




Islanders first to sky dive!

May was an exciting month for several thrill-seeking and brave islanders. They were the first to take to the sky with pilot Dustin Shaffer, owner

of Island Air Service, and then tandem parachute jump to the lawn just south of the Put-in-Bay Airport terminal.

The first skydiver was Andy Shuttleworth, bartender at the Round House. A group of onlookers watched from the ground as a speck came out of the sky. The descent seemed surprisingly slow, but the final seconds coming down seemed to speed up just before touching ground.

The next person to take to the air was Aaron "Vern" Schroeder the owner of East Point Construction here on the island.

And then history was made when Madeline Pugh (PIBHS Class of 2014) took to sky and made the first female tandem jump. Madeline must have been saving her money from her ongoing yard sale to pay for the excitement.

The cost to make a tandem jump from 10,000 feet above the island is \$300 with hand cam video included at this time.

Chief Tandem Instructor, JR Piosek, has 20+ years experience and over 19,000 jumps. Pilot Dustin Shaffer has 20+ years experience flying aircraft and has been flying these islands for eight years. He operates Island Air Taxi, an island based air service providing winter flights to the island, air charters to larger cities, and scenic tours in the summer.

We dodged another bullet and driving in deep wa-

Put-in-Bay another bullet on Mother's Day Sunday. A few days before the weather forecast was for several hours of sustained winds over 30 miles an hour out of the northeast. It looked like it

would be the worst storm of the spring. Fortunately, the weather forecast got better and better and by Sunday the winds were blowing at only 20 mph or so out of the northeast. The predicted nor easter had fizzled out.

The water in front of the monument on the road leading to East Point still flooded but it was nowhere near what it could have been. A few days before another nor easter hit the island, and we noticed a vehicle stranded in the high water on Route 357 by the Monument. It was one of the many cars and trucks that drive through the flooded area each time there is a nor'easter. So far, most of them have made it through safely, but there are the exceptions.

If you were one of the drivers either coming from or going to East Point, you probably had the feeling of wondering if your car or truck would make it through.

If it didn't make it through, you would have had to get out and wade through the water to a high spot. This time of year the water is still very cold, but probably not enough to give you hypothermia as you made your way to high

One young island family actually had their car stall out while trying to get by the Monument and had to get out of their car and wade through the water with their toddler to safety.

A question came up; How much water can a car drive through before it is unsafe? That's a really good question, and thankfully, the Internet was there to provide us with an answer.

On just about every website the maximum safe depth to drive through was about 4 inches before damage could be done to a car.

Drivers really need to know the risks they take for both themselves and for their vehicles, so here are some precautions you might consider.....

1. Take an alternative route

Never drive through deep, flooded roads if you can avoid them. It's better to add an extra few minutes to your journey rather than risk your car's engine and electrics being ruined or stalling out and being stranded.

2. Check the water depth

Unless you're driving a high-riding 4x4, the maximum depth most experts advise you drive a standard car through is four inches. Modern cars are generally water-tight so they can start to float when driven through water that's only 30cm deep.

3. Let oncoming vehicles pass

Wait for oncoming vehicles to get through the flood patch before you head into it, especially if they're large vehicles or are travelling fast because they could soak your vehicle and cause it to break

4. Drive the highest point of the road

At the Monument, for example, vehicles have been trying to ride with one wheel up on the sidewalk. That's another reason to wait for oncoming cars to get out of the way before attempting to cross floodwater.

5. Don't drive too fast

Drive through flood water slowly - 3-4mph is an adequate speed. If you drive too fast you not only

will you create a wave that will splash other road users, you'll also run the risk of your car's tires losing their contact with the road. If this happens, don't brake, just take your foot off the accelerator and keep the steering wheel straight and wait for the grip to return.

6. Don't stop

Although you should drive slowly, it's important not to let the car come to a halt while crossing deep water because that could allow water to get into the exhaust pipe, which can cause costly damage. Keep the engine revs up, too. If you're driving an automatic, select the lowest possible held gear and keep your foot on the accelerator.

7. Dry your car's brakes

Gently press your car's brakes a few times once

you're clear of the flood – and in a safe place to do so - to dry them off and ensure they respond efficiently.

What to do if you're stuck in floodwater

If the worst happens, and your car gets stuck in deep water stay inside it and phone for help. Don't get out or open the hood or you could worsen the initial damage. Don't try to restart the engine either as that could suck water into the engine. Help can be called.

Insurance Coverage

If your car is damaged in deep water, you are covered for this peril by your insurance if you have comprehensive coverage after you pay your deductible. Better yet, don't drive through deep water!

Three rescued by Kentuckians

Three Kentuckians, Robert Bush, Charlie Banks and Josh Brinker, from Dryridge, about 35 miles south of Cincinnati on I-75 were out fishing on a charter boat off Put-in-Bay north of the Monument mid-afternoon on Monday, May 20th, when they had an experience they will never forget. They rescued three fishermen who ended up in the water when their boat started taking on water and capsized. Apparently, their bilge pump wasn't working.

According to reports, the crew on the M/V Islander, the Miller Boat Line ferry that serves Middle Bass, spotted the fishermen in a small metal boat. They signaled the Kentucky boat that trouble was nearby and must have called the Coast Guard, too.

The wind was stiff and the waves were high, but the three Kentuckians were able to pull the very cold men out of the lake and take them to the Boardwalk. Bush reported that the rescue was exhausting and the scariest thing that had ever happed to him. The rescued men were basically in shock, but after getting back to Put-in-Bay, they were able to take a golf cart and get back to where they were staying on the island.

Interestingly, the Coast Guard showed up after all the men were safe on the island, but official reports read "Coast Guard rescue 3 from capsized boat" and "Boats from Station Marblehead responded, rescued all three occupants and returned them to land."

When the excitement was over, the three Kentuckians headed out to Massie East Point Preserve where they found the capsized boat washing up against the rocks below the cliffs there. At times the waves were splashing higher than where the men were standing as they took photos of the boat in the lake below.

We're sure that the three Kentucky fishermen will be retelling this fishing adventure tale for years to come.



She still comes to the cottage, but now, with a tall, thin blond, an almost-teenager, much like that little girl I shared the shore with years ago. And a little boy, a young man that often is accused of being much like Sarah's father. And she brings a husband, my favorite son-in-law, always willing to help me with whatever project is underway, or to just join me by the grill with a cool beer. I'm proud of that little girl by the lake, blessed and lucky to be her Dad. It has been a while since we bounced through the waves on a jet ski, but we still sit by the lake, I fire up the grill for an earlier dinner, and we share another island sunset.

I am glad the little cottage works its magic, it draws her back, to see the lake, the waves, the sunsets ... and me.

NORTH BASS DOCK

Legislators in Columbus recently passed a transportation spending bill that included \$500,000 to repair the main dock on the south shore of North Bass Island. The dock is in need of serious repairs and if they were not going to be fixed, Miller Boat Line would not be able to service the island. The dock at North Bass Island must be repaired to allow ferry service to continue. The dock is critical for getting equip-

ment to the island to repair roads and keep the airport running. If the airport shut down, the Put-in-Bay Port Authority would risk having to pay back millions of dollars of federal grant money. One official said, "If people can't

One official said, "If people can't get there by plane or by boat, it's going to cause a real problem."

When the transportation bill reached the Senate floor, it was amended to add \$500,000 for the dock repair. State Representative Steve Arndt said keeping the dock project in the final bill was a struggle, but that Governor DeWine intervened.

"The governor put his foot down and said we are going to fund the North Bass dock," Arndt said. The Division of Parks and Water-

The Division of Parks and Watercraft is creating a master plan for North Bass Island, an expensive piece of property the ODNR purchased to eventually become a state park.

The department also had an interest in the project because they want to be able to have some way to get people to and from North Bass for hiking, exploring and primitive camping there. The ODNR plans on keeping the island as natural as possible.






PIBIO -Is it Summer Yet? **By Peter Huston**





Tom, who spend summers as a youth on the island, says he'll be making fresh donuts. We were in the bakery the other day and they looked delicious.



Former PIBPD officer acquitted of federal charges

Former PIB police officer El'Shawn Williams was recently found not guilty of charges stemming from an incident that took place at the PIBPD jail in the summer of 2017. Williams resigned from the PIBPD

shortly after the incident. Williams was indicted in a 2018 federal indictment alleging police brutality and falsification. In a jury trial, he was acquitted of deprivation of rights, falsifying a report and witness tampering.

Williams was accused of assaulting a man who became combative following his arrest and police were forced to restrain him. Trial evidence included incident reports, multiple audio files, police body camera footage and photos of the man in custody. The man in question didn't testify.

Williams was one of numerous officers involved in a standoff with island resident Keith Blumensaadt in June 2017.

Williams attempted to pull Blumensaadt over while he was on his way home from work, but when he pulled into Blumensaadt's driveway on Airport Rd., Williams claimed he saw Blumensaadt point a rifle at him and he quickly left the scene. Multiple officers went to the scene and ended up in a stand off with Blumensaadt which wasn't resolved until Sheriff Steve Levorchick arrived on the island and arrested Blumensaadt several hours later.

Blumensaadt was indicted and is still sitting in the county jail nearly two years later. Several issues, including a resolution of Williams's federal trial, have kept Blumensaadt from having his day in court.

A final pretrial for Blumensaadt is scheduled for July

22nd and a trial for July 29th in Ottawa County Common Pleas Court.








Beach Glass Report June, 2019

I wasn't born with a silver spoon in my mouth. I had to go out and find my own...

The foundation of my 2019's summer beach glass report is based on record northeast winds, multiple storms, and significant property damage. Sea break walls throughout the Lake Erie Islands are falling faster than the gates of Troy. Millions of dollars of erosion has plagued its shorelines.

Chad Waffen of Kelleys Island reports that Lake Erie's water level is near a record high. The low water mark (NOAA, since 1959) was 569' above sea level. The high water mark was 576' (1970's). Our current water mark is (+/-) 574'8." "If it goes up another 1'4+" we will be at a record high water mark," said Waffen

Beach Glass Reports

The only bright side to this year's high water and storm damage is that it has produced a bumper crop of beach glass. Sections of beach that have not been turned over since the 1970s are now in play.

Reports from all Islands indicate that glass yield is significantly higher than previously recorded. Here are exam-

Maureen St. John of Middle Bass found her first bottle stopper (green, frosted, tapered point).

Barry Koehler of Put-in-Bay has found red glass (depression era, patterned), Vaseline (yellow glass), children's marbles, and several large chunks of blue.

Bud and Ruth Stonerook have lamented that high water has kept them out of some of their favorite beach glass hunting grounds, but one or two of their "secret" beaches are yielding well. Ruth recently found a very rare piece of china that was labeled "Hamburger Castle, Put in Bay."

Lucy Schneider of Middle Bass has had great success at her Grandma's (Carrie Schneider) beach finding some nice blues, chunky, highly abraded bottle bottoms, and recently two brown bottle stoppers (early Clorox bottles or beer bot-

I have a confession. I frequently send Lucy pictures of recent beach glass finds (from all over) and tell her that I found them all on her Grandma's beach. Lucy (Junior, Putin-Bay High School) has a great sense of humor and is a highly competitive beach glass collector.

Jessie Greene of Put-in-Bay said that the high water has kept her from some favorite spots. However, she has found some unusual things including a miniature sun-purple stopper from a perfume bottle.

Jessie also has the only piece of beach glass from a Put-in-Bay Bottling Works bottle (Nate Ladd). I offered her \$10,000.00 for it. She declined the offer.

Regarding Silver Spoons...

Some of my favorite places to hunt beach glass required me to wade up to my neck in 45-degree water this spring. The early bird gets the worm, but also risks frostbite.

In addition to beach glass, the spring storms have revealed everything from horseshoes and flat irons to Victorian window weights and potbelly stove parts. Common finds also include forks, spoons and table knives.

I was hunting in a particularly hostile part of a favorite beach. In the summer, water snakes frequently drop on you from trees. In the fall and spring, the water is so cold your extremities sting before they go numb.

I looked down in a crux and saw a spoon wedged be-

Old dining utensils found on the beach are usually worn showing some silver and the underlying red copper. After finding a few of these picnic relics, they don't hold much interest.

There was something different about this spoon. It had an early colonial design and there was no red hue where the plating had worn out. This was a special piece and was comprised of solid silver.

It was signed Hotchkiss. An internet search claimed that the makers mark was for David Hotchkiss (1796-1874) of Palmyra, New York (east of Rochester). According to Hotchkiss's mark on this spoon, it was hand crafted between 1816 and 1849.

The maker's mark is like a social security number for silversmiths. It was an elite trade whose ranks included Paul Revere. After 1849, Hotchkiss's mark changed as he partnered with several associates most notably Andrew Schreuder of Schenectady, NY, from 1857 to 1871.

The name H.D. Farnum was custom engraved on the handle. Silver flatware of this type was a high-end luxury item. So who were the Farnum's and what was their relationship to the islands?

I reached out to North Bass Island (NBI) historian Robin Burris. Her research produced an 1874 North Bass Almanac map that showed Newell Farnum owned property across from her Dad, mid-Isle St. George.

Middle Bass Island (MBI) historian Mike Gora con-

firmed that there was an islander named Newell Farnum (NBI, island assessor). According to a March 12, 1872 newspaper article Gora sent me, Farnum was active in local politics with other island forefathers like Simon Fox, Andrew Wehrle (MBI), Frederick Bretz (MBI), Philip Vrohman (PIB, treasurer), and John Brown Jr. (PIB, his father, abolitionist John Brown Sr., led the raid on Harpers Ferry).

Newell Farnum must have inherited the family silver from his father, H.D. Farnum. All the dates fit. How the spoon ended up on a beach is anyone's guess. Back then; everything was dumped into the lake at one point or another...

I was not born with a silver spoon in my mouth. In my experience, it is more fun to find your own silver spoon than to be born with it (even if the water can be arctic cold or snakes fall on your back). 2019 Beach Glass Forecast: Hunting will be cloudy with a chance of excellent finds. Glass that matters.

The Cove and the Idiot By Kevin Coleman aka Animall

Do you remember where you were on Friday, June 21st, 1979? To refresh your memory, it was a beautiful sunny day and it was the last day for any islander to be able to swim at The Cove. You see, I was the "idiot" who ruined it for everyone. I broke my neck diving off the cliffs that first day of summer forty years ago.

My friends Duke Hearons and Art Brown and I were recently hired to be the new bartenders at Frosty Bar and Wonderful Pizza. We filled out job applications on the back of paper plates and as promised, June Stoiber called us in April and offered us jobs in paradise.

We worked in shifts. With two other bartenders, I worked from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and then 6 p.m. to 10 p.m. Art and Duke worked 2 to 6 and 9:30 to close. By mid-June we were in our strides and learning from new friends like Curt Massie and Bobert Kowalski what person was "cool," who was "uptight" and to never, NEVER, walk down the street with an open beer.

That Friday, June 21st, George Stoiber went to Toledo to be on a noon news broadcast to promote Founder's Day on the island. June brought a portable TV into the bar and we watched George talk up the parade and other festivities. George's interview went so well that June broke out some bottles of champagne – Mimosas for everyone!

By 2 p.m. I was feeling pretty light headed. Art came into the bar and said three friends were on the island. They wanted to go swimming at The Cove. They had some smoke-able substances and he asked if I would take them. Sure, why not? I was swimming at The Cove the day before and agreed to drive them to the West Shore for an afternoon of fun in the

Back then, there was only that craggy old stone fence over which it was very easy to climb. There were three to four others there having fun and jumping off the cliff. I too had jumped in twice that day and several times the day before and never once touched bottom.

On the third jump I figured I would try a shallow dive.

I remember everything.

First was the crunchy sound of my head moving some pebbles on the bottom. I came back up to the surface and looked up at a friend who was ready to jump. My head did not hurt. I don't remember being in any pain.

'Don't dive! I just hit bottom.

I will always remember the look on Werner's face. Pure shock. "Your head is bleed-

When I reached up to feel the top of my head (which wound up needing 48 stitches) I felt a big hole. Now, here comes the part people cannot believe. I climbed up the cliff, grabbed my towel, put it on the top of my head and drove myself to the airport.

It must have been quite a sight – me with a bloody face driving up to the airport office. The person working in the office called the police. Enter my own personal hero – Bruce

Later I was told that the steps Bruce took literally saved my life. He looked in my eyes with a flashlight. He gave me a very funny look and put a cervical collar on me and gave me a steroid shot. The doctors in Toledo said that was critical for making it so I would make it to live a normal life.

A four-seat Cessna pulled up and Bruce helped me into the back seat, where he joined me. We flew to Port Clinton where an ambulance was waiting. I got out under my own power and they put me on a backboard, which was the first clue that something was wrong other than a gash in my head.

Off we went to Magruder Hospital.

When I was taken in for x-rays, the technician asked if I could stand up. I did and they took two pictures - one with my chin on my shoulder and then, standing sideways, one with my chin on my chest. I got back on the gurney and was chatting it up with a cute nurse I recognized from the bar. Talk about denial! Maybe I could get lucky, get stitched up and make it back to work by my 6 pm shift.

There are "flashbulb" moments we will always remember. From that day, the one thing that will always be with me is the Jamaican doctor with the overly-worried look on his face and thick Caribbean accent. "Mr. Coleman, it looks like you broke your neck...

I remember laughing at him. "No way, Doc! I can do this" and I raised my foot and shook it at him.

"Yes! That is very good but DON'T MOVE! We are going to send you to Toledo for some good doctors to look

Off we went; the cute nurse, a respiratory therapist and two ambulance men took me to St. Luke's Hospital in Maumee. My parents were waiting there, along with a surgeon to stitch up my head and a neurosurgeon to make sure my precarious neck was stabilized.

My dad, Chester Coleman, was a retired Toledo Fire Di-

vision District Chief. He was well known in local emergency rooms. He got there before me. While they were wheeling me in, he said, "Kev, you have a hole in your head I can put my fist in." I regret putting him through that pain.

When the doctor looked at the x-ray of my chin on my chest, he turned to my dad and pointed at it and said, "That could have killed him"

But it did not kill me. Six screws in my head, a halo brace and a laminectomy later, I came back for three more years at Put-in-Bay, working at Frosty, The Round House and Heineman's Winery. I went on to have a successful sales career, got married, divorced, married again, put two daughters through college. I have been truly blessed.

My replacement at Frosty Bar was none other than Mark Kaiser. He came to take my place and never left. Now he is Billy Market's best ferry Captain.

I come back to the island every year to see old friends and share the lesson I learned 40 years ago – feet first!

At about 2:20 p.m. on Friday, 21 June, 2019, exactly 40 years to the day and hour, I will be on the island, drinking a toast to the late, great Bruce Mettler and being with Duke and old friends to remember that day.

A couple of ideas for our community

If we expect to change people's behavior, we probably need to change ours and be more accommodating as well!





Museum tells story of fascinating history of Hotel Victory

Over the last few years, museum curator Dan Savage has put together displays each season that highlight Put-in-Bay history. This season marks the 100th anniversary of the burning of the Hotel Victory here on the island, so it was appropriate that this anniversary be the featured show.

For those who wonder what was so important about the Hotel Victory, the story is larger than life. The Hotel Victory was billed as the largest wood-structure summer hotel in the world when it was opened in 1892. It's opulence reflected those golden days when America first began feeling its oats as an economic and military power in the world.

The display Dan has put together includes items saved from the ravages of the fire to souvenir items, numerous original photos, some loaned by private collectors for the display, help tell the story of the hotel that was on the island for only 27 years.

Items like elaborate dinner menus, key fobs, baggage tags, silverware, original blue prints and even one of the handles from a soda fountain that was inside the hotel are all on display.

The collection of souvenirs and other memorabilia that has survived for more than a century for you to see makes it easy to step back in time to the days of the Hotel Victory.

Please stop by the island museum behind the Put-in-Bay Town Hall and see for yourself. The museum is open 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily all summer long.




Amazing Island Raise

TIPS Program for Alcohol Servers Steve Heineman has been training island bartenders with a TIPS program for 30 years. This year's

Steve Heineman has been training island bartenders with a TIPS program for 30 years. This year's training will be held at the Niagara Events Center. Two classes will be on Monday, June 17, and Tuesday, June 18. Classes will begin at 8:30 a.m. and conclude at 11:30 a.m. Cost for the class will be \$60 per person.

TIPS (Training in Intervention Procedures for Servers of Alcohol) is intended for workers, their managers and the owners of businesses that sell alcohol. The approximately 3-hour course will teach the attendees the effects of alcohol on the body, interacting with customers and the server's responsibility to the community. Instruction is in the form of class lecture, viewing videos of actors in sample situations and will be reinforced by the use of role-play and a short quiz covering the materials presented in the class.

Upon successful completion the student will receive a certificate from the TIPS organization that is good for two years. Many states, as well as service clubs and food service companies require this training to sell alcohol, and many insurance companies offer discounts for liquor liability insurance to businesses that have employees trained in TIPs.

Jack innocent in mock Trial



Bob Gatewood and Calabash will bring the festival home in the final slot of the day. One of the island's favorite bands, Calabash plays a variety of original music as well as many popular covers. Gatewood's Put-in-Bay anthem, "Friends of the Bay," will cap the end of another festival of music at the National Park.

Two food trucks from the Toledo Food Truck Association will provide a variety of menu items this year. The food trucks and the beverage tent will open at 11 a.m. The Lake Erie Islands Historical Society will operate the festival's beverage tent again this year with the bulk of the proceeds benefitting the historical society museum, a non-profit 501c3.

Personal coolers are not allowed on park property.

The 2019 Put-in-Bay Music Festival will include a Guitar Hero tent, a craft area where kids can make a variety of musical instruments, a music workshop tent where all ages can learn how to play the ukulele, and an area where anyone can play the Battle of Lake Erie corn tass.

Information about Put-in-Bay, including lodging, dining and live entertainment can be found at the Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce website. The park encourages festival goers to bring lawn chairs and blankets. Limited seating will be provided, but there are tables and chairs inside the beverage tent as well as surrounding the tent.

Many who attended the 2018 Put-in-Bay Music Festival said they planned a weekend visit so they could also enjoy the many entertainment venues in Put-in-Bay's Downtown District. Check the Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce website for links to schedules.



his orders to report


vice United States during Navy World War II published in 2004. He reported for duty in New Caledonia on 13 March of

Since reporting on that day, Mr. Obenauf always considered Friday the 13th to be his lucky day as he lived to see the Japanese surrender. Carl and Marjorie married in November 1945 when he returned from service. During Carl's working years they made Chicago and Beloit, Wisc. their home and spent vacations at the Cottingham family cottage on Put-in-Bay. In retirement, the Obenaufs moved to Columbus and then Port Clinton, Finally, they summered at Put-in-Bay and wintered in Virginia. Mr. Obenauf became a member of the U.S.S. Yorktown CV-10 Association at its inception in 1948. On Columbus Day weekend 1975, the ship U.S.S. Yorktown CV-10 was dedicated as an official part of the Patriots Point floating museum just outside Charleston, SC. The U.S.S. Yorktown CV-10 Association has always been an integral part of the ship, and Mr. Obenauf served in many capacities including a number of years as Association president and chairman of the board. Carl had more than 60 years of involvement with The American Legion. 



The program will be directed at business owners or to whomever is in-charge of the Social Media for their business.





Golf cart fee case goes to Ohio Supreme Court

Ohio's highest court has agreed to hear a case that will decide if a municipality can place an additional tax on vehicles driving on its roads. Specifically, the Village of Put-in-Bay charges businesses that rent golf carts a \$50 fee per cart to rent them out. The money goes into the street repair fund.

The original suit was brought by Mark Mathys, the

owner of Delaware Carts and Islander Inn owner Tim Niese. They claimed the Village Ordinance requiring owners of vehicles used for transportation of property, for hire and for use within the Village is unconstitutional.

Under the law, once the fee was paid, a sticker needed to be displayed on each vehicle to be driven on the Village's streets and roads. People who didn't pay the fee could be charged with a fourth-degree misdemeanor punishable by 30 days in jail and/or a \$250 fine. The law does not apply to privately owned carts in the Village.


Some years back, a similar lawsuit was brought before the court, and the Village prevailed. This latest case was won by the plaintiffs, and then reversed in the appeals court. Now the issue is going before the Ohio Supreme Court. It is not known exactly how long it will take for the judges to make a ruling, but some say it could be up a couple of years.


The decision is important for those who rent golf carts in the Village. Anyone who looks around at the number of carts for rent, has to realize it means big dollars to both parties involved in the lawsuit.

Safe Island Task Force - Report to the Community

On Tuesday, May 14th, members of the Safe Island Task Force met with community members at the Senior Center to give a progress report on what they've learned and what they are doing to solve the problems associated with big weekends. The group was originally formed last summer after the infamous weekend in July (CIJ) spurred community leaders, business owners and residents to do something to combat the misbehaving crowds, the bad publicity generated about the island and the loss of business during what should be one of the peak weekends of each season.

The ultimate goal of the group was to make a visit to Put-in-Bay safer and more enjoyable for everyone.

The Task Force's spokesman, island business owner and former Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce president Brad Ohlemacher, gave the audience a little background on how the group got started and how the 22 members started four committees to address legal, promotion, transportation and public safety issues.

Members of the Safe Island Task Force are Brad Ohlemacher, Mayor Jessica Dress, Eric Booker from the Boardwalk, Billy and Julene Market from Miller Boat Line, Todd Blumensaadt from the Jet Express, Peter Huston from the Chamber of Commerce, Aaron Walker and Mike Bell from Toledo, Kim Morrisson from Frosty Bar, Marc Wright from The Forge, Dee Dee Duggan from Island Bike and Cart Rental, Christie Ontko from Freshwater Retreat, Patrick Myers, a man of multiple talents, Lake Erie Shores Marketing Director Bryan Edwards, Joey Wolf from the Anchor Inn, Chris Cooper from Island Hardware, Robbie Morrow from the Crew's Nest and Put-in-Bay Winery, Tina Rogers from the Chamber of Commerce, PIB Police Chief Steve Riddle and Trey Sheehan from Oak Point.

The group's original focus on one bad weekend has changed in the last few months to coming up with policies and procedures to deal with any big weekend.

Another point that was made is there are no longer any island businesses promoting the unspeakable weekend. Having mixed messaging about the weekend the past few years has been a problem and this a big step in the right direction.

With that said, members

agreed that even with all their hard work, no one knows what to expect this coming last weekend in July.

Coming up with plans to solve the growing pains of success meant the committees had to do their homework on many topics. Early on, there were multiple solutions put forth by every island John, Dick and Harry, but it has basically come down to the fact that there is no simple solution to the problem. There's no easy fix, no magic bullet!

There have been an estimated 360 hours of meetings put in by Task Force members in the last ten months. They discussed the issues involved, the pros and cons of various solutions and still know there's a lot of work to be done.

Fortunately, they had some input from Mike Bell, the mayor of Toledo from 2010 to 2014, and retired Highway Patrol Officer Aaron Walker, who both volunteered to join the board. Island visitors for many years, the two black men added a perspective to the conversation that the all-white board welcomed with open arms. Mike, a visitor to the island for 30 years, told those gathered, "It's not about what you look like, it's about behavior. The task force came at it with diverse eyes so there would not be any blind spots. There were behaviors happening years before that you weren't paying attention to."

Mike and Peter Huston actually met with one of the tour bus operators from Detroit. Peter said he learned a lot from that meeting. Mike and Aaron's experience dealing with all types of people and situations over the years has proven to be invaluable.

Eric Booker told how his group met with attorneys to discuss options under the law, but after much discussion, solving the problem by legal remedies would prove difficult and expensive, not be a practical reality, plus would be bad for Put-in-Bay. Eric said, "We're not going to sue our way out."

Patrick Myers talked about the signage which will let all visitors to PIB know what is expected and what the rules are. Too many people come to the island and think it is some kind of free for all. Some even think the island is a different

country where anything goes. The signs are a start in getting information to our visitors.

Billy Market talked about the numerous issues involved with the ferry services dealing with the public. He told how the ferry lines are no longer offering group discounts on weekends and staggering the arrival of busses. Unfortunately, many bus owners don't communicate with the ferry lines and simply show up unannounced. For example, last year on CIJ weekend the boat line knew of 14 busses, but 38 showed up. His committee is making an effort to establish communications with all tour bus operators and find someway to pass along our behavior expectations before people even get to the island. Todd Blumensaadt from the Jet Express has cut way back on the really late night runs hoping this will help.

Chief Riddle talked about the issues involved with bringing in law enforcement from the mainland, the type of training and equipment his officers are getting to handle crowds, plus his efforts to clamp down on open containers and reckless golf cart operation. He also talked about his plans for addressing the traffic bottlenecks the island experiences on busy weekends.

Representatives from thunder::tech, the public relations the Task Force hired from the \$50,000 raised from the island community, gave presentations during the meeting, They felt that letting visitors know what is allowed and not allowed on the island is important. They showed off the signage, plus talked about an ad campaign with new messaging. The firm also monitors social media to give the Task Force a heads up about what to expect if something pops up about the island that needs to be addressed.

One of the big messages from the Task Force was do not share bad news about Put-in-Bay on social media. It spreads like wildfire and is detrimental to getting the positive news and publicity out.

With all this in mind, let's hope that we can spread the word and make this coming summer safe and enjoyable for every island visitor.

There is a huge need for new operators, mechanics, welders and yardmen to fill marine jobs left by longtime skilled tradesmen who are nearing retirement.

Marinas all along the North Coast are feeling the squeeze. Put-in-Bay residents who are mariners will certainly benefit by the increase in skilled labor that Paul Bolden

this program will deliver to our area. Myself along with others on my dock have struggled over the years to find qualified marine mechanics. The shortage of mechanics in our area have left the few that we have over worked and overwhelmed.

HOW TO PASS A VESSEL INSPECTION (VSC) PART 2 OF 3

Continuing from where we left off last month. Part 2 of this 3 part annual series will assist PIB residents in understanding and passing a vessel inspection (VSC). Please remember that Vessel Safety Checks performed by the Coast Guard Auxiliary ARE NOT a law enforcement action and you WILL NOT be cited if your vessel should happen to fail. Rather, these courtesy checks give you an opportunity to correct any issues or violations in advance of being stopped and perhaps fined by the Coast Guard while you are underway.

1) Pollution Placard. Lake Erie as well as all Great Lakes are federally controlled waters and boaters are subject to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.. If your vessel is 26' and over, you are required to have a Discharge of Oil Placard affixed in a conspicuous place in the machinery or bilge pump area of your vessel. The discharge of oil or oily waste into any navigable waters of the U.S. are strictly prohibited by law.

2) Marpol Trash Placard. Let's make this one simple! Don't throw any waste overboard okay! Vessels 26' or greater are required to have a Trash Placard on display. Usual places to affix the placard are in the galley or head, etc. Vessels 40' and over must additionally have a written trash disposal plan onboard.

3) Marine Sanitation Devices. On Lake Erie you are prohibited from discharging waste into the water. If your vessel has a porta potty you are okay in that you will remove the unit for emptying once ashore or at a pump out station. If you have a flush toilet that empties into a holding tank that is a closed system and can not be discharged overboard you are okay as well.

Here's where it gets a little tricky. If your vessel's head has or has had the capability of discharging waste overboard, that feature must be disabled. This is too complicated to fully discuss in this article. I would strongly

advise that you contact the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary and have a vessel examiner do an inspection to assure that you are in compliance with federal law. Islanders can have this inspection performed free of charge. Call (419) 379-9000.

4) Navigation Rules. Boats 39.4' and over must have a current copy of the navigation rules on board.

5) State Requirements. Pick up a copy "Ohio Boat Operators Guide." Contact the USCG Auxiliary or the Department of Natural Resources (ODNR).

6) Overall Vessel Condition. Your vessel must be free from fire hazards, in good overall condition, with bilges reasonably clean and visible hull structure generally sound. The engine horsepower must not exceed that shown on the capacity plate. The electrical system must be protected by fuses or manual reset circuit breakers. Switches and fuse panels must be protected from rain or water spray. Wiring must be in good

condition, properly installed and with no exposed areas or deteriorated insulation. Batteries must be secured and terminals covered to prevent accidental arcing. If installed, self-circling or kill switch mechanisms must be in proper working order. Portable fuel tanks (normally 7-gallon capacity or less) must be constructed of non-breakable material and free of corrosion and leaks. All vents must be capable of being closed. The tank must be secured and have a vapor-tight, leak-proof cap. Each permanent fuel tank must be properly ventilated. System and fuel tanks must be properly secured with no flammable materials nearby.

PIB RESIDENTS CAN CALL ME FOR FREE SAFETY CHECK

I am available to personally inspect your vessel free of charge. Now is the time to do it since the boating season is upon us. The best way to reach me is via email: paulbolden. uscgaux@gmail.com. You can also call me at (419) 379-9000 stating your name, your phone number, that you're at Put-in-Bay and would like to have a Vessel Safety Check.


AmeriCorps intern for 2019 The Lake Erie Islands Conservancy, Lake Erie Islands Nature and Wildlife Center, and

MISCELLANEOUS

The SCHOOL WEBSITE is filling out nicely and provides lots more information than the old one. The new pavilions at the West Bay Inn are finished. The VFW will celebrate MEMORIAL DAY on Thursday May 30 (which is the official day) and NOT on the Monday holiday. May is BIRD MONTH on the Island with many birders making the trip. We met for our first KIAC pot luck. Grossbeaks, loads of humming birds and orioles, indigo buntings, finches are around. Tom Bartlett reported that on May 19 he banded 237 birds (35 species). The Bird Kelleys Island Facebook page keeps us up to date on his activities and there is a great photo of a yellow billed Cookoo and a black billed cuckoo there. We bid farewell to Ericka who was the manager last winter. DOG WALKS are starting up again, Island dogs should being their people to the school at 1:00 sharp – then move to a comfortable walking spot. Have you heard those mysterious booms on the west side? The West Bay Inn now has a cannon to celebrate sunsets. Ron Ehrbar has officially announced his candidacy for Mayor.

REFERENDUM FILED

Ordinance 2019-O-4 combining the duties of the clerk/treasurer into an appointed office known as the village Fiscal Officer in the Village is being challenged. A copy of the referendum can be viewed in the Village office.

COUNCIL NOTES

This was a rather fast moving meeting but not without some surprises. There is a new Mayor's Court Clerk – Rosalyn Ahner, and Council hired this year's part-time police officers and established a "use of public ways by service providers" policy. They will be putting two levies on the fall ballot: Renewal 1.00 mill for fire protection services and 3.00 mills renewal for streets, roads and bridges. Bids are coming in on the AIRPORT DRAINAGE project. With this high water, FLOOD CONTROL on E. Lakeshore, east of the marina, is a priority. The PARK BOARD announced that two signs for Village parks have been donated and should be installed soon. Cost saving measures continue with the cancellation of two cell phone contracts which were determined to be an unnecessary expense. Actually, one was not even used. Paperwork is moving forward for grants and permissions to install an official HELIPORT at the airport. At a special meeting on April 27, Council officially accepted the resignation of Councilperson Mike Feyedelem and appointed Russ Maust to Mike's remaining term.

SAFETY SERVICES NEWS

The POLICE DEPT. received 164 telephone calls, and issued five warnings for speeding and grass on the roadway. They will be applying for a grant for bullet proof vests and are looking at purchasing AED equipment for one of the police cruisers as they are usually on the scene first. The FIRE DEPT. has received their multi-gas detector. There are problems with the Dwelle House (police housing) septic system that will have to be dealt with. On Sunday, May 19, our SAFETY SERVICES held an ACTIVE SHOOTER TRAINING event at the school. This was a realistic session and after receiving the report, areas were cleared, perimeters secured and injuries and deaths were dealt with as the shooter was identified and secured. Several Islanders participated as bystanders and victims. The house burning exercise was changed in scope. Permission was not granted to burn the house, however, several different types of fires were set inside the home in various locations and firefighters were sent in to deal with the scaled down blazes.




