

# PIBIO -Dr. GreenLove, or How I learned to love the blooms! **By Peter Huston**

There are good algae and bad algae. The good algae are part of the essential Lake Erie food chain and is essential to the lakes annual cycle of life. The bad algae lurks waiting for the right conditions to become harmful algal blooms (HABs) that contain cyanobacteria 'Microcystis'

The "BAD" algae or "Microcystis" is a bio-organism that can cause problems for the fish, humans and animals and we should avoid drinking it, cooking with it, or even watering the garden

with it. I have learned to watch out for the "BAD" algae, and be tolerant of the rest that exists here in the western basin of Lake Erie. Here's how I learned to love the algae.

This past month a gathering of scholarly experts took over the Ohio State University Stone Lab on Gibraltar Island to make their annual HAB prediction. It is organized and facilitated by Stone Lab Director Dr. Chris Winslow.

All the cool kids were there, and every politician from the region too. Everyone wants to know the "when, where and how bad' of this season's prediction. It's a big deal. Not just Punxsutawney Phil, looking for his shadow media circus, no this is the real deal with a room full of people with PhD's using real science to back up this years forecast and a handful of laymen like myself trying to make sense of it all.

It is a consortium of players including NOAA, Heidelberg, Michigan, and Ohio State University scientists who have been pursuing the HAB origins and better methodology for detection. They all are there to hear the prediction for the length and severity of this years "BAD" bloom of algae.

So first I want to let your know that the algae you have been seeing here around Put-in-Bay may be ugly, slippery and a nuisance but it is not all that "BAD". Sometimes it grows on boat ramps that can become a slippery slope to getting wet. Other times it is growing and hanging about near the shoreline and getting

caught in your boats propeller. It washes up on beaches and smells bad but that's just the regular "Good" stuff, really.

The "Bad" algae in Lake Erie are spawned by an excess of phosphorous. Not some alien being at the bottom of the lake spewned by the state of the phosphorous are off more than likely. ing goo. We know that the phosphorous run off more than likely comes from Midwest farms to the lake through creeks, streams, rivers in what is known as the Maumee River Water Shed. There is also some of these "BAD" nutrients and I use that word loosely that come from Canada, Michigan and Wisconsin through Lake Sinclair and the Detroit River too.

Amazingly, a team of Heidelberg Scientists led by Dr. Laura Johnson continually measures the amount of phosphorous. They have been doing this for a bunch of years. I have this vision of

college kids with beakers and pipettes but it really is done with quite sophisticated sampling stations located through out the region. Dr. Johnson took time to explain to the group how they track the impact of the phosphorous by comparing it to a cup of coffee verses a whole pot of coffee, which was perfect metaphor for me! As the flow rate increases the amount of phosphorous that "loads" the lake goes up. As an avid coffee drinker I understand "flow".

So those spring rains add to the amount of "BAD" fuel over a long period of time, it's not just because of a single event. Establishing methods for lowering the amounts of "nutrient" runoff is a goal of Dr. Johnson and the other scientists share but is not essential to this year's prediction.

But you're wondering about, "the Bloom the Bloom." So then Dr.Rick Stumpf from NOAA, takes into account all this amazing data that has been collected by Dr. Laura Johnson, he plugs it into several computer modeling forecasting programs, and they come up with a solid prediction for the season. This simple predictor number does not necessarily mean it will be everywhere or nowhere, just that somewhere during the summer there will be a bloom. In 2013 which was a pretty bad year it was a 10. This year's number, drum roll please, is a 6, last year it was an 8. Dr. Stumpf said most of the lake this summer will be fine most of the time. So a 6 sounds pretty good

The "where and how big" part comes all summer long from the NOAA group led by Dr. Callendar that use satellite imagery to pin point the blooms. In fact they have gotten access to the European Space Agency satellite, which allows us to read peoples name tags from space it so amazing. With this advanced imaging technology they will be able to detect not just the surface location but how deep the Cyanobacteria blooms go too. # Law enforcement helps contain holiday revelers

Detroit's favorite island holiday came and went this past month. And thanks to more than 130 law enforcement officers ranging from the Ottawa County Sheriff deputies to State Highway Patrol Officers, and Put-in-Bay Police officers to liquor control agents and more, there was a law enforcement presence never seen before on Put-in-Bay. At the property owners meeting on Sat, July 21st, Chief Riddle announced the "C\$\*?#&@#\* in July" the amount of manpower he had lined up for what has become the island's most down and dirty Saturday of the season.

The Ottawa County Sheriff Dept, was on hand with drug dogs at the Miller Ferry Dock on Catawba in the morning when dozens of busses dropped their loads of passengers off to head

Golf carts were sold out by mid-morning. The streets were jammed by gawking golf carters long before the lunch hour.

By noon, the streets of the village were jammed with carters looking for parking and places to party. Many had their own coolers filled with soft drinks and water. Some had those funny smelling cigarettes, plus some of the women weren't exactly modest when it came to their wardrobes. If you didn't know any better you'd have thought Put-in-Bay was ground zero for the Miss World Fat Booty Twerking Pageant.

Also about mid day, a contingency of State Troopers got off several Coast Guard boats and marched off C-Dock. They were later spotted around the Village patrolling and mingling through the crowds. It appeared one or two of them were seen on the roof of the Put-in-Bay Town Hall with binoculars. We are sure their presence went a long way in helping to keep things under control.

Police did their best to take care of the traffic situation by blocking roads and clearing Delaware Ave of traffic, but this did little, if anything to alleviate, the gridlock. Some say closing off the main street just added to the gridlock. We saw an emergency vehicle trying to get through the crowd on Lorraine Ave. It was having a very difficult time of it.

Over in McCann's field, there was a gathering of scores of

golf carts near Adventure Bay. Earlier, it was reported that the field was not going to be used this year like it was last year for such a gathering, but it soon became obvious that there needed to be an outlet for the overflow from the downtown.


One observer told the Gazette that State Troopers were out in the Township writing tickets for those driving with drinks. Apparently, the word must have gotten out over social media, and he claimed the roads outside the Village were empty compared to a normal Saturday. He volunteered to take us on a tour to prove his point. Indeed, the township roads were like a Tuesday afternoon in May. Everyone had concentrated in the downtown area thus further contributing to the gridlock.

The EMS had more runs than a usual summer weekend, but were able to take care of everything. Life Flight trips off the island for the weekend were a bit up over a normal weekend mainly due to people doing stupid things. The EMS did report that it was a bit more difficult to get around.

Chief Riddle reported there were 75 citations for open container, weed, disorderly conduct, public urination and the like issued. These run about \$100 a piece, plus court costs. There were also more than two dozen arrests, plus 36 OVIs (Operating a Vehicle while Intoxicated) recorded. This was for Saturday and early Sunday. The chief reported there were no major incidents on the island.


There were a lot of lessons learned over the weekend, but the one problem that still remains is how to contain this abnormally crowded July Saturday that has now become a nightmare for the island. There is no doubt some business make out very well, but many businesses say they lose thousands that day. Numerous businesses reported conversations with customers, who didn't realize what the weekend was like, saying they would never come back to the island. The tsunami of negative social media reporting of that weekend was off the chart.

Islanders, residents and business people are concerned about the worsening progression of this weekend, and are trying hard to come up with ways to get this weekend back to normal.

# Not a good month for Put-in-Bay!

You read the headline correctly! With all the great things we having going on on the island, we're sad to say Put-in-Bay is still garnering bad publicity in everyone's "favorite mainland newspaper," the Sandusky Register.

But don't blame the Register, these stories don't just stay in our area, but go out all over thanks to the Internet.

What stories, you ask?

For starters, a former Put-in-Bay Police officer who worked on the island last year, El'Shawn Williams, was indicted for allegedly assaulting a man and falsifying reports to cover it up. This is serious business. It not only reflects on this officer, but on the Put-in-Bay Police Department and the entire community of Put-in-Bay.

The next two stories took a little digging on the part of the Register. A Put-in-Bay Councilman, Tip Boyles, was cited for disorderly conduct, after a confrontation with a young woman passing out flyers for the Blue Marlin, an island pool bar located a block south of the main downtown area. The details, like with any story, are fuzzy, but the bad publicity from this encounter just adds to the fodder faced by the island in the

There's also a story about an island businessman who alledgedly removed the water meter at his place of business and then installed a bypass line. When the Register reporter tried to get a police report on the matter, he reported he was stonewalled with the excuse that "There was no secretary in the police department who could access the report." The reporter reportedly did not have phone calls or email inquiries returned after that. The island sure didn't get any good headlines from this story.

Then came the dreaded "C\$\*?#&@#\* in July," Friday and Saturday on July 20th and 21st. The island was inundated with hundreds of people who came on buses from Detroit, Cleveland and elsewhere to celebrate the holiday which most island business people and residents have come to loath.

Headlines following the event included "Large crowds fight in Put-in-Bay" and "Brawls break out during PIB's Xmas in July." The lead line in a story read, "Chaos erupted all across Put-in-Bay Saturday during the notorious Christmas in July event." There was one good article praising the police and the work they did to keep the lid on any disruptive behavior, and that was certainly welcome, but the bad headlines over-whelmed the good by a long shot.

This is a mixed bag of bad news stories to say the least, and what they have in common is that they all reflect negatively for the island, islanders, and island business people with headlines and social media posts.

Probably the stories stemming from "C\\$\*?#&@#\* in July" have the biggest impact on the island. The many times we heard of people saying they would never come back to the island after seeing what happened was staggering. We also heard of businesses down 30% or more over a normal summer weekend. Granted there were some businesses that had to be way up, but perhaps it is time for them to step back and take a look at whether these short-term gains will hurt their businesses in the long run.

The island businesses spend hundreds of thousands of dollars each year promoting the island, yet in a flash, stories like these, at no cost to anyone, undo all the good things about the island everyone tries to promote. This must change, but it takes the entire business community to work together on this problem that seems to get worse and worse every year.

Put-in-Bay welcomes people from all over the wor or, race and creed, but some of those who come to the island on "C\$\*?#&@#\* in July" bring out the worst in themselves as they litter our streets, openly smoke pot, drive golf carts dangerously, flaunt the law and play the fool. They should be ashamed that they give a bad name to their entire group. This lack of respect for the island and themselves is a mystery to those who love Putin-Bay and welcome all. It's making it more and more difficult to put out the welcome mat for "C\$\*?#&@#\* in July."

## **MID-SEASON SAFE BOATING TIPS Extreme Heat Tips for boating**

We have had a string of very hot days over the last few weeks around Put-in-Bay. Here are some tips to stay as cool and healthy as possible while on your boat. 1) Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of water. Particularly under extreme heat conditions which you should do so prophylactically in other words, don't wait until you are dying of thirst before you drink. 2) Wear light and light colored clothing. Black and dark colors will make you very hot very fast. As a personal cooling preference I usually wear white or khaki shorts and tank top with a white or khaki breathable knit ball cap with a extra long bill. People often overlook the importance of protecting their head from direct extreme sunlight. If you don't have a bimini roof or such to protect you from hours of direct sun exposure consider wearing a buff. You'll look a bit like a bandit but that's the trade-off LOL. 3) If possible, limit your time on the water to the coolest parts of the day.

## Heat Exhaustion **VS. Heat Stroke**

(Know the difference and know the symptoms) Heat exhaustion is the precursor to heatstroke and is a direct result of the body overheating. Symptoms include heavy sweating, rapid pulse, dizziness, fatigue, cool moist skin with goose bumps, muscle cramps, nausea and a headache. If heat exhaustion is suspected, remove the person from the heat by getting out of the sun and loosening tight clothes, misting the body with water or placing ice packs in the armpits and groin. Re hydrate the person with plenty of water and avoid beverages that contain alcohol, caffeine or high amounts of sugar.

If heat exhaustion is not addressed, heatstroke could follow and without emergency treatment can lead to death. Heatstroke results when your body temperature rises to 104 degrees or higher. At this temperature, your brain, heart, kidneys and muscles can become damaged, leading to serious complications or death. If you suspect heatstroke seek medical attention immediately.

## **Please Be Advised**

Last month there were three re-occurring violations that we encountered while on patrol in our part of the Western Basin. Wake violations: Coming in to Put-in-Bay harbor (and others) there were countless boaters violating the "No Wake Zones." Be sure to learn what idle speed means. As a rule of thumb if you look over your transom and you see white water you are probably going to fast. Remember that you are legally and financially responsible for any damage caused by your wake to other boats and facilities. Make no mistake, it is enforceable!

Boaters riding on the gunwales and/or on top of the bow. WOW is that dangerous...and illegal. If you hit a sudden hard wake or wave bodies could go flying and maybe into a prop. Make sure that all of your passengers are safely inside the vessel while underway

Kayakers without life vests on board. While kayakers aren't required to wear their life vests while underway, they are required to have them on board. I would ask you to consider this. Unless you are an amazing swimmer and in your prime, your ability to recover from a sudden and catastrophic event such as a flipped over kayak may be limited. The life vest that you have stowed on board will be completely useless under these types of circumstances. Please consider wearing your life vest while kayaking.

Nature Camp wind up
The Nature Camp mission is to encourage children's natural curiosity of the

outdoors by engaging them in fun and educational activities. Nature Camp seems like a bubble, an intentionally built community, and there are usually many in the community who love and care about the magic that is the nature camp experience. It takes a village and begins with the Wildlife Center's board and staff, community leaders, camp alumni, colleagues, and donors who make camp possible and provide a great experience each year.

The Lake Erie Islands Nature & Wildlife Center has successfully been doing

this since 2003 for youths 4-14 years old, reaching out to over 150 campers each year on Middle Bass and South Bass Islands to help them learn about the Lake Erie Island's ecosystem. Topics we have covered over the years have included bats, snakes, turtles, fish, butterflies and moths, slugs, caves, and much more. This year

Nature Campers learned all about Lake Erie!

The Middle Bass Nature Camp was June 25-28, 2018. Camp was at the Middle Bass Island State Park each day. Nature Campers explored the science of Lake Erie through investigation and observation. We went into the ponds and dipped for micro and macroinvertebrates creating "enclosed ecosystems" from our findings. We were able to find dragonfly and damselfly larva, scuds, tadpoles, beetles, fly larva, and much more. Rangers from Perry's Monument came over for a day; they had activities about predatory animals that depend on water as a food source and discovered how all creatures are connected through water- including us! Biologists from OSU's Stone Laboratory also came one day. They brought salamanders, turtles, and fishes native to the islands so we were able to have hands-on and up-close interactions with these animals which depend on the islands' habitats. Fishing was a nice bonus as we were able to catch bass, perch, and freshwater drum/sheep head. Environmental Adventure Camp I. (9-10 years old) took the Sonny S Ferry to Putin-Bay for an afternoon to Kayak. Although it was a little windy and choppy on the water we had a blast paddling around Gibraltar Island, and we ended the day with much deserved ice cream before heading back to Middle Bass Island. Our campout was canceled due to bad weather, but we still seized the day and cooked s'mores over the fire, and cooked pancakes, bacon, and eggs the following morning.

This year we started the Wildlife Center Nature Camp Counselor Program. This is a curriculum-based project geared toward youth 15 and older. This program offered our counselors a one-of-a-kind opportunity to become involved with the Wildlife Center's education and conservation efforts of the Lake Erie Islands. Counselors experienced all components of the Lake Erie Islands Nature & Wildlife Center, from learning about the island's wildlife, presenting educational programs, working with wild animals, creating displays, and so much more. Counselors are a large asset to the camp program! There is no way we could have as much success without this team of wonderful help and support! The 2018 counselors were; Emily Beal, Sydney Ralofsky, Lizzie Rader, Lucille Schneider, Amanda O'Laughlin,

Olive O'Rourke Scherf, Larissa Swonger, and Aidan Ptak.

Thanks to; Glenn Cooper for being the chase boat for our kayaking day and Kayak the Bay for hosting Nature Campers each year. Thanks to our hardworking staff: Jackie Taylor, Kate Ptak, Debbie Larcey, Renee Market, and Maddie Heart. We could not put camp together without all their great ideas and support! As we pulled the boat back up to the Yacht Club lawn, granddaughter and grandfather, together nearly four hours on Erie, we had not registered a victory in any of the morning races; but for me, it was very clear who was the day's winner. A gem.

A few days later, Emma's brother, eight-year-old grandson Owen, would join me for golf with a group of mostly retired islanders, officially know as "The Put-in-Bay Duffers" - a weekly exercise I affectionately refer to as "old man golf day." Each Tuesday during the season, a dozen or so 60+ year-old islanders (the oldest, a few tics north of 90) venture to the mainland for coffee, donuts, and 18-holes at a nearby rotation of courses. To say Owen was excited would be an understatement – he had looked forward to this day for over a year. He glowed in his crisp, new golf shirt and matching shorts. He lugged his bag down the long hill at the Lime Kiln dock to meet the rest of the 'boys' for the 8 a.m. ferry. He was quickly 'one of the guys' as he chatted away with his new friends as we marched toward the ferry – even Billy Market, working the early shift on the dock, always with a kind word for the gray-haired golfers, wished Owen luck, "Hit 'em straight!" as he patted Owen on the back and sent him on his way.

Once on the mainland, we converge on Bassett's for a healthy breakfast of sugar-packed donuts. Owen carefully selected the largest one on the shelf as the group collected around our usual table. It was fun to watch him as he talked with men 60 and 70 years his senior as if they were old bud-

dies at the second-grade lunch table.

At the golf course in Huron, we took extra water and plenty of sun screen as we loaded the cart for our round – it was a sweltering day and Owen's face was already turning red as he grabbed his putter and ran to the practice green. We played in the second of three foursomes that day – already, his new friends were impressed with his smooth swing, and a flexibility not common to us old timers. Owen played quickly, sometimes jumping from the cart while it was still moving. He hit the ball consistently, and when he had trouble, happily accepted my invitation for a 'Mulligan" or just tossed another near to Papop's drive. He devoured a fat hot dog at the turn, continued his banter with our gracious playing partners, and attentively listened to my instructions on the courtesies of golf: "Be still while the other player is putting; don't walk in another player's line; and never talk during a back swing."

Afterward, gathered around a large table as we waited for the final group to finish, Owen traded stories about the days best shots and those that were less than perfect. He gulped down his orange Gatorade as the rest of us sipped beer or iced tea. Finally, League Commissioner Nagy announced that Owen had won a special prize, one dollar - low putts for the day, in the 10-and-under age group - from the smile on his face, you would had thought he just won The Masters. Indeed, it was a day unlike any other!

I peeked in the rear view mirror as we drove back to the Catawba dock, in the back seat, Owen's head swayed from side to side, his chin rested on his chest – sound asleep after his big day with Papop. A home run!

# Kelleys Island's Zion Church celebrates 125 years

On Saturday, August 18th, Zion United Methodist Church on Kelleys Island will celebrate 125 years in its current building. There will be an anniversary worship service at 10:30 am, followed by a light luncheon in the church fellowship rooms. A special invitation is extended to all present and former Kelleys Islanders who have had any connection with the church. Invitations to former pastors and notable guests have been sent. If you are able to attend, please call the church office at 419-746-2514 and leave a message.

Zion was first formed as the German Evangelical Church in 1854. A small church building, currently the home of Allen and Diane Nickles at 208 Division Street, was built in 1873, and a parsonage was built in 1879 at a cost of \$600, paid for by 28 church members. The present Church, at 101 Chappel Street, was built in 1893. A corner stone commemorating the construction with the words, German Evangelical Church 1893, is still visible. Interestingly, the German language was used in worship until the year 1910.

When the Congregational Church disbanded in the early 1930's, the remaining members gave their land and building to Zion Church, which enabled the addition of the educational and social rooms. During this time the church was known as the Community Church. When the Evangelical Association and the United Brethren Church united in 1946, Zion Church became part of that larger communion. In 1950, the church became a member of the Ohio Sandusky Conference of the Evangelical United Brethren (EUB) Church. In 1968 the EUB united with the Methodist Church and in 1973, the church on Kelleys Island became known officially as the Zion United

ing this month.

Despite being a small congregation, Zion Church has fostered at least seven young men who have entered the ministry and continues to have a vital and supportive outreach on the island. Current programs include, among others, a welcoming program for summer student workers which incorporates a bicycle loan program to help them get around,

# The Choirmaster on Middle Bass By: Gordy Barr

The Israeli intelligence officer looked at Ernie Hisey and calmly said, "As you know there was another attack on the Golan Heights area by the Syrians. It is the area where you and your choral singers are due to perform later tonight. As you know we have to answer every attack on Israel with a reciprocal attack. We have decided not to attack until your group is done performing..."

group is done performing..."

Performance anxiety? Hardly. The concert went off as planned. After the performance mortar and gunfire could be heard in the distance.

Middle Bass Island's Professor Emeritus Ernie Hisey has decades of service in educational and religious institutions including Cleveland State (Vocal/ Choral Music Program Chair), 17 years in area high schools, and 35 years as a church musician and choir director (most notably at Bay Presbyterian Church in Bay Village). To this day, nothing short of gunfire surprises him.

Hisey has conducted professionally for over 50 years and has had concert tours through out the United Sates, Romania, Israel, Canada, Communist Poland (Northern and Southern), Germany, and invitations to Lithuania, and Latvia.

Yet, his fondest concert accomplishments may have been heard when Ernie and his wife Bernie created the Middle Bass Fine Arts Festival (1994-2004) to support the Middle Bass School Board.

"Every year we expanded our programs. Music and the choral arts were our foundation but it became so much more. Some years were themed to include jazz, classical music, dance, and visual arts.

We had poetry readings at Ron and Jan Hellman's Stone Mansion as well as an educational tour of North Bass (using the Put in Bay Tour Train and Miller's Ferry) culminating with a choral performance in the North Bass Chapel.

Our goal was to promote the arts in our island community and to inform and educate our participants. The range included school children to adults."

Hisey has had his fingers on the pulse of Middle Bass for over 30 years. When Paramount Distilleries was exploring how to divest themselves of their island properties, Middle Bass was targeted by several developers. One wanted to put in an exclusive "members only" club on the Lonz property that would have excluded Middle Bass residents.

Hisey had a high school friendship with Sam Speck (Director of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources). Hisey worked with Speck and the State to develop Paramount's island holdings. Today Middle Bass Island State park and Marina (and North Bass) are proud testimony of tired land given a new lease on life.

Ernie Hisey was instrumental in founding and acting as president of the Middle Bass Island Senior Men's Club. He wanted to gather members from all parts of Middle Bass and create a unified voice to deal with some of the larger issues Middle Bass faced.

Issues the group addressed included getting gasoline service at the State Park (2015), encouraging the State to put in a safe walking path from the ferry dock to the town hall (2014), getting Ohio Edison to trim fallen trees and branches from power lines (after years of deferred maintenance, 2012), and putting in strategic placed street lighting on some of the main roads (2015).

There is more work to be done on Middle Bass. The Middle Bass Island Senior Men's Club is ready to address other opportunities to improve Middle Bass. There is more to come.

Ernie has also been a realtor for many years on Middle Bass (and the Westside of Cleveland). He and his wife Now

Bernie fell in love with the peace and tranquility of Middle Bass. His tag line for years has been: "Middle Bass, the quiet island for active people."

One of Ernie's other sons, Lee Hisey, has taken over the real estate business (Howard Hanna). Ernie likes to lend a hand when he can.

"Bernie and I raised our children (Joe, born 1988 and Susan, born 1990) on Middle Bass during the summers. We purchased our Burgundy Bay house in 1987. Everyday was an adventure in nature. Every sunset is still a treasured memory."

Ernie looks forward to seeing Middle Bass evolve. The Middle Bass of 2018 is far different than the Middle Bass of 1987. Thirty years makes a big difference. Who can say what Middle Bass will grow into by 2050, but Ernie Hisey is always looking ahead.



The first day of school for students is Monday, August 27th. Letters will be sent informing parents of school supplies needed to begin the school year. Students new to our school district should register at least one week prior to the

When school does begin on August 27th, we would like parents to adhere to the following guidelines when dropping off and/or picking up their children:

1. No parking/waiting on the sidewalk (ball field side

of Concord).

No parking behind the cars in the parking lot. No parking across the street on Catawba (heading to State Park).

All drop-offs and pick-ups will take place along Catawba Ave. heading into town. For students walking or riding their bikes to school, the corner of Concord and Catawba will be monitored by crossing guards, school faculty and/or local police to ensure a safe crossing.

Our school's attendance policy has changed considerably with House Bill 410 being passed. Instead of counting days absent, schools now must keep track of hours absent. Excessive absences will now be reported to the Ottawa County Juvenile Court. The new definition for excessive absences is: absent 38 or more hours in one month or 65 or more hours in one school year. Prior to filing a complaint with the court parents will be notified, followed by an absence intervention plan. Complete details of House Bill 410 will be sent home. Parents are advised to make appointments and plan vacations on the following dates that school will not be in session: (Labor Day)

September 1 - 3 October 20 - 22 November 21 - 25 December 22 - January 2 (Christmas Break)

February 23 – March 3

(Appointment Day) (Thanksgiving)

(Winter Break) April 20 – April 28 (Spring Break) May 23 - LAST DAY OF SCHOOL

The school day will be lengthened this year by six minutes. School will continue to start at 8 a.m. Students are asked to arrive at 7:50 a.m. Primary elementary students will begin lunch dismissal at 11:50 a.m., followed by grades four to six. Grades 7 – 12 students will be dismissed for lunch at noon. All students are to return from lunch at 12:50 p.m. to begin classes at 1 p.m. Elementary students will be







# Historic "Seven Gables" now gone!

The talk of the island in July was the tearing down of the historic "Seven Gables" cottage in the Shore Villas subdivision just east of Perry's Monument.

The home, named for its seven gables, canopies over the windows and doors, was built in 1885 according to tax records. President Howard Taft stayed at the home when he visited the island. Fifty years ago, the home was owned by Larry Gazzola, a wellknown summer person. More recent owners were the late Scott and Linda Buttrey, and Jerry and Lana Sluss. The new owners, Ed and Wendy Pesicka, purchased the home last June for \$552,000 according to the Ottawa County Auditor's office. The property has a spectacular view of Put-in-Bay harbor and of the lake to the west looking out towards Rattlesnake Island. It also has a private dock.

According to reports, the Pesickas were interested in saving the home, but discovered issues with the foundation which would have made making extensive changes difficult and expensive. A new home, similar in style to Seven Gables, but not identical, is planned for the now-vacant lot.

Interestingly, Island mystery writer, Bob Adamov used the home in his popular novels. It was the home of the lead character Emerson Moore's Aunt Anne in his books.

When Bob saw the house coming down, he posted it on Facebook and asked his readers to explain its demise with creative plot ideas. His readers responded with numerous plots. A couple we liked were the following.

"Racing speedboat chase across Lake Erie by the speedboat Coast Guard. Illegal immigrant smuggling suspected. As they near PIB, the speedboat driver dives overboard and the boat jumps the dock, airborne, and lands/crashed into Aunt Annie's house. The investigation takes Emerson to Guatemala jungles, Mexico, and involves ICE.

"Auntie fell and broke her hip and had to go to a rehab home. Squatters made themselves at home and left the stove on in the kitchenturned meth lab. It starts a fire while they are gone. They return to a burned out shell. Meanwhile they had been pawning Auntie's valuables on the mainland. Auntie, now fully recovered, joined reporter in locating druggies."
You get the idea.



# 2018 Put-in-Bay Sports Car Races to celebrate **Bugeye Sprites and** Porsche

The Put-in-Bay Road Race Historical Society is celebrating our 10th year of honoring the intrepid racers of the 1950's by celebrating the 60th birthday of the iconic Austin Healey Bugeye Sprite and 70 years of Porsche building some of the most desirable sports cars ever conceived. "Bugeye Sprites were highly represented in the 58, 59 and 1963 races and a variety of Porsches were significant competitors at the original races," said event founder and race director Jack Woehrle. Strong turnouts for racing and road-going examples of both marques are anticipated as well as the usual array of vintage sports cars such as Alfa Romeo, Datsun, Fiat, Austin Mini, MG, Lotus, Morgan, Triumph and others plus a growing cadre of vintage open wheel racers.

Following a record turnout for the 2017 event, where owner-drivers of more than 100 race cars and some 60 street cars came to play, we are expecting a comparable turnout in 2018 despite a change to a later date. Organizers pushed the date back three weeks to September 24th thru the 27th in order to attract even better cars. Many racers not wanting to risk their cars health prior to the long running Watkins Glen, New York and Elkhart Lake, Wisconsin events expressed their desire to race director, Jack Woehrle, for a later date in September so they could attend. This change should not only bring in a larger variety of cars but cooler weather for the cars, drivers and spectators. Tarmac can get mighty hot in a fireproof suit!

Not only have the dates changed but the order of events have to a degree as well which should afford participants and spectators alike more opportunity to see and be seen around the island. A significant percentage of the participants will be arriving throughout the day on Sunday the 23rd. Events open to the public begin on Monday, September 24th with the Car Show being held that afternoon from 2 to 4 p.m. followed almost immediately thereafter by the Parade Laps of the Original Track which is one of the most anticipated activities of the whole event.

Racing will take place on Tuesday and Wednesday at the Put-in-Bay Airport from approximately 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day with great viewing areas available surrounding Erickson Field. Another event open to the public are the very popular "Rocker Cover Races" to be held at 6:30 p.m. at The Goat Soup and Whiskey. Even if you are not an official participant you can construct a rocker cover racer and enter. Instructions are available on our website.

Remember on days when the temperature is 90+ degrees, the Senior Center will be open to resident seniors if they need a break from the heat.





On offense he ranks fifth in area history with 388 total points (63 touchdowns, five 2-point conversions). On defense, he recorded over 300 tackles and eight interceptions. Jackson wound up his stellar grid career with an impressive 5,040 yards rushing on 948 attempts, which are still all-time Wayne County records. Nicknamed "Action" Jackson, he was named the Associated Press All-Ohio first-team and was the AP Inland District Offensive Player of the Year in 2003. The Daily Record named Jackson its Player of the Year and also picked him for the 50th anniversary all-time Wayne County Athletic League All-Star team during his senior year. He also was a standout baseball player with four varsity letters and multiple all county recognitions. Jackson currently plays shortstop for Heinemans Winery team, the Winos. He can be seen with the rest of Put-in-Bay's athletes Sundays, Mondays, and Wednesdays at Mother of Sorrows softball field throughout the Summer.

Dr. Barry Dean Valentine passed away in Columbus, Ohio, on July 1st, 2018. He was born in New York City on June 6, 1924. Barry spent his childhood in New York City and at an early age was introduced to the world of insects during a summer at Camp Kinderhook. The study of insects, amphibians, and reptiles were to become his passions for the rest of his life. He was in the U.S. Army in World War II and was stationed in the South Pacific. Upon returning to the States, Barry continued his schoolwork at Cornell until 1948 when he transferred to the University of Alabama. where he completed his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Zoology. He married Buena Stubblefield in 1953. In 1955, after stints at Harvard, U. of Southern Mississippi and Cornell, he began teaching at The Ohio State University where he taught in both the Departments of Entomology and Biology and during a number of summers at OSU's Stone Lab for almost 30 years until he retired in 1988. His devotion to teaching was felt deeply by his students, and he was nominated repeatedly for OSU's Best Teacher Award. When Jeff Reuter first became director at Stone Lab, he asked Barry to be the Associate Director, particularly

to oversee things when he wasn't there. Jeff remembers telling him that it wouldn't Dr. Barry Valentine take any time at all. That was the year a tornado came through while Jeff was absent and 40 trees came down on Gibraltar Island! Due to his encyclopedic knowledge and extensive insect collections created from his many trips in the US, Africa, Central America, Europe and parts of South America, Barry was widely recognized as the leading world expert in his field. In 1979, as a result of his contributions to the field of entomology, teaching, and exploration, he was elected a member of The Explorers Club. Prior to his passing, Barry donated his entire life's work on Anthribids including specimens and library to the Smithsonian Museum. His other collections including the world insects, clams, salamanders, and fishes were donated to various institutions of higher learning including the OSU, U. of Oklahoma, U. of Florida, U. of Kentucky, Carnegie Mellon University, and U. of Alabama among others. Barry is remembered for his peaceful and gentle nature, his desire to share his knowledge of the natural world with anyone interested, his dedication to his students, his love of classical music, his fun sense of humor, and his masterful use of puns. # The Impact of Food on our Looks, Health, Wealth and the Future

The number one expenditure in the USA is for health care. If we changed our diet from animal products to

vegetable non-processed foods, according to the National Academy of Sciences, carbon emissions could decrease by 70 %, NOAA\_shows vegetable. non-processed diet would decrease deforestation by 30%, and the World Health Organization calculates that this would decrease hunger world-wide. Not doing so, the Paris Climate Accord's goals will be futile making our future most precarious.

So, it is up to us medical doctors, to educate about the importance of good nutrition as its impacts are far reaching."

schools do not teach this, for prevention has no economic incentive, Dr. Kaplan is writing a book based on this work named The B.E.S.T. Diet. In it, we learn how eating animal products - including seafood, poultry, dairy products, all fats, eggs and processed foods damage our health and make us fat. "Processed" includes products that use: white sugar, artificial sweeteners, white flour, "enriched" processed foods, etc. Key to this diet is taking Vitamin B12 complex daily, (no need for prescription) and sticking to it for a lifetime. Of course, we must have annual medical checkups, and follow mainstream medical care.


