



And High Water it is! We've lived here a lot of years, but we never saw three

We've lived here a lot of years, but we never saw three high water events in a period of ten days before. Well, that's what happened in April, Fortunately, they were of a very short duration. The water came up relatively fast and went down the same way.

For anyone who hasn't been around the island for many years and who is surprised to see the island streets flooding as high as they did, they are still in more an even bigger surprise. The water level in Lake Erie is expected to rise several more inches between now and July before it starts tappering off. What that means is if we get a really big nor'easter of any real duration, you can expect to see record flooding water levels six or more inches higher than we experienced last month. That would be a repeat of some of the high water levels of the 1970s.

One of the problems of concern is getting from the main portion of South Bass to East Point. The nor east winds push water over the back seawall of the Monument, then flows across the lawn and floods the road. When the water in the lake goes down, water is trapped behind the northern seawall and keeps the road impassible for many vehicles. The water is trapped because drain basins and lines which let the trapped water back in the lake are clogged with sand and gravel. Perhaps the roadway needs to be raised and scuppers need to be installed in the seawall.

Over on Middle Bass, East Pointers there are having a problem getting back and forth to civilization on the main part of the island. The strong winds build waves which push gravel onto Deist Rd., the narrow, two-lane road that connects the two portions of the island.



Case closed! An Editorial

At the end of March, former Put-in-Bay Mayor Mack McCann and his two adult children, current PIB Village Councilman Michael McCann and former PIB Village Councilwoman Melinda Myers, appeared in Ottawa County Municipal Court where they learned what their sentences would be after pleading to various misdemeanor conflict of issue charges were filed last fall. The charges came after a yearlong investigation by several governmental agency including the Bureau of Criminal Investigation (BCI), the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Internal Revenue Service and the Ohio Ethics Commission (OEC).

In a plea deal that included dropping two felony charges

again Mayor McCann, it was agreed that he was to resign as mayor, plus plead guilty to lesser misdemeanor charges.

The visiting judge also fined each of the trio \$1000 and 180 days in jail. One hundred and thirty five days were suspended, plus upon completion of 100 hours of public service, the fine would be reduced to \$500

and the remaining 45 days in jail would be suspended.

Everyone will agree ethics and conflict of interest issues are important when it comes to public officials. They are complicated to say the least and sometimes interfere with what makes for common sense conducting the business of government.

In the former mayor's case, McCann's decision to recommend to Council that his business associate, Todd Blumensaadt, install a portion of new waterline on Victory Ave. made a lot of common sense. The waterline replacement had been on the Village's burners for several years. Todd had the machinery, the equipment and the time to put the line in before the busy season began, plus it the work could be done with much less expense. Council members, following the mayor's recommendation, voted unanimously for the project knowing full well that Todd and McCann have had a business relationship over the years. The project made sense, but ethically it violated conflict of interest laws.

Had officials investigated the operations of past mayors and village council members, they more than likely would have found numerous examples of these kind of violations. Sometimes when you live on an island, it makes sense to do things differently than if you're in a community on the mainland. It becomes tougher in the eyes of the law when

the island has such close knit family and business associ-

In the midst of the investigation, in April 2018, a representative from the Ohio Ethics Commission presented a two-hour program on ethics and conflict-of- interest issues for the island's elected officials. It was an eye-opener to say the least.

In retrospect, after seeing all this story play out, we wish investigating officials would have come to all the village officials and sat down with them and explained exactly what the issues were, how things should have been done and how to avoid these issues in the future. Island officials would have all learned something, and a prolonged, expensive legal battle could have been avoided.

Oh! And by the way, it's somewhat ironic that the three McCanns were sentenced to perform public service. Over the years, the McCanns have been champions of public service here on the island on a voluntary basis.

Make Put-in-Bay Great Again!

One afternoon this past month, forty people gathered at the Put-in-Bay Town Hall for a public hearing concerning the number of taxis which should be licensed to operate on the island. Taxi company owners, taxi drivers and any interested parties spoke. The sworn testimony covered everything from the number of taxis on the road to having unlimited taxis on the island. Currently, the Village ordinance allows for 36 taxis to be licensed.

This public hearing was interesting to say the least, but it reminded us that there is a rich history of taxis on the island, one that makes us again wonder if the taxi service of the past or the taxi service of today is better.

THE BEGINNING

The Hotel Victory was located where the South Bass State Park is now. You could disembark from one of the many steamers and catch a trolly which passed the island's biggest

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attractions, the caves and Heineman Winery on the way to the hotel. When the hotel burned in 1919, there was no longer a trolley, but the need to get people out to the caves and winery probably spurred the birth of taxi service on South Bass Island. There were no runs to the Lime Kiln Dock simply because there was no ferry service there. It was simply the end of the island. Like visitors of today, visitors then wanted to see the island. One of the big draws for the taxis were tours of the island. Remember, there was no tour train or golf cart rentals then, plus bicycling the dirt roads was not for everyone.

We don't know who decided to start driving taxi on the island, but whoever it was saw the need and started his engine and it has continued to this day.

THE 1920s & PROHIBITION

One of the earliest photos of taxis is one taken out by Mammoth Cave and Heineman Winery. All the taxis and drivers are parked for one of Otto Herbster's panoramic photos. The one on this page shows the taxis lined up on Delaware Ave. by the old Colonial building. From the look of the dress and Model T-like taxis, we suspect the photo was taken in the 1920's.

During Prohibition, one taxi company owner, Fred Cooper, used his cab, not only to haul passengers, but also to procure customers who he would take to his home on Mitchell Rd. where they could purchase adult beverages made from the fruit from his vineyard. Fred's son, Gus, was the last Cooper to own Cooper's Restaurant, which islanders now know as the Goat Soup & Whiskey. The house on Mitchell Rd still stands and is the home of Capt. Russ and Lisa Brohl who still tend several rows of grapevines from which bootleg wine was once made.

THE 1930s & 1940s

Moving forward to the 1930s and 1940s, things got a little fancier. The cab companies stepped it up a bit with big, open convertibles. These are the big classic cars collectors pay tens of thousands of dollars for today. You could pile a lot of riders into one of these land boats. The ride from downtown to the caves was 10ϕ , or in today's money just under \$2. The names of driver/owners Walt Smith and Billy Adams who ran cabs in the 1930s and 1940s are still heard to this day when islanders reminisce about the good old days.

We can only imagine the cabs lined up at the steamer dock when one of the big lake boats pulled in and discharged hundreds of passengers. Keep in mind, these were still the days when bikes and popular tandem bicycles could be rented to pedal around, but there were still no golf carts, mopeds and other means of easy transportation.

Larry Reinhard, the brother of the late Norma Wasson from East Point, ran cabs in the 1940s after the war. One of his drivers was Tom Lunt, who later owned Stonehenge.

THĘ 1950s

Larry ended up selling out to Bob Ladd, the father of Paul, Chris and Shawn Ladd several years after World War II. Among Bob's drivers were his brother John Ladd and Mark Barnhill who spent their summer vacations earning money to attend Bowling Green State University. John said island tours for \$4 were popular. He also told how one of Bob's passengers was the infamous Sam Sheppard who made headlines in Cleveland over his wife's controversial murder. As the steamer age came to an end, there was still a need for taxi service. The last of the big open limo cabs started to disappear only to be replaced by more modern post-war vehicles. Riders could still pile in and ride seated on the top of the retracted convertible top with their feet nestled between fellow passengers seated on the back seat. It may not have been the most comfortable, but it was exciting and fun to say the least. Remember, back then you didn't have to buckle up or be as concerned about your safety as we are today.

Shortly after Mack McCann graduated from high school in 1954, he started a taxi company associated with the Park Hotel. One of his drivers was Jim Tobin who drove the company's huge red 1953 Packard convertible. The business only lasted a couple of summers until Mack went to work for Lee Miller on the ferry. He did, however, drive the Packard for the next ten years until he got rid of it. On his 60th birthday, Mack was presented with a restored red 1953 Packard convertible which he still has on the island.

THE 1960s & 1970s

Mac McCluskey was running Mac's Cabs in the early 1960s. His home was the Delwood on East Point (the former group home). One of the memorable vehicles in his fleet was a red Cadillac convertible from the late 1940s. Every time Mac's cars broke down, he'd show up at Parker's Garage hoping Joe would drop everything and fix what was wrong so he could get back on the road to make a buck.

Mac's competition was Smiley's Cabs which had two brown 1960 Chevy Impala convertibles. Bill Timmerman and Bob Stone, aka the "Cargo Net Boys," bought out Smiley when they owned the Victory Park Resort and before they bought out Ken & Greta's, the souvenir shop downtown next to Frosty Bar. They had Chevrolet, Ford and Plymouth convertibles which were driven by drivers dressed in red shirts with Victory Cab printed on them. Lee Miller, the owner of Miller Boat Line, was so impressed with how they looked and operated that he had a special pick up lane at the Lime Kiln for them. When they sold the Victory Park Resort to the Starners, the cabs were part of the deal.

About 1977, Matt Parker who is now the dockmaster for Miller Boat Line at Catawba and David Bianchi who now also works for Miller Boat Line partnered up to run Rock Cab. They used their personal vehicles, a 1964 4-door Buick Electra and a 1959 Mercury, to haul passengers anywhere on the island for a dollar per head. Matt said a bad day was \$45, but their highest was about \$350, except for one day when Skip closed up bus service to the Lime Kiln early. Matt says he raked in \$720 from one cab that day That's the equivalent of \$3200 today. A couple of the Rock Cab drivers were Jeff Bykowski and Howard Martens. Matt and David's competition was a short-lived cab operation run by Skip Duggan. Matt and David bought out Skip's operation, but Rock Cab was also doomed to be short-lived thanks to a little too much partying according to Matt. By the way, Rock Cab operated out of what is now Chris Krueger's Surf Shop next to Mojito Bay.

Dick Dysert and his partner, Ivy, started Put-in-Bay Taxi Co. in 1978. He used a fleet of yellow-painted vans with a professional-looking logo. One of Dick's memorable drivers was "Big John." He was well-known by the islanders and garnered their support for his dream of canoeing via the nation's waterways from Lake Erie to the Gulf of Mexico. There were fundraisers for his trip, but once he left, the trip quickly became a bust due to John being extremely overweight and out of shape. Dick sold what is now the oldest-existing cab company on the island to Larry Kowalski who runs year-round transporting people, hauling mailing between the post office and airport, plus transporting the kids and teachers who fly into Put-in-Bay for school from the other islands.

Roy Steunenberg came to the island in 1997 after running a cab company on the mainland for a couple of years. He started Northcoast Cab which still operates today, but it is now owned by another party. Mary, Roy's widow, has been driving cabs on the island for 22 years and says she's got lots of tales to tell about her experiences.


The late Stan Snider also operated a cab company. In those days almost 20 years ago, the fare was \$2 a head and competition was fierce as other cab companies started up. Other memorable owner/drivers were John Pleva, Dave Washtock, Bruce Burkett and Brian Cultice. Today, Paul Jeris, owner of Island Club Taxis, is the oldest, original owner operating today.

For many years the taxis thrived because the bars downtown closed at 1 a.m. The bars outside of town stayed open until 2:30 a.m. for those whose thirst wasn't quite quenched.

Late night runs to the Castle Inn until it burned, Dailey's Tavern, and later to the Skyway until it closed were lucrative runs. "Late Nite" at the Skyway would see the cabs lined up out to Airport Rd at times when the bar closed. Once the bars started staying open downtown, those late night runs became trips back to the burgeoning number of outof-town accommodations like the Island Club.

REGULATION

Taxi owners were making the bulk of their money on the weekends, but problems came when drivers were bringing vans over from the mainland to compete for the big bucks. Drivers were found sleeping in their vans and then would leave the island once the weekend was over, while those who had a vested interest in the island struggled during the week. There were other complaints, too, and eventually the Village of Put-in-Bay decided it needed to pass an ordinances which had mandatory rules and regulations, including a limited number of taxi licenses that could be issued. Lawmakers took some time to pass taxi legislation, but eventually the problems were pretty much solved. The legislation requires background checks for drivers. insurance coverage, cleanliness of cabs and size of cabs and number of passengers, among many other things. The ordinance has been the law for the last

Today there are eight taxi companies with 36 cabs servicing the island - Put-in-Bay Taxi Co., Checker, Monumental Productions, Island Club Taxi, Put-in-Bay Condo Taxi, North Coast Cab Co. and new this year Coop's Cab and Tony's Taxi. Competition is still stiff which is obvious if you've ever

gotten off the ferry at the Lime Kiln and seen all the cabs lined up. As one operator recently said, there have been more than ten cab companies that have come and gone in the last several years.

Last month's public hearing at the Town Hall was to determine if fewer or more than 36 cabs should be licensed to operate on the island. During the testimony from those present, it was obvious that the Village's taxi ordinance needs to be amended to clarify some procedural problems.

We couldn't mention every company in this piece, but it does present enough information for the reader to decide whether to make Put-in-Bay great again and return to the good old days.





Monument Opens





St. Paul's Summer Plans St. Paul's vestry gathered for a vestry goal setting retreat at Bellwether Farm Camp, Retreat, and Education Center on Wednesday April 24th. The parish leaders enjoyed seeing the sheep, chickens and a couple of dogs who all live together at the site. The new cabins are ready for summer campers as well as other groups. During the retreat the vestry discussed goals for the next 12 months. In past years there has been a focus on the parish facility renovations and repairs. Now, with everything in good order the vestry hopes to focus the congregations energy and enthusiasm in three areas, St. Paul's will seek to Expand involvement in parish activities. The renovations completed last year will provide space for different types of activities. The intention is to use the facility including the kitchen space for God's glory. The vestry will seek to invite and welcome the community to St. Paul's events and also set a goal to find new ways to reach out to both summer and year around visitors and residents. One of the first Actions to support these goals will be to re-design the parish web page. It has been almost 10 years since it received the last major renovation so it is time to get a face lift! St. Paul's looks forward to the next few weeks when we will begin to make plans for additional activities.

Summer early bird worship services at 7:45am have appealed to many including those who need to go to work. The 7:45am service will resume on May 19th. Island employees may also find the Wednesday Morning worship is a better fit for their schedules. The 9:30am Wednesday Morning Prayer & Worship service will move to 9:00am in June.

St. Paul's Makes Long Term Plans

On April 28th St. Paul's Vestry and Mother Mary shared some long term plans for St. Paul's during the worship service. Mo. Mary has served as St. Paul's priest-in-charge since August 2010. In the months ahead the parish will initiate a process for the call of another priest to serve the congregation. This process will be different than what is followed in most Episcopal churches since Mo. Mary will remain as the priest serving St. Paul's during most of the search process. This method will provide stability and continuity that is often

lost during the traditional transition process. The good news is there will be stability during this process which is outlined in the recent Letter of Agreement signed by Bishop Hollingsworth, St. Paul's wardens and Mother Mary. The new agreement goes into effect in August 2019 and continues until the next priest is identified.

Although there is no way to anticipate how long this transition process will take, most churches spend 2-3 years on all the steps to call a new rector from the time they begin conversations about transition. St Paul's last transition took almost five years. One of the first steps is for the vestry to prepare a notional timeline and to invite input from members of the congregation

on how they envision ministry at St. Paul's in future. The proposed timeline will be shared with the congregation once it is developed. There is a sense of relief that the congregation can take the time needed to imagine the parish vision for the future. Parishioners will be invited to contribute to this vision. After the parish vision is identified, the vestry will appoint a committee to share the vision with potential candidates, and plan to interview those who are interested in serving this unique island parish. In the Episcopal Church the vestry is responsible for the selection of clergy although all candidates must be approved by the Diocesan Bishop.



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
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"Make it Happen Captain....

The Pelee Passage, the Lake Erie waters between Point Pelee on the Canadian mainland and Pelee Island northwest of the Bass Islands, is storied water. It is one of the more tricky passages in the Great Lakes. During peak shipping season, several Lake Freighters run through every hour. That is a lot of tonnage passing through Lake Erie just north of the Lake Erie Islands.

I asked retired Interlake Steam Ship Captain Russ Brohl what would happen if I had engine failure or ran out of gas in the Pelee passage.

Would my Yamaha Jet Ski show up on an oar boat's radar or would a 1,500-ft. lake vessel filled with iron ore run

"If the crew sees you they can avoid you. We used to dodge fishing boats all the time in the Pelee passage. You would never be run down by a 1,500-ft. ore boat."

"Good to know," I said.
"There are no 1,500-ft. vessels on the Great Lakes. You might get run down by a 1,013-ft. ore boat. In the Soo canal our vessels can't exceed 1,013 feet. There are 110 feet of width in the canal. Your largest boat is 105 feet wide, giving you clearance of 2.5 feet on each side. So, Genius, how many clear feet length wise in a lock?" "Lots?" I said.

"1,200 feet, clear."

"Good to know," I said.

"Now the question is, will the freighter crew see you if you are stalled in front of them? A Yamaha Jet Ski is fiberglass, has low angles of deflection, and has a low boat aspect to radar ratio. If it is a windy day and there is a lot of sheet clutter (waves), the radar will not pick you up. So the crew needs to see you visually.

They are normally good at spotting pleasure craft but if they have been drinking in Cleveland the night before and fought with their girlfriends, wives, or both, watch out. They are hung over and don't give a crap.

"So, a 1,013-ft. ore boat is pretty nimble?"

"No, it is like trying to steer a pig down Euclid Avenue in Cleveland with a tooth pick." Russ took a long pull from a bottle of Great Lakes Brewing Dortmunder.

Why does the word Dortmunder invoke imagery of a shipwreck in my mind, I thought?

Russ continued, "The pilot house is 900 feet from the bow, your line of sight is 1,500 feet beyond the bow. You have a blind spot of 1,500 feet."

"Good to know," I said.

"If you are really worried about staying visible you can buy radar reflectors from West Marine. Or, go old school. Buy a roll of tin foil from Bassett's market and unravel it. The worst they can get you for is littering.'

Good to know

"You let me know the day. I will tell them to watch out

"Would you?"

"Maybe you could teach me how to do signal flags." Russ continued. "The Pelee passage is a dangerous pas-

Navigable water narrows to about 10 miles between Point Pelee and Pelee Island. The wind funnels there during storms. A big ore boat has a tremendous amount of surface area. Roughly, 1,013' length X 22' of freeboard equals 22,000 square feet (loaded) of surface area.

The wind loves to play havoc with large boats in narrow

'Canadian vessels have an easier time of it. Most Canadians are 740 feet max and have a 78-ft. width so they can pass through the Welland canal and access the St. Lawrence Seaway to the Atlantic. 70% of the American flagged Lakers are land locked by the Welland."

You drove the equivalent of a 1,013-ft. floating dump truck for 30 years." I said looking up from my notes. "Yes, you could say that. And I never got a DUI."

"However, I was involved in a hit and run. We were waiting at the mouth of the Detroit River for three saltwater freighters, south bound, to clear in a heavy fog. It was December and they were trying to beat it out to the Atlantic before the Welland Canal closed for the season.

One of the boats turned east too soon and glanced off us. A few bent frames but nothing below the waterline. We hailed them but they never responded. The Coast guard caught them at the Welland Canal, just west of Niagara Falls.'

Not a clean getaway?

"Where do you hide a 730-ft. saltwater vessel? I have to go.'

He took a final pull from his bottle and exited Topsy Turvey's Bar.

The retired ship's captain, once king of the Great Lakes, headed home to cut his lawn.
Russ's parting words, "There is a good chance the bow

wake would push to the side if you weren't seen. On the other hand you might get sucked under..."

I left Topsy Turvey's, fired up my Jet Ski and headed

for Learnington, Ontario confident in the knowledge that if I encountered engine trouble in the Pelee Passage I had a 50% chance that I would not get killed.

Percy Bysshe Shelley wrote in his essay, A Defense of Poetry, that "...poets are the unacknowledged legislators of the world..."

Great Lakes ship captains like Russ Brohl are the unacknowledged legislators of the world...not only could Russ circumnavigate the globe in a freighter, he is really good at yard work. Most importantly, his command had survived the Pelee passage for 30 years without incident.



Community Swim Sail

The Put-in-Bay Community Swim Sail (PIBCSS program includes swimming and sailing lessons for students aged 4 to 18*. Younger children will learn swimming skills and safety, while older students will learn boat handling, sailing, and water safety.

Costs for swimming classes (both youth and endurance) are \$105 per child. Costs for sailing classes (8 years and older as of August 1st) are \$510 with options to add evening endurance and/ or race team participation for an additional fee.

Each student in the Swimming Program will be placed in a level that is appropriate to their swimming ability. This will be deterpre-test that will occur the first few days that Swimming Program starts in June.

For those who want to learn how to sail, there is a program for that. Various classes and levels are designed for those who are curious about sailboat racing or interested in joining the Race Team down the line. Students will sail Optimists and/or 420s. The primary focus of the class will be basic racing skills and tactics. In order to be eligible for this class, sailors must have at least 1 year of sailing expe-

SOS stands for Start Opti Sailing. This will be a one-week program for children aged 5 to 7 who will eventually be part of the

goal of this class is to get kids comfortable with the water, sailboats, and learn some sailing and water safety basics. They will not actually be sailing. Many other yacht clubs have similar programs, and we believe this is a great way to introduce the sport to our future sailors.

PUT-IN-BAY SCHOOL





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

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The First Boat Trip Across Lake **Erie in 1669** By Michael Gora

It's time to celebrate the 350th anniversary this year of the first boat trip across Lake Erie, and the first appearance of the Lake Erie Islands on a map. The trip continued on to the northernmost points of Lake Huron, a trip made by canoe. The French priests Dollier and Galinée accomplished this in 1669-1670. Even though Rene Robert Cavelier de la Salle and Father Louis Hennepin are often regarded as the first explorers to navigate Lake Erie, Lake Huron and Lake Michigan, in 1679, and the first to produce a map naming Lake Erie with its current name. Both of those claims are

The Griffon built by de la Salle was in fact the first sailing ship to navigate Lake Erie and the upper lakes, but Francois Dollier de Casson and René de Bréhant de Galinée navigated the entire length of Lake Erie, near the north shore, in canoes in 1669 and 1670 and continued on to the northwest tips of Lake Huron at Sault Ste. Marie and also Mackinac Island. Their map is the very first showing the Lake Erie Islands. In 1669, Adrien Jolliet (this is the French spelling - in English it is usually Joliet) had traversed the north shore west to east by land. That year two Sulpician priests, Dollier and Galinée, met Jolliet who told them of his passage along the lake and they planned their own trip.

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We will never know for certain which explorers first discovered Lake Erie, but we are reasonably certain that all the other Great Lakes were discovered earlier, because they appear on maps before Lake Erie does. Lake Erie itself first appears quite accurately on the 1650 Sanson map of the New World beside the label "N. (Nation) du Chat" and subsequently on Sanson's 1656 map as "Erie ou du Chat". It appears for the third time on the 1660 Du Creux Map in Latin as "LACUS ERIUS seu FELIS". The word Chat or Cat refers to the Cat Tribe of Indians on part of the south shore of Lake Erie. There is an earlier map, the 1643 map by Jean Boisseau, that shows a tiny "Lac Derie" but this map is so grossly inaccurate that it can't be considered a decent map of Lake Erie. The name Erie is generally thought to come from the American Indian tribe of this name, and the name Erie means "long tail" as well as "cat". The tribe is thought to come from the

Iroquoian branch ethnically, and from Hokan-Siouan stock linguistically, and lived on the south side of the lake.

After those first four maps showing Lake Erie, the 1669 Galinée Map is the first to show the Lake Erie Islands, even though they just appear as tiny specks at the bottom. The copy of the map shown here is a small piece of a bigger map

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
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> of the trip, but all known copies are tracings of the original which disappeared in the second half of the 19th century.

Lake Erie walleye limit to be increased for 2020

Here's some great news for walleye fishermen! For the March 1 through April 30 period next year, the walleye bag limit will increase from four fish to six fish daily in the Ohio waters of Lake Erie, including the Maumee River. In the Sandusky River, the four fish daily bag limit will remain in place



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PIB Police Department receives funds from law enforcement program

On Thursday, February 14, 2019, the Put-in-Bay Police Department was awarded \$4,263.00 to purchase body armor for their officers as part of the recently announced Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program.

The Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program was created to help Ohio's local law enforcement agencies to purchase body armor vests. In June 2018, the Ohio Bureau of Workers' Compensation announced that it would dedicate a portion of safety grants to prevent injuries and fatalities among law enforcement officers. Under an agreement between the Attorney General and BWC, the Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program will be eligible for these funds through June 2019. Ohio's law enforcement agencies can apply for the program through an application form on the Ohio Law Enforcement Gateway (OHLEG) website.

We filled out the forms, submitted them, and received the acceptance letter fairly quickly," stated Chief Steve Riddle, Put-in-Bay Police Department. "After the Ottawa County Safety Council told us about the program and how to apply, we contacted OHLEG. The time frame is about one month." The Village of Put-in-Bay is a member of the Ottawa County Safety Council.

Recently, BWC Administrator/CEO Stephanie McCloud, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine, and State Attorney General Dave Yost recently announced an additional \$500,000 to fund the Attorney General's Ohio Law Enforcement Body Armor Program. This is on top of an initial \$2 million previously announced for fiscal year

Village Council Notes

The Put-in-Bay Village Council met twice in April, first at its workshop meeting on Wednesday, April 3rd, and on Wednesday, April 17th, for its regular meeting. The Council also held a public hearing in April to hear comments on the number of taxis which should be licensed to operate on the

Council passed an amended Pedicab ordinance, but did not pass the map which is required to limit the route of such vehicles. That was sent to committee for further consideration once members of Council realized the route did not include most of the major streets in the Village.

A temporary moratorium on roving entertainment businesses was passed. The ordinance addressed businesses like the karaoke golf cart that applied to operate in the Village

A "Small Cell Design Guidelines" ordinance had its second of three readings, plus there was a third and final reading of an ordinance which authorizes internet auctions of surplus Village property.

One of the bills which was authorized to be paid was one for Walter-Haverfield in the amount of \$54,220.31 for the period December 2018 through February 2019. This is the legal firm which provides legal service for the Village and the Planning Commission.

2019 BUSINESS LICENSES

Tony White has received a business license to operate a taxi company. Jeff Jankowski has applied for a business license to bring "E-Bikes" to the Island, primarily to give tours around the island. The Mayor and the Fiscal Officer will review Mr. Jankowski's business license. A fixed location was missing from the application; making it incomplete.

LAKE ERIE LOVE SIGN:

Council approved the installation of a 4-ft. by 13-ft. "Lake Erie Love" sign along the lake front by the city docks. The sign is not only an advertisement for the visitors bureau, but when installed, will also be a photo opportunity loca-

VILLAGE HOUSING

Approval was given for the installation hookup for TV and wifi for the police housing at the Fredrick's House. The money will be paid out of the general fund. Any monthly charges that are incurred will be tenant's responsibility. Mayor Dress started a discussion of Employee Housing Agreements and Rent per unit. Both were referred to Property/Town Hall Committee for further review.

MERGER COMMISSION

Legal counsel was directed to review process for creating a Merger Commission which would look into establishing one government entity for the islands. Councilman Kelly Faris has been recommending this for some time now. Voters would have to vote on establishing a commission unless both the Township and the Village would agree to establish one. The commission would consist of five people from the Village and five people from the Township who would look into the issues. After the commission has finished its work, the voters would determine if the two island governments would merge into one.

Approve was given for the purchase of flags for the Village in the amount of \$1,207.00. These Village burgee flags have been sold at the Village in the past. Retail outlets have also sold them before. An inventory will be needed to be taken on how many flags are in stock. The Fiscal Officer will take inventory, contact manufacturer, and present council with quote at the May meeting.

WARNING SIGNS

Approval was given for the purchase of 75 electrical shock warning stickers for the Village's A and C Docks. DeRiviera Park is interested in purchasing 25 from the Village for their own "B" Dock. The total amount would be \$129.75

ZONING BOARD

Councilman Boyles will remain on the Planning Commission Board.

There was a discussion at one of the April meetings about extending sewer into areas of the village that currently do not have sewer access. Council was assured that the current sewage treatment plant could easily handle not only the homes in the village, but also many homes in the township portion of the island. One of the interesting options for the Village is to allow low-pressure systems rather than gravity sewer lines.

There was also a discussion about properties on Detroit Ave. tying into the sewer system which serviced the Morgan Park Subdivision on East Point.

Council also approved the payment of \$20,000 to the EPA for the utility violation fines which were assessed last summer before new management came in and began working on turning things around at the water treatment plant.

Mayor Dress recommended a pay raise for Mr. Jaime Mendoza, the Village's water treatment plant operator..

FROM THE VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR

Council granted Put-in-Bay School a temporary easement; up to 180 days; to be drafted by legal counsel, for the specific purpose of moving tree trimming and lawn mowing equipment to a rear portion of the Frederick property which they purchased from the Village.

Anne Auger will be meeting with John Galvin John Galvin from DeRivera Park and Barb Hunter from the Garden Club to discuss the future of the Bathing Beach and the flower baskets and planting in the downtown park.

The Village Dock Committee will come up with a revision of the dockage rates. Last year, the city docks took in \$60,000 less than the previous summer.

At the water treatment plant, the Ozone project is underway. Kirk Brothers have completed a sight survey, Poggemeyer Design Group, the Village engineers, has staked the property. The EPA will be coming out to the island to check progress of project. All parties are aware of a timeline that has been established for the completion of the project.

The administrator requested the approval of council to donate an unused junk vehicle at Utilities Department to the Fire Department for training purposes. Legal Counsel will draw up a resolution declaring the vehicle unfit and/or obsolete.

POSSIBLE PARKING /TRAFFIC CHANGES

Councilman. Faris has proposed removing the yellow parking curbs on Delaware Ave. between Toledo Ave. and the bathing beach, plus changing Delaware to one way. These topics were referred to the Rules and Ordinance Committee to review and revise. The committee met several days later.

FISCAL OFFICER

The Fiscal Officer Courtney Blumensaadt gave dockage receipts and why there are discrepancies in cash and credit card totals. She is also working on better collections of the Resort Tax

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Legal counsel requests council to enter into Executive Session for the discussion of Pending and Threatened Litiga-

ADVERTISING POSITION

Mr. Boyles requested that the Village advertise for the Village Administrator Position. Anne Auger is currently the acting Village Administrator, the position she has held for the last several months. It is up to the mayor to bring a candidate to the Council for its approval.

Bell Choir Rings Out

The young bell choir at St. Paul's continues to perfect their skills. In May they plan to share their skills with the members of American Legion Post 542 during their monthly meeting. In March, they played in the Talent show and in April they played on Palm Sunday in the church. For Palm Sunday they played during the congregation's response to the Prayers of the People. The words to the response was written by Archbishop Tutu: "Goodness is stronger than evil. Love is stronger than hate. Light is stronger than darkness. Life is stronger than death." The bell choir will conclude their practices in May, but plan to resume in the fall. St. Paul's Bible Explorers will also conclude their activities in May.







Fish and get college credit

Ohio State University offers a lot of interesting courses each summer at Stone Laboratory at Put-in-Bay that students can take to learn more about biology, zoology, natural resources, or even pre-medical requirements.

Among the popular courses are Limnology (study of inland waters), Ichthyology (study of fish), Field Zoology (study of animals) and Herpetology (study of reptiles and amphibians).

One of their most unique classes — Lake Erie Sport Fishing — is one of the most interesting of the classes.

The two-semester-hour Lake Erie Sport Fishing course is scheduled to run from June 3rd to 9th. It combines extensive on-water training in fishing techniques with classroom sessions to teach anglers how to increase fishing success by understanding fish ecology and behavior.

Students will be taught to use GPS, sonar and internet resources; learn to rig and operate popular styles of fishing gear such as diving planers and side planer boards; and learn sonar structure fishing.

The course's daily field trips will feature drifting and casting and trolling for walleyes; structure fishing for small mouth bass; searching for open water white bass and anchoring for yellow perch. Evening lectures, lure-making sessions and rowboat fishing in Put-in-Bay Harbor

Housing and tuition rates apply. Stone Laboratory is open to college students from any educational institution.

A three-day, non-credit Sport Fishing Workshop is being offered May 17th through 19th for \$450. It includes housing and meals on Gibraltar

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

Commander ...Ahoy! by Paul Bolden,

I AM BACK ON THE ISLAND! Finally it's that time of year again...Boating Season! After one long hard Winter (for those of us who didn't head south), it's time to get things thawed out and shipshape. One of the keys to safe boating is making

sure that your vessel is seaworthy and compliant with current boating laws governing the Great Lakes (where I presume that most of us do our boating). I STRONGLY, STRONGLY urge that you have a vessel exam (called a Vessel Safety Check) performed by the USCG-AUX before you head out on to the water this season.
NOT A LAW ENFORCEMENT ACTION

Vessel Safety Checks performed by the Coast Guard Auxiliary ARE NOT a law enforcement action and you WILL NOT be cited if your vessel should happen to fail. Rather, these courtesy checks give you an opportunity to correct any issues or violations in advance of being stopped and perhaps fined by the Coast Guard while you are underway. If you do pass our safety check, you will receive a window decal to be affixed to your vessel alerting the Coast Guard that you have been inspected and perhaps averting a boarding. PIB RESIDENTS CAN CALL ME

I am officially back on the Island from now through October and I'm available to personally inspect your vessel free of charge. The best way to reach me is via email: paulbolden.uscgaux@gmail.com.

You can also call me at 419-379-9000 stating your name, your phone number, that you're at Put-in-Bay and would like to have a Vessel Safety Check.

HOW TO PASS A VESSEL INSPECTION (VSC)

PART 1 OF 3

In this three part series, we are going to cover everything needed for PIB residents to pass a Vessel Safety Check (VSC). By understanding the examination requirements in advance, it is much more likely that your boat (or jet ski, etc) will pass the inspection which will also make the job a lot easier on the vessel examiner. Lets get started

1) Registration. Make sure that the correct vessel registration is on board and is current. In addition to a valid date, the vessel's state registration numbers, and hull identification number must match the

registration document exactly.
FOR DOCUMENTED VESSELS: Documentation numbers must be permanently marked on a visible part of the interior structure. The documented boat's name and hailing port must be displayed on the exterior hull in letters not less than 4 inches in height.

You would be surprised at the number of people that I've encountered who can't produce their boat registration or not even sure which document it is. Not producing the correct documentation has us off to a bad start and it's usually downhill from there. PLEASE have your correct documentation on board.

2) Display of Numbers. This is the number one violation that I see around PIB. Numbers must be permanently attached to each side of the forward half of the vessel. The numbers must be read from left to right, and of a color that is contrasting with the background color; for example, black numbers on a white hull. Lettering must be in plain, vertical block characters of not less than 3 inches in height. Spaces or hyphens between letter and number groupings must be equal to the width of a letter other than "I" or a number other than "1." The validation stickers must be affixed within six inches of the registration numbers.

NOTE: The letters/numbers should be a plain block font like "Ariel" not cursive, swirly or otherwise. The letters/numbers should not be multiple colors, fancy fadings, shadows or outlines. Caution: Even though there are local stores willing to sell you these types of lettering does not make it legal to display on your vessel.

3) Personal Flotation Devices. The USCG requires that there be a USCG approved PFD (in good condition) on board for each passenger. Vessels 16' - 65' must also carry a Type IV throwable device such as a cushion or ring buoy. Children must have a PFD suitable for their size. In the state of Ohio, children under the age of 10 must be wearing their PFD while on board vessels 18' or less.

4) Visual Distress Signals. Here are the basics. For vessels less than 16' distress signals are only required when operating between sunset and sunrise. 3 combination day/night red flares or 1 electric distress light are required. For vessels 16' or longer you are required to have 3 handheld or floating orange smoke signals and 3 night flares or 3 combination day/night flares, hand-held, meteor or parachute type or 1 orange distress flag and 1 electric distress light or 3 handheld or floating orange smoke signals and one electric distress light or flare gun with 3 day/night cartridges. NOTE: Make sure that your flares are not

There are other combinations possible. If you have any questions contact the USCG-AUX at 419-379-9000.

5) Fire Extinguishers. Fire extinguishers are required if one of the following conditions exists:

(1) Inboard engine(s); (2) Closed compartments that store portable fuel tanks; (3) Double bottom hulls not completely sealed or not completely filled with flotation materials (4) Closed living space (5) Closed stowage compartments that contain flammable materials or (6)

Permanently installed fuel tanks.

Power vessels <26' or are required to have 1 B-I fire extinguisher. Power vessels 26' to <40 are required to have 2 B-1 or 1 B-2 extinguishers. Power vessels 40' to 65' are required to have 3 B-1 or 1 B-1 and 1 B-2 extinguishers. The fire extinguisher gauge should be in the green and the unit should not be more than 10 years old. A 2-digit date is often stamped on the bottom of the extinguisher. A fixed system such as "Halon" replaces 1 B-1 extinguisher. Make sure that your fixed system's maintenance requirements are current and that the proper maintenance certificate is properly affixed.

6) VENTILATION: Boats with gasoline engines in closed compartments, built after 1 August 1980 must have a powered ventilation system. Those built prior to that date must have natural or powered ventilation. The ventilation system is designed to remove potentially dangerous fumes.

Usually to the aft starboard and port are the intake and exhaust vents. Turn on your exhaust and place your hand over the exhaust port and make sure that it is blowing air out.

ADDITIONALLY: Boats with closed fuel tank compartments built after 1 August 1978 must meet requirements by displaying a "certificate of compliance." Boats built before that date must have either natural or powered ventilation in the fuel tank compartment. Outboard equipped vessels are exempt.

7) Backfire Flame Control. Called a Flame Arrestor needs to be clean and oil free. HINT: The arrestor is situated on top of the carburetor and held in place by a single nut. Outboard and

Diesel engines are exempt.

8) Sound Producing Device. This one is simple. All vessels to 65' are required to have a sounding device such as an installed boat horn, whistle or air horn, etc. capable of a 4-second blast audible for ½ mile. Vessels 65' feet or more in length are required to carry a whistle or horn and a bell that are audible for 1 mile.

9) Navigation Lights. All boats must be able to display navigation lights between sunset and sunrise and in conditions of reduced visibility. Boats 16 feet or more in length must have properly installed, working navigation lights and an all-around anchor light capable of being lit independently from the red/green/white "running" lights.

NEXT MONTH

Next month, part two of this series will cover Pollution Placards, Marpol Placards, Navigation Rules, State and Local requirements and overall vessel condition. Lets make this boating season on the waters around PIB safe and accident free.

At first I thought I was dreaming, but then I heard it again. I opened my eyes, the morning sky was just beginning to brighten, but the sound was unmistakable; a chirping bird. It was the first one of the season, perhaps up early to find a juicy worm, maybe build a nest in the big pine by the shed, or possibly searching for a mate to share some springtime romance, or perhaps to remind me that it is time to head for the island, another cottage season was about to begin. It was mid-March, on the mainland the landscape was cool, gray, soggy, gloomy. I had already started to gather supplies for my first trip. I was anxious to get started – but I knew not to risk going up too early – a Spring freeze, frozen pipes, the cold lake winds, and with the unusually high water levels, the possibility of being stranded for a few days in the cold cottage.

But as I sat on the edge of the bed looking out into the back yard, the chirping continued. It's time to go, like Christmas Eve, a flurry of anticipation, excitement, and in the end, something magical. Like a 7-year-old, I jumped up and sprung to action. First, I studied the weather forecasts, radar images, and satellite maps; searching for a window of opportunity to make my first trip – soon, I had a plan.

This year, I had some extra work to do before turning on the water – lots of new pieces and parts for the well, now spread across a large table in the basement, a new toilet for the upstairs bathroom, a new faucet for the kitchen sink – all this in addition to the usual routine of leaves, gutters, windows, and more. I hoped to have a day and a half of decent weather to make the trip and get my first wave of projects completed.

Over the next few days, as the birds continued to call my name, I packed, prepared, and finally, planned my escape. My "weather window" would begin with a warm, sunny day in the 60's, after that, a jumbled mix of typical northern Ohio gloom, anything goes. I was off!

I boarded the 9:30 ferry. It was chilly, but comfortable, I hoped to have running water by the end of the day. By about 4:00, I primed the pump and hoped for the best – the sun popped out from behind the clouds – I peeled off my sweatshirt. Perhaps this unexpected burst of warmth and brightness is a good omen. Water flowed and I quickly found a few small leaks in some of my new connections – but within a few minutes I was able to tighten things up and was ready to try again. I opened the cold water valve to fill the hot water tank and let pressure build into the cottage. My tired body ached as I scampered inside to check for leaks. Everything seemed good as I opened the hot water valve and again ran inside.

I heard water running as I first stepped into the kitchen, but the faucet was off – what was

I hearing? Moving to the center of the cottage now, I stopped and listened. In the bedroom, behind the kitchen wall – I grabbed the heavy bunk bed and pulled it away from the wall. Water was everywhere! Fortunately, a nearby valve allowed me to turn off the gusher – apparently, an old fitting had corroded – a flood!

Now, tired, creaky, a little cranky, I had to repair the pipe, pull the water-soaked rug out of the room, move furniture, and mop up the mess. Soon, the carpet was stretched out in the late-day sun, the broken pipe repaired, and Larry was in the old green chair by the lake, reflecting on a full day, feeling good, satisfied, at home.

The next day arrived quickly, with cooler temperatures, the adventure continued. My body still ached from the bending, lifting, and crawling of Day One; so most of this day would be spent putting away tools and organizing the chaos after yesterday's cyclone of activity. On the third day, I puttered about, chipping away at my list, and enjoying the solitude of a near-deserted West Shore. A cold northwest wind chased me inside. I was ready for an early bedtime.

I heard the waves crash all through the night, it was just 33 degrees when I climbed out of bed. Outside, the trees and lawn by the shore glistened with a thin coating of ice. The spray from the angry lake began to coat the windows. The cold was expected. I hoped it would not get any colder.

I walked around the cottage. It seemed different, unfamiliar, the frozen landscape outside, occasional squalls of icy snow, the constant pounding of the

waves, the temperature continuing an ominous decent. I began to think of frozen pipes – I stared at the thermometer. I needed a plan. By 9:30, the temperature had dropped to 27°. I ran the water in the bathrooms, in the kitchen, I let the faucet run until I could here the pump kick on at the well. I knew as long as I kept the water moving through the pipes it wouldn't freeze. But how cold would it get?

By noon, I had gained a degree, now 28° and a steady, light snow blew in from the lake. I puttered about, continued to run the water every hour, flushing toilets, showers, and watching the thermometer – 29° by 1:00; 30 at 2:00; 31 at 4:00; 32 at 6:00; and finally, 33°, above freezing, at 8:00! The barometer was slowly rising, the skies were expected to clear, I checked the forecast: How cold would it get overnight? Most of my weather apps predicted overnight lows near 30. Then, I looked at the NWS Marine forecast – low 22°!

My mind raced. Should I shut down the pump and try to drain the pipes now? I sat down, peered out at the lake through the ice covered windows, collecting my thoughts. I've made it this far, almost all day below freezing, stay the course, this is not the time to abandon ship! I made my hourly rounds, running water, checking heaters, making sure the pump cycled on and off. I moved an extra heater into the bathroom, another into the kitchen. Outside, the wind howled; snow bounced off the frozen cottage; the ice on the windows, in the yard, and on the trees thickened.

Bedtime, still 33°. I'll be fine. I turned on a couple faucets, just a drip, enough to keep the water moving. I couldn't sleep. Tossing and turning, listening for water, the heaters, the waves ... finally, I jumped out of bed. Again, I made my rounds, running water, checking the heaters, the pump. I picked up my phone to set the alarm – I will only sleep an hour at a time – through the night I would climb out of bed, make my rounds, check the temperature, and go back to sleep – I slept like a newborn baby, an hour at a time! For most of the night, the thermometer hovered around 33° – the little cottage survived!

Milestones OBITUARY Terry Heidenreich

Skyllay put-in-bay, oh

Islanders were saddened to learn of the passing of Terry Heidenreich on Sunday, April 7th, in St. Petersburg, Florida. Terry operated Terry's Skyway from 1980 to 1998 with a flare and pazazz have been remembered and retold on the island more than 20 years after the business changed hands. Terry was born in Batavia, New York, to parents Harold and Shirley Flattery (McClure) Heidenreich. He was raised in West Seneca, NY, and Rocky River, OH, where he graduated from Rocky River High School in 1972. He headed to Florida where he graduated from St. Petersburg College with degrees in food service and business. In 1978, Terry's father, Harold, and his wife Ann who were Crew's Nest boating members purchased the Doller Estate on Bayview Ave. from John Nissen. Terry would visit them there. Then in 1980, he, his father and step-mother purchased the Skyway and Terry was the obvious choice run it. Among his staff during those early years were Marge Smiley and Dirty Girty. Everyone still remembers how good Terry's sticky buns were. Terry's reputation for outrageous antics endeared himself to his customers and employees. Among the more suitable for print is the story about a birthday party some of the island ladies were having for one of their

friends. As so often was the case, a pre-bought, beautifully decorated cake was brought to the Skyway before dinner and was served for dessert after one of Terry's great dinners. In this particular case when the time came to serve the cake, Terry came out of the kitchen with a big slice already cut out which he proclaimed was his piece. His sister Linda also had a cute story about Terry being stopped by the island police one snowy New Years. When asked why he was driving so erratically, he told the officers he was trying to keep his champagne from spilling. They let him go and sent him on his way. At closing time on a busy night, Terry would often sing with glee "get out, get out, get your butts out - right now!" Bob Gatewood recounted how Terry would stand on the skyway roof at closing time and sing the oldies song Nobody But Me, but instead of singing "no-no-no-no-no no no no." he would sing "go go go go go go go go go!" Amy Huston recalled how one New Year's eve, she was with a group of island girls celebrating at the Skyway. At midnight, Terry poured each of them a glass of champagne, then walked down the barstools kissing each of the girls in turn, right down the line! You never knew what Terry was going to come up with, but you can bet your bottom dollar he was one of those island characters who made people smile and laugh hilariously. While Terry lived in the Doller Estate, he had several spooky experiences. In the middle of the night, he reported he would awake in his bedroom in the older part of the home and there would be an unseen force holding him down on the bed. This would last three or four minutes at a time. His story is told in William Krejci's book, Haunted Put-in-Bay. At the Skyway, Terry could do the things he loved best, cooking, dancing and helping people. After Terry's father died in 1997, the Skyway was sold to Sue and Don Thwaite. Terry spent time in Florida, in both Bonita Springs and St. Petersburg, but eventually gravitated back to the island where he worked summers at the Erie Island Tavern, Mossbacks and most recently at the Put-in-Bay Winery at the Doller Estate which had been owned by the Heidenreich Family for more than 25 years. Terry, who loved to travel, continued to spend his winters in Florida, and one year had a contest with the Scott and Linda Buttrey to see who could take the most cruises. Even though he went on seven cruises, the Buttreys beat him. Many of Terry's employees became his lifelong friends right up until he passed away. As one friend posted on Facebook "Rest In Peace Terry. Thank you for all the laughs and making everyone smile. You will be forever missed." Another post read "Put-in-Bay has

lost another one-of-a-kind. I'm sad to hear about Terry Heidenreich passing away. So many funny stories that make people say, "He really did that??!" RIP Terry!" Terry is survived by stepmother Ann Heidenreich, sister Linda Mansell (Ed), brothers David and Randy, stepbrother John Hillman (Jeanneanne), many nieces and nephews and many great friends on Put-in-Bay. Terry was cremated and there are plans for a party at the Put-in-Bay Winery at the Doller Estate which will be announced at a later date.

An interesting fact about the new HANCOCK WOOD SUBMARINE CABLE – when they pulled up the old cable, there were three dozen anchors stuck to the cable. One lonely ice shanty still sits on the sand at the State Park beach. Optimism is great, but we think the season is officially over.

ELECTIONS

This year is an election year for the MAYOR (Ron Ehrbar) and two COUNCIL persons (currently Mike Feyedelem and Scott Smith). The ballot would normally include the CLERK/TREASURER position (currently held by Claudia Brown) however, at the April Council meeting, after three readings, this position was combined into a new one named the VILLAGE FISCAL OFFICER. The Mayor makes the appointment with Council's approval. The new Fiscal Officer does not need to be a resident of the Island, but must become one within six months of appointment. The ordinance is effective April 1, 2020. Speaking of the elections, rumors are already circulating about who might be running – at last count there were a dozen people in the rumor mill.

DSL/TELECOM UPDATE

People on the west end of the Island began signing up for the FRONTIER DSL \$20 upgrade that promised substantial increased speeds thanks to the booster unit located on Pauline. There are 93 ports available and would free up ports at the Island's central building for new customers. Two additional repeaters will be installed at the other end of the Island this year. UNFORTUNATELY we have just been advised that this service is currently offline and for those who signed up already, they are out of luck as they cannot be switched back to the main station. We are back in the dark ages again. Dial-up anyone?

COUNCIL NOTES

All five of the new recruits to the EMS SQUAD have completed their training and testing and are now certified by the State of Ohio. The FIRE DEPT. has begun training again. A live fire training was scheduled for April 27. Procedures call for substantial prep work to remove hazardous materials before the burn can be permitted by the Ohio EPA. KIFD and KIEMS along with the Danbury Twp. Fire Dept. will work together on this training. Council approved the purchase of a multi gas meter and combustible gas detector and a new thermal imaging device (the old one has been used in every fire we had). Chief Skeans also received approval for the 'I Am Responding' phone app which will streamline and coordinate responses. The POLICE DEPT. will hold an Active Shooter Training exercise at the school on May 19 at 11:00 am. Expect some rerouting as our Safety Services respond, treating this as an actual emergency. Chief Craig received permission to secure a grant for bullet proof vests (the Village cost is just 10% of the total

Rates at the TRANSFER STATION will be going up; the last increase was in 2005. On the list of improvements that are needed is the paving or improving of the road access to the Transfer Station. The Antenna people (McKay) have offered a nice donation for this project. RECYCLING is, once again, off the table; the costs being too high to justify a program.

Historic Kelley's Hall will be getting some upgrades too, including replacing the ceiling lights with energy saving lights and ceiling fans to circulate the warm air, particularly in the winter. The Village will be taking advantage of some rebates for the project. Tom Pieratt was appointed to the Park Board; Debra Haig and Erie Longbrake are appointed to the BZA; and Ron Doe to the Refuse Board.



Book documents Camp Perry POW camp during WWII

During World War II, more than six thousand prisoners of war resided at Camp Perry west of the islands on the mainland and its branch camps at Columbus, Rossford, Cambridge, Celina, Bowling Green, Definance, Marion, Parma and Wilmington, Ohio. Island summer home owner Dr. Jim Van Keuren has written a fascinating book about the camps drawing on first-person accounts from soldiers, former POWs and residents, as well as archival research, to delve into the neglected history of Ohio's POW camps.

From the start, the camps were a study in contradictions. The Italian prisoners who arrived first charmed locals with their affable, easygoing natures, while their German successors often put on a serious, intractable front. Some local residents fondly recall working alongside the prisoners and reuniting with them later in life. Others held the prisoners in disdain, feeling they were coddled while natives struggled with day-to-day needs.

Although islanders weren't concerned with the POW camp at Camp Perry, they did have to contend with years of the artillery testing that took place. Ask anyone who lived on the islands years ago, and they can tell you about hearing the guns and the shaking of windows here on South Bass when the tests were conducted.

Jim and his wife, Pat, have had a cottage on the island for many years, and for a time, had shops at Harbor Square.

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




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This & That
