As part of our Bicentennial Celebration Year of the Native American we will focus this year's

activities and displays on the First Nation tribes and heritage in Canada. As always we will celebrate Independence Day with our Canadian friends by serving cake at noon. Activities will run from 11 am - 2pm at the Perry's Victory Visitor Center. 

Lawsuit filed against island police, village and township

Last July, West Shore home owner Brad Ohlemacher was in his pool in the early hours of the morning. The neighbors called the Put-in-Bay Police when they heard the noise. This was the third complaint by the neighbors.

The police ended up hauling Ohlemacher off to jail, cut and bruised and charged with four misdemeanors: resisting arrest, criminal mischief, disorderly conduct and disorderly conduct with intoxication.

When all was said and done, the prosecutor dismissed three of the charges, and Magistrate Lou Wargo found Ohlemacher not guilty of the remaining charge after a bench trial in Ottawa County Municipal Court in April.

Ohlemacher decided to turn to federal court and file a suit asking for more than \$75,000 in damages. He alleges the officers wrongfully and maliciously arrested him and violated his civil rights. He is suing the Village of Put-in-Bay and Put-in-Bay Township, plus Put-in-Bay Police Chief Ric Lampela and three police officers Aaron Crawford, Jeffrey Corwin and Michael Coyne, in U.S. District Court in Toledo.

Ohlemacher's claims Put-in-Bay Police Officer Aaron Crawford arrived at his home and walked behind the house to the pool, doing this without permission or a warrant. The officer supposedly told him he needed to respect others and advised him when there is a complaint, the police have to

Ohlemacher reportedly began using profanity and yelling at the officer, who then threatened to arrest him for disorderly conduct with intoxication. The police officer wrote in his report Ohlemacher told him to get off his property several times and about a scuffle that followed

It ended with Crawford and another officer, Jeffrey Corwin, taking Ohlemacher into custody and taking him to jail at the Town Hall. Ohlemacher reportedly resisted being cuffed, refused to walk a line twice and the officers had to carry him. According to the lawsuit incident, he suffered a concussion and bruises during the incident when officers shoved his head into a wall.

Records show officers returned to Ohlemacher's home later that morning after he spent a few hours in jail, returned home and then allegedly threatened the neighbor who made the complaint. Ohlemacher says police should not have entered his home, but officers claim a man staying at the house let them in.

In the federal lawsuit, Ohlemacher claims when he told the officer to leave the property, he should have obeyed because he did not have permission or a warrant

to be there. The law allows for officers to enter a property without a warrant, but only when there is a violent crime, a suspect is armed or believed to be on the property or is likely to escape if

not caught quickly. The lawsuit continues saying the police violated Ohlemacher's Fourth Amendment rights against illegal search and seizure and his Fourteenth Amendment rights against depriving U.S. citizens of life, liberty or property without due process of law.

In the past, suits like this have been turned over to the Village's insurance com-



Life on North Bass Is a Life on Boats By Robin Burris Cadez

North Bass is probably the most remote island in Lake Erie which is inhabited by year round residents. The island is the last U.S. point before the Canadian border. Even though now the island has more modern conveniences, it is less connected to the mainland than the early years of settlement. Now the only way to the island is by private boat, airplane, water taxi or charter ferry service. All of which come at a

cost, some more than others. However, it wasn't always so difficult to stay connected to the mainland, which islanders refer to as "town."

North Bass was first permanently settled in 1844, and by the mid 1860's there were thirty-one families residing upon the mile-by-mile island. The islanders quickly developed a community and a number of businesses were soon

flourishing. Vineyards and fruit trees covered the landscape, and wine, fish and wool were among the items



the islanders would need to export to mainland buyers. The combined amount of people and the need to ship goods meant a demand for steamer service, and depending on the time of the year, there could be as many as four steamers a day in, and as few as one stopping every other day, and they would continue this way until the season of navigation would come to a close every winter. Some of the steamers to frequent North Bass were Philo Parson's, Chief Justice Waite, American Eagle, Arrow, and Chippewa to name a few.

There were also a number of excursions that would stop by North Bass. Often several of the steamer companies would hold day races against each other, with the ships making stops at Kelleys, Put-in-Bay, Middle Bass and finishing up on North Bass. The North Bass Wine Co. was located just down from the foot of the dock, so the ships would pull in and tourists would flock into the cellars to sample the fine island wine. Sometimes the excursions would come from islands to the mainland so the islanders could enjoy special treats such as the county fair or horse races. In 1888, The City of Sandusky ran special trips with a round trip fare of 50 cents, leaving North Bass at 6:15 a.m. with stops at the other islands along the way to Sandusky so island folks could enjoy a day at the fair, then departing the city at 5 p.m. for the return trip home.

John Cummings boat on North Bass about 1914. Most of the boats on the islands during this time would have looked much like this one.

In the early 1890's, Capt. Michael Sietz set the wheels in motion for change and brought the first private steam boat to the island. He hoped to transport guests to Kenney's Club Rooms, a dance hall. Also he would run the mail on days the steamer wouldn't stop and people could purchase a seat to Put-in-Bay where they could catch a commercial steamer to the mainland. These small boats soon took over the fishing industry and private boats became a modern convenience, making life easier getting around the islands. Work could be done more quickly and efficiently and visiting friends an easier venture when not needing to depend on the wind.

Like with many things in the United States, Prohibition had a huge effect upon the islands and everything connected to them. The steamers, too, were hit hard and the demand to and from the islands became less and less until they eventually ceased coming all together. The islanders who remained mostly relied on fishing and, of the course, with the proximity to Canada, bootlegging was a way of life as well. After Prohibition was repealed, North Bass soon found itself once again covered from end to end in lush vineyards. Thus again calling for the need of boat service larger than the islanders themselves could provide. Two local ferries would frequent North Bass, Neuman Boat Line from Sandusky and Parker Boat Line based out of Put-in-Bay. Neuman's would load every inch of its decks with grape bins heading to be pressed, and for many years Parker Boat Line would also make trips from North Bass to Port Clinton taking islanders to run mainland errands every pay day.

By the 1960's, Meier's Wine Cellars had bought out most of the island land owners yet continued to grow grapes upon the island for their winery located in Silverton, Ohio. The need for an all-around work boat became necessary and

the company purchased an old steel hulled fish tug which they renamed the Isle St. George, another name for North Bass. The boat was used as a work horse until the early 70's and was then sold off and the islanders once again depended upon Parker Boat Line.

In 1980, it was thought another work boat on the island could be used. A couple of old fisherman from Sandusky, who were both born and raised on North Bass. were ready to retire and had a 40-ft. steel fish tug named the Favorite Won for sale. A deal was struck and before long the old boat was bobbing in the waters tied off the island's main dock. The two old timers were happy to see their boat heading off to the island they still considered

The Favorite Won has been more than just a boat and has worn many hats with a number of different duties through the years. She would transport the islanders in all kinds of weather to the mainland, act as a school bus when the planes couldn't fly, the old girl has carried the bodies of islanders going home for their final rest, acted as a recovery vessel, hauled grapes, cars, transported the softball team for games and has even delivered Kentucky Fried Chicken to waiting island tables

I have decided to come clean. I am secretly jealous of all the people who grew up on Put-in-Bay, and have moved off after high school. Believe it or not, this is something I swore I was going to do. I would NEVER have thought in a kabillion years I would still be here after my graduation in 1991. I was the snob of my time constantly reminding everyone around me how I was going to move somewhere warm to live and teach school. All I wanted to do was get outta this small town in which I grew up in so I could truly experience life in the "real world" of the mainland.

I have always wondered what my life would have been like if I had moved off the island. It has been years since that moment of truth when I moved my tassel to the other side of my cap and said to myself, "I'm outta here!" And, I was...for a short time. To Bowling Green State University I went, only to return a few years later with my first child and dreams of becoming a teacher in my very own classroom.

That dream came true and I have been a teacher here now for fourteen years at our island school. But, what if? What if I hadn't stayed? What would be different? Would I have travelled to faraway lands to teach children there? Would I have lived barefoot on a different island teaching the youngsters there - Hawaii perhaps? Should I have left?

I'll bet the thirteen high school graduates this year are feeling mixed emotions. It is a bit scary to leave high school, but at the same time an exhilarating emotion of freedom comes over most seniors on graduation day. I felt nostalgic and I think I even felt a tear squeeze out of my eye when the students mentioned ye olde school teacher Miss Christie (that's me) in their speeches this year at our graduation ceremony. I taught ten of the students of this class when they were only first graders, and have had the privilege of watching them grow up, learn new things, and become the amazing people they are today. It's hard for me to believe they have officially graduated!

Each year the day after Put-in-Bay School's graduation, ALL graduates from each year are invited to an annual ban-

quet in which memories are shared along with recognition of 25- and 50-year graduates. We also welcome in the newly graduated from our school. Someday those newly admitted kids will be like me - sitting and reflecting on twenty years of life after high school. Will they come back home after college? Will they make a life for themselves on the mainland?

All of my classmates left. Kristin Altoff, the only other girl in my class of five, was this year's honored graduation speaker. During high school, I can remember her dreaming of leaving to attend Boston College. As young children, we would play in the woods near Perrry's Cave, when my grandpa owned the property, and spend hours making our rock forts. We traded stickers from our collections and can still name our Cabbage Patch dolls. She is all grown up now and is an attorney. She has worked and lived in London, San Francisco, and Washington, D.C. She still continues to amaze me with her brilliance, and as my childhood best friend, we share stories nobody else quite understands.

Tanya Burgess (Sister of Tracy and class of '87) moved away, too. She comes back each June to celebrate at our annual banquet and share stories of her two adorable red-headed children. Tanya is still an artist

> and works in her field today. Michelle (LaPlante) Mettler graduated one year ahead of me. After living here as a child, and teaching me all about things every teenage girl should know, she has gone on to save many lives as a surgical nurse. Jay Faris, the one and only graduate of 1988, went to college, and now works in Port Clinton at the courthouse. He is still hilarious as ever with his quick wit and agrees with me that my dad is a

cool guy. (Please refer to last month's article.) My sister also left the island and joined the Air Force ROTC program at BGSU. During her life she has lived in various places such as Korea, Germany, Texas, North Carolina, and Las Vegas. When she comes home for a visit, I swear all the signs on the island have



magical switches that turn from "Welcome to Put-in-Bay" to "Welcome home Natalie!" I truly enjoy seeing everyone each year at the alumni banquet and especially love it when my sister comes home.

I have lived most of my life here on Put-in-Bay, and while others from our high school have lived abroad, saved people's lives, and are able to shop at TJ Maxx anytime they want, I have to admit, I have had a pretty wonderful life myself. Not too many teachers can say they have taught both their daughters. Just ask Anna, my seventeen year old. I am certain her memories of first grade are as great as mine! When my younger daughter, Meredith, has felt ill at school, I have been the one to feel her forehead first. Childhood memories I had are now being implanted in my daughters, because many of our local school traditions still continue to

Where else can a commute to work consist of stress-free travel? While I listened to Kristin and Jay at the alumni banquet talking about traffic and 45-minute commutes, I simply said, "My commute is about ten minutes when walking through the woods. Or, if I am feeling lazy, it's about three minutes in my car." My best commute to work is when I walk out to my garden, open my laptop, and work on stories such as the one you're reading right now.

I am the George Bailey of Put-in-Bay, folks, even though I have not saved the island bank from ruin like he did in the now famous movie, "It's a Wonderful Life." Like George, I had dreams of travelling far away, and life away from our small town. But, more importantly, like George, I can feel the love of our local community when life gets tough.

As I proceed into year thirty-eight of my life as an island girl, I must remember that even though my sister may receive star status upon visiting home, and Kristin Altoff is now in the process of planning another trip to London, I too, have a life that is pretty darn good. I think I need to get over the fact life didn't turn out exactly as I had planned that day in June twenty years ago - and I'm happy to say I'm glad it took a different turn.

Island News July 5th, 1885

The glorious Fourth was celebrated in the usual style-fire crackers and excursionists visited the island that day; two boat loads came from Detroit, the Alaska with about 400 and the Northwest with about 800. Wonderful but nevertheless true, no fight took place, although many of the excursionists indulged freely in native wines, and the day passed off without rain, storm or fight. The steamers Jay Cooke and B. F. Ferris brought a large excursion to Wehrle's party rooms in the evening where the music of the Great Western Band they "tripped the light fantastic toe" until 1 o'clock a.m., when the excursion returned to Sandusky.

Luke Meyer, son of Lucas Meyer, met with a very serious accident the fourth in attempting to fire an old horse pistol. The cap would not explode, he tried to extract the cap with his knife

and in doing so the pistol went off, part of the contents going into his face. He will probably lose the use of one of his eyes. He, in company with his brother and Dr. O.T. Sears went to Sandusky on the Cooke in the afternoon.

The Steamer Pearl brought a large excursion from Cleveland yesterday. She had aboard about 500 passengers....the sloop yacht Cora of Cleveland is in the bay....The yacht Fanchon will be sailed by Capt. V. Ennis in the Cleveland regatta. She is going down and win the silver cup for a third time, and under his able management she will be sure to come out ahead.

Schraidt's seeding (Black Pearl) has suffered very much from mildew. The Catawba and Concord have also been affected, but not as bad as the Schraidt's.

Periodically, it comes up when I'm meeting with people about the Lifeflight insurance available through St Vincent's Medical Center. A few of the questions I hear from time to time are: Is it still available? What's the cost? How does it work? About ten years ago I wrote an article that went into how the program worked, and after talking to a few islanders, I thought maybe it was time for another update. So after a few phone calls and a lot of phone tag, I was able to verify a few of the more common questions and what was the same vs. what was different from years ago.

The program is still available and you can pick up applications at the EMS station on the island. The cost has gone up a little over the years and now costs \$75 a year for individuals and \$100 for the family for one year based upon

the date paid. (Family being someone whom you could claim on your tax return. That could be different from who is on your medical coverage.)

Another question I was surprised to hear is the rumor you can be turned down. I have been assured that is not possible and you do not need current health insurance to get the program. I think this rumor is coming from the last paragraph on their application, which I will admit is confusing, as well as them asking for your insurance cards should you have them. But I have been told twice they do not refuse any application. If you pay for it, you get it. This paragraph on the application pertains to the fact should you need Lifeflight there will be many more bills involved that financial assistant will be needed

for. (Most hospitals have programs that help people without health insurance with their bills.) From what I have been told, should you not have insurance, they will want you to let them try to get financial assistance from the state through their programs to reimburse St. V's but whatever is not covered would then be waived. In fact, the phone number listed is for HELP and not the Lifeflight program itself, so calling this number is only needed should you have a claim and, in fact (since I did call it out of curiosity), they barely even know the program exists, so I'm not sure why it's on the application.

Your deductible and co-pays still apply. In the past there were a few islanders who got the deductible waived by the luck of timing of the bills received by the insurance companies, but that has since been addressed by the program, and it sounds like they keep a closer eye on that now.

Also be aware the membership only pertains to the flight itself, not the doctor bills and other medical bills that happen during flight. Nor will it pertain to any bills at the hospital itself. Those are billed separately. Most health insurance plans do cover emergency air but most have limits as to how much and for what reasons. And often those limits can be less then what the cost is. You could be especially vulnerable if your network of hospitals does not include St. V's. (Most health insurance does cover St. V's. but not all.) And it's no secret the odds of it being needed for someone who lives on the islands is much higher than someone who lives on the mainland. The other issue is an insurance company might not consider why you were lifeflighted off to be life threatening and refuse to cover it for that reason. Should that occur, the program would absorb the cost. However, again, St. V's will want you to go through the process of fighting the claim to try to get it covered so they can try to get reimbursed. I hope this helps clear up some of the more common questions.






Mark had flown in from Florida, which for him is a little more than four hours, less time than if he had taken the time to fly commercially. It wasn't the DEA, but

Put-in-Bay and Lake Erie Islands cruise aboard vintage tugboat Restless

An Ohio island journey becomes a fresh lake adventure, Put-in-Bay Cruises recently inaugurated its new Put-in-Bay and Lake Erie Island harbor and sunset cruises aboard a historic 38-foot tugboat, the Restless. Take the helm, or sit back and enjoy a sunset and islands of western Lake Erie.

With home port at Miller Marina, 535 Bayview Ave., Put-in-Bay harbor, the 1938 tug Restless gives a relaxing one-and-a-half hour tour of the bay, along the cottage-lined west shore of South Bass Island, and past Middle Bass Island, home of Lonz Winery. The fare is \$65 per person, with a two-person minimum, for up to six passengers. Light snacks, soda, water and ice are provided. Reservations and more information can be found by calling 419-285-5902 or visit the website www.putinbaycruises.com.

Owner Scott Market, year-round resident of Put-in-Bay, hails from a long line of boat operators on the waters of Lake Erie. In 1978 Market's parents Bill and Mary Ann Market bought Miller Boat Line, a passenger and vehicle ferry service that operates on Lake Erie between Catawba and Put-in-Bay/ South Bass and Middle Bass Island, Ohio, A fifth generation islander, he owns the boat line along with brother Bill Market and sister Julene Market, holds a 100 ton Great Lakes Captain license, and owns and operates the Miller Marina, Put-in-Bay.

The tugboat Restless was launched in 1938 by the Palmer Johnson Shipbuilding Company of Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin, when the Army Corps of Engineers sought a prototype work tug. In hopes

of landing a contract to build these tugs, Palmer Johnson built a 38' 2" tug with a 12' 3" beam that drew 5' of water. However, the Corp pursued a different design, leaving the tug without a home. She was taken


back to the shipyard where a For Sale sign was displayed in her wheelhouse. A gentleman from Milwaukee bought the tug and added an aft cabin, head and sleeping quarters. A collector of Great Lakes marine artifacts, he also installed an 1800's binnacle, a brass steering helm, and portholes and beveled glass windows salvaged from a Great Lakes freighter. The vessel passed into the hands of Roland Schultz, of Traverse City, Michigan, who further restored the tug and named her Restless. Market found the vessel up for sale, drove from Put-in-Bay to Traverse City and immediately knew she would be a perfect fit on the island of Put-in-Bay.





Scheeff East Point Nature Preserve receives special addition

On May 7, volunteers erected a new 24-gourd Purple Martin rig at Scheeff East Point Nature Preserve. The rig replaced a house that had been vandalized last summer. The rig was provided via a conservation grant from the Columbus Zoo. Grant writer Darlene Sillick made the project happen. Installation could not have occurred without the expert help of Lee Krendl, Russ Brohl, Lisa Brohl, Bob Russell, Ed Erickson, and Darlene Sillick. I was able to lend a helping hand as well.

During installation, a couple pairs of Purple Martins flew in to supervise the work. They landed on the perch bars while we did our work and chortled their suggestions. They knew this new contraption was for them, even before the gourds were installed.

Many people do not realize that Purple Martins east of the Rocky Mountains rely on man-made housing. Nonnative House Sparrows and European Starlings devastated colonies in more natural settings years ago. Today, responsible Purple Martin landlords keep these aggressive nonnative birds out of Purple Martin compartments so these large native swallows can raise a family each year. Compartments are monitored every 5 to 7 days to help birds be as successful as possible.

On May 14, I performed the first monitoring check of the rig and was pleased to see 4 pairs of Purple Martins already here. It was a pleasure to meet Mark Barnhill and learn more about the vineyard he was tending adjacent to the rig. He was pleased to learn that Purple Martins only eat flying insects so will not harm his grapes in any way. Rather, their insect eating ability should be a benefit. He was also pleased to learn that European Starlings would not be permitted to reproduce in the gourds. These nonnative birds often devastate fruit crops.

I hope islanders and visitors will come by and watch the Purple Martins during nesting season. Their vocalizations and aerobatic ability to catch insects on the fly are enjoyable to observe. Purple Martins will be with us until August. At that time, they will gather their young and begin their long migration to South America.



When island pioneer Jose de Rivera donated the land for the village park, he kept the eastern two acres for himself. When he passed away in 1889, the village wanted to buy it, but didn't have the funds. In 1896, two businessmen wanted to buy the property and build a dance hall and saloon, plus an aquarium near the shore.

The Village took immediate action and decided to appropriate the land. An election was held and the outcome favored taking the land. The two businessmen took the Village to court claiming the election was fraudulent. The court found on the side of the Village. A bond issue in the amount of \$9,039 was passed to appropriate the land. Today, the pubic bathhouse in the park occupies the property.







New rooster weathervane tops steeple at St. Paul's

On June 2nd, St. Paul's at Put-in-Bay, celebrated the completion of the recent repairs to the 146-year-old steeple. It is one more step toward preparations for celebrating our 150th year as a worshipping congregation. The final step was putting the last piece on the new weathervane soaring above the steeple which houses a bell dating to 1870. Members of the parish and community watched as the lift carried the new rooster to its perch. As it was put in place the congregation joined together and said the Lord's Prayer. As the people gathered on the sidewalk around the crucifer watched, the rooster immediately began to catch the light breeze and reflect the sun as it stood against the clear blue sky. The congregation's hearts soared and the completed repairs are still talked about on this small island in the middle of Lake Erie.

After the steeple itself was repaired in 2010, St. Paul's began the work to restore the top portion and find a similar weather vane to replace the original. Vestry member Melinda Myers located the new copper weathervane that restores the steeple's appearance to the original appearance of the church.

St. Paul's Vestry began the planning for the steeple repair in 2009 when the deterioration of the 140+ year-old wood panels on the steeple became obvious from ground level. This steeple has withstood the Ohio summer heat and winter cold for many years, receiving new coats of paint from time to time. The trim below the belfry has changed, but the steeple is still supported by the original timbers used to build it in 1865. The heat, cold and humidity finally had taken its toll. The lower part of the steeple (the belfry) has louver blades tilted downward to emit the bell's sound while keeping out the rain. The wood closest to the outside showed the most deterioration. The rotten wood was repaired and in some cases replaced while the bell (with 1870 stamped on the side) remained in place continuing to peal each Sunday during the repairs.

The church members thank the long list of people who contributed funds for the repairs. Mr. Rob LaPlante, an island contractor, worked tirelessly on the steeple as he engineered the pieces so they fit together like a large puzzle. His skillful workmanship and experience enabled him to create the pieces needed to attach the weather vane to the steeple. As an islander, Mr. LaPlante was proud to be able to restore a piece of island history. St. Paul's could not have accomplished the repairs without the generosity of island resident Todd Blumensaadt who loaned the lift required to do the work, significantly reducing the cost of the repair.

When St. Paul's examined the top of the steeple in 2009, the vestry learned the remaining part of the historic weathervane was barely supported by the deteriorating wood at the top. Senior Warden Mary Ann Meyers decided it was better to remove the old weathervane than to have it fall. The weathervane portion came down and the Historical Society has taken the responsibility of protecting

and preserving. Examination shows where the top portion, the original rooster, had broken off years earlier. The few remaining historical pictures of the church do not show the entire weathervane so the exact shape of the rooster mentioned in the church records remains a mystery.

Many church weathervanes are in the form of roosters, an old symbol which is a reminder of Peter's three denials of Christ, which Jesus predicted would occur before the cock crowed. For some, a weathervane also signifies how easily faith could be swayed, like the arrow in the weathervane.

There is a tradition dating back over 1,000 years of placing a weathervane on churches which was the highest point in the villages. Roosters are one of the most familiar things used in the past. The steeple and its weathervane hold many meanings today. It recalls the scripture from John 12:32 "If I be lifted up from the earth, I will draw all men unto me." While signifying what death He would die, this scripture also challenges the members of the church to lift Christ up to the world. Mother Mary Staley, the Priestin-Charge at St. Paul's, has two things she likes about the steeple saying "When we see a steeple, pointing gracefully towards heaven, we are reminded of Christ's ascension. Additionally, the arrow on a weathervane always points the way and reminds faith communities that Christ points the way for us."

Andronicus, an astronomer in Athens, Greece, built history's first recorded weathervane about 48 BC. Archaeologists find them throughout Europe dating back almost 1500 years. The Bayeux Tapestry of 1065 CE shows a weathercock vane being placed on Westminster Abbey. The oldest weathervane in Britain is believed to be at Ottery St. Mary, Devon, and dates to about 1340. It has whistling tubes so the rooster decoration makes a crowing sound. There was a "Golden Age" of weathervanes in the United States, in the latter half of the 19th century when St. Paul's was built. Dozens of weathervane designs were mass-produced in the 19th century by various makers. There are no details recorded about St. Paul's weathervane other than it had a rooster on the top.

The view from the top of the steeple includes a view of the open water between Gibraltar Island and Peach Point of South Bass Island in the distance. The rooster also sees the flag on top of the Town Hall, the island's water tower, and the tops of trees that replaced many of the vineyards which were on the island in the 1860's when this parish was formed. When the island was covered with vineyards, St. Paul's weathervane would have been as visible to most islanders just as Perry's Monument is today.

The congregation as well as friends had a chance to see the rooster up close before it was placed on the steeple. It was in the church for the service on June 2nd. Following the service, the congregation proceeded outside for prayers

of dedication and thanksgiving. Everyone is invited to stop by St. Paul's any time. There is a free guided tour every Tuesday at 9 a.m. and other times by appointment.

A Work of Art / A Middle Bass Fireplace

Roman Sapecki is a photographer by profession but an artist at heart. In Roman's photography he captures the "best essence" of what his subject possesses (be it a person or an object). He knows when to trigger the shutter and in which light to present the subject.

He also has the unique ability to look at something not as it is, but rather what it could be. Roman and his wife Sue are very proud of their Middle Bass cottage but their unique log home in Burgundy Bay was missing a focal point. In-



spiration came in the form of a fireplace (which the house did not possess...yet). Over several years, Roman worked through many ideas. The element he lacked was the material for his mantle. It had to be something unique, rare. He wanted the perfect piece of wood, preferably something from the beaches and lake.

After several years, on a ferry ride to MBI, he talked to friends Betty and Chuck Basher from East Point and shared his vision of the perfect fireplace and his need for that unique

piece of wood. They said they knew the perfect piece of tim-A recent storm had brought up an ancient log that might work. Following the lead, Roman found what he was looking

"The log was over 35' long and inaccessible by road. We cut the log to a length of 25' and pushed it into the water. There were five-foot waves and we had to push it through the surf several hundred yards to a point where the log was accessible to the road and my truck. It took six of us to lift it into the truck bed, said Sapecki.



For those of you who enjoy "Christmas in July," we decided to bring you this story and Christmas greeting card from Middle Bass.

He put the log under his porch and let the log stabilize for a few years as years of water saturation worked its way out of the wood's fibers. Neighbors would frequently come by with drinks and cameras to take pictures of Roman's log. The log seemed to reach out to people. With such a powerful draw as a raw log, Sapecki could

imagine the magnetism the log would generate as a finished

fireplace mantle.

The social fabric of modern life has been has been unraveled by computers and televisions. These machines by their nature induce solitary acts, isolation. The repair to this social void on Middle Bass are porches (and fire places). These focal points in a home (not a house) draw people together. Whether it is board games by candle light, ghost stories, a glass of Heineman wine (from a jelly jar), or simple talk of nothing that means everything. Connection. Bond. That is what owning a summer house is really all about.


After a decade or so in the works, the fireplace in the Sapecki house has become the home's focal point. It embodies the imagination of its builder with its presence a hinge leading to the swing of conversation, comradeship and com-

Per Roman, "My life has been built on creative endeavor. Coming to Middle Bass allows me to take a break from the consumption of life. I recharge in this room in the presence of this fireplace. It inspires me. One very nice surprise, I underestimated the structure's value as a portal to creative ideas.'

"The log mantle has a history that goes back a hundred plus years. The spacing of its end cut rings tell its history. Tight band rings speak of drought. Wide band rings speak of water, plenty, growth. There are burn marks and hatchet cuts in it's surface. It floated here from who knows where? Canada, Buffalo? It has a history and a life we will never know. But I am lucky to have come across it. Who knows what ideas it will inspire and what conversations it will over-hear going forward!"





Dyed in the wool MBI By Gordy Barr



SCHOOL NEWS

With attendance at the island school dropping (just eight students in 2012 and two of them will attend high school off-island) the School Board has adopted OPEN ENROLLMENT allowing students from other Ohio school districts to attend the island school. Boasting an excellent teacher-to-student ratio, individualized instruction and a personalized curriculum with individual learning objectives, the

school hopes to attract mainland families who want a better education for their children. The school put in a bid on the adjoining property on Division Street (the Rom house) for use as rental housing for relocating families, but were, as they say, a day late and a dollar short. The big question is, with so many families on the island with children, why do they choose off-island schools for their education?

To help deal with the dead and dying tree prob-lem Council is considering TREE REMOVAL legislation. Under a first reading, the ordinance gives the Village Administrator sole responsibility for trimming any tree existing on any public place, including tree lawns"so as to insure the safety or preserve the symmetry of the beauty of the public place." Various sections indicate "He shall have the right to remove any tree or any part thereof which is in an unsafe condition" or "injurious to other public improvements" or is "infected with any injurious fungus, insect or other public which account he atherwise part to the "the pest which cannot be otherwise controlled" or if "the roots of the tree obstruct or interfere with any storm sewer or sanitary sewer." "Whenever, in the OPIN-ION of the Village Administrator, any tree located on PRIVATE PROPERTY within the Village becomes in-

PRIVATE PROPERTY within the Village becomes infected with any parasite, insect, pest or fungus so as to threaten the scattering" of the same "to trees standing in any public place," he may require REMOVAL OR TREATMENT. There are procedures for notifying the property owner, which "shall state the particular THING which the Village Administrator requires" If Village Administrator requires." If there is no compliance, a fee schedule for the Village to accomplish the work is included. Unfortunately, the basis for any decision will be based on the Village Administrator's "opinion" and not on the advice of a certified arborist, as appears in many similar community laws. It does not give the landowners any recourse to appeal the decision nor does it deal with ownership of the woodchips or firewood generated from the tree removal (valuable commodities). There is no requirement for competitive bids when the Village must remove the tree. The position of Village Administrator does not require any type of expert status or even knowledge of trees or their diseases.

ROAD WORK begins with drain work on W. Lakeshore and pavement treatment. The water pouring out of the house next to the Post Office is under investigation. Preliminary reports indicate is it not village water, but research continues. The Village is meeting with CAMP PATMOS on the possibility of extending the municipal water line to the camp. The year-round ATV ORDI-NANCE had it's second reading but no discussion. The PUBLIC RESTROOM BUILDING project is moving forward. Shear Construction was awarded the contract at \$78,241. Speaking of restrooms, there has been considerable vandalism to the restrooms at the Addison Road park. The police are stepping up their investigation. The Village has also turned off the water at the particular to the partic vilion and cemetery. Water usage has been high because of vandalism there. Water taps have been left turned on to run unattended. The water will be turned on for events that have a valid Village reservation and alternatives are being explored for a public water station at the water plant. The Village Website www.KelleysIsland.us is still



FAA puts brakes on access to PIB Airport by property owners

Put-in-Bay Port Authority Chairman Terry Burns tells us the FAA has a new policy concerning property owners around the Put-in-Bay Airport having access to the run-

Under the new guidelines, those property owners who have deeded access to the runway from their properties will maintain those rights.

Property owners who do not have deeded rights, but started paying to access the runway before Sept. 9, 2010, may continue to do so until they sell their properties. Once their property changes hands, the ability to access the runway will end.

Property owners who do not have deeded access and currently do not have a permission agreement for runway access will no longer be allowed to access the runway from their property.



The controversy over the rezoning of the lot on Catawba Ave. between Tony's Garage and Wyland Gallery came to an end this past month.
