The high water storm was the second of the year, but was even worse than the first back in March. The lake level was already high on Friday, the 13th, as the wind blew out of the east, but by Saturday afternoon the wind was blowing hard and the water was rising and covering the pavement on Bayview Ave. in front of the Monument and by the Crew's Nest, Put-in-Bay Yacht Club and Miller's downtown ferry dock. If you were brave, you could navigate a regular car or minivan through the water, but as the night progressed the water rose even more and it took a large pickup to get by the Monument. Jared Dress will probably agree with that since his small car stalled before getting all the way across. On Saturday night, Paul Lemmon from East Point and his fiancee Jacki Hupp decided not to attempt going home after a night of fun and ended up staying with Mike "Bud Light" Conshafter at his home on Concord Ave. In the morning, Kyle

one end of the harbor were covered with water.

After the water recedes, debris consisting of anything that floats, plus lots of stones and sand is left to be cleaned up. Out on East Point, the turn around at the end protected by those decorated blocks was deep in water and covered in stone and sand debris which had to be cleaned off the road with heavy equipment.

heavy equipment. East Point resident Glenn Cooper had seawall damage from the first spring storm. This second spring storm helped wash out even more of his seawall. Other low-lying properties on East Point were flooded. There is erosion along Chapman Rd. on East Point, too.

Over on Middle Bass, Deist Rd. which connects the main part of the island with East Point was flooded and only the brave dared to drive it. Several homes at Burgundy Bay were surrounded by water. No land was lost, but two seawalls were heavily damaged and will require expensive repairs. Most homes built in the flood plain were built high enough not to have any water damage, but at least two of the older and lower ones had significant inside flooding. One ten feet long and three feet wide section of Deist Road on East Point washed out and has been repaired.

On North Bass, Dale Burris reported erosion on the east side of the island was so bad that he estimated 20 feet of land along a thousand feet of unprotected shoreline was lost. He estimated it was a loss of about three acres.

On Kelleys Island, Bruce Korenko came across several Lake Erie water snakes along the shore that didn't survive the storm.

The stuff that washes ashore during a storm sometimes makes one wonder what is out there in the lake. Barry Koehler (PIBHS Class of 2000) was out walking his two dogs, Charlie and Hazel, and came across the skeletal remains of some animal he didn't recognize. Barry also rescued a water snake that lost its winter shoreline home to erosion. He took it to Kristin "The Snake Lady" Stanford so it could recover from it traumatic experience.

Lisa Brohl went beach cleaning after the storm and commented, "With high water levels on Lake Erie shores we are seeing more than driftwood - much more plastic than I remember in the 80's high water events."

For those who want proof that the water in Lake Erie has been higher than this storm, Ma Werty dug out some of the old photos showing how high the water was back in a storm in April 1974. In several photos she posted on Facebook, you can easily tell the water has indeed been much higher.

We've left the bad news for last. The Army Corps of Engineers, in its "Great Lakes Water Level Outlook" for April 2018, is showing in its range of possible outcomes a lake level that is a foot higher than what we had in April. If this prediction becomes reality, and we get a strong storm from the northeast like we did a couple of years ago during the summer, you can expect to see the highest water levels anyone alive today has ever seen. Let's just hope these two factors don't merge and create the perfect storm.

Due to the recent flooding of South Bass Island, East Point was temporarily cut off from the rest of the island again! Over the years it had been a bowling area, dance pavilion, skating rink, wine cellar and more. When it burned on the Friday of Memorial Day Weekend 1988, it housed the island grocery store and the Beer Barrel Saloon where Pat Dailey entertained.

The fire began at a propane-fueled grill at the front of the building. A supply line malfunctioned spewing liquid fire up the front of the old wooden structure. Within 45 minutes, the massive structure was smoldering ruins.

Shocked islanders couldn't believe this beloved island landmark was gone.

Owner Tip Niese vowed to rebuild, and a new Beer Barrel Saloon and Tipper's Restaurant were built.

The burning of the old Colonial marked the beginning of a new era at Put-in-Bay. The first Jet Express and the first of the new larger Miller ferries meant more people, both day trippers and those who could stay late into the evening. This resulted in more entertainment at the various island watering holes and eventually the influx overnight lodging we see today.

There are still many islanders who remember the Colonial, have stories to tell about fun times there, or who worked there. Maybe if you're lucky, you'll hear some fun and interesting things about the Colonial as the anniversary of its demise is marked.

lage Council Notes NEW VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR

When Village Administrator Steve Riddle was made Chief of Police about a year ago, he took on the responsibility of both jobs. The Put-in-Bay Village Council passed an ordinance to separate the two positions. Last month, Put-in-Bay Mayor Mack McCann recommended Glenn Basting of Huron, OH, to become the new village administrator. Council voted unanimously to accept the mayor's recommendation.

Basting, who attended the Village Council meeting in April, told Council he would be able to begin work about mid-May. The new administrator has a Class III water plant operation license and has thirty years of water plant experience, much of it dealing with the treatment of lake water. He will commute to the island and will earn \$69,500 per year with applicable benefits. At one time, Basting had a Class I wastewater treatment license. He indicated he would pursue renewing a reinstatement.

VILLAGE UTILITY DEPT. LOSES OPERATORS

The Put-in-Bay Village Utility Department has lost four licensed operators in the last nine months, two of them coming this past month when Doug Knauer, the former Village Administrator, announced his retirement, and wastewater plant operator Mike Mewhorter gave his two weeks notice. Knauer had a water treatment license, and Mewhorter. Mewhorter's resignation will leave the sewage treatment plant with no operator. Mewhorter recently agreed to stay on another month to help give officials time to find a replacement. Licensed operators Zach Kowalski and Tony Joyce left the plant a few months ago.

PUT YOUR ATVs & SNOWMOBILES AWAY

Put-in-Bay Village Council voted in April to allow ATVs and snowmobiles on island roads from November first through April 30th. That also means they won't be allowed to operated on island roads from May 1st though October 31st. This falls in line with recent Ohio Revised Code changes.

VILLAGE WINS ONE IN COURT

A court recently ruled for Put-in-Bay Village against former Put-in-Bay Police Chief Ric Lampela in a case that taken more than two years to decide. Lampela appealed the Village's administrative action which removed him from his job about three years ago, but the court said the procedure was handled properly. Lampela is still awaiting a decision concerning any unemployment compensation he was entitled to after his termination.

ETHICS WORKSHOP

Elected officials and village employees along with others attended an ethics workshop con-ducted by Susan Willeke from the Ohio Ethics Commission on Thursday, April 12th, at the Put-in-Bay Town Hall. The hour and a half long workshop was attended by about three dozen people. Willeke told those in attendance that living in a small community like Put-in-Bay sometimes offers some challenging situations when it comes to ethics for those in public service. One of the topics of discussion was the tipping of the dockmasters who work each summer at the village's public docks. She made it quite clear, it was not only illegal for the dock personnel to accept tips, but that it was also illegal for the public to give the dockmasters tips.

Man sentenced for crime committed on PIB 25 years ago

Kevin Lynch, 75, accused of sexually assaulting a 17-year-old girl 25 years ago while she was unconscious on his boat at Put-in-Bay in 1993, was sentenced to prison.

The Ottawa County Sheriff's Office began an investigation of the crime when the victim reported it 20 years later after she found a video Lynch made of the sexual assault.

In 2014, a grand jury indicted Lynch on four counts of rape.

Last November, Lynch pleaded guilty to two counts of sexual battery, both third-degree felonies, after the prosecution amended the charges as part of a plea agreement. The agreement was made with the approval of the victim and the investigators,

Ottawa County common pleas Judge Bruce Winters sentenced Lynch to two years in prison for each sexual battery charge and ordered the sentences be served consecutively for a total prison sentence of four years. The court also required Lynch to pay a \$10,000 fine.

SECRET INFORMATION-HOW TO PASS A VESSEL INSPECTION (VSC) PART 2 OF 3

Don't tell anyone that I told you!

Let's continue where we left off last month. By the end of this 3 part series you should be able to breeze through a Coast Guard or Coast Guard Auxiliary inspection. I'm letting you in on all the secrets!

1) Pollution Placard. Lake Erie as well as all Great Lakes are federally controlled waters and boaters are subject to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act.. If your vessel is 26' and over, you are required to have a Discharge of Oil Placard affixed in a conspicuous place in

the machinery or bilge pump area of your vessel. The discharge of oil or oily waste into any navigable waters of the U.S. are strictly prohibited by law.

2) Marpol Trash Placard. Let's make this one simple! Don't throw any waste overboard okay!

Vessels 26' or greater are required to have a Trash Placard on display. Usual places to affix the placard are in the galley or head, etc. Vessels 40' and over must additionally have a

written trash disposal plan onboard.

3) Marine Sanitation Devices. On Lake Erie you are prohibited from discharging waste into the water. If your vessel has a porta potty you are okay in that you will remove the unit for emptying once ashore or at a pump out station. If you have a flush toilet that empties into a holding tank that is a closed system and can not be discharged overboard you are okay as well.

Here's where it gets a little tricky. If your vessel's head has or has had the capability of discharging waste overboard, that feature must be disabled. This is too complicated to fully discuss in this article. I would strongly advise that you contact the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary and have a vessel examiner do an inspection to assure that you are in compliance with federal law. Islanders can have this inspection performed free of charge. Call 419-379-9000.

4) Navigation Rules. Boats 39.4' and over must have a current copy of the navigation rules on board.

5) State Requirements. Pick up a copy of "Ohio Boat Operators Guide." Contact the USCG Auxiliary or the Department of Natural Resources (ODNR).6) Overall Vessel Condition. Your vessel must be free from fire hazards, in

6) Overall Vessel Condition. Your vessel must be free from fire hazards, in good overall condition, with bilges reasonably clean and visible hull structure generally sound. The engine horsepower must not exceed that shown on the capacity plate. The electrical system must be protected by fuses or manual reset circuit breakers. Switches and fuse panels must be protected from rain or water spray. Wiring must be in good condition, properly installed and with no exposed areas or deteriorated insulation. Batteries must be secured and terminals covered to prevent accidental arcing. If installed, self-circling or kill switch mechanisms must be in proper working order. Portable fuel tanks (normally 7 gallon capacity or less) must be constructed of non-breakable material and free of corrosion and leaks. All vents must be capable of being closed. The tank must be properly ventilated. System and fuel tanks must be properly secured with no flammable materials nearby.

REPORT CLAIMS DAVIS-BESSE NUCLEAR POWER PLANT TO SHUT DOWN IN 2020

For the first time, the operating end points for FirstEnergy Corp.'s Davis-Besse nuclear power plant in Ottawa County; its Perry nuclear power plant east of Cleveland in Perry, Ohio, and its twinreactor Beaver Valley nuclear power complex west of Pittsburgh in Shippingport, Pa., have been put in writing by a corporation subsidiary. News, views, and comment from a South Bass cottager ...

Something was amiss. I tossed and turned through most of the night. As I climbed into the old blue pickup for the drive to the Catawba dock, I didn't feel quite right. I remembered the excitement in early March when the first ferries began to run. But it seemed whenever I looked at the calendar to plan my first trip, the weather would deteriorate – too cold, too windy, ice on the dock, snow, a Nor'easter - it seemed like there was never a string of days that had Mother Nature's full cooperation! I gathered my tools, supplies, made lists, and waited; measuring each day well into April.

And finally, it was time. Sunday would be cold, but clear; the chill would continue through the first few days of the week, but then, real Spring weather would finally arrive. I could connect the pump for the well, get the water flowing and the plumbing ready to go. There would be plenty of work inside to keep me busy until the warmth blew in from the South. It was snowing when I left home, but by the time I pulled up to the ferry dock, the sky was clear and blue – I was feeling better, more excited than anxious.

As I had done every Spring for the past twenty-four years, I walk around the yard, through Winter's rubble, checking the cottage roof for fallen limbs and wind-whipped shingles. Inside, I check the windows, poke around for any unwelcome critters, and turn on some heat. Then, it is out to the garage to lay out my first job: I gather my tools from the pickup and pull the cover off the tiny, pump-house shed. My knees creak as I squat down to connect the pressure tank and prime the pump. Then, one more trip through the cottage to be sure I have no open valves in the bathrooms or kitchen. Finally, back to the pump-house to plug in the power.

They say records are made to be broken. Joe DiMaggio recorded a hit in 56 consecutive games. Cal Ripken Jr. played in 2362 consecutive games - the "Iron Man". Byron Nelson won 18 PGA tour events in a single year, including eleven in a row! The Montreal Canadians won 24 Stanley Cups, including five straight. The Boston Celtics won eight



consecutive NBA championships. The great Cy Young recorded 511 wins. Ohio's Jack Nicklaus won 18 Major Championships. Jerry Rice scored 208 career touchdowns.

But streaks end, records fall. Athletes age, retire. Yes, everything comes to an end. I plugged in the pump - just a faint buzzing sound. I tried again, nothing - no water. For the next few hours I fiddled, prodded, and probed, checking connections, power, taking apart what I could, staring blankly at what I could not. Finally, late on that sunny, Sunday afternoon, I reluctantly accepted defeat - my streak had ended. For the first time in 24 years, there would be no water on this Opening Day.

Defeated.

I pulled out my phone and called for professional help. This late in the day, especially on a Sunday, I did not expect an answer: I left a message, hopeful that Monday might bring a quick fix at the hands of a trusted Island expert.

There was nothing left for me to do; I was tired, frustrated, drained, not feeling my usual excitement and enthusiasm. I opened a beer and dragged the old green chair out by the lake. The sun was warm, the chilly wind had subsided. I called Mrs. Larry to report my failure. Finally, looking around, I took a deep breath and let the sound of the soft waves, birds chirping in the trees overhead, and the natural beauty of the island surround me. Reaching for my beer, I was feeling better. Soon, the pump will spring to life, water will flow - just a little bump in the adventure we call cottage life

With that, a bird in the tree overhead dropped his "load" squarely in my lap!

I just smiled to myself, leaned back to look up into the barren branches of the big oak, I spotted my feathered friend, Thanks. I needed that.

About the Put-in-Bay Community Swim Sail Program

The Put-in-Bay Community Swim/Sail program (PIBC-SS) includes swimming and sailing lessons for students aged 4 to 18*. Younger children will learn swimming skills and safety, while older students will learn boat handling, sailing and water safety. See page 12 in this issue for 2018 registration details. Everyone is welcome to participate. BACKGROUND:

More than a generation ago, a swimming and sailing program began at the Put-in-Bay Yacht Club for the youngsters on the island. The lessons became more and more popular and the program was evolved into a partnership between the Put-in-Bay Recreation Committee and the Yacht Club which evolved into the Put-in-Bay Community Swim/Sail Program. The subsidized lessons make it affordable for all youngster to learn how to swim and sail during their summer vacations here on the island.

COSTS:

Costs for swimming classes (both youth and endurance) are \$105 per child. Costs for sailing classes (8 years and older as of August 1st) are \$460 with options to add evening endurance and/or race team participation for an additional fee (details below)

SWIMMING LEVELS:

Each student in the Swimming Program will be placed in a level that is appropriate to their swimming ability. This will be determined during a swimming pre-test that will occur the first few days that Swimming Program starts in June.

Level 1- Water Exploration

- Level 2- Learn to Swim: Primary Skills
- Level 3- Learn to Swim: Basic Swimming Skills Level 4 A- Stroke Technique

Level 4 B- Stroke Technique

Pre-Endurance: Laps, Laps, and technique Endurance: Laps, Laps, and More Laps

Kelleys Island News

It's April 20 and winter is still with us. When will Islanders finally be able to give up their winter coats? Stores and restaurants are opening and we hopefully shake off the bone-chilling cold of this winter and revel in our few sunny days. May 5 is Derby Day, May 10 Council shifts to the second Thursday at 7 pm, May 12 the EMS Spaghetti Dinner, May 17-19 Nest With The Birds, May 17 KIAC pot luck (by the way there are lots of activities scheduled - check the website for dates and details www.kelleysislandnature.com. May 19 KILA Welcome Back Potluck, Safety Services Day on the Casino Dock and the KI History Museum opens, May 20 KI Police car wash, and May 24 is the Island's Bike Week day, just to mention a few of the events this month. SCRAP METAL DAY

Scrap Metal Day will be held on June 2nd. Clean up vour scrap metal for free (except where Freon must be removed) from 10-3 at the Transfer Station. THE KI HISTO-RY MUSEUM opens on May 19 with free admission as they celebrate International Museum Day. The displays this year are Island Electricity and Bathing beauties of the 1950's. VILLAGE FINANCES

Greg Ritchie and Mike Feyedelem (Finance Commit-tee) prepared a report on the financial health of the village for 2017. There are six major funds: General, Water, Road Construction, Street Maintenance, Fire and EMS. If you ever had a question about where Village money comes from or how it is spent - this is the report to read (www.KelleysIsland.us click on Village News). Here are some highlights. GENER-AL FUND INCOME: 85% of our income comes from taxes (Property, Resort Area, Homestead and rollback), Mayor's Court accounts for just 5% and 10% comes from permits. leases, rental fees, licenses and other sources. GENERAL FUND EXPENSES: The Police Dept accounts for 33%, Village Workers 7%, legal 14%, contract services 13% and 17% other (loans, capital outlay, auditor and misc.). This left the Village with a deficit in 2017 of \$111,227. WATER FUND: Income: 98% is generated from billing, tap fees and bulk water sales. Expenses: 47% Salaries and benefits, 37% office and distribution, 15% loans. ROAD CONSTRUCTION FUND: Income - 100% from taxes. Expenses - 95% Capital improvements. STREET MAINTENANCE: 99% from taxes. Expenses - salaries, benefits, travel, contract services, supplies & materials.

COUNCIL NEWS

In May, Council meetings switch to 7 pm on the second Thursday of the month at Kelley's Hall. If the March and April meetings are any indication, Council meetings will be

pretty exciting. There were some pretty heated discussions on several topics and there is a distinctive voting block. Since one Council member was absent, several motions failed that might have either passed or ended in a tie vote (broken by the Mayor). The usual one hour meeting stretched to nearly two hours. HOT TOPICS included pay raises for multiple employees (voted down), Consumer Price Index increases (clarification needed), increase in water rates (voted down), salary for water plant superintendent (changed to first reading), a freeze on all non-mandatory salary increases (passed), applying for a loan for water plant improvements (changed to first reading), and hiring a new Village Administrator (pending personal interviews with the four candidates). The GOLIAS HOUSE is proving to be an unexpected strain on the Village. Back in December the Village contracted for mold mitigation in the house, but now it appears that the porch needs to be rebuilt (approx. \$12,500) before the mold work is done. Repairs to the house are adding up and, coupled with the \$2000+ mortgage payment each month, might prove the house to be a white elephant for the village. The house, built in 1870 but with numerous additions over the years, has seven bedrooms and one bath (according to the Auditor's office). It sits on one acre of land and adjoins the Village office property. It seems no one wants to move into the house (paramedic housing and Village offices were suggested with no interest from either party). The Lands and Buildings committee will meet to determine its future. If the Village cannot find a use for the house it might be demolished or perhaps the lot, or part of the lot with the house, might be sold to cut losses. PARKING ON DIVISION ST. might be a little tighter this year as the driveway to the new Sand Lot (former Tiki Hut) will eliminate two spaces on the street. Council is reviewing options. The TELECOM-MUNICATIONS COMMITTEE has outreached to several companies including Hancock Wood Electric/fiber options, Beam Wireless, Western Reserve Communications and Amplex (installed in some places already). Also they advised us that FRONTIER will be starting new tech upgrades by the end of April which should take 2-3 weeks. A shortcut to the Committee can be found at www.KelleysIsland.us under Village News. The POLICE DEPT. has begun pulling people over for running stop signs, speeding and vehicle registration. The completed house checks logged in at 576 house and 104 business checks this winter. Phone calls are increasing (231 last month). You can keep up with KIPD news on their Facebook page. Ferry information can be found on the Ferryboat Facebook page. The dept. received permission from Council to install a MEDICATION DROP BOX at the station. Most mainland department's have them. It keeps old

and unused meds out of septic/sewer/lake systems and out of the hands of inquisitive children.

THE BIG STORM

We asked Leslie about any storm damage that occurred on Kelleys Island . She wrote, "No, it doesn't look like we lost any land during the high water/storms, but most of the docks on the south side were under or near under water. Many of our south shore docks were badly damaged by ice this

winter - some cool videos of the ice approaching a dock, then lifting and cracking the concrete slabs as the photographer beat rapid feet in reverse. The waves didn't help what was left of some of these docks.

An anonymous donor offered to provide the funds needed to renovate the area St. Paul's uses to prepare coffee hours and other community activities where meals are served. The committee worked diligently so the work could begin the week after Easter in hopes of completing the modernization before Pentecost. We are grateful for the planning and preparation provided by Dave Zilch of Roger Miller Builders who worked with us to ensure the best possible result. With all the plans in place the Kitchen committee quickly removed all the kitchenware. The coffee hour set up is "camping out" in the parish hall during the renovation. They will have a few days before the ribbon cutting to move everything into the new space.

Community members are all invited to join St. Paul's on May 20th for the celebration of Pentecost and the ribbon cutting for the kitchen renovation. There will be a string duet and other celebrations to observe the day. We expect the anonymous donor will be able to observe the ribbon cutting through a FaceTime video feed.

St. Paul's first kitchen started in the space where the coal burning heating system sat 150 years ago. The space became a kitchen after the oil burning heat was installed and over the years it was improved as newer appliances and materials became available. The last significant update occurred in the 1950s with the addition of green Formica counters. The Burrs donated a stove in the 1990s and when microwaves became popular, one was added. Some of the details about previous upgrades became clear when the entire kitchen area was taken apart revealing the 153-year-old timbers and some original electrical wiring which

may have been 100 years old! It is a relief to know the Electrical system is ready to support our current needs thanks to Scott Pugh's work. The kitchen is the hub of all the electrical use in the building.

After removing the previous materials which seemed like anything that was not nailed down, St. Paul's saw how the space was constructed. The original stone foundation received a covering of cement some time in the past. One of the older wires for the first electric stove was embedded in that cement. After the electrical work was complete, including a new line to allow crock pots to be plugged in on the new center island, the wallboard wen up in short order. It was prepared for the installation of new cabinets. New flooring covered the cement base and a dropped ceiling with LED fixture was added. The picture of the finished kitchen space will not be revealed until next month. To see it before the June Gazette appears, join St. Paul's worshiping community on Pentecost (May 20th for worship and an extravagant coffee hour.

shaded area underneath large Native trees of Maui. I loved the State Park and walked there often, but this hidden spot was new to me.

I could feel the gentleness of his heart. He spoke of the history of cock fighting as a way to make the roosters stronger and more fierce, in order to fend off rodents. "Not like the illegal rooster fights of today, where they allow them to kill," he explained further, "They'd just choose the strongest bird.

He spoke further, ""Man used to fight hand-to-hand and now how we glorify the hurtin' of one another." More from him came, talk of history of the world, wars and how things have evolved. I just listened.

It was time for me to say good-bye, I'm sure Cliff would wonder what was taking me so long this morning, and I didn't want to worry him. The Rooster Man felt so much love for his pet and this was obvious. He may not have a home, car or even clean clothing, but he had love and an ocean view.
