

2019 Election Results

Island voters went to the Senior Center on Tuesday, November 5th, to vote for two candidates for mayor, former mayor Judy Berry and current major Jessica Dress. Jessica was reelected by just a two-vote difference, 57 to 55.

All the other local candidates ran uncontested. PIB Village Councilman Kelly Faris was reelected with 84 votes. In the township, incumbent trustee Chris Cooper had 285 votes and Laurie Miller, candidate for the Township Fiscal Officer position received 275 votes.

School Board members, Billy Market with 255 and JR Domer with 196 votes, also retained their seats. On Middle Bass and North Bass, there were write-in votes for the School Board positions on those islands. Kathryn Schneider received 8 votes and Ruth Ann Stonerook on North Bass received 4 votes.

When it came to tax levies on the ballot, all of them passed.

The Put-in-Bay Township renewal levy with increase 4.8 mills for maintenance of roads (unincorporated) (5 years, 2020) passed by a vote of 155 to 63; the Put-in-Bay Township renewal .25 mill levy for the physician's house (5 years, 2020) by 251 to 78; and the Put-in-Bay

Township renewal for 1.5 mill for current expenses (5 years, 2020) by 245 to 79.

There was one tax levy which only Middle Bass voter voted on. The Put-in-Bay Township (Middle Bass) renewal levy of 3 mills providing/maintaining a refuse site on Middle Bass (5 years, 2020) passed by a vote of 26

Voter turnout in the Village election for mayor was 67%. The Village has 166 registered voters. In the Township, the turn out was 56% of the registered voters There are 474 registered voters on South Bass Island, 105 on Middle Bass and 9 on North Bass. Ottawa County's overall voter turnout for the election was in the 41% range. This shows how seriously islanders tend to take their right to vote.



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

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Memorable Experiences at the 2019 Great Lakes Islands Alliance Conference

A group of Put-in-Bay, Middle Bass, Kelleys and Pelee Islanders headed to Mackinac Island to attend the third annual Great Lakes Islands Alliance (GLIA) conference that took place Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, October 20th through 22nd

GLIA is an organization which brings together islanders from the numerous islands in the Great Lakes to discuss challenges and common interests, issues, problems and solutions. The group is still in its infancy, but more than 120 people attended the event. Among the attendees were elected officials, business owners, educators, media, air and ferry transporters, year-round and part-time residents and conservationists

from the various islands.

This conference is the only Great Lakes-wide event dedicated to the needs of island communities to foster relationships and share information concerning Great Lakes island living. Participants from more than a dozen Great Lakes islands were in attendance. They came from Beaver and Washington Islands in Lake Michigan; Madeline Island in Lake Superior; Harsens Island in Lake St. Clair; South Bass, Kelleys, Pelee (Canadian) and Middle Bass Islands in Lake Erie; Mackinac, Bois Blanc, Drummond, Manitoulin (Canadian), Bois Blanc, Les Cheneaux Islands in Lake Huron; and Neebish Island in the St. Mary's River.

There were there sessions with general topics dealing with the islands, but also breakout small group sessions on topics such as education, communications, affordable housing, infrastructure, tourism, safety, ecology and more. There were also side trips to Fort Mackinac which looks over the downtown and harbor area, the water treatment plant, the Butterfly House, the sewage treatment plant, the airport, the transfer/recycling station, the library, the police and fire stations and the medical center,

Featured speakers at the 2019 conference included Lisa Powers, chairwoman of the Mackinac Bands of Chippewa and Ottawa Indians; Phil Porter, Director, Mackinac State Historic Parks; Eric Ellis, Project Manager, Great Lakes Commission; Lisa Brush founder and executive director of the award-winning Stewardship Network, among others.

The 2020 Great Lakes Island Summit will be hosted by four islands: South Bass, Middle Bass, Kelleys and Pelee. Next year's event is scheduled for the week between the Wine Festival and Oktoberfest in early October. A group has already met at South Bass Island to begin coordinating and planning the event. Among the many things they can use help with are accommodations, transportation, meals, speakers and more. 

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



Fri., Nov. 1st - The temperature dips into the 30s for the first time since last spring. It's the beginning of the PIB High School's Panther basketball season. They begin with

morning drills called Morn-Madness. There's a gathering of ATVers at the Bird's Nest to celebrate that can ride they vehicles their legally on the island for the next six months. Due to the cold and windy weather Halloween, island kids are trick or treating.

Sat., Nov. 2nd - The Heineman Winery Close Down takes place at the winery. You've got to love those deep-fried

turkeys and all the great homemade dishes. **Sun., Nov. 3rd -** The lights are on at Pasquale's as the PIBHS senior class prepares pizza for a fundraiser for

Mon., Nov. 4th - Linda Parker, Sue Latham and Linda Mahony take a walk through Cooper's Woods. All six members of the Village Council and Mayor Dress meet with Fiscal Officer Courtney Blumensaadt to discuss the 2020 Village budget. Police Chief Steve Riddle is on hand to discuss an officer resignation, a new full-time officer hiring and promotions in the department.

Tues., Nov. 5th - If you voted at the Senior Center, you had your choice of either using the traditional paper ballot or a touchscreen ballot. Before 11 p.m., the Ottawa County Board of Elections releases the unofficial vote count which shows former mayor Judy Berry with 19 votes and incumbent mayor Jessica Dress with 14 votes.

Wed., Nov. 6th - In the morning, the mayoral unofficial vote count reads Dress 56 and Berry 50. The USCGC Bristol Bay, WTGB-102, with a buoy barge attached to the bow, spent the night between Kelleys and Put in Bay. They head east in the morning. A group of island seniors are on the mainland at a Toledo Walleye hockey game.

Thurs., Nov. 7th - Members of the Words & Wine Book Club meet at Karen Wilhelm's house. Participants bring their own beverage and an appetizer. The crew of the M/V Put-in-Bay takes the ferry to Cleveland for its 5-year hull inspection and bottom painting.

Fri., Nov. 8th - Marty Harayda brings a group of Middle Bass islanders over to PIB for the Harvest Dinner at Tipper's. The South Bass has its first below freezing temperature of the season

Sat., Nov. 9th - All the golf cart rental places are finally closed. It's cold and gray. There are no big events

to attract visitors. This is the quietest weekend on the island since early last spring. But over at the Middle Bass General Store, 105 people

are celebrating with an island Thanksgiving.

Sun., Nov. 10th - The Fire Department hosts a fundraiser breakfast at the fire station. The menu includes pancakes, French toast, eggs, sausage, ham, orange juice and coffee. 

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

3) Winning island card players know that a standard 52-card deck of playing cards has four suits of 13!

4) I'm sure our 5th grade math class students can tell you that 13 is a prime number, that is, a number greater than one that can only be divided by itself and one. 13 belongs to a distinguished group prime numbers It's pretty amazing that prime numbers like 13 are truly unique "islands" of math-

5) If math was not your best subject, did you pay attention to learning US History in school? I loved learning history and I know that every child in our school learns about the 13 original colonies—which became the original 13 American states. Because of those 13 original colonies, the first US flag had 13 stripes and 13 white stars.

6) But you might be surprised to know how many times the number 13 shows up on the one dollar bill. There are 13 arrows, 13 olive branch leaves, 13 olive fruits, 13 stars above the eagle, 13 steps of the pyramid, and 13 bars on the shield. So it's important to remember we celebrate 13 every time we spend or make a dollar.

7) The Battle of Lake Erie was won by Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry who some say was the luckiest person alive on that 10thday of September, 1813 when he defeated the British Navy and changed the course of American history.

8) Anyone that can get to the village bakery early knows that there are 13 baked goods in a baker's dozen. (One for the baker to test!)

9) Sport fans know that many famous athletes have found great luck wearing the number 13, Island Browns

Backer fans know their lucky 13 is Odell Beckham, Jr.
10) And finally we are "lucky" to live on one of the 13
unbridged islands in the Ohio waters of Lake Erie: South Bass, Middle Bass, North Bass, Gibraltar, Kelleys, Rattlesnake, Green, Ballast, Sugar, West Sister, Mouse, Starve and Turtle!

So the next time you start to worry about 13 take a moment to recall the unique power of 13 and say "fare tredici."

It is often said that cottage life on South Bass Island is an adventure, and indeed it is; pleasant surprises, the unexpected, the unplanned. From the quirky old cottages; unpredictable, Erie storms; ever-changing ferry schedules; and an unusual collection of is-

land characters, there is never a dull moment. And often, that same spirit of adventure that we share on Lake Erie lures us to explore other islands.

Recently, we took advantage of just such an opportunity. A few weeks ago, shortly after closing the cottage for the year, we embarked for Saint Croix in the Virgin Islands, at the invitation of two of our West Shore neighbors, Bill Boag and Jim French, a pair of island gentlemen, two unique personalities indeed. With Mrs. Larry rounding out our foursome, it was a combination of the "Odd Couple" and "Three's Company." Ostensibly, they planned the trip to coincide with the opening of the new Goat Soup & Whiskey location, but I suspect it was just an excuse to spend ten days in the sun and sand of this sleepy, tropical island.

I had barely finished unpacking the truckload of tools, clothing and supplies that I hauled back from the island; the first snows of early November were already in the air; but ready or not, we were off! St. Croix, with a population of about 50,000 people, is nestled in the warm, blue waters of the Caribbean. There are countless secluded beaches, quaint restaurants and bars, and plenty of open spaces to enjoy the near perfect weather. By day, with our two septuagenarians in tow, we explored the historic sites in Christiansted and

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
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Frederiksted; traveled to Cane Bay and Point Udall; toured the local rum factories, a brewery, and even a distillery where they made island vodka from the local breadfruit! We attended a goat race; watched countless sailors negotiate the shallow reefs; wandered deserted beaches; and lounged in the shade by the pool. We were welcomed at the local yacht club, enjoyed a sunset cruise aboard a beautiful catamaran, and even squeezed in time for a pre-opening dinner at the new Goat.

Another evening, I enjoyed freshly caught tuna in an historic, old restaurant at the end of a sandy drive, frequented over the years by an odd collection of the rich and famous, including Ted Kennedy, Joe Biden, Walt Frazier, Jackie Robinson, Olympic hockey legend Mike Eruzione, Bill Buckner, Roger Clemens, Steven Seagal, Bill Murray, and Michael J Fox. My favorite spot was probably the local gas station, alone on a secluded country road. A crude awning teetering on the side of the building served as a makeshift bar and restaurant – coffee in the morning, food and beer or local rum almost any time of day, and even an elaborate outdoor brunch, just a few feet from the gas pumps, on Sunday morning! You could shop for groceries inside or buy fresh seafood from the trunk of a car parked out front.

There are few similarities to Put-in-Bay. St. Croix is much larger and crowds of tourists are scarce; the only golf carts I saw were at the golf course! But the Crucians and visitors alike seem to share that universal island vibe – never in a rush; always time to stop for a conversation; moving slow and easy, feeling lucky to be surrounded by an abundance of nature's best.

Finally, we wished Scott, Caroline, and their Goat crew the best of luck in their new adventure (they hope to officially open their new restaurant in a couple weeks). We reluctantly boarded the plane for the flight back to Cleveland, tired, colored by the sun, and already dreaming of our own next adventure.



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The East Point Anchor, an Island Tradition

Something happened on Halloween that hasn't happened in many years. The large anchor on East Point that sits by the road at the head of the tree-tunneled lane that leads to the Anchorage ended up on the front lawn of Put-in-Bay School. For many years it was tradition for the students to "pile" the school with anything from around the island that wasn't tied down. The anchor was always the prized item because it was very heavy and took some ingenuity to transport. Kudos to those who completed the task this Halloween!

There's a bit more to the anchor story to be told. Before Halloween, Pam Ackerman spent a few days on the island. Pam, who now lives in California, spent summers on the island when she was growing up. She had an interesting story to tell. Her grandfather, Brad Granfield, married one of the three Engel sisters, the daughters of the "Engels" part of the E&K Winery (Engels & Krudwig). The two other sisters' husbands, one of whom was Barbi Barnhill's father, Marion Yenney, ended up operating the winery because the sisters didn't want to. The only problem was that the three men did not get along with each other and the company ceased making wine about 1960.

The Granfields owned the Anchorage, now the home of Maryann McCann, and Pam would stay with them and play with her Barnhill cousins on East Point. Pam's parents, Charles Ackerman and Helen Grandfield, were married at St. Paul's Episcopal Church by the Rev. Lee Lindenberger. Warren Miller from Wa-Li-Ro, the boys choir group associated with St. Paul's, was the organist. Charles and Helen had their wedding reception on the lawn at the Anchorage and later dined at Cooper's Restaurant (now the Goat). Eventually, her grandfather sold the Anchorage and bought the "Salt Box,"



which is currently the home of Amanda and Elizabeth Mc-Cann on Put-in-Bay Rd.

Pam told us about the large anchor, the very same one that ended up on the lawn at Put-in-Bay School. She told how her grandfather acquired the anchor in Detroit and brought it to Put-in-Bay and placed it where it sits today. Pam didn't give a specific date, but we're guessing it was sometime in the 1950s. It was originally painted white, not the silver color it is today. When we told Pam how the island kids would take the anchor on Halloween and put it in front of the school, she was surprised to learn of that.


We wonder if Pam's grandfather ever thought that the anchor he brought to the Island would be an island landmark and part of an island tradition more than 60 years later.

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Rare Fob Donated to Island Museum

Curator Dan Savage from Lake Erie Islands Historical Society graciously accepted a valuable and rare item for the island museum's collection this past month. Sam Irwin from Essex, Ontario, came over to the island with an early Perry Monument watch fob that is more than 100 years old. For years, Sam has been going to Pelee Island and is well-aware of the historical importance of the Lake Erie Islands.

For those who don't know what a watch fob is, it's a small ornament piece suspended from a pocket watch chain. Years ago, pocket watches were carried in a vest pocket with a chain suspended from a buttonhole.

Sam's brass fob featured a monument with the wording "PERRY MEMO-RIAL MONUMENT • LAKE ERIE O." The only problem was the monument on the fob didn't look anything like the Perry's Monument which has graced South Bass Island for more than 100 years.

In a previous visit to the island museum, Sam learned that the fob his father had given to him came from before the final design of Perry's Monument had been decided on.

And indeed, the piece is rare. Dan, who had never seen another one of these fobs, plans on displaying the piece along with the artist's rendition of the same early-design monument that hangs in the island museum.

What remains a mystery is how the fob came into the possession of Sam's father who was born in 1904 and a child when the fob was made. Sam had no additional information, but it would be interesting to know the fob's complete journey to its final home in the museum.

While Sam was on the island, he also stopped by the school and dropped off several soccer balls and basketballs for the Panther students to enjoy.

On behalf of us islanders, thanks Sam for both donations.

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

Freedom of Speech

My son Alex was three and was not speaking.

He was content to sit on the cooler of our 22" Boston Whaler Outrage and watch the water as it rushed by on our way to neighboring islands like North Bass. His eyes were keen and bright and he understood things (don't put your fingers in electrical outlets, don't eat sand, don't put plastic dry cleaning bags on the cat, give lot of hugs). But, he didn't talk.

When he was born we had a scare during delivery. His umbilical cord wrapped around his neck for a brief period of time. Fortunately, the problem unknotted itself. His APGAR test was perfect, but there was a tremor of concern. Would there be any longterm effects from the cord wrap?

If deprived of oxygen, the human fetus abandons systems (apraxia). The first to go is speech and the last to go is the heart beat. It is a hierarchy of system's reduction (in the event of catastrophic trauma) developed over several million years of evolution.

Alex developmentally was doing fine, but he did not speak.

We took him to a speech pathologist named Debbie Ungamack in Cleveland Heights, Ohio. If his speech center was damaged, she was the one that could help salvage what remained. She was the top in her field.

Six months, three times a week, we visited her home office. Alex loved the trains she provided, but he still remained mute. The worries of dealing with the long-term implications of Alex's issue were starting to weigh on my wife and I. Time seemed to crawl with no results to show for our efforts.

On December 22nd, 1998 we were having a routine therapy session. Debbie was doing her best to explain about body parts using a Mr. Potato Head doll. She would point to the doll's various appendages, "Alex this is his hat, these are Mr. Potato Head's eyes, this is his moustache, look, his shoes...

After 15 minutes Debbie removed Mr. Potato Head's ears. "Alex, what is Mr. Potato Head missing?" This went on for several minutes. Alex played with a train, Debbie continued her query about the missing ears, and I felt a sense of dread that my lovely son was going to have a very difficult path in life.

"Alex, what doesn't Mr. Potato Head have?"
Alex had enough. He stood up, extended his arm, the small wooden train in his fist, and dropped the train like a rapper drops his microphone.

"Mr. Potato Head has no neck." While not the answer Debbie was looking for, it was true; Mr. Potato Head has no neck!

He walked out of the room. Debbie looked at me, tears in her eyes, and said "Merry Christmas, Gordon. I don't think Alex needs me any more..."

Notes on the story:

1). Alex graduated from Hawken School in 2014 and Miami of Ohio in 2018 (Business and Spanish)

2). He is fluent in three languages and lives in Boston, Massachusetts.

3). He works for a Swedish company, Education First (EF) that does educational travel and

experiential learning programs for Colleges and Universities.

My Parker's Garage Experience By Mel Geithman

Editor's Note: This article by Mel Geithman is a follow-up article about working at Parker's Garage. It is about working there more than a decade earlier than Jeff Koehler's article in the November issue. Mel's uncles were Earl and Joe Parker. His recollections are from the time when Earl owned Parker's Garage.

My summer job before working at Parker's Garage was at Rittman's grocery store. Uncle Earl must have offered a dime an hour more, so that summer I started to work for him. I do not remember anybody else working full time for him. I think the year was 1949. I believe I was there all of my high school days. It was just Uncle Earl and his brother, Joe. I think I had all of the jobs no one else wanted.

Of course, the main thing to do was to pump gasoline which included washing the windshields, checking the oil and filling the radiator with water. If a tire looked like it was low on air, we had FREE air. After that you had to fill out the charge slip on the machine in the office and give the customer his or her receipt. Credit cards were coming on the scene and it took a long time to fill out that card.

I remember hauling the batteries down into the basement and putting them on the charger. We had loaner batteries, too. The many taxi cabs always needed batteries or tires fixed. God, I wonder how many tires I had to repair just bending over with two tire irons to take the tire off the rim and then putting the vulcanized patch on the tube.

When we had a little break there would be 25 to 50 50-gallon drums of gasoline to be siphoned into the ground tanks. I can't believe I am still alive after all of those gasoline fumes. Then the grass needed cutting, both at the garage and at his house. Aunt Lenore always had something cold to drink because we only cut grass on the very hottest days.

Of course, the windows in the garage, especially those big ones in front, needed washing at least once a week. Remember the white gas pump on the Schnoor & Fuchs side of the garage for the older cars (pre 1935's) and the garage's Model A Ford pickup which was used for service calls on the road. Earl also had an old Buick for pulling someone into the garage when their vehicle would not go on its own.

When we did an oil change on a vehicle, there was the SOHIO book that told us where all the grease fittings were on the various cars. The used oil was put in 50-gallon drums in back of the building to be used on the driveways to hold down the dust.

I did some mechanical work. I usually took a motor apart and they would put it back together after the valve job or whatever was necessary. I also had a part time job cutting up old cars on nice-weather weekends after school started. As I look back they could be worth a million dollars today. The little storage shed (Uncle Earl's old chicken coop) held all the used parts that might be re-sold. I worked at the garage the summer of 1953 and then went to work at the airport. Quite a change, but it was a full-time job for the next eighteen months.






Did you notice that the Christmas decorations went up in DeRivera Park more than a week before Thanksgiving? We haven't even finished our Halloween candy yet!

Bill Cantillon from East Point is a consultant for logistics help on a two-wheel-house Staten Island Ferry. The ferry is the first of four being built for the NY Port Authority. The ferry does not need to turn around like the Miller ferries do when they come into dock at the Lime Kiln.

This coming season, two Delaware Ave. businesses won't be returning. They are Mama Maria's, the food stand at Delaware Carts between Lovella and Mr. Ed's, and Del Sol, the color-changing t-shirt shop at Harbor Square. We've only heard rumors about what will be replacing them.

Police Sergeant Carson Frase who served as a police officer on Put-in-Bay for the last two years has left the island to take a position in Mansfield, Ohio. Melissa Wilde has been chosen as a replacement.

For some reason this summer, perch fishing wasn't the greatest, but recent reports say it picked up nicely in recent weeks. We don't know which is your favorite, bass, walleye or perch, but we will definitely take perch over all the rest.

ELECTION RESULTS

We have 323 Registered voters and 186 ballots were cast (57.59%); 124 of those voted in person! The Island levies all passed and the ordinance to convert the Clerk/Treasurer position to an appointed Fiscal Officer was overturned. As a result, Lisa was elected the new Clerk/Treasurer for the Village: Lisa Klonaris (165) over Rosalyn Ahner (18). The Mayor (Ron Ehrbar), Board of Education (Cindy Herndon), 2 Council seats (Russell Maust-159 and Gary Finger-133) ran unopposed.

MIŠCEĽLANÉOUS

The final Audubon Club meeting took place at The Inn B&B as we sat around a warm fire and said our last goodbyes to many of our friends. Council is supporting the move to make Kelleys Island a designated Monarch City. Kids really clean up on Halloween up here. The big weekend had hay rides, trunk treat or treating, and pumpkin carving. Island kids had a traditional evening on Halloween, but the winds almost blew them away. Veterans Day was well-supported here. Even though it was wet and cold and slushy snow started to fall, 50 people still showed up to remember those who served. Good News for people with land lines on the Island (and many still do because of the random cell service here). Frontier just started posting a "potential spam" message on our caller ID. This should make it easier to ignore those calls; however, we did receive SEVEN calls one day from our own phone no. according to our caller ID. Let's hope our government does something about them. Sure, the Thanksgiving turkey is fine, but what we really look forward to is listening to Arlo Guthrie's 1967 song, Alice's Restaurant at noon on 98.5 while the turkey cooks.

WEATHER

The first snowflakes fell on November 7, but it wasn't until November 11 that we got one inch of real snow. Fortunately, the big storm missed us. The Shirley Irene was out of commission for two weeks for its 5-year inspection and some repairs. As the winds of November ripped across the lake, the Kayla made as many valiant trips as it could, concentrating on people and cars and restricting construction equipment and large vehicles. Weather cancelled the Goodtime Halloween cruise – there were some pretty spectacular waves all weekend. The wind blew out quite a bit of water and a lot of the State Park beach was exposed. It was really weird to see plants and trees along the lakeshore covered with sparking ice so early in the year. Also, it was cold. Toledo broke a 1911 record with 11 degrees on November 12. We weren't much warmer.

COUNCIL NOTES

As the days get shorter, so do the Council meetings. There were very few reports and only housekeeping ordinances on the agenda. Lands and Buildings reported that the suggested splash park project was declined but drainage at the pavilion will proceed. Streets & Sidewalks noted that the paving project for Memory, Fernwood, part of McGettigan, and the Transfer Station will be going out for bids. The petition by McGettigan residents to be included in the project failed for lack of the required number of signatures. The Park Board has volunteers working to cut some trails into one of their preserves. The Shoreline Protection Committee is working with the Corps of Engineers for programs to assist the Village with shoreline protection. After serving for 25 years on the Fire Dept., Don Huntley is retiring. There was one fire in October. As a result of the KIFD networking with other agencies, the Strongsville Fire Dept. is donating 1000 feet of 4" hose to us, and we will be buying 20 hydrant adapters. The Dept. conducted hazmat training. EMS reported 5 runs. Each year, and this is important, they remind us to call 911. Do NOT try to chase down one of the EMS people. If you think you have a medical problem - call 911 for the fastest response. The Police Dept. had just three reports, fielded 102 phone calls, and issued a ticket for driving under suspension. Really, this seems to be a recurring problem up here. As a result of the impounding of these and OVI vehicles, the Village will be looking at formalizing an impound fee structure. Some repairs were needed on one squad car and there were recalls on two SUV's and the truck. Remember to turn in your house check forms (they already did 50 inspections last month) and file safety check forms for your loved ones who are wintering here. They are available online (KelleysIsland.us) and at the Village office. Eric Longbrake reminds winter residents that there is a reimbursement program for 'catastrophic' transportation needs for people with only one house and that one house is here on the Island - contact Serving our

Vice Commander...Ahoy! By Paul Bolden, Vice Commander of the 9th Coast Guard **District, Central Region, Division 16**

Put-in-Bay Maritime Academy (part2) I'm on a mission to make South Bass Island boaters the

safest and most knowledgeable on the Great Lakes Seas. During our second off-season mariner class we are going to focus on those "Aids to Navigation" encountered in and around South Bass Island. This is not a complete list of aids, rather common ones seen in the waters around the island and different from last

year's class, this wont be a quiz but a discussion.

There are literally hundreds of navigation aids (atons) but in our waters 6 or so stand out as most common. I can't over stress the impor-

tance of understanding their meaning. Many of these atons can save your life or the life of someone in the water! PLEASE LEARN THEM!

The first aton in Image 1 is called a "CAN" because of its shape and is green. They mark the channel on

the right or starboard side when going out to sea. The second is called a "NUN" because of its shape and is red. They mark the channel on the right or starboard side when returning from sea.

Image 2, This regulatory marker with a diamond shape and cross means boats must keep out indicating Swim Area, Beach, Keep Out, No Boats, Closed Area, etc.



Image 3 is a regulatory marker. This buoy indicates a hazard such as Rocks, Stump, Shallow Area, Reef, Shoal, etc.

Image 4 is a non-lateral dayboard. The sole purpose of these diamond shaped dayboards is to help the vessel operator determine his/her location.

Image 5 is a diver down flag. It means that a diver is actively underwater and yes we have divers in our waters, I've seen them. Your vessel must maintain a distance of 300ft from such

Image 6 is the Stone Lab Data Buoy used to confer weather and sea conditions online.

Again, this was not intended to cover every aton, rather to test your awareness of some of the most common Aids to Navigation around PIB. What's more, the explanations for these 6 atons was very basic. Please take the off season to study and sharpen your boating knowledge. In our often crowded and relatively shallow waters it is important

to understand what these aids mean and in our the PIB Mariner Academy classes we barely scratch the surface. If you didn't recognize most of these, that should serve as a clue that you need further education. Safe boating classes are taught by the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary and are available to nearly everyone. You just have to be willing.



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



Once you enroll

Your BasiCare Plus packet will arrive within six to ten days. You'll be prompted to activate your service by providing your medical history, allergies, prescriptions and your current doctor's name as well as your preferred pharmacy. Once activation is complete, you are set for your free consultation at your first sign of illness.

How it works at your first sign of ill-

You call into the service and a medical assistant takes your symptoms and reviews your current prescriptions just as would happen if you visited your regular doctor. The assistant asks if you'd like a video conference or regular call and then contacts a doctor to call you.

If you use the free app for Android® or iPhone®, you will log into your personal account, schedule your visit, answer some questions through the app about your illness and wait for your appointment to begin.

A doctor is usually available within ten minutes during the day and a little longer during the night. The doctor will review your medical condition, make a diagnosis and, if a prescription is needed, send a prescription to your pharmacy of

your choice. And, with your permission, the doctor will send a copy of the diagnosis to your doctor to be included in your medical records.
