

Get ready to put your ATV away this summer

Island ATV owners will no longer be able to operate their vehicles on the island once a new ordinance is passed this spring. The new law will allow ATVs to be operated only from November 1st through April 30th. It also applies to snowmobiles. The new ordinance complies with a new Ohio Revised Code which was lobbied for by the Put-in-Bay

Township Trustees because of concern about someone renting ATVs to tourists during the summer if they were allowed to be operated year round.

ATVs have been operated on island roads for many years and some owners are not happy they won't be able to use them any more for simple day-to-day activities like going to the store or work during the busy season.

Trump budget slashes funds for Great Lakes

The Trump Administration's newly released budget cuts funding for the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI) from \$300 million to \$30 million... If this rings a bell, it should – just last year, the program was zeroed out entirely, but the Ohio and other Great Lakes delegations fought successfully to restore full funding of the programs that monitors the health of the lakes and funds Great Lakes research. The proposed cuts threaten the well-being of the Great Lakes and jeopardizes the economies of all the states bordering on them. The Great Lakes are a natural resource that is more important to this area and the nation than any one of the many infrastructure projects the administration wants to fund to

the tune of \$200 billion or the multi-billion dollar border wall. The funding is a tiny fraction of the proposed military spending increases.

GLRI has helped Ohio clean up Lake Erie – and Ohioans know just how important that effort is in the ongoing battle to keep the Great Lake a healthy natural resource for residents, workers, employers, tourists and more. If you have a business here on Put-in-Bay, this is extremely important.

The fight to keep the funding at its current level is a bipartisan issue in all the Great Lakes States and includes this area's U.S. Representative Marcy Kaptur (D) and Ohio Senator Rob Portman (R).

ON THE WATER EMERGENCY

You are returning from a trip to Pelee Island when your boat suddenly loses all electrical power and propulsion. You are located about a mile north of North Bass Island. There is a moderate wind from the north at 5 - 10 knots, the air temperature is 80F water temperature is 69F, the time is 3pm. Your vessel has not sustained any

visible damage and is not taking on water. You have four passengers on board. Your attempts to restart your boat have failed and you are adrift. What now?

Take Action!

- 1) Drop anchor to stop your boat from drifting. The northerly wind may push your vessel towards the rocks. The tip of North Bass is extremely shallow and rocky (however, you are aware of this condition because you consulted your charts before you left PIB that
 - 2) Make sure that all passengers are wearing Life Vests and that they remain calm.
- 3) Call the Coast Guard on CH16 (if your radio is still functioning). Clearly say Coast Guard, Coast Guard, Coast Guard, this is "Vessel Name." Give your position/location. State the nature of the distress. State the number of persons on board. If your radio is not functioning, try your cell phone. Add the Coast Guard's phone number to your contact list (419) 798-4444
- DO NOT SAY MAYDAY. THIS IS NOT A MAYDAY SITUATION as conditions are not life threatening. We will discuss mayday calls at another time.
- 4) Affix your orange Distress Flag to the highest point that you can do so safely. Consider igniting your orange smoke flares to help the Coast Guard and other boaters locate your

Other Considerations

Before you leave port: Review your charts (know your waters), like in the scenario above, GPS devices can fail. File what's called a Float Plan which lets someone ashore know when you left, where you went, and when you are returning. Also give them a description of your boat, it's name, and your O-H numbers. If you have an on-board marine radio, consider buying a handheld radio as a back-up. Consider carrying extra flares beyond the minimum required.

Conclusion

These are some (not all) of the steps that you can take towards safer boating. We will be covering more tips in future articles. Here's to a safe boating season!

the living room. Mrs. Larry turned from her usual roost, "What the ...? And why is it so hot in here?"

"I'm tired of winter, we're having a picnic! Hot dogs, potato salad, baked beans, everything! And after dinner, we'll watch the sunset from the lawn chairs! Oh, and I turned the furnace up to 80- degrees to help get that summer vibe going." She could only shake her head as I went to work.

First, I turned the clocks back a few hours so sunset would be around nine, just like in June. 



Village to challenge ruling

The Ottawa County Court of Common Pleas Court Judge Bruce Winters recently ruled that Put-in-Bay Village's rental golf cart, taxi and bus fee "is for similar purpose that is already imposed by the state and thus would be improper and impermissible

Mathys, Mark who owns Delaware Carts, challenged the ordinance in 2015 after he was issued a citation for not paying the fees. His lawyer, Andrew Mayle, argued, among other things, that the village could not assess a fee on something the state already licenses. Otherwise, municipalities all over Ohio could charge high license fees for the right to use their streets.

The Village takes in about \$30,000 per year in such fees. The fees were used to street repair and maintenance.

In a similar case from several years ago, a judge ruled in the Village's favor, so the Village Council voted to appeal the decision.

Mr. Mayle said business owners are now considering civil action to recoup fees they paid the village. This could be a considerable amount the Village would have to repay if it loses.

Island Girl: "There's No Place Like Home" By Christine L. Ontko

All within 24 hours, I was basking in the Maui sunshine and then, in what seemed like an instant, a cold and snowy Cleveland Airport surrounded me. Good friend Anne pulled up in her warmed car just as I stepped outside the doors near baggage claim. Perfect timing.

I was bundled up as much as possible, having wrapped my multi-colored scarf around my head, ears and neck. The jacket I wear at the Upcountry Farmer's Market on Maui was tied as tightly as I could get it. My feet were covered with the one pair of wool socks I held onto and took to Maui - just in case – and kept me warm inside my Birkenstocks. Clearly I wasn't prepared for winter weather in Ohio. However, I knew once I arrived back on my Put-in-Bay island home, I could dive into the stored winter gear and all would be well.

In life, things don't always go as planned, and this was one of those unforeseen times. I was coming home to Put-in-Bay months before my scheduled time, with no return flight.

> I had my days set before me, with lots of soap making for the new season at my shop, redesigning my web site, appointments, and business stuff. I'd call this time my "Island Winter Retreat."

I hopped on Dustin's plane and when I spotted the Monument from afar, a warm feeling filled me up inside. We landed smoothly and my little Smart Car awaited me, thanks to the help of friends and daughter, Meredith. It started right away and I thanked my little car. Thanks to neighbor Joe, I arrived to a warmed home, and he handdelivered fresh eggs from my backyard hens. I walked into the house and it smelled so warming, like home. I felt as if I'd never left. Searching every corner for signs of any damage, I felt relief when there was none. Everything was perfect, just perfect!

During my long flight over the Pacific, in times of restless attempts at sleep, I dreamt of a warm fire in my island fireplace. But, when I arrived home to reality, there were only five logs sitting on the front porch. With snow covering everything, my chances of finding and chopping any firewood were pretty slim. A quick post on Facebook got me some firewood from friendly islander Rob LaPlante - delivered to my front porch. What service! No firewood necessary in Lahaina, Hawaii, where temperatures average about 75 degrees.

Tyrus Burgess, an old high school friend, was visiting from Brooklyn, NY, for a quick family visit. What an unexpected coincidence! It was great spending an evening with him, filled with laughter and a bit of warming whiskey. Memories and talk of our middle-aged lives...nobody understands you like a childhood friend. They're not on Maui.

Daughter Anna, who has lovingly cared for our cats while I've been in Hawaii, "allowed" me one of our two kitties to snuggle with while home. Boy, how I miss my



Not only do I miss live things, I miss our large space. The Maui condo is only about 550 sq. ft. My big Put-in-Bay bathtub allowed me a soak in it, complete with lavender bath salts. Oh how I'd missed that tub!! I'd never dare to take a hot soak in my Maui bathtub. Too darn hot.

Bingo with mom. Appointments with dad. Subbing at the school, hugging all the young children again, and looking up at my former students, who now tower over me. Having breakfast and lunch with old pals. Helpful, handy friends. A Thanksgiving-like meal with my daughters. Hugs at the Grocery Store and Post Office. I was still able to feel aloha, even though I was in Lake Erie and not in middle of the Pacific Ocean.

My Maui friends keep asking if I'm ever coming back. Like Put-in-Bay, people come and go all the time on the islands. It's not for everyone, and I know all too well the feeling of "losing" people to the mainland. In this case, my Maui friends were concerned I'd be lost to my home island. Maui won't lose me and neither will Put-in-Bay. When you're reading this article, I'll be back on the warm, sandy beach on my other island. Peace out, Put-in-Bay. Thanks for loving me so much.





PIBIO: The Island's Fake New By Peter Huston

You only have to do a simple "google" of "putinbay", "put in bay" or "put-in-bay" to find out how many interesting, sometimes useless and often crazy stories, pictures and videos there are about the island. This column is about Fake News- Island Style. Borrowing from the current buzzword about information sources for our visitors coming to the island. I think we need to look at the "Fake News" and understand that it is at the root of many of our

From what I have discovered from online "google" Fake News sources, we have no enforcement of laws restricting open containers for alcohol, or even smoking pot in public. You can bring your own food and drink in a cooler and party on the street while you let your 6 year old drive the golf cart. Turns out you don't really need a license to drive a golf cart either. In fact, you can drive anything here with wheels and an engine. It's on the "internet", so you have to believe me.

These compounded layers of misinformation find their way to serious news articles, business websites, facebook pages, you tube and even TV news shows. Just look on "Trip Advisor" under "Is Put-in-Bay a huge party?" to see what we have systematically done to ourselves. The world of social media has spawned a monster and we can't get it back in the cage.

It's easy to point fingers at others, but over the past ten years we have collectively marketed to and encouraged the behavior we now decry. There are digital online images that purport to represent our island and yet they directly or indirectly encourage many of the things we want to curb, like driving with a drink in hand, or allowing a child to drive (so many grand parents are guilty of this). I call it the "Disneyfication" of Put-in-Bay. We are in many ways an amusement park experience to visitors.

In fact, stories about driving without a valid license here made their way to the regional and national news last year. We get calls from people asking if they need a license for their teenager to ride a moped or can they bring an ATV to drive on the island. Some how we have gotten a reputation for being outside the laws of Ohio. While being an islander requires a lot of independence, our independent vision of how things should be done has become accepted and imitated.

If you're internet savvy I challenge you to take a look at what's out there and who promotes this type of Fake News. Try a simple "google" query like "putinbayferry", "putinbayparty" or "Put-in-Bay Christmas In July" and you find pages and images that provide an insightful look at what potential visitors see about us. Incomplete information like this misleads visitors interested in coming to the island and it is being promoted daily.

If you live here, you're probably making a living or enjoying in some way the island life style that has been built on the tourism business over the past 40 years. If you want people visiting to get the "right idea" about coming here, we all need to promote and share through social media and word of mouth the images and stories we want to promote about the island. Let's demonstrate to them the rules of the road, the behavior you want emulated, the lifestyle you like to see.


