TIPS Training for servers of alcohol

Steve Heineman is the instructor for TIPS Training on Put-in-Bay. Training in Intervention Procedures for Servers of alcohol is intended for servers of alcohol, owners and managers.

This summer's training is to be held at the Niagara Conference Center on Tuesday, June 19th and Wednesday, June 20th, at 8:30 a.m. The three-hour course includes: The effects of alcohol on the body, the server's response to the intoxicated customer and the server's legal and civil responsibilities. This information is reinforced with role-playing and a written test.

The cost is \$50 per person and protects the server and the management with a certification that is valid for two years.

Perry's Monument reopens for 2018

Visitors to the island will be happy to know that Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial (aka Perry's Monument) will be open for business this season. The Monument was closed last season for maintenance which involved cleaning the exterior of largest Doric column in the world.

The Monument officially reopened on Saturday morning, May 20th, with a ribbon-cutting cer-emony in the Rotunda of the Monument. Between 60 and 70 people attended the ceremony where representatives from the national government, state government and county government were on hand to say a few words as Superintendent Barbara Fearon conducted the affair. A round of applause welcomed the opening as she happily cut the ribbon.

Lee Vivod was on hand from Huntington National Bank to pay for the first 103 adults to take the elevator to the Observation Deck for free in observance of the 103rd anniversary of the start of memorial operations. A decedent of the founder of Huntington National Bank, was instrumental in raising funds to build the memorial.


Thanks to friends at Lake Erie Shores and Islands, the area visitors bureau, the first 103 children (15 years old and younger) received a Perry's Vic-




Successful regional marketing, along with networked and intertwined social media strands, has allowed us to share island life to a widening demographic. Ethnic groups from




We travel deserted, water covered, debris filled

Secret information how to pass a vessel inspection (VSC) - Part 3 of 3

Don't tell anyone that I told you

Continuing where we left off last month, this is the final installment of our three part series on vessel inspections (VSCs). If you are boarded, you should be able to breeze through an inspection. I'm letting you in on all the secrets!

Several of the following items are optional, but your compliance is strongly recommended.

1) Marine Radio: If you have one on board, you are required to have it on at all times while underway. Some radios will automatically monitor channels 9 and 16. Become familiar with its operation. The emergency channel is 16

2) Dewatering Device: Keep a device on board such as a manual bilge pump or bucket for bailing in the event that your vessel should begin to take on water.

3) Mount All Fire Extinguishers: This allows for easy access when needed.

4) Anchor and Line: Maintain 100' of line for your anchor. Regularly inspect its condition.

5) First Aid Kit: Keep one on board.

6) Ohio Accident Reporting Procedures: You are responsible for reporting any accidents that you are involved in to the U.S. Coast Guard or the Ohio Department of Natural Resources as follows:

• Loss of life or disappearance from a vessel; OR

• An injury that requires treatment beyond first aid; OR

• Combined damage in excess of \$500; OR

• Complete loss of vessel.

Reports must be submitted within 48 hours for injuries or death. For other cases reports must be submitted within 10 days. There are additional Federal reporting requirements. BEST ADVICE is to take a Coast Guard Auxiliary safe boating class. It is the responsibility of the boater to fully understand all laws governing the operation a their vessel while boating on state and federal waters!

7) Nautical Charts: Keep them on board and know how to read them. We have spoken on the importance of this several times in pass articles.

8) Float Plan: We have spoken on this in the past as well. A float plan simply informs someone onshore where you are boating, who is on board, when you are expected back and a description of your vessel including registration (OH) numbers. This information can be given to authorities should you go missing.

This concludes our three part series on Vessel Safety Checks. I've let you in on all the secrets! So what's next?

Your best course of action in making sure that your vessel is compliant with all the aforementioned is to schedule a free Vessel Safety Check with the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Vessel Safety Checks (VSC) conducted by the USCG Auxiliary ARE NOT a law enforcement action! No one will be cited for not passing this voluntary inspection. Rather, this gives you an opportunity to correct problems that might lead to heavy fines should you be boarded later and various infractions remain uncorrected.





Sip & Paint for Pollinators

Sip some wine, nibble some cheese, and paint a home for pollinators while you enjoy the shady new back porch of Lake Erie Islands Nature and Wildlife Center on Friday, June 22nd from 2 to 4 p.m.

Maybe you have seen a mason bee house, which looks intriguingly like a birdhouse filled with hollow tubes. Each tube is a home to a mason bee which it uses to make a series of nests to deposit eggs.

Mason bees are beneficial as agricultural pollinators, especially for orchards. The diminishing populations of European honeybees is due to the Varroa mite, but Mason bees are immune from that mite.

Mason bees are virtually harmless and do not drill your house boards, unlike the carpenter bees. Mason bees rarely sting and their sting is not painful.

Mason bees are a win-win-win for a gardener! And so is our Sip and Paint! For \$20, paints, brushes, wine, cheese and your Mason bee house are supplied.

Best of all, inspiration and instruction will be supplied by Middle Bass artist Kim Miles, who will also bring her woodburner. You may have seen Kim's hooked rugs at a show, or taken an art class from her at the Erie Islands Library.

Last man standing on North Bass By Gordy Barr

Commercial grape growing on North Bass ceased operations in December of 2017. It was the end of 150 years of wine making tradition. North Bass has been critical to North American wine production since the 1860s, providing the raw materials for an early domestic emerging wine making market. Besides the economic impact to the island, the human cost was very real for Jimmy and Sandy Yelensky.

Jimmy Yelensky was the utility infielder for the Middle Bass Island Dockers softball team. Name the infield position and Jimmy played it (except first base). According to Eddy Sheller "Jimmy's strong suit was as catcher. He was dependable and the team could count on him at game

time, every time."

Jimmy had to commute from North Bass Island (Isle of St. George), but had nearly perfect attendance at his games for over 25 years.

Firelands Winery could say the same about Yelensky. He was an employee they could count on. Jimmy and his wife Sandy lived on North Bass Island for 38 years. Unfortunately, Firelands Winery lost their lease with the State of Ohio on the 40 acres of vineyards they were cultivating on North Bass. Suddenly, the Yelensky's were without a home and North Bass was deprived of its agricultural pride.

Jimmy was hired by Paramount Distilleries of Cleveland/Meier's Wine Cellars of Silverton, Ohio, in 1980. His first boss on North Bass was Dale Burris.

Jimmy was a good fit for the business. His father had 18 acres of vineyards in Vermilion, Ohio. Jimmy grew up with an understanding of viticulture. He possessed a rare skill set, at a young age, that was perfect for Paramount/Meiers.

At its peak between 1960 and 1990, North Bass had roughly 300 acres of vineyards and seasonally up to 40 employees. North Bass had the rare distinction of having the prestigious designation as an American Viticultural Area (AVA). AVA is a designated wine grapegrowing region in the United States distinguishable by geographic features, with boundaries defined by the Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and Trade Bureau (TTB) of the United States Department of the Treasury.

North Bass is rare ground and was invaluable to the wine producers that owned these vineyards for the last 150 years.

In 2003, the State of Ohio purchased 593 acres of North Bass (roughly 87% of the island). Unfortunately, the State of Ohio elected not to further the leases on 260 acres (of the 300 acres) of vineyards. Within a few years of the purchase, over one hundred dumpsters were loaded with vines, tying wire and stake posts and carted off the island. The majority of the vineyards were razed. In France or Northern California this would have been viewed as a tragedy.

The excuse for the destruction of the arbors was that tastes had changed and North Bass grapes were not relevant to the modern wine connoisseur's pallet. Logistics (getting the product off North Bass) and an aging North Bass work force also shouldered some of the blame.

Counter to these arguments is the continued success of Heineman Winery on South Bass and Fireland's Winery in Sandusky.

Firelands Winery was purchased from Paramount Distilleries by Paramount's chief wine maker Claudio Salvador in 2002. Firelands Winery became the largest wine producer in Ohio and was able to retain 40 acres of vineyards on North Bass. Yelensky was put in charge.

The Vinifera varieties like, Chardonnay, Pinot Grigio and Riesling are valuable. Add in Fireland's Winery other "in place" assets such as the Vidal grapes that were used to make Ice Wine (a late season wine with a high alcohol and sugar content that is enjoyed as a dessert wine).

Here is the quick math. An acre of vineyards yields about three tons of grapes. The market value depends on the variety of grape. Catawba grapes bring about \$400 per ton. The grapes used in more sophisticated wines might bring \$1,000 per ton (perhaps more). Firelands has roughly 40 acres. On a good year the grape yield might yield a gross of around \$70,000.

Why were the North Bass grapes prized to Fireland's Winery? Tradition. Pride. Quality control to produce the best possible (Ohio) product.

Could various grapes be purchased elsewhere? Yes, California, South America... In some Ohio wines, outside grape product have to be used. But using imported grape product lessens the tradition of dirt to bottle processing. Wine making is an industry filled with obscure and relentless tradition but in the best case scenarios, quality starts from the roots of a local vine...

Favorite Won, the 1950s former gill net boat Yelensky used to haul grapes to Sandusky was recently sold for \$12,000 and will be converted to a commercial trap net fishing boat. The main dock on North Bass suffered severe damage this winter. The harsh winters of 2014 and 2015 killed off 15 acres of the 40 acres of vineyards. The State of Ohio would not offer a long-term lease on Fireland's remaining 25 acres of Vineyards. Leases were year to year. For Firelands to replant the missing vines would be a three to five year wait for fruition. If you have a year-to-year lease, that is a dangerous long term investment. In addition, the State of Ohio proposed an increase in annual rent on the acreage from \$2,000 to \$40,000. Grapes raised on North Bass are not an obscenely large money maker. Again, Firelands Winery kept the vineyards alive out of pride

and their commitment to a quality Ohio product.

A \$40,000 lease combined with arbor labor, dock repair, equipment purchase and maintenance, as well as transportation to the mainland, rendered grapes on North Bass a financially insolvent proposition.

Jimmy and his wife Sandy left North Bass in December of 2017. It was a sad departure. Per North Bass resident Kerry Burris, "The Yelenskys were very hard workers. This is the sad end of an era for North Bass.'

The Yelensky's children, Evan (PIBHS 2005) and Robert (PIBHS 2007), will miss North Bass. Evan is in Rochester, NY and works in the pharmaceutical industry. Robert works in telecommunication at Cedar Point in Sandusky, Ohio.

One of Jimmy's favorite pastimes on North Bass was ice fishing. After work, he enjoyed going out and catching dinner. John and Robin Glauser on Middle Bass were kind enough to store a fish shanty and a four wheeler for Jimmy and Sandy.

In spite of 2018 being a great winter for ice, with all the changes going on in their life, the Yelenskys never made it over to fish.

The Yelenskys are currently renting on the mainland. They hope to put an offer on a house of their own soon. Firelands Winery will keep them employed at their vineyards and processing operation in Sandusky.

Jimmy will reprise his role as one of the best utility infielders in the western basin of Lake Erie, but in a new location. His home field will move from North Bass to Sandusky. But like any great utility infielder, instead of softball, he will continue to be a contributing employee for Firelands Winery.

were being unloaded off the ferry and onto the mainland of downtown Port Clinton, Ohio. The deckhands drove each car off. She then watched all the people depart, get in their cars and drive away. Little Christie felt special, because she was allowed to stay aboard the ferry inside the pilothouse. You see, her grandpa Alfred Parker was the Captain of the Erie Isle and owner of the small ferry service known as Parker Boat Line. Christie was along for the ride that summer day in 1979.

During those days, there was no fancy automatic departure like today when everyone drives her car on and off

They're heavy. That's why," he replied matter-offactly

'Well, I wish they didn't have to be SO loud," Christie complained.

She watched the usual movement of the cars as they the boat. Instead, two long and heavy planks of wood were placed on the edge of the ferry making a bridge to land. The cars were driven on and off the ferry this way for many years

During her youngest years, Christie didn't have a long seawall bordering the Monument property to get in her way of fun on the Lake. There was just lots of seaweed covered rocks to walk upon with her summer friend Mara Stifter. The girls would play their own made-up version of hopscotch as they tried to keep their feet dry, but rarely did they accomplish this. And, the bathing beach was THE beach to swim. Christie loved it when her summer friend arrived each year, because that meant lots of swimming, swinging in the park, and lots of chocolate-dipped ice cream cones at the Dairy Queen, which was located across the street from Mara's family's large Victorian home. That home was moved to the other side of the Monument and has since been sold and completely renovated.

At one time, there were also TWO arcades on the island for the local and summer kids to spend their quarters. One arcade was inside the old Colonial, now home to the World's Longest Bar and the other arcade as behind the delicious Dairy Queen. Christie loved the game Centipede, while her older brother Davey enjoyed a good game of Pac Man. Tenyear-old Christie also recalls the sad day when Davey came home from playing "Just one game at the arcade!" to find his new bike had been stolen just outside. He failed to "Lock it up!" as dad had reminded him.

Christie loved to be barefooted. The exception to the barefoot rule was when Christie was playing in the downtown park. Mom always warned her never to go without shoes in the park for fear of cutting her feet on broken glass. (Lots of wine and beer bottles in the park during those days.) The other time when shoes were a must was when she was playing Little League Softball with all the island kids. She also had to wear hot jeans, no shorts allowed. This frustrated Christie, but she was happy she had those jeans on when a slide into home plate occurred.

When all this fun was over, the winter fun began! From a pack of gum to an old fashioned soda fountain, Tony's seemed to have it all for young Christie. Oh how she loved the special treat of an old chocolate soda with vanilla ice cream. Now home to The Reel Bar, Tony's was

and fun place for island kids to be during the coldest of winter nights. Filled with music from the old jukebox, some of her best memories are of that place. (And, of course the place to meet and figure

out where the Friday night party was going to be held.) Mercy must've known every detail of the island teenagers. There really wasn't any "getting away" with anything growing up on the small Lake Erie island of Put-in-Bay.

When the Erie Isle couldn't plow through the thick ice any longer, Christie and her family had to travel to the mainland aboard the Tin Goose airplane. Going to the mainland during winter was a BIG deal. Christie's family only traveled to the mainland once a winter, twice if there was a special occasion, and sometimes never left the island at all during a winter season. There wasn't a winter break from school during those years when families left the island all at once to travel to warm places. Heck no! Christie's family stayed and enjoyed every moment of winter!

Ice fishing! Ice-skating! Sledding! This is when island winter was at its best. Christie kept her feet warm and dry using old plastic bread bags, which she put each sock-covered foot into, before slipping inside her clunky Moon Boots. This kept her feet dry and warm, sometimes. The State Park was the place to go sledding, because they had a wooden toboggan and everything! Oh, how Christie loved winter as a kid.

Grown-up Christie still feels the sense of island community and fun, even though many changes have taken place. The past winter season brought the islanders all of the winter fun they could ever wish for! The summer cottagers have arrived and opened up their homes again, allowing their children to play with the local kids. There's more automation during a ferry ride, and Parker Boat Line no longer exists, but the calm of the ferry ride experience remains. The Dairy Queen has now changed its name, but any kid (or adult) can get a chocolate-dipped ice cream. All in all, I think young Christie would still love the island and all its changes, because the smallness and wonder of it all still exists.

Their story...

Erika Crossley (Suttmann) Class of 2001 and Louis Suttmann Class of 2005 may not be actual twins, but they are siblings who are as close as any set of twins could be. They were raised on a small island (see photo above) of approximately 450 residents in the United States. Since their secluded up-bringing, both have found themselves living abroad and working at different schools: Erika in Shaftesbury, England and Louis in Salzburg, Austria. Each have drawn inspiration from different, but similar places in wanting to compete in the Race to the Stones Ultra-Marathon and doing it for The Mix.

Erika says, "The seemingly ridiculous idea of doing an ultra marathon came to me last year. At the time, I had a 3- year-old and a one-year-old at home. After my second child I really had to work hard to start running again. I started with a Couch to 5k App running 30 seconds then walking. It took a lot of dedication, but I managed to get to a half marathon, which I ran with my Mama, brother and his girlfriend. I was proud of my progress and suddenly found myself intrigued by other challenges.

My brother has always been an inspiration to me. He comes up with an idea and 6 months later he is doing it. He has biked across America, Austria, and climbed Mount Kilimanjaro. When I came across Race to the Stones, I knew it was my next challenge. I just hoped Louie would be there with me so I could join him on one of his crazy adventures.

We have decided to run for the charity The Mix, which is an organization that provides essential mental health support for under 25s. I have had bouts of depression in my life so this cause means something to me on a personal level. For most of my adult life I have worked in the mental health field providing support to young people. I am a mental health nurse that is currently working in the school systems. The Mix is an organization that I whole heartedly stand by and one that deserves as much support as possible. We will be fundraising and competing in this race to help support those young people who feel they have none. As such, we will attempt to collectively raise over £1,000 for The Mix. We thank you in advance for any support, both emotional and monetarily."

both emotional and monetarily." Louis says, "Throughout the years I have developed a bit of an ethos to live by: allow myself to be inspired by others, believe in myself, and to say 'yes'. I am thankful for the many adventures this mind set has taken me on. Most recently, my sister told me that she was going to compete in an ultra-marathon. She hadn't asked yet, but of course I said 'yes!'. I am constantly

amazed at what the average person can accomplish with the right mind set. And let me tell you, it doesn't get more average than me!

As soon as we were committed, we began discussions on how to use this platform as a means for change. My close relationship to Erika has allowed me to be moved by her experiences in mental health. I quickly realized that this was an illness that carried a stigma in our society that could only be improved through positive and realistic discussion as well as appropriate support. In the meantime, my own career in boarding schools has showed me the ways in which mental health can manifest itself in our impressionable youth. As such, we will be raising funds and awareness for The Mix, an organization that helps those under the age of 25 with emotional/mental support.

Any donation toward The Mix would be greatly appreciated. For those of you who can not financially support mental health, there are other ways you can support! Play your part in de-stigmatizing mental health and never forget that no matter how healthy and


happy someone looks, they might actually be struggling with symptoms we can't see."


Come to hear labyrinth traditions and to make the walk with the guidance of a trained labyrinth facilitator.

Since earlier upper-level projections from the Army Corps of Engineers that the lake level could peak higher than ever recorded, the lake has calmed down a bit and the level in May came out at 22 inches about the long-term normal for the month, but were still shy of the highest monthly average of the record for May set in 1986. This means a lot less damage if we have a big northeast storm anytime this summer.

One thing of interest is the fact that the cool spring helped keep the lake water colder and more dense. A warm spring would have warmed up the water and made the water expand, thus producing higher levels.





June 2018 Island pioneer Jose´ DeRivera honored

A huge white oak tree in DeRivera Park began its life an estimated 36 years before one of the early pioneers of the Bass Islands arrived and purchased South, Middle, Gibraltar, Ballast and Starve islands for the sum of \$44,000 in 1854, and now it has been turned into a beautiful stump carving honoring him.

Jose' DeRivera, a Hispanic merchant arrived at Put-in-Bay and completed the purchase. He then hired surveyor John Brown, Jr. and parceled off South Bass Island, He then began selling parcels to immigrants interested in establishing vineyards and making wine, plus many at deeply discounted prices to various organizations. The school was built on land DeRivera sold for \$1, and St. Paul's Church was constructed on land DeRivera sold for \$10.

DeRivera, who the downtown park is named in honor of, was one of the most influential men in Putin-Bay history.

Fast forward to 2017 and a fierce storm rolled across the Lake Erie Islands causing catastrophic damage to the tree estimated to be 200 years old. Instead of breaking out the chainsaws and making firewood, the tree was topped just below its breaking point. One year later, wood sculptor Matt Missey, owner of Ohio Tree Carving, arrived in Put-in-Bay to begin the project of giving new life to the damaged tree.

Missey spent the first few days at the Put-in-Bay DeRivera Park setting up the required scaffolding and safety gear required when working with the various chainsaws and grinding equipment he used to complete the project. While Missey has been carving trees for more than 12 years, the Put-in-Bay park project is the largest he has ever worked.

The project required more than 80 hours of cutting and grinding, often in not so favorable weather conditions. Using over a dozen saws and tools, he deftly shaped the tree into a memorial in the image of DeRivera. Missey had a couple of photos he used as a guide. The \$8,000 project was completed and dedicated Thursday, May 3rd, in the park in downtown Put-in-Bay.

The tree carving memorial is expected to last at least 25 years and must be sealed annually to protect the exterior from damage. The tree is expected to be one of the most popular Put-in-Bay attractions.

RIDDLE RELIEVED OF VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR DUTIES

The Put-in-Bay Village Council voted five to one to ask for Steve Riddle's resignation from his duties as acting village administrator in May. Riddle was handling both the police chief and village administrator jobs. He was first hired by Mayor McCann with approval of the Village Council to

be the village administrator. A few months later, the job of police chief opened up and the mayor put Riddle in charge of both positions. A year ago or more, a call went out for those interested in becoming Put-in-Bay Village's administrator, plus Council voted not to have both jobs combined. No new administrator was hired until a few weeks ago, so Council voted to officially ask for his resignation.

REGISTERED MON-ARCH VILLAGE USA

The Village of Put-in-Bay is now a Registered Monarch Village. Council voted to join an organization which helps protect the monarch butterfly, an important pollinator, and keep it from becoming extinct. Monarchs use the Lake Erie Islands as stopovers during their mi-

gration each year. NOTHING OFFICIAL

Readers will remember how the Ohio Attorney General's office had the Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation take loads of official documents from Village offices last fall. Well, at press time there is still no news concerning the ongoing investigation, and there is no official news of when a final conclusion will be released.

EXECUTIVE SESSIONS

There seem to be more Village Council "Executive Sessions" than in the past. Executive sessions are those where the general public is not allowed and Council members are not allowed to repeat any information discussed. Only certain topics may be discussed such as personnel, real estate dealings and pending legal matters involving the Village. Generally, the village solicitor is present and anyone else Council wishes to attend. One executive session in May last almost an hour and a half.

GOLF CARTS

When the Village of Put-in-Bay recently voted to allow the use of golf carts on the streets in the Village, Council added that all golf cart drivers must have drivers licenses. The Put-in-Bay Village Council's solicitor, Susan Anderson, was recently she said she couldn't find anything in the Ohio Revised Code mandating a drivers license to drive a golf cart. The Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles will tell you that one is required. So with two different opinions, one an attorney's opinion and the other a statement from the BMV that cannot be verified, this leaves quite a problem for the portion of the island in the township. Hypothetically, if a child is driving a golf cart in the township, what do the island police do? Remember Village law does not apply in the township, so what happens if someone challenges the island police?







Put-in-Bay Garden Club

Man killed in crash on Kelleys Island

Kelleys Island News

When Spring arrived, it was spectacular. 80 degrees, sunny and the landscape changed from drab browns to bright green in just a couple of days. The May ELECTION had a low turnout. Out of 334 registered voters, only 77 ballots were cast (24 filed absentee). Activities are picking up: 6/3-5-10k run, 6/16-KILA Welcome Back potluck, 6/10- Cops & Bobbers fishing event, 6/14-Council meeting at 7 pm, 6/24 Make-A-Wish Horseshoe Tournament SHIPWRECKS IN THE NEWS

A third shipwreck with an Island connection has been discovered. The first was the 2015 discovery of the sunken barge Argo, which was lost in a storm east of Kelleys Island in 1937 with a petroleum cargo. Some of that cargo proved to still be on board and was leaking, and the discovery resulted in a federally funded cleanup. The second appeared in the news in March; the shipwreck of the Margaret Olwill, a steam barge that sank carrying 900 tons of limestone from Kelleys Island to Cleveland in June 1899. The ship went down in a nor'easter, killing the captain, his wife and their 9-year-old son, as well as five others aboard. The third is believed to be The Lake Serpent, a two mastered schooner, lost in 1829 while carrying a load of stone between Cleveland and the Islands. Its location has simply been identified as being east of Kelleys Island, possibly off the Erie County coast (whatever that means)

MISCELLANEOUS

We congratulate COLLIN NUNN STRASSER on his graduation from Danbury High School and completion of the Criminal Justice Center Career Choice program at EHOVE. Did you know that SERVING OUR SENIORS (SOS) does more than sponsor our senior lunches? SOS and the Erie Co. Health Dept. have partnered to provide free safety equipment to Erie Co. seniors. Items include bath benches, shower chairs, raised toilet seats and grab bars. They can arrange installation as needed. Deadline is May 31 (419-624-1856). They can provide transportation from both the airport and ferry to health care appoints. If you want to fill out a survey or participate, contact SOS. Preliminary survey results indicate that many seniors on the Island are not aware of this program. The EXIT RAMP OFF ROUTE 2 that was closed due to a landslide was expected to reopen by Memorial Day; however, that date has NOW been pushed back to an unspecified date.

BUSINESS NEWS

It is official, Bag the Moon has been sold. Temporary new signs are up - the new name is Peepers and they are open for business. Construction is almost complete on the six new bathrooms for boaters at Portside Marina. A new sign recently appeared at a storage facility under construction in Sweet Valley. It read: Kelleys Island Nuclear Storage Facility - Serving Bessie Davis (with a mushroom cloud). This drew lots of comments and chuckles on Facebook. A for sale sign appeared in the window of the Captains Corner this

winter, but it is gone now. **DEADLY ACCIDENT**

The POLICE DEPT., FIRE DEPT., and EMS responded to an accident on April 30 at 1:12 am. A car hit a pole on E. Lakeshore Road, just east of Seaway Marina. Reports indicate the vehicle was travelling at speeds close to 70 mph. The driver skidded towards the lake, overcompensated to the left and hit a utility pole with devastating results. There was one fatality and one critical injury. A representative from each branch of the safety services spoke TO Council of the dedication of the responders, the

difficulty of having to notify the family, and the compassionate assistance that was offered to the family and the responders. The State Highway Patrol was called in immediately and took over the investigation and provided the responders with grief counseling. This horrific accident had an overwhelming impact on the responders and for several, this was their first run.

COUNCIL NOTES

In a series of special Council meetings, some ordinances were passed including several for the WATER DEPT. including repainting, replacing a control panel and employee compensation. In a later meeting, Council approved applying for an OWDA loan. Also approved was a plan for AIRPORT DRAINAGE and the AIRPORT CAPITAL IMPROVE-MENT PLAN. The Maintenance Dept. will be doing some repair work on McGettigan. After three seasons, the Kelleys Island Police Dept. will no longer be the sole enforcement officer for the STATE PARK, for which we received no compensation from the State for providing village staff and resources. ODNR is providing a law enforcement ranger for the season. Legislation was also passed to raise WATER RATES by 5%, effective the second quarter of this year. A PROCLA-MATION declaring June 12, 2018 as DANNY AHNER day was unanimously approved by Council, and applauded by the audience. The POLICE DEPT. reported there was one arrest for criminal trespass, menacing and criminal damaging; two tickets for speeding; and 15 warnings for stop sign and

speeding. Chief Craig made it clear that because of the accident and an increase in destructive and aggressive behavior on the Island, his department will be enforcing the laws of both the State and the Village. He realized that this will not be popular with either the tourists or the residents, but in light of the terrible accident that occurred, his first priority is the safety of the people who live on and visit the Island.






the end of your eighth grade school year you get to do an eighth grade graduation! I can't wait for the next school year to start, but I won't rush my summer!
