Put-in-Bay




If you're making a list of important Put-in-Bay historical treasures, you would probably top the list with the Battle of Lake Erie, the building of Perry's Monument and the tale of the Hotel Victory. The famous battle was won, the Monument still proudly stands today after more than 100 years, and the Hotel Victory story is often a topic of island conversation in spite of the fact it burned to the ground 100 years ago this month. So here's the story of the Hotel Victory, billed at the time it was built as the largest summer hotel in the world.

In the late 1880's, Put-in-Bay saw two businesses thriving...grape growing and wine making, plus the development of the island as a tourist destination. Islanders were approached by John Tilloston, from Toledo, with a visionary proposal to build the Hotel Victory, an opulent 625-guest-room hotel in the woods on the south end of the island. He was able to recruit enough investors that on September 10, 1889, the anniversary of the Battle of Lake Erie, a cornerstone laying ceremony took place with a reported 8,000 people in attendance.

CONSTRUCTION

A 100-acre site overlooking Stone's Cove on the southwest side of the island was chosen for the location. Twenty-one of the acres would be used for the hotel and grounds, while the rest were subdivided into small cottage lots

Prominent Toledo architect E.O. Falls designed a Queen Anne-style three-story building with

multiple dormers, towers and turrets, planning the hotel's facade to create a favorable impression as tourists approached the hotel via steamer. The primary building measured 600-ft. by 300-ft., threestory building with high corner towers around an enclosed courtyard. Attached was the large dining, kitchen and employee housing structure. Workers had to install 16.5 acres of flooring, 16,000 sq. yards of carpeting, 7 acres of shingles, 7.5 miles of

baseboard, 1 mile of wainscoting, 1,700 doors, 2,500 windows and a steam heat system. New electric power from the hotel's own generating station supplied the power for three elevators, individual call buttons in each room and 6,000 incandescent light bulbs to light the hotel. George Feick of Sandusky was awarded the construction contract and work began with a sawmill

> and planning mill right on the site. A tent city with a dining hall and dormitories was set up for hundreds of workers. When the first guests arrived in 1892, workers were still

busy in some of the areas of the hotel.

Besides the guest rooms, there were the large

1,200-person dinning room (115 ft. by 85 ft.), the 10-table billiard hall, the assembly room for conventioneers, a ladies lounge, a lobby, private parlors, a wine cellar, shops, a

green house, a barbershop, a 30-ft.-long bar, a soda fountain, bell boy stations, a newsstand and even a photo darkroom. There were hundreds of tables, chairs, night stands, beds and other furnishings. The kitchen was equipped with the most modern equipment of the time. Plus the hotel was heated with steam heat.

Outside, the grounds were attractively landscaped. A boardwalk with areas to stop and enjoy the view ran the length of the shore. Paths, one with a rustic bridge spanning the ravine that runs through the property, were built. Benches were placed, and there was even a "Trysting Place" which served as a rendezvous for romantic couples.

Although not part of the construction, developers realized there was a need to transport the hotel guests arriving on steamboats in the downtown harbor to the hotel a mile away. A trolley line was built from the docks to the front door of the hotel. There was a half-way stop at the caves.

HOTEL VICTORY OPENS

As with many projects, cost overruns shot the price of hotel to one estimate of \$28,000,000 in today's dollars, but that didn't stop the hotel from opening. A courtyard-view room for two on the third floor with a shared bath down the hall was the equivalent of \$957. If you wanted a lake-view room with private bath on the first floor, it would cost just over \$2500 for a couple for a week in today's dollars.

The hotel opened on July 12, 1892, and by September the hotel was bankrupt and had to close. It reopened in 1893, but closed again in early August due to financial problems and remained closed for the next two seasons. In 1894, a Toledo News reporter wrote "The immense structure is not simply but a home for bugs, rattlesnakes and June bugs. The windows are so thickly covered with June bugs that it is impossible to look through them, and Victory Park - J.K. Tilloston's dream - is today a cow pasture. A match or cigar stub carelessly thrown near the structure would start such a fire as was never seen before on the island."

In late 1895, the hotel and its contents sold at a sheriff's auction. The hotel and grounds sold for just over a half million dollars and the furniture sold for just over two hundred thousand dollars in today's dollars.

Without the huge debt load, the hotel opened again on July 20, 1896. The hotel was promoted then on a large scale to bring in new customers and conventioneers. One of the guests was the widow of Confederate President Jefferson Davis.

The unfinished interior work was completed and the hotel entered its glory years. In 1898, a 30-ft wide and 100-ft. long, covered, lake-water-filled swimming pool called the "Natatorium" was built. It was the first pool in the country which allowed both men and women to swim together.

Another interesting thing happened in 1898. Five mild cases and one serious case of smallpox were discovered amongst the hotel's mostly "colored" help. Dr. John Bohlander, a physician from the island, quarantined 200 guests and 250 employees at the hotel. The quarantine was successful and the disease was spread to only 27 mild cases. Unfortunately, when one of the hotel's employees was diagnosed, he ran screaming from the building and

jumped off one of the cliffs along the shoreline where he died on the rocks below. He was the only fatality. Interestingly, a Hotel Victory brochure several years later advertised "All White Servants." In 1899, brothers and hardware merchants C.W. and J.W. Ryan, purchased the Hotel Victory and brought in T. W. McCreary as the hotel's general manager. McCreary went about revitalizing the trou-

bled hotel. He not only had a genius for promotion, but was also the "perfect host". Visitors found continued on page 3 Thank you all for spending so many fun-filled years with us at The Round House Bar.

group of 150 from Detroit. Both groups commented on their great day on the island. Peter Huston, Director of the Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce (visitputinbay.com), also noted that the island tour train, Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial and other island

In 2018, large number of visitors came to the island for the unofficial "Christmas Party", and it had felt on the weekend once called "Christmas in July". There were no seasonal decorations or overwhelming to many of the residents. The area news media focused on the unruly "street party" crowd. Last Santa hat revelers, instead families, couples and empty nesters made their way to Put-in-Bay years biggest weekend of visitation was the impetus for change. Island business owners, the Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce (visitputinbay.com) and concerned citizens got together and formed the Safe Island Task Force. Two tour groups came for the day, an Amish church group from Indiana, and a charter The SITF, led by local business owner and resident Brad Ohlemacher, met regularly throughout the year working through the myriad of issues and possible solutions to better manage the islands peak visitation days.

The positive net result of that effort was that this year's "biggest weekend" became a typical summer Saturday. SITF worked on messaging, signage and social media to help connect visitors to our island community and

rules of engagement. Part of that effort is to have a visible number of safety personnel on hand including Ottawa and Erie County Sheriffs on the islands peak

So Saturday started slowly with new traffic flow plans put in to action by the Put-in-Bay Police which were designed by Police Chief Steve Riddle. Special duty officers were present through out the downtown directing traffic and providing a visible presence as well. Along DeRivera Park, in the center of the village, Delaware Ave was closed which allowed it to become a casual walking area. This successfully reduced golf cart and taxi congestion from years past. The new traffic plan worked very well and by 2 p.m. the standard traffic flow was restored. The Put-in-Bay Police followed through on their plan to be friendly but fair in the enforcement of open container, driving under the influence, and other public safety violations governed by local and state laws.

As the day went along, spurred on by the great weather, more boaters and day visitors made their way to the island. By late Saturday afternoon South Bass Island looked and felt like a normal Saturday. Business owners were happy and people were enjoying island hospitality. Frosty Pizza co-owner Ryan Stoiber shared on social media "Thank you all for the hours you worked this year to keep our wonderful island safe. The whole islands owes you are gratitude."

Chamber of Commerce "Ask Me" volunteers handed out island maps and answered questions to arriving visitors. Michael Bell, former Toledo Mayor and member of the Safe Island Task Force, said "on a scale of 1-10 that (from his perspective) the day was a 10".

The Safe Island Task Force work is not done, with other big visitation days still ahead. They will continue to meet and work on further long range plans to manage growth and visitation. The overnight community response on social media has been extremely positive.

a visibly revitalized and refreshed Hotel Victory as the 1900 season began. McCreary became the longest-running manager at the Hotel Victory, which experienced the peak of its popularity and success during his 1899-1907 tenure. McCreary's unceasing publicity efforts established the Hotel Victory as THE PLACE to stay, making it worth the higher rates the hotel charged to meet its costs and offset the fact that it had a short season. He was also great at attracting group meetings to supplement the usual

crowd of tourists. He also touted the many activities, entertainments and safety measures taken to insure for the comfort and entertainment of guests.

THE AMENITIES

To keep guests happy, the hotel had a house physician, a dentist, a tailor, a dark room for amateur photographers, a manicurist, a ladies' shop for fancy goods and toilet articles, an ice cream parlor (soda fountain), a barbershop and public baths, a livery with "pleasure wagons," a telegraph office and long distance telephone access, a stenographer, a newsstand, a laundry, a pool room, a lounge

for the ladies, a conference room and more.

For activities, guests could take a "constitutional" on the grounds, swim in the natatorium, ride the water toboggan, go on moonlight hayrides and trolley parties, watch the sunsets, go fishing (and have your catch cooked for your dinner), and enjoy the benefits of "Strontium Spa Water" directly at the spring, reported to be in the lobby. The water claimed to be the greatest of all the hotel's attractions was touted as one of the best remedies ever discovered for all forms of brights disease and help with Paddock disorders, whatever they are.

The Victory had a symphony orchestra and band of musicians employed throughout the season. In addition, there were children's parties and dances in the ballroom.

Guests could also "get behind the scenes" and visit the hotel kitchen, pantry, storeroom, cold storage, wine cellar or laundry, as well as investigate the other workings of the "great hotel." Guests could also leave the grounds and enjoy all the other tourist attractions of Put-in-Bay and Middle Bass.

THE WINGED VICTORY STATUE

McCreary hired the German sculptor, Alfons Pelter, to design the Victory Monument for the hotel grounds. Twenty-two feet high, the bronze monument featured a winged woman holding a wreath in one hand and a staff in the other. The "Winged Victory" monument was surrounded by a stone balus-

trade, the ruins of which can still be seen today. The Vice-President of the United States, Charles W. Fairbanks, attended the unveiling ceremony in 1907.


Unfortunately, McCreary also died in 1907, and Colonel B.G. Doyle took over the management. Two years later, the hotel closed again.

THE FINAL YEARS

By 1911, a Chicago newspaper reported that neglect and decay caused the hotel to look like a "haunted" place. Meanwhile, rumors had circulate about the hotel reopening or getting new ownership; however, a short-lived remodeling effort quickly halted because money was again a problem.

During World War I, the E.M.T. Automobile Company in Detroit purchased the hotel and began yet another remodeling effort before the Fl

began yet another remodeling effort before the Flanders Realty Company of Detroit eventually bought the hotel.



opening it in 1918. The owners sought convention traffic and marketed the hotel as a great getaway for Army and Navy men on leave during World War I. Rooms cost \$1.50 and up, and crowds started to arrive at the hotel again.

In 1919, a Chicago group headed by Charles J. Stoops purchased the hotel and obtained a \$250,000 mortgage on it. There were great hopes for the hotel with the predicted post-war economic boom, but business was less than brisk and rumors of closure again surrounded the Hotel Victory.

HOTEL VICTORY BURNS

On Thursday night, August 14, 1919, shortly after the dinner hour, a fire started in the northwest corner of the third floor of the reopened hotel. The fewer-than-40 guests were able to escape unharmed. Looters, meanwhile, stole many of the personal belongings left behind by fleeing guests, pieces of the hotel's furnishings and anything else of value they could cart off. An hour later, the entire building was an inferno and no match for the island's fire department which concentrated on saving nearby structures. The flames, shooting more than 75 feet in the air, lit up the sky and could be seen as far

away as Sandusky, Toledo and Detroit. Ashes reportedly landed on Kelleys Island. The next day there was nothing left but foundation ruins. Damage was estimated between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000, or \$7,400,000 to \$14,8000,000 today.

There was much speculation that the fire was purposely set to collect the insurance on the building, but it was later learned there was little insurance and that the fire was probably due to an electrical problem.

In any case, it was the end for Hotel Victory.

THE LAST 100 YEARS

The Hotel Victory site lay fal-

low and underdeveloped until the State of Ohio purchased the acreage in 1938 to build a new public park. The park site became part of the Ohio State Park System in 1951. One hundred years later, there are a few hints that something once graced the land now occupied by campers. The remains of the natatorium are most prominent, now fenced in for safety concerns. Nearby is the stone base of the bronze Winged Victory statue. The actual statue was carted off the island during the scrap metal drives of World War II. For many years, you could find small charred items such as pieces of broken plates, silverware, pottery and artifacts, but after 100 years, such finds are now rare.

SPECULATION

One can only speculate what would have happened with the Hotel Victory had it not burned. Mackinac Island's majestic Grand Hotel opened a couple of years before Hotel Victory. Although it also went through some hard times, it still stands today, a proud survivor of an era that started 130 years ago. Over the years it has been visited by U.S. Presidents and First Ladies, Thomas Edison, Mark Twain, celebrities and dignitaries from all over the world. There have even been movies made at the Grand. Had the Hotel Victory not burned, would it have enjoyed a similar glory? With its financial troubles, Prohibition and the Great Depression may very well have been too much for the Hotel Victory to weather. Although if it had survived, could you imagine today's golf carts parked in front of the glorious structure, with visitors wanting to tour the grounds or have lunch in the huge dining room. Like the Grand on Mackinac, it would have been a glorious attraction for Put-in-Bay.



There are also island history books which help tell the story, plus there are articles and photos on the internet. Islander Barbara Allen Cooper also wrote a booklet about the Hotel Victory.

It should come as no surprise to anyone that Lake Erie and all of the Great Lakes (St. Clair included) are much above their average levels and most are close to, or setting, new record highs each month. In May and June we set a new record average monthly lake levels for each of those months. Each of those monthly averages was also a new record for Lake Erie for any month. It is almost a sure thing that we will also set new record highs in July. In August and September, it is highly likely that we will set new monthly records for those months, but it is also possible that those levels will be below the July record for Lake Erie (assuming it stays high throughout the month of July).

The following information comes from the 1918-2018 records of the US Army Corps of Engineers. On 5 July we were 2 inches over the level from one month ago (5 June), 11 inches over the level of 1 year ago (5 July 2018), 33 inches over the long term average for the month of July, 6 inches above the record average for the month of July set in 1986, and 68 inches above the record low set for the month of July in 1934. We really need some dry weather! However, even with dry weather, because about 90% of Lake Erie's water comes from Lakes Superior, Michigan, Huron, and St. Clair, and with all of those lakes at or near records highs, it is likely to take a while for Lake Erie's levels to decline significantly.


Lantern Tour of Hotel Victory Grounds

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Letter to the Editor

The Bernard McCann that has been portrayed as 'corrupt' or 'unethical' is not the Bernard McCann we know. We (Maria and Miyo Hristovski) wanted to reach out to everyone in order to convey how much we love and appreciate everything Bernard McCann has done for us and for our community on South Bass Island.

Throughout Bernard's life, he kept his family close and protected them as they flourished into the wonderful people they are today. He taught his children to work hard by not only growing their own personal career paths but also growing within the community they were born in, how to keep growing and to be prepared to spread their wings and fly. His children are pivotal members of our island community and have continued his legacy through endeavors of their own, always going the extra mile to support this community, as they often do. Even as his grandchildren have become of age, they have started to show those same traits as the generations before them, being amazing and charitable members of our society.

Our small island is a difficult place to survive, let alone thrive. Bernard is a part of the golden generation of builders and people who have cultivated this island to be the successful destination island it is today. He was a part of a group of islanders working on the Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial. From working on the docks while updating the Monument (because the government contractors refused due to ice and cold conditions) to becoming the mayor of our village, his work is awe inspiring.

We moved here in 1999 and have made Put-in-Bay on South Bass Island our home. Even just within the twenty years we've lived here, we have witnessed many projects completed by his administration that changed the face of our island and have made it possible to continue thriving. Before Bernard's influence, parts of the island did not even have clean water available to its residents and businesses. This incredibly limited any use of public utilities and created an economic disaster for local businesses. He completely renovated and updated the sewer and water plants up to today's EPA standards. Thanks to his negotiation skills, he was able to save the community any additional costs while improving the standard of living and the safety of island visitors. This saved the local economy that supports the lives of thousands of people.

Most of the seasonal traffic in our community is people in golf carts and on foot. It is pivotal to have well paved roads in acceptable condition. Our first responders and community members drive on these roads every day. The roads were not safe and were not usable by the general public. His project of repaving all the village roads created a safer environment for vacationers and residents alike.

When the town hall fell to disarray, it was Bernard's job to figure out a way to create a safe and functional environment for everyone on the island. He had to accomplish this without any funding from the government. He secured the funding by allowing a Verizon tower to be placed on the roof. Through his business savviness, he was able to both secure the funding needed for updates and created better cell reception for everyone on the island. This allowed better reception for both first responders dealing with emergencies as well as residents and visitors. Through that funding, he was able to create a space for our elderly, our children, island-wide activities and functions, functional offices for village officials and a space that represents his love for our community.

Through Bernard's own personal actions and willingness to donate his personal time and funds, many incredibly important projects and facilities are now available to the general public. His constant support of the volunteer firefighters, the police department, the local churches, cancer and medical fundraisers, island holiday functions, repairing the street lights around the park, creating public transportation that increases revenue with the Jet Express, maintaining docks up to standards; these are the ones we can think of off the top of our heads. When he owned roads that could be used by village first responders, visitors and community members, he donated it free of charge for use by everyone. He could have charged everyone for using it, or used the land for private means. Instead, this is the road that allows access to multiple businesses, homes, the post office, and our only gas station. He's been doing this, not for personal gain, but out of love for his village that he were born and raised in. Even during his first eight years of being Mayor, any small amount of income the village could afford him, he recycled it directly back into the village. When he retired the first time from being Mayor, he was asked back for an additional election because this village was failing without him at the helm.



Speaking from our personal experiences, he has affected our lives greatly for almost two decades now. We arrived as inexperienced young adults that had never been to the United States before, let alone a small island in Lake Erie. We began our island careers as one of his many employees but he consistently treated us as members of his family, which was so important when we are so far away from our families. Having a father figure when our own family was so far away helped this island community feel like home and he helped us feel as though we belonged here. He recognized those same traits of an entrepreneur in us that he had in himself too. He guided us throughout our early years on this island to show us how to stay focused on our goals and to maintain the right path on our own journey. From us, to our children and to all of our future generations, they will know that being a part of this great country is a gift that while we earned it ourselves, we were influenced greatly by his guidance.

As his friends, family and neighbors, we will always be there for Bernard. We know what's in his heart and his love for this community. With how much love he has in his heart for this island and its members. Bernard's actions were made to be as beneficial as possible for the island as a whole.

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


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Listen to Larry

On a near perfect summer day as we filed out of the island's Mother of Sorrow church, our hearts and minds all connected with one single emotion of grief. The biggest out pouring of love and affection I have seen on the island in my many years here, all for the loss for Patrick N Myers. He was a man who made endless contributions to our island family. That was pure Patrick!

About a year ago, when our island community was reeling with unfocused anger and disbelief about the continued promotion and the subsequent over attendance of "Christmas in July" weekend, a meeting was held at the senior center. At that meeting we formed a new community action group that was later to be called "The Safe Island Task Force". One of the first hands to go up to volunteer that day was Patrick Myers. Pure Patrick!

Patrick was a "Community activist". Within a week or two after the first Safe Island Task Force (SITF) meeting, he had gone out and recruited former Toledo Mayor Mike Bell and retired Ohio State Trooper Aaron Walker to provide a broader off island and African American perspective on our island's growing pains. Patrick knew them from his days as an EMT and Firefighter training and convinced them to get in touch with our group. Pure Patrick!

Last August, after doing a live show from the softball game, Patrick explained to me that Put-in-Bay is a community of families, kids, grandparents and business owners, not just bars and attractions. Patrick told me about an idea he had for a video that would demonstrate our strong sense of community here on the island, which would encourage visitors to respect it more. He was certain that if they knew

Of course when we were working on that idea he was worried about how North Bass and Middle Bass might feel about "One Island", that was also pure Patrick.

In the fourteen years that I knew Patrick, he has been simultaneously an artist, activist, broadcaster, theater director, set designer, video producer, play by play announcer, volunteer, pit crew member, creative thinker, salesman, ferryman, sailor, husband, and friend. Pure Patrick.

I have to say that we were all very fortunate to

Note: There will also be a concert on Middle Bass the same day in the afternoon at 1:30 at the Lonz Pavilion.

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

More Money for the Islands

The Ohio Department of Natural Resources has been funded to carry out emergency repairs to the pier and boat launch ramp area at North Bass Island State Park on North Bass Island. Currently, the dock is in such bad repair that the limited ferry service provided by Miller Boat Line has been cancelled. The main dock is the lifeline to the island. So if the ferry service ends there will be no way to get things like vehicles to the island or equipment to repair the airport or township roads. If the public airport is not maintained or usable, the FAA grants for the airport must be paid back.

The State's Controlling Board also approved about

\$317,000 for Stone Laboratory on Gibraltar Island in the harbor at Put-in-Bay. Most of the money will be used to buy water quality monitoring instruments.

I saw the police help MANY people throughout the night who were unable to help themselves. I saw a lot of patience dealing with some difficult people.



Thurs., July 4th - Howard and Elaine Martens start their holiday by watering the downtown flower baskets. The Patriots Band plays a concert in the evening at the Monument a few short hours before the fireworks show over the harbor. Mark Ray has guests over to his rental cottage at Shore Villas to watch the fireworks on the water.

Fri., July 5th - There's a Ladies Auxiliary yard sale going on at PIBYC. The second unted Put-in-Bay ghost walk takes place

Sat., July 6th - Purple Martin banding with Tom Kashmir and Lisa Rock of the Green Creek Conservation Society and Paula Ziebarth of the Lake Erie Islands Conservancy takes place in the morning at the Scheeff East Point Preserve. Afterwards, AmeriCorps intern Emma Young leads a shoreline cleanup at the preserve. There are lots of boats at the docks in the morning, but many boaters leave with reports of northeast winds coming. Bob White removes a (deceased) squirrel from St. Paul's dryer vent.

Sun., July 7th - Waters from the lake fill the low spots in Route 357 (Bayview Ave.) from the Crew's Nest to around Squaw Harbor and in front of the Monument. Kids have fun canoeing in the street in front of the yacht club, and the Sonny-S curtails ferry service between PIB and Middle Bass due to the northeast wind and flooded docks. The Ford Trimotor

Mon., July 8th - Funeral services for Patrick Myers take place Mother of Sorrows. The Cornerstone Room is filled and the overflow gathers in the Undercroft of St. Paul's Church across the street where a video feed of the services is set up. Patrick is the first to be laid to rest in the new portion of Crown Hill Cemetery. An Irish wake takes place at the

Crew's Nest Pavilion. **Tues., July 9th** - Rich Zura (PIBHS Class of 1955) and his sister Sue (PIBHS Class of 1969) visit the home they grew up in on Concord Ave. now owned by Mike and Lyndsay Conshafter. Richard says he hadn't been to the island in 12 years.

Wed., July 10th - Put-in-Bay Village Council meets in the morning. Council, concerned about the decreasing revenue from the "Island Resort Tax," learns the State of Ohio Taxation Department will be on the island in September to deal with the non payers. The Round House softball team is playing the Middle Bass team at the field on Middle Bass Island.

Thurs., July 11th - The Diversity workshop takes place in the morning. Officials from Stone Lab officially release the harmful algal bloom report for Lake Erie for the 2019 season. The bloom forecast is a 7.5 (roughly between a range from 6 to 9), making it similar to 2017 and one of the 5 worst since HABS reports started. It's gorgeous weather in the evening for Eric Booker's 50th birthday party at the Boardwalk.

Fri., July 12th - It a perfect summer weather day on the island. There's a Curley's RibFest Cookout going on in the parking lot at the Island General Store. You can get a full slab of ribs for \$12. Out in George Stoiber's barn in Victory Woods, the museum is selling items which were left from an estate sale in Toledo. Nancy Bane is holding another big sale in her yard, too. At the Yacht Club, the young Community Swim/Sail Program youngsters are attending this season's award ceremony.

Sat., July 13th - The Erie County Sheriff's marine patrol along with the Coast Guard pull a couple to safety after their boat begins to take on water off Kelleys Island. Over at Lonz Winery, the Middle Bass Music Festival is taking place. A wonderful, perfect-weather Community Swim/Sail Program fundraiser cruise takes place in the evening. Toby Landreth takes honors as the best-dressed cruiser!

Sun., July 14th - Liesl Jackson, the daughter of Scott and Caroline Jackson from the Goat Soup & Whiskey, celebrates her third birthday early with a barbecue party at the Jackson's stone presshouse home near the airport. There are 46 cars in the antique car parade in the afternoon. The parade sponsors are Bill and Gail McCracken, Bob and Dianne Smith and Jack and Kathi Spayde. This is the fourth day in a row that you can say it's been perfect summer weather. Joe Charboneu, the Cleveland Indians baseball team's American League Rookie of the Year almost 40 years ago, is on the island.

Mon., July 15th - There are scores of young sailors on the island competing in the first races of the Junior Regatta. The Village Council meets to discuss future options for its Frederick property on Erie St. The monthly Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce meeting takes place at The Keys for the first time. A couple of good downpours get the islands wet in the late afternoon. In a race from the Goat to Joe's Bar, Paul Jeris on a bike beats Mark Lekanka who is driving his golf cart. Dottie Sweeney (PIBHS Class of 1975) is on the island visiting old friends.

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
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Impact of Flooding

Lake Erie water levels are 13 inches higher than they were last year, and with the excess water comes severe consequences. Wetlands are flooded, beaches are eroded, and agricultural fields were not able to be planted. However, one of the most severe repercussions is the flooding of streets and yards. Bayview Avenue in front of Perry's Monument, Monroe Street by the Port Clinton Jet Express, and many others

are still experiencing flooding although the rain has let up.

Seiches are primarily responsible for the flooding. A seiche is a type of cyclical oscillation in the lake caused by changes in atmospheric pressure. In other words, strong winds cause water to be pushed to one side, and when they stop, the water rebounds to the other area. In turn, the rebound causes the oscillation of the water back and forth.

Typically, when the seiche cycles occur, there is enough room in the lake for the water to go. This year however, there is simply no room left in the lake due to the high-water levels. In other words, seiches are normal and usually lead to flooding, but in past years, the lake has been low enough for the water to recede back into the lake. However, because of the lake water-levels being this spectacularly high, the flood water has nowhere left to go, and finds home in roads and people's lawns.

The highly increased amount of precipitation this spring is another factor for the amount of flooding and high-water levels. It precipitated 55 days out of 93 this spring. The water has resided in the Great Lakes.

Seiches are part of a cycle, but with the alarming side effects of climate change, the cycle is worsening. Part of the effects of climate change is an intensifying water cycle, explaining both the record-breaking high waters and the incredible amount of rain.

The flooding is especially terrible on Middle Bass

A popular neighborhood on the island called Burgundy Bay has been flooded all spring and summer. Fortunately, most of the houses' first level is the garage, meaning that the house levels are still livable. However, it is difficult for the home-owners to actually get to their houses because of the perpetual foot of water on the road.

The East Point area of the island has lost ten to fifteen feet of beach due to the high water. The once sturdy seawall is eroding away from the waves crashing into it.

The sewage treatment plant is struggling to process sewage because of all the lake water infiltrating the plant. Because of this, the island is facing water backing up. The General Store decided to ditch its indoor bathrooms and switched to porta potties, so they won't contribute to the sewage backups. The Middle Bass music festival also made the switch to porta potties.

Wildlife on the island has also been affected by the flooding. Fish that are meant to be in the lake have made their way into what was once forest, but is now a swamp. Ducks are happily swimming in people's lawns. Trees and shrubs are rotting on the bottom from the excess amount of water.

The flooding on some parts of the island is destructive, but Middle Bass is resilient. The islanders are still enjoying their weekly baseball games against the other Lake Erie Island teams. All of the businesses are open and encouraging visitors. Only a small portion of Middle Bass is flooded, so islanders are welcoming tourists to visit.

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


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Our Changing Island

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Local Educator Engages in Research **Excursion on Lake Erie**

Missi Kowalski, 7-12th grade science teacher at Putin-Bay Schools and resident of South Bass Island, recently stepped off the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) research vessel Lake Guardian.

Kowalski was one of 15 educators chosen from more than 40 applicants to collect data alongside scientists from July 8 - 14 as part of the Center for Great Lakes Literacy's Lake Erie Shipboard Science Workshop.

"I'm so excited to have had this opportunity to learn more about Lake Erie and the topics that affect her waters," said Kowalski. "I loved getting to do authentic scientific research in the areas of algal blooms, microplastics, and zooplankton, all of which directly affect us as island residents. As the only science teacher in our district, I am always grateful for the chance to collaborate with like-minded educators. I am coming away from this experience with so many new ideas and resources to integrate into my classroom that I can't wait for the school year to begin so that I can share them with my students."

Thanks to facilitators from Ohio, Pennsylvania and Indiana-Illinois Sea Grants, the workshop provided teachers an opportunity to work alongside four scientists on current Lake Erie research projects. Dr. George Bullerjahn from Bowling Green State University, Dr. Lorena Rios Mendoza from the University of Wisconsin Madison, Elizabeth Whitmore from Cornell University, and Ben Alsip from the US EPA Great Lakes National Program Office guided educators in learning about the impact of human activities on water quality.

Teachers evaluated the presence of microplastics and microbial DNA and RNA in surface water and sediment, enumerated zooplankton as a proxy for productivity, and measured chlorophyll to determine phytoplankton concentrations throughout Lake Erie's basins. Samples were analyzed in onboard laboratories or preserved for later processing in researcher's laboratories. Ultimately, educators will be able to take their experiences back to the classroom and inspire their own students to want to do scientific exploration of the Great Lakes.



"Educators were immersed in an intense week of Great Lakes science. They assisted with authentic data collection and processing that can be used to provide insight on the quality of Lake Erie's water. Using innovative sampling and monitoring equipment, teachers were provided with once-in-a-lifetime professional learning experience to explore science up-close and personal," said Angela Greene, Ohio Sea Grant Education Specialist, who helped facilitate the workshop.

In addition to gathering and synthesizing data aboard the ship, participants had shoreline experiences in Erie, Pennsylvania and Put-in-Bay, Ohio. They collected and sorted litter from a beach clean up, learned how to implement stewardship projects with students, and practiced Great Lakes classroom lessons. Teachers tweeted (#shipboardscience) and blogged (www.cgll.org/featuredblogs/) about the experience as well.

The Lake Erie Shipboard Science Workshop was supported by the US EPA through funding from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and Center for Great Lakes Literacy (www.cgll.org).

The Center for Great Lakes Literacy is a collaborative effort led by Sea Grant educators throughout the Great Lakes region. The Center fosters informed and responsible decision-making that advances basin-wide stewardship by providing hands-on experiences, educational resources and networking opportunities. CGLL promotes

Great Lakes literacy among an engaged community of educators, scientists and citizens who can effectively contribute to the sustainability of the Great Lakes.

Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Illinois-Indiana Sea Grant are part of the National Oceanic and Administration Atmospheric (NOAA), a nationwide network of 33 science-based outreach and education program.


I want to thank the gentleman who owns The Cove property. It was very gracious of him to let me come to the scene of the crime and drink a toast to




Lights of Peace, The Harbor Illumination


Pelee Island Ferry Issues The Ministry of Transportation says a full review will be carried out over the

issues with ferry service to Pelee Island on the Canada Day weekend, the last weekend in June. Both the new Pelee Islander II and the Jiimaan ran into trouble, leaving some passengers stranded on Lake Erie for more than four hours. Fish flies (mayflies) clogged the cooling system for the Pelee Islander II on Sunday, June 30th, leading to engine problems. The new \$40 million ferry was taken out of service at which point the Jiimaan was called into action. It, too, ran into its own engine is-

sues and forced the Owen Sound Transportation Company to put the decades-old, and smaller, Pelee Islander into service on Monday, July 1st. The Pelee Islander II was put back into service later on July 1st.

Getting to Know: CC Wisniewski By Sarah Barney

CC Wisniewski is part of what makes the Lake Erie Islands' community truly unique. The talented woman with a passion for teaching officially brought her teaching skills to Put-in-Bay and Kelleys Island in 2017. Although she has only lived on the island for two years, her contributions are incredibly valuable.

Wisniewski grew up East of Cleveland in Mentor, Ohio, but throughout her life, she spent a lot of time on Put-in-Bay.

Wisniewski's parents were avid sailors, so they were heavily involved with Inter-Lake Yachting Association (I-LYA). I-LYA and the annual regattas brought her family to Put-in-Bay for a few weeks each summer. Eventually, her parents bought a lakefront cottage which encouraged Wisniewski to spend even more time on the island.

After her parents passed, Wisniewski moved into her parent's cottage on the island and brought all of her teaching skills with her

Wisniewski is making wondrous changes for the Lake Erie Islands. She is one of two managers at the Put-in-Bay Yacht Club, along with directing the Put-in-Bay Community Learn to Swim and Sail Program.

Wisniewski also formed the sailing team at Put-in-Bay High School. She stated that the high schoolers' interest in the sailing team was present from the beginning.

"The kids were super excited," she said.

To have a sailing team, a school only needs four people, and Wisniewski had six their first season. Now eight students have joined the sailing team. The team has been around for about two years, completing three total seasons: spring of 2018, fall of 2018, and spring of 2019.

Three or four weekends during the seasons, the team travels off the island to compete against people from all over the Midwest

Wisniewski greatly enjoys coaching the team. Because the sailing team is fairly small, it gives Wisniewski valuable one-on-one time with her team.


"Basketball is the number one sport along with cross country and volleyball. It's fun to give the kids another opportunity they don't always have."

Wisniewski herself started sailing when she was very young. It's a skill shared though multi-generations of her family.

"I started sailing before I knew how to walk," she said with

She began to be heavily involved in sailing competitions when she was young, and at 18, Wisniewski started teaching sailing while still participating in competitions all over the country including Put-in-Bay.

In addition to coaching sailing, managing the Put-in-Bay Yacht Club, and directing the Learn to Swim Sail Program, Wisniewski also teaches music on Kelleys Island during the school year.



In middle and high school, Wisniewski participated in band where she fell in love with music. She chose to attend college in Rhode Island to be a music teacher. Wisniewski knew she wanted to be a teacher, and music was the perfect thing to teach.

"My parents were both teachers. It is in my blood," she claims.

After she graduated college, she was a kindergarten through eighth grade music teacher at a charter school in Cleveland. After she moved to the island, she wanted to find a way to keep teaching music, and Kelleys Island was the answer.


Wisniewski teaches in small groups to elementary kids. The groups being kindergarten and first grade, then second and third grade.

"We do all sorts of general music. Instrument playing, singing, movement, creating, all that kind of stuff." Wisniewski provides all different types of instruments for the kids to play with and to become familiar with.

She said, "All kids are innately musical so it's just kind of getting them to be confident with it."

Wisniewski found the Put-in-Bay lifestyle an easy adjustment. The supportive community has aided in the move, and the beautiful views of Lake Erie will never become old to her.

While she does miss the ways of a city, Wisniewski loves her life on the island, and the island is grateful for her many contributions in the community.

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

Bob Wolford, a retired purchasing manager who was influential in bringing the ship now known as the Col. James

M. Schoonmaker to the banks of the Maumee River, died on

Friday, June 28th, at his home in Port Clinton. He was 76. He

is believed to have died of a heart attack, said Donna Wolford, his wife of nearly 50 years. Bob was an engaged hus-

band, father, and friend to many and had a hand in numerous

community organizations, including Junior Achievement of

Northwest Ohio and the Ohio State Alumni Club of Lucas

County. His drive to stay busy kept him active into retire-

ment. He co-anchored a local Internet radio show, and he and

his wife, a retired teacher, picked up jobs working a dock and selling tickets in Put-in-Bay, Ohio, for the Jet Express ferries.

Bob would often drive the Jet Express boat/car in the Sunday antique car parades on the island. The day before he died un-

expectedly, he worked a full shift on the island and enjoyed a dinner out with friends, his son, Jon Wolford, said. "He lived

life to the fullest until his last day," he said. "He was a 'Let's

have fun' kind of guy," Mrs. Wolford said. "He wanted to be on the go and he wanted to be doing something all the time."

Bob was born Dec. 27, 1942, to Robert and Dorthy Wolford

in Newark, Ohio. He grew up in Granville and moved with

his family as a teenager to Vermilion, Ohio, where he gradu-

ated from the local high school in 1961. He went on to obtain

an associate's degree in engineering drafting from Stautzen-

berger College. His professional career established him in

Toledo, with two years at Prestolite Automotive, nearly 10

at Haughton Elevators, and the bulk of his working years

at Owens-Illinois, from which he would ultimately retire

as a purchasing manager in 1999. He met his wife through

mutual friends shortly before he moved to Owens-Illinois. They married on Nov. 30, 1973. During his years at Owens-

Illinois, through his role with the International Park advisory

board, he advocated for the city to purchase a retired lake

freighter and redevelop it into a floating maritime museum.

named to the board. Toledo purchased the retired freighter,

then known as the Willis B. Boyer, in 1987, and Mr. Wolford

tional Park before it was rechristened in 2011 to its original

name, the Col. James M. Schoonmaker, and moved a short

distance to a wharf at the future National Museum of the

Great Lakes the following year. "I think he was proud of

that, definitely," Jon Wolford said. After Mr. Wolford retired

in 1999, he and his wife moved to Port Clinton, where they

became the dockmasters of their condominium association.

In addition to their shifts with the Jet Express, which enabled

them to enjoy plenty of time on Put-in-Bay and Kelleys Is-

land, he co-hosted a local Internet radio show highlighting

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Vice Commander...Ahoy!

HIGH WATERS PRESENT HIDDEN DANGERS FOR PIB **BOATERS**

As I mentioned last month, parts of PIB are literally under water. I was talking with Ken Fox the other day and he mentioned that this season's high water levels have encouraged some boaters to go where they shouldn't...and he's right! Here are two examples which have amazed me when I've seem it and a lot more boaters (emboldened by the high waters) are taking the risk! Between Gibraltar and Oak Point is a string of regulatory markers indicating rocks and shallow water. How shallow? Shallow enough for you to walk across and barely get your feet wet if you know where the rocks are. This hazard is also noted on nautical charts (we discussed both of these back in December). The rise in water levels have made it such that small and medium size boats can cross this zone with a high probability of not damaging their vessels. Another is the waters between Mouse Island and Catawba Point. Normally about 1 foot deep in parts, the increased water levels have encouraged some boaters to take the risk of crossing. Those who are aware of these



hidden dangers are playing a dangerous game as water conditions and levels are varying daily. Another hidden danger is a large submerged rock to the left of the also submerged access ramp at

the state park. During normal water levels this rock is only partially submerged and is visible enough to be avoided. I have long felt that ODNR should have this obstacle removed as it represents a navigation hazard in my opinion. As a result of the high water, this large rock is now completely submerged and could do serious damage to a boat should she hit it. Picture #1 shows the completely submerged access ramp and the circle indicates the location of the hidden rock. A very risky approach for this boater!



U.S. COAST GUARD CONDUCTS ACTIVE SHOOTER DRILLS

The US Coast Guard from Station Marblehead conducted a series of drills in Put In Bay harbor in June. These exercises took place on ferries from Miller Boat Line, the Jet Express, Kelley's Island Ferry Boat Line and the Goodtime1. Several area law enforcement agencies including the Put-in-Bay police department took part. Put-in-Bay is a major regional tourist destination and as such it is of the utmost importance that all area law enforcement as well as ferry personnel train and practice together to ensure the safety of visitors to the islands. The joint exercise covered four scenarios: a bomb threat, active shooter, brawl, and a report of a firearm on an uncooperative passenger. Interestingly, this was the first time that I had been on all four ferries in one day as each drill was conducted separately on

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

At Mother of Sorrows Church, we continue our discussions on Thursday mornings in August 8 a.m. – 9:45 a.m. Breakfast will be provided.





Jet Skier Rescued After 14 Hours in Water

A 57-year-old woman who left Put-in-Bay on a jet ski headed for the mainland spent 14 frightening hours in windy weather and choppy seas, after she fell into Lake Erie. She was with two other jet skiers heading for the Portage River in Port Clinton, when she disappeared in 5 to 6-ft. waves at about 8 p.m. on Sunday night, July 21st.

After being notified, crews from Michigan, Canada, and local police departments including Put-in-Bay joined the local Coast Guard to search by boat and by air through the night. Her jet ski was found around 1 a.m. Just before 10 a.m. Monday, 14 hours after she fell into the water, the woman was found by fishermen.

The woman was taken to the hospital suffering from exhaustion, dehydration and hypothermia. The Coast Guard said she had drifted almost 5 miles during her ordeal, and credited her survival to wearing a life jacket, zipped and buckled properly, she survived.


The woman also had a whistle with her, but her life jacket was black, which made it difficult to locate her. The Coast Guard recommended a bright colored vest, a strobe light or reflective tape.

"If you're trying to put your life jacket on in an emergency situation, it's like trying to put your seat belt on when you're going through a car crash," Kittrell said.

The woman, who remained in the hospital Monday night, has not been identified.

After Two Years in Jail, Keith Blumensaadt is a Free Man

After two years sitting in the Ottawa County jail awaiting trial after being arrested at his Put-in-Bay home on several felony charges, Keith Blumensaadt is a free man. Keith was arrested after a standoff with Put-in-Bay Police at the end of June 2017 when police say they spotted him with a weapon in his yard after being chased for a traffic violation. The Ottawa County Sheriff was called to the island to take Keith into custody. Later, charges were filed when firearms, ammunition and explosives were supposedly found at Keith's home.

Keith, who reportedly was one of the whistleblowers in the case involving former PIB Mayor Mack McCann, said the island police were targeting him. After being arrested, the bond was so high, Keith could not pay it and he sat in jail awaiting trial.

Complications arose when one of the key witnesses, the officer who arrested Keith, was himself arrested on federal charges. The case dragged on and on and was scheduled to go to trial later this summer.

Keith accepted a deal to plead guilty to three charges in exchange for a two-year prison term with credit for time served, plus a 180-day suspended jail sentence. In addition, he is not to visit Put-in-Bay for one year unless accompanied by a sheriff's deputy.



There are also a bunch of entertaining things happening everywhere at the various commercial establishments.

The first KI TÄLENT SHOW was a nice surprise. It drew a big crowd and included singers and tether acrobats (this required a backhoe to suspend the tethers). It was whittled down to six finalists, with Lily Franks coming in first. What appeared to be a white dove was walking around downtown at the end of July. We figured it was an escapee from a magic show. It sauntered around for quite a while, definitely not afraid of people or vehicles. We woke up on Saturday July 29 connected to the world again. CAMPING, TRAILERS AND MOTOR HOMES were on the top of the comments explored on Facebook and at the council meeting during public participation. The big question was "why can't I use my property for camping?" There is a fine line between enjoying ones property in a tent or camper and living next door to someone enjoying their property in a tent or camper. The bottom line is, the village has ordinances to regulate camping on private property. These rules appear in the zoning code and other places. These sections can be reviewed on the village website: www.KelleysIsland.us. They include: §96.04 overnight camping permits are required. The fee is \$20 per unit for a 30-day period or less. §152.013 ... Junk motor vehicle storage and inoperable motor vehicle storage are also not permitted within any zoning district. §152.012 (E) A manufactured home may be used as a temporary office or building incidental to construction of a building or development on the premises on which the manufactured home is located, only during the time that the construction or development is actively underway, and for a period not to exceed 18 months, starting with the issue date of a building permit for the permanent structure. The manufactured home may only be used as sleeping quarters if it has a self-contained sanitary system or is attached to a sewage disposal system as approved by the Erie County General Health District.

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

Our fall sports programs begin preparing for another season this month. Coach Craig Schuffenecker will lead a talented volleyball team. Coaches Adam and Johnna Danes have everyone back from last year's cross-country team, and coach Coralee Wisniewski will have her sailing team back in the water prepping for the regattas in September and October. Good luck Panthers!

The first day of school for students is Tuesday, September 3. Letters will be sent informing parents of school supplies needed to begin the school year. Students new to our school district should register at least one week prior to the first day of school.

When school does begin on September 3, we would like parents to adhere to the following guidelines when dropping off and/or picking up their children:

- No parking/waiting on the sidewalk (ball field side of Concord).
- No parking behind the cars in the parking lot.
- No parking across the street on Catawba (heading to State Park).

All drop-offs and pick-ups will take place along Catawba Ave. heading into town. For students walking or riding their bikes to school, the corner of Concord and Catawba will be monitored by crossing guards, school faculty and/or local police to ensure a safe crossing.

Our school's attendance policy changed considerably with the inception of House Bill 410. Instead of counting days absent, schools now must keep track of hours absent. Excessive absences will now be reported to the Ottawa County Juvenile Court. The new definition for excessive absences is: absent 38 or more hours in one month or 65 or more hours in one school year. Prior to filing a complaint with the court parents will be notified, followed by an absence intervention plan. Complete details of House Bill 410 will be sent home. Parents are advised to make appointments and plan vacations on the following dates that school will

School will continue to start at 8:00. Students are asked to arrive at 7:50 a.m.. Primary elementary students will begin lunch dismissal at 11:50, followed by grades four to six. Grades 7 – 12 students will be dismissed for lunch at noon. All students are to return from lunch at 12:50 to begin classes at 1:00. Elementary students will be dismissed after school at 3:16 while high school students will end the day at 3:21.

Student handbooks will be sent home the first day of school. Parents are advised to pay particular attention to the school dress code.

We will have our annual school open house on Thursday, September 12th, from 3:24 -4:30 p.m. A reminder will be sent home a week prior to open house.

And finally, everyone associated with our school, from staff to students, are mourning the passing of Patrick Myers. Patrick was "the voice" of Put-in-Bay basketball for years. He loved his job and it showed! He created a 'big-time' atmosphere mixing in music and the famous Panther 'growl' to go along with his commentary. He brought player introductions to a new level, sounding much like NBA introductions. We will never be able to come close to the passion Patrick brought to the table. Patrick worked tirelessly to make sure most, if not all, our games were broadcast on WPIB radio. And when he wasn't announcing ball games, he was setting up the lighting for our concerts and the sound system for our graduation ceremonies. There was nothing that Patrick would not do for our school and the kids he loved so much. We will miss you, dear friend.

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Island 5K Gets Technical

The annual 5KatPutinBay is completely changing its runner timing method this year. Like almost all 5Ks in the area, the popular Put-in-Bay 5K previously used the "pull tab" method of runner timing. This method requires someone at the finish line to remove the "pull tab" from the numbered bib, mark

it with the runner's time noted from a nearby clock and secure the tab on a spindle so it doesn't blow away. Obviously, this method is prone to human error.

The newest and most reliable and accurate runner timing is called, "Chip Timing." A small microchip is embedded in the runner's bib. This chip contains all pertinent runner information including bib number, name, age, etc. As the runner crosses the finish line their time is automatically integrated by a receiver. The completed time and information is automatically recorded to a computer and the information is displayed as an Excel spreadsheet. The information is accurate within a 10th of a second and subject to no human error.

The 5KatPutinBay occurs every third Saturday of September and draws 500 to 800 runners. The Miller Boat Line owns the naming rights to the 5K and The Boathouse Restaurant owns the rights to the 5K race headquarters. This year marks the 16th running of one of the largest 5K races in all of North Central Ohio.

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














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
