes" and smoother rolling tissue dispensers.

Skyway owner Susan Thwaite ruled out the possibility there might be a urinal installed. "It never was an issue, but someone downtown started that story weeks ago, and we flushed that rumor immediately.

## **Island** police to get GPS

The Put-in-Bay Island Police Department announced it will be installing portable heavy-duty GPS units in all of its police vehicles on South Bass and Middle Bass Islands this coming month. Chief Rick Lampale convinced Township Council to fork over nearly \$15,500 for the four units, telling them his officers needed them to save lives and property and to protect the island from a terrorist attack. When Ray Stuffenburg from Northshore Cab Company heard about the police getting GPS, he told the Bayzette he will not be installing GPS units in his car, but, instead, radar units like boaters use on their boats. Ray said he would also be installing new digital to analog televison converters in his cabs in time for the change over in June. These changes will serve the same purpose as GPS.



In an effort to raise money for the South Bass Island Port Authority, Derriere Bob has offered to have this giant fiberglass cow placed in front of the terminal to promote business. The cow, about 10 feet high, is guite an attraction, but Bob says he won't bring it to Put-in-Bay from Michigan until he gets a thumbs up from Port Authority Members.

## **Airport authorities** explore funding options

The Bass Islands Port Authority reports it will ask for as much money from President Obama's stimulus package as it can get, but short of a massive bailout for the island airports, authority members are continuing to explore new avenues of funding for their cash-strapped entity.

Members recently learned there is FAA funding for a team of TSA (Transportation Security Agency) officers who would be stationed at all four island airports - Put-in-Bay, Middle Bass, North Bass and Rattlesnake Island. The FAA would actually pay the Bass Island Port Authority to allow them to provide security. This would mean baggage checks and shoes-off inspections for anyone flying out of the island airports, but if it meant \$25,000 additional revenue a year, it would be well worth it. The one down side would be the cost of installing the baggage scanners and metal detectors in the waiting room at the terminals on the four islands with airports.

The best idea for raising revenue came from Authority head Terry Burnt who suggested opening a pizza parlor at the PIB Airport. "There's no pizza place in this part of the island, plus we've already got rental golfcarts we can use for the free delivery," he told fellow members. He added, "I've seen what success they've had selling pizza downtown, and unless all our pizzas are burnt (no pun intended), we can't lose." Hattrick Myers took the idea a step farther saying Derriere Bob could offer delivery to the upper islands in his plane.

One last idea for saving money also has merit. Officials want to shorten the runway by 200 feet to save about \$10,000 a year in maintenance costs. They could then sell off a building lot and not worry about having voters pass levies to pay off the airport property.

### Green Island could annex Put-in-Bay

Visiting environmental professor, Dr. Sarkasian Olgivie, at The Ohio State University uncovered a here-to-fore unknown codicil in Ohio's state archives in Columbus directing South Bass Island, Put-in-Bay Village and the township of Put-in-Bay to become part of Green Island to fulfill "environmental imperatives" of the Western Reserve. Doctor Ogilvie was rumored to have last visited the island five years ago with his blonde college-aged graduate assistant, although no-one recalled meeting the two of them after they were spotted late one night doing the frug at the Round House.

## **Island Profile Patty Bauer** by Kit Miniclier

Sometimes regulars share their intimate secrets with this petite, blue-eyed pixie barely moments before she spontaneously sheds her decorum (but not her clothes) to dance on the bar.

Even without her roller blades, the veteran bartender seems to be moving much faster, and with more purpose, than anyone else at Tipper's or the Boathouse.

Ironically, she marked the first day of spring this year by working at the Winter Bar in the Park Hotel.

Although she lives in the "Walleye Capital of the World," her favorite dish is a tuna casserole.

During her last three years of high school in Fostoria, she learned first hand about life and death as an orderly in a nursing home.

"I'd just get to know someone and they'd die." As part of her training "each of us had to prepare a

body for the undertaker."

She credits that experience, and the fact that both her parents are in their 80s, with giving her the focus and patience to appreciate, make time for and enjoy older people.

"Patty makes a point of taking care of the older people first, always making them comfortable," says Tipper, who wooed her away from the Boathouse after

nineteen years.

"It takes a very special person to work behind the bar and always keep the same friendly attitude," Tipper said, adding:

"She is the best we could have hired. When she walks in everything is taken care of." Instead of bartending for a season or two and moving "up" to the corporate world, Patty Ann Bauer says she did it "backward" - moving from the corporate world, with an oil company, back to the island to become a full-time bartender.

After 20 years behind bars at Put-in-Bay, she is probably the senior bartender on an island offering at least 51 bars suggested Paula Garsteck, a veteran bartender at the Roundhouse and a friend of Patty's.

When Patty worked in the office of Island Resorts, she'd often get to work before 7 a.m., work until five, go home and freshen up, and then work at the Boathouse from 6 p.m. until closing.

'She is good at everything she does and is a kind, thoughtful person who loves her family. She has a treadmill in the living room and I understand her cats walk on it too," said Caroline McCabe, who worked with her in Island Resorts.

Patty started work in Put-in-Bay in the summer of 1989, as a waitress at the Boathouse. Her sister Rose worked there as a bartender. Patty fell in love with the friendliness of the island, and really enjoyed waiting tables.

> When she asked if she could come back as a server the Michael McCann, refused,

insisting she work behind the bar.

"It was the best thing he could have done," Patty says now, with an infectious smile.

"I may have a hard time with their names, but I know their drinks."

When regulars come through the door to the "Wrinkle Room" at Tipper's for Happy Hour, Patty likes to have their beverage of choice on the bar waiting for them as they sit down.

Her sunny, bubbly personality lifts spirits (literally and figuratively) at the bar and she is a pillar of stability for those in need.

If you have a personal problem she will listen. If there is a dispute, her diplomatic skills may suggest a less rocky road to communication.

"I love my job. I love talking and joking with people," says Patty.

"She always has an ear ready to listen and has a way of handling people without calling security," said regular Ted Hiles.

"She gets respect from people because she is respectful...sometimes she is a bit of a smart a--...She can give it as well as she takes it," Hiles added with an amiable smile.

Although Patty is manager of the 30-stool bar at Tipper's, she doesn't do job interviews or hiring. Those tasks are left to the owners. "I get to do the firing," she added.

What does she look for in a bartender?

"A great, outgoing personality, a good memory for drinks and the prompt, accurate, precise making of drinks," she unhesitatingly replied.

There aren't any resident shrinks on the island, so some bartenders, including Patty, become involuntary hometown psychologists. "We hear a lot and I'm learning to keep secrets," she said with a twinkle in her

Two customers who eventually married credit Patty with their marriage and at least one other couple credit her with melting glaciers of misunderstanding between them.

Her worst experience behind bars? "A woman spit in my face because she didn't think I waited on her fast enough." After dashing off to wash her face, Patty came back to kick her out, but the spitter had vanished.

As a generality she says drunk women tend to argue more than their inebriated male counterparts. Ever the diplomat, Patty refers to inebriated customers following season, her boss, as "over-served," and she asks them to leave.

## Lorain to PIB ferry moving along

Things are looking up for ferry service from Lorain, Ohio to Put-in-Bay this summer. The Lorain Port Authority recently receive two bids for a ferry boat which can provide ferry service this summer starting as early as July 4th.

The Port Authority has \$1.4 million in federal funds for the purchase, and The Jet Express, which will operate the service to the islands from the Black River Landing, has agreed to put up \$350,000 in required matching funds. The Jet Express will own 49 percent of the new ferry and will run and maintain it.

In the first round of bidding, no bids were received. The Port Authority will to either accept or reject the bids early in April.

## Trustees urge yes vote on reduced fire dept. levy

The Put-in-Bay Township Trustees will ask voters of South Bass Island to pass a 1.2mil levy to fund the Put-in-Bay Volunteer Fire Department. The previous 4.0 mil levy was mistakenly not put on the November 2008 election ballot for renewal. This new levy will generate approximately the same or slightly less dollars as the 4.0 levy did.

The Trustees and the Put-in-Bay Volunteer Fire Department understand the hard times facing everyone due to the current economic downturn and will be striving to make due with less. The 1.2 mil levy will support a Volunteer Fire Department which costs little compared to a paid (personnel) department.

The South Bass Island Volunteer Fire Department is still paying off the balance for two new fire trucks which was supported by the 4.0-mil levy. Due to the 4.0-mil levy not being on the ballot in 2008, we will receive no tax payer funding in 2009. The lack of this funding has caused the Put-in-Bay Volunteer Fire Department to curtail needed improvements, and they will have problems making the final payments on the new fire trucks.

The voters are being asked to consider this levy on May 5th, 2009. Volunteer departments are the most cost effective of fire departments. The Put-in-Bay Volunteer Fire Department has worked to lower fire ratings on South Bass Island from a nine to a six in many areas of the island. These improvements should help lower your insurance rates if the voters approve the 1.2-mil levy. Having the South Bass Island Volunteer Fire Department will continue to keep our ratings down and help to lower them in some of the other areas of South Bass Island.

Unfortunately, if the levy were not to pass, the rating may go up to 10 and in some cases make properties uninsurable because we would not be able to maintain a Fire Department without funding. Put-in-Bay Volunteer Fire Department does not have the luxury of mutual aide with other fire departments. This department is your only choice for fire protection. We thank you for your time and patience and hope this answers your questions. - *The Put-in-Bay Township Trustees*.

# 23rd Blessing of Fleet scheduled for April 28

PUT-IN-BAY – Three island ministers will bless a fleet of ferry boats, fishing vessels and emergency and rescue craft here on Tuesday, April 28, at the 23rd Annual Put-in-Bay Blessing of the Fleet. The blessing will take place beginning at 11 a.m. on Fox's Dock, near where the Jet Express docks, in downtown Put-in-Bay.

The idea of blessing the fleet is a centuries-old tradition. Ports often bless boats in the spring for a prosperous fishing season. The main focus behind the blessings is that the vessels and those who operate them return safely to port.

"All of the vessels being blessed are important to our lives here on the island," said Mike Steidl, Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce President. "Safe passage is always the goal."

Put-in-Bay School's choir will perform a medley of songs under the direction of Gay Pippert as part of the ceremony. There will also be a moment of silence for those who lost their lives at sea.

Rev. Webster Maughn from St. Paul's Episcopal Church and Father Ron Brickner from Mother of Sorrows Catholic Church and Rev. Dan Keck from St. John's Lutheran Church are scheduled to administer the blessings from the dock.

The traditional fleet blessing prayer asks God to bless the vessel, its equipment and all those who use it. The ministers' prayers also ask Jesus Christ, who calmed a storm on the sea, and filled his apostles' fishing nets with fish, to bring everyone back to safe harbor.

Watercraft will circle the bay after a rendezvous at the Middle Bass Island dock. They will each receive a blessing as they pass by Fox's Dock at Put-in-Bay. Each blessing takes about 45 seconds and the entire ceremony takes about 30 minutes.

About 20 vessels participate each year, including aircraft from Griffing Flying Service in Sandusky and Dairy Air from Put-in-Bay. Lifeflight from St. Vincent Hospital in Toledo and Metro Health in Cleveland have also participated.

Charter boat captain Pat Chrysler will be the "on water" marshal for the event. Also

participating will be Miller Boat Line, the Jet Express, charter captain Joe Kostura of Hard Water Charters, emergency and marine towing vessels and rescue craft from the U.S. Coast Guard Marblehead Station.

When the Miller ferry pauses to be blessed, it is significant to note Mary Ann Market, owner of the boat line with her three adult children, was one of the original organizers of the event. She co-chaired the event for 15 years. Miller Boat Line began running its 2009 schedule on March 20.

At the end of the ceremony the watercraft will gather for another tradition - a mariner's salute of two long and three short horn blasts.

Coffee, hot chocolate, cookies and donuts will be served on Fox's Dock after the ceremony.

They will deny it, so I just take their drink." She rarely needs to alert security.

Asked about her personality, which prompts her to practically sprint from place to place, she shrugged, agreeing that she is a bit hyper.

"I've always been on the go. I always find something to do to keep busy." She tries to walk three or four miles a day and enjoys both biking and roller blading. Friends say she has a treadmill in her home which her two house cats -Mimi and Maxine - share.

The cats were found under the Roundhouse three years ago and she says Teri Winchester talked her into keeping them.

After working 70 hours a week during high season she likes to go with a couple of friends and just hang out at one of the island's quieter bars, which don't have live bands or blaring loud speakers broadcasting the latest compressed musical offerings.

Summer nights she works from 6 p.m. until closing six days a week

In summer the bars close at 2:30 a.m. However, in the winter, when only islanders are about, the last guest gone on a truly memorable (if anyone can) night may not be until 4 a.m. Her cats awaken her by 9 a.m. to play.

Patty is devoted to her parents and her sister's children and is already trying to persuade the kids to come and work on our island when they grow up. However, their parents operate a marina in Marblehead and have different ideas.

"I have great parents, Dad will be 88 in June and Mom is 85. They are both very healthy and still worry about me, as all parents do."

The other day her Mom, Corrine, came over to the island to help Patty pack up her three-bedroom bungalow at the Island Club, which she had just sold to pay for a new home she is building elsewhere on South Bass Island.

They got everything boxed up in one day with the help of Linda Ostrander and Stephanie Thompson. Where does Patty get her energy, enthusiasm and good cheer? "From me, I guess," her Mom spritely quipped.

We are once again connected to the outside world. The first ferry ran on April 26 and I don't think there was one person left on the island.

### THE LIBRARY

The Big Read is heading for 100% so if you haven't signed up, please do. An official count was made on March 1 and 128 people were physically on the island. That is the goal. You can still sign up as a supporter, that counts too! Go to the Village website www.KelleysIsland.us and click on Big Read to contact Elaine). It's a shame the eagles weren't included in the count. They were spotted spring cleaning and repairing their nest at the end of February. By the way, our little branch library has some very impressive statistics under its belt. In 2008, the library circulated 7,735 items including 2,233 adult books, 2,855 children's books, 2,264 movies, 301 magazines, and 23 books on tape/CD.

### SAFETY AWARDS

The island's safety services were honored with an award from St. V's (Life Flight) for their assistance at the plane crash incident in 2007. A St. V 's Life Flight Conference honored our hard-working safety services with a

plaque and the Dr. Frank Foss EMS Excellence Award. Accepting the award were Sally Hiller and Kathy Reddinger (EMS), Jack Hostal and Paul Hiller (Fire Dept.), Sharon Devine (Paramedic), and David Green (Police Dept.).

### RESORT TAX

The resort tax receipts are in and are a bit lower than previous years. The village received \$115,932 which equals \$7,728,800 in taxable sales. The resort tax is reported on sales in the village on items subject to the regular sales tax.

### **GREEN OPTIONS**

Council met in February for a work session. Different from the Council meetings, officials were encouraged to share their projects, concerns and comments. Recycling and Green initiatives include the purchase of an oil heater for waste oil for the maintenance building. An oil recycling program will likely be started. Aluminum cans continue to be accepted at the transfer station and other recycling options are under consideration. The scrap metal collection day is May 30.

### VILLAGE WEBSITE

The village website, www.KelleysIsland.us, has loads of information for residents and visitors. You can look up sections of the Village Code, email your officials and download and request forms. Coming soon, PLANNING COMMISSION minutes. These will be of interest as the members have been working on rewriting the Zoning Code.

### **OTHER VILLAGE NEWS**

Work will continue on the Dwelle house, public restrooms and Kelleys Hall lift/elevator and restroom project. Trees, drainage and sidewalks will be priorities this year with hazards identified and action taken to assure resolution. The WATER DEPT. has presented Council with legislation to raise tap fees. The standard 3/4" tap will increase from \$3500 to \$7000. Don Alexander explained this was more an impact fee than a tap-in fee. John Kilko would like to see the Port Authority brought back to the Council table. Reassignment of powers from Council to the Port Authority was previously tabled. There will likely be a Council workshop on April 11 and the Council meeting will move to the 25th because of Easter. **AIRPORT** 

The Airport Layout Plan is moving through the FAA review process. On the ballot this May will be a levy to cover repairs and resurfacing of the runways. Tom Griffing encourages voters to approve this levy. The Village

## Middle Bass Buzz Mid Bass State Park project gets \$1.2M funding

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources has released \$1,256,700 for the water, wastewater and electrical utilities project at Middle Bass Island State Park.

"This project is critical to the vitality of Middle Bass Island State Park and Ottawa County as a whole," Rep. Dennis Murray said. "I'm extremely pleased the state saw the importance of this project, and I am excited to see what the park will look like when it's completed."

The project consists of the construction of utility system infrastructure to support current and projected future development within Middle Bass Island State Park, including the recently renovated marina basin.

Major items of work include new water and sewer lines

### Middle Bass State Park **Dock Lottery**

There were 35 applications for seasonal docks at the Lonz Marina received by the deadline of February 25, 2009, 5 p.m. at the Catawba State Park Office. There were 70 slips set aside for the seasonal dock lottery. The drawing was conducted at the Catawba State Park office on March 5, 2009, 6 p.m. Thirty-four docks were assigned through the seasonal dock lottery. One of the 35 applications was a duplication, hence 34 docks were assigned out of the 35 applications received. Karen Beckman, the assistant park manager for Middle Bass, has been contacting those dock holders to work out the details. This year, the price of a seasonal dock is about \$30 a foot. By 2011, plans call for an increase to \$50 per foot.

### Spring construction plans

Construction on the water tower near the school house and lines will continue. The Electric infrastructure will be built out. New roadways will be further planned and temporary roads will be used. There are to be some finishing touches to the marina basin, including two pipe piles and some rock in the channel to be cleared out. Docks are currently scheduled to be completed for public use the beginning of June.

to connect the park to existing treatment facilities and a new elevated water tank (now under construction), an expanded electrical distribution system, proper abandoning of two existing groundwater wells that are no longer used, and miscellaneous minor site improvements.

Water supply and wastewater treatment will be provided through a previously executed agreement between Ohio Department of Natural Resources and the Lake Erie Utilities Company, who is in the process of upgrading their treatment plants to handle the additional demand.

All work on the project is scheduled for completion by September 2009.

### Safety

In regards to the General Public Docks in the Lonz Marina - docks may be in the water, but will not be available for use until they are certified by the contractors and engineers for pubic use. Contractors working on the docks have asked to let boaters know excessive boat traffic this spring could slow their progress. Please don't encourage boat traffic into the marina while the docks are being finished "on-site."

### **Management change**

Scott Doty, who was Regional Manager of the Lake Erie Island State Parks, has taken a new position at Maumee Bay and Harrison Lake Region State Parks. Ina Brolis, Regional Park Manager of East Harbor will assume the regional responsibilities over Lake Erie Islands. ## Man takes plea deal, will serve time

A man arrested for raping a woman at Put-in-Bay last August agreed to a plea deal in Ottawa County Common Pleas Court. Sammy Battigaglia, 53, Springfield, pleaded guilty to felony attempted abduction last month in a deal with the prosecutor's office. He had originally been charged with rape, two counts of kidnapping, one count of assault and two counts of abduction involving a 26-year-old woman. He received a sentence of 17 months in prison.

The woman told police Battigaglia was a long-time family friend and 'fatherlike figure." She was at the island with him to celebrate his birthday with another friend, who canceled at the last minute.

The woman told police she and Battigaglia went back to the room after an evening out so she could go to sleep, but he held her down and assaulted her. After the assault, she told Battigaglia she had to use the bathroom and she escaped from the room.

Hotel staff called Put-in-Bay police who found Battigaglia in the hotel room, visibly intoxicated.
