Indictments come down after year-ago raids

Put-in-Bay village mayor Mack McCann, 82, his son, councilman Michael McCann, and his daughter, former village council president Melinda McCann Myers, are facing multiple conflict of interest charges following a year-long investigation. Also indicted this past month is former village clerk/treasurer Kelly Niese.

The mayor was indicted on six counts, two felonies and four misdemeanors. According to the indictment, McCann's charges stem from incidents that occurred on approximately May 2, 2016 and January 21, 2017. The two felony violations fall under ORC Section 2921.42(A)(1) which reads, "2921.42 Having an unlawful interest in a public contract. (A) No public official shall knowingly do any of the following: (1) Authorize, or employ the authority or influence of the public official's office to secure authorization of any public contract in which the public official, a member of the public official's family, or any of the public official's business associates has an interest." The four misdemeanors are of Section 102.03(D) and 102.03(E) Representation by present or former public official or employee prohibited, and read "(D) No public official or employee shall use or authorize the use of the authority or influence of office or employment to secure anything of value or the promise or offer of anything of value that is of such a character as to manifest a substantial and improper influence upon the public official or employee with respect to that person's duties. (E) No public official or employee shall solicit or accept anything of value that is of such a character as to manifest a substantial and improper influence upon the public official or employee with respect to that person's duties." McCann was charged for alledgedly using his position to secure waterline contracts for a business associate. Mayor McCann plead not guilty and a

jury trial has been set for January 15th, 2019, in Ottawa County Common Pleas Court

The Ohio Attorney General's Office filed a notice with the Ohio Supreme Court on October 30th to begin suspension hearings for McCann. This is mandatory under Ohio law. The process can take anywhere from anywhere from a few weeks to a few months and can be contested. If suspended from his mayoral duties, McCann would continue to receive compensation from the Village.

Attorney John McCaffrey reportedly emailed a statement on behalf of Mayor McCann to the Sandusky Register which read:


"The conduct at issue concerns separate contracts the village of Put-in-Bay entered into with PIB Investments. One contract involved work on the Victory Avenue water line, while the other involved the repair and installation of a manhole on Delaware Avenue," an excerpt from the statement reads. "Mayor McCann, and no member of Mayor McCann's family, has any business interest in PIB Investments ... We strongly disagree with the state's interpretation and application of the facts to the charged offenses."

Both projects were approved by a vote of the Village Council. Councilman Jeff Koehler said they were approved because PIB Investments was the only company on the island that had the

Some islanders attended weddings and rehearsal dinners in October, where the food was plentiful, to say nothing


about the drink. Mind you, this was pretty much gratis!

Village Council News

Put-in-Bay Village Council dealt with several issues in recent weeks. One of the first decisions was to make Anne Auger the acting Village Administrator since Glenn Basting was off on medical leave. Shortly afterwards, the Village Council voted to remove Basting from the position permanently. No specific cause was given, but under Basting's tenure, the Put-in-Bay Water Dept. received multiple violations from the EPA.

To help with the Water Dept.'s situation, Council voted to hire Mr. Darrel Blanchard, a Class IV operator with years of experience to help correct the EPA violation issues. Good progress has been made in doing so. Later in the month it also hired back Dave Dezeeuw, the water department's former operator. Dave has the Class III license needed to be the operator of record for the plant. Council also approved hiring former Village Administrator Doug Knauer on an as-needed basis to work on the sewer impact fees and fill in at the water plant

A zoning request from Tracy Schork to rezone her property on Doller Ave. to heavy

commercial was not approved by Council.

PIB Police Chief Steve Riddle requested promotions and salary increases for some of his officers. He is looking for a replacement for officer Woodside who recently announced he

would be leaving the department for a position on the mainland.
Council allocated \$160 for Wreaths Across American which is a program putting wreaths on the grave sites of veterans in all the islands' cemeteries.

Shipwreck could be oldest found in Lake Erie

Shipwreck hunters believe a discovery made off Kelleys Island in 2015 may be the Lake Serpent, a ship which went down in 1829 while making a voyage from the islands to Cleveland. Dives over the last couple of years, plus the researching of historic records have led to this conclusion.

The Lake Serpent was built in Cleveland in 1821. The Lake Serpent carried cargo for eight years until it sank in late September or early October 1829. It is unknown what caused the ship to sink, but some experts believe it may have been the result of a bad storm. If this is true, the wreckage is the oldest ever found in the shallowest of the Great

On October 8, 1829, the Cleveland Weekly Herald reported that the Lake Serpent had left four weeks earlier to get stone from Put-In-Bay on the lake's South Bass Island. This is rather interesting, because there is nothing in the history books about stone being quarried on Put-in-Bay. It may be more likely that the stone was loaded from Kelleys Island. Exact knowledge of where the ship went down when it was returning to Cleveland might give clues as to where the ship was coming from

In any case, the size of the wreck, the stone cargo, and what appears to be a carving at the ship's bow all point to it being Lake Serpent. Historical records show the ship had a serpent's head carved near the front — an unusual feature for a vessel of that era.

It was also reported that the bodies of the vessel's captain and his brother, Ezra and

Robert Wright, washed ashore in Lorain County, Ohio in the first week of October 1829.

equipment to do the work, the job was cost effective for the community, plus the work could be completed before the busy season began.

Michael McCann, 54, was charged with four counts and Myers, 52, was charged with six counts, all first-degree misdemeanors, in Ottawa County Municipal Court. Both are alleged to have violated Ohio law regarding prohibited representation by public officials - Michael in February 2014 and May 2016, and Melinda in October 2015 and twice in May 2016. These are the same misdemeanors sections Mayor McCann was charged with, but it is unknown what the violations details actually involve. In a joint statement Melinda and Michael disputed and strongly disagreed with the State's characterization of their conduct while serving on Village Council. The statement read, "They await the opportunity to properly explain the appropriateness of their actions and defend against the allegations of misconduct.

Kelly Niese, 49, the village's former fiscal officer, was charged with theft in office and grand theft, both felonies. Niese allegedly disbursed village funds to herself without an authorization from village council, according to the Ohio Attorney General's Office. She was replaced by Coun-



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Cell Service & High Speed Internet Update

Technology is great! There are more people than ever using the Internet and cell phones, and that includes those of us on the island. Among those at the Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce meeting to help with islander Internet needs were Tom LaPlante and Bruce Sundman from Megabits, LLC, who gave a presentation about a new high-speed, wireless Internet service coming to the island. The Put-in-Bay Village Council was also approached in October by Sundman who talked about their Ohio company formed by three independent businessmen who recognized the need to bring high-speed broadband Internet service to Put-in-Bay and the Lake Erie Islands.

Two partners, Tadd Schwarz and Tom LaPlante are third generation Put-in-Bay property owners. The third

partner, Sundman brings 40 years of wireless communication experience to the project.

Megabits, LLC is seeking a long-term agreement with the Village of Put-in Bay to allow the placement of antennas and transmitter equipment on the Village water tower, Village structures, docks and properties. This equipment will allow Megabits, LLC to quickly expand its new wireless Internet network which will be providing fixed and mobile broadband Internet services on the Island.

Megabits also sought permission to investigate where the Village could utilize valuable high-speed internet connectivity within all departments so that we may offer and negotiate a service proposal to the Village. The company is prepared upon the Village's request to propose payment of an industry competitive site rental fee for use of the Water Tower.

Megabits has additionally negotiated 20-year agreements with American Tower Corporation to rent space on one commercial tower on the island and two on Catawba Island. These towers will be used for the radio link that will bring connectivity to the island.

Megabits would install multiple antennas on the unused antenna mounts located below the base of the ball of the water tower. These antennas would allow Megabits to provide an extremely high level of service to the Village, its businesses and residents. The equipment and frequencies that will be used are all regulated or licensed by the Federal Communications Commission. As such they will not adversely impact any other wireless services on the Island.

The Federal Communications Commission has currently defined "broadband" internet as a fixed Internet connection which provides speeds of 25 Mbps downstream and 3 Mbps upstream. This is level of service that is not dependably available from any service provider on the Islands. The National Telecommunications and Information Administration stated "Broadband connectivity is essential to the nation's economic growth and social advancement. It is the conduit for economic and social opportunities for U.S. households and a gateway to increased productivity, growth and market access for businesses of all sizes.

Last fall, the Megabits partners began meeting informally with residents, business owners, government and public safety officials to develop a plan that will best support the needs of the islands. They are pleased to announce that they will begin construction on the Megabits Island Internet (Mi2) wireless network this fall!

The Mi2 network is engineered using multiple tower sites and the latest dependable

carrier grade wireless technology. o Subscribers will be able to select symmetric service from 25 Mbps to 100+ Mbps

starting at \$49.00 per month. The Mi2 network is engineered to support 10 Gigabits (Gbps) of traffic and is con-

nected to a 100 Gbps fiber optic business-only Internet network. The Mi2 network will support VOIP telephony, CCTV cameras, security systems,

public safety communications and mobile data.

Megabits will have full-time presence on the island for installations, service, and technical support.

Megabits will build an expansive wireless network to serve fixed and mobile users at homes and businesses. In addition, they will install hundreds of Wi-Fi access points across the Island. This subscription-based Wi-Fi network will simultaneously serve 1,000's of users at most public and business venues, campgrounds and marinas across the Islands. Once the backbone system is active, Megabits will begin installing equipment for customers that sign up for service now.

Migabits is looking forward to further discussion and opportunity of providing high-speed Internet service the Village.

Keith Blumensaadt remains behind bars

Rumors about Keith Blumensaadt getting out of the Ottawa County Jail are not true. Keith was arrested in late June of 2017 on a variety of charges that began with a traffic stop, a stand off with island police and a search of his home where guns and ammunition were found.

On Friday, October 19th, Keith appeared before Ottawa County Common Pleas Court Judge Bruce Winters requesting a reduction in his bond from \$750,000 to \$50,000. The county prosecutor, James VanEerten, argued against the reduction and proposed it be reduced to \$500,000, no ten percent. Release would have been contingent on Keith being under house arrest at his mother's house in the Cleveland area. Winters ruled in VanEerten's favor, so it appears, Keith and his family will not be able to raise the money and he will remain in jail until such time he is tried.



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

Kid Rock concert will test the system

On Saturday, Oct. 20th, the Put-in-Bay Twp. Port Authority held a public meeting to discuss the Kid Rock concert scheduled for the end of next August at the Put-in-Bay Airport. With reports of the concert being sold out with 14,500 tickets being sold, the concert will definitely be a test as to whether such a crowd can be accommodated and served. Promoter Tim Niese was at the meeting and he told the members of the PA board that about 9,500 fans attended the Toby Keith concert and that this year's concert with Rascal Flatts only drew about 7,500. In any case, the Kid Rock concert will add about 50% more people to the mix than the Toby Keith concert had.

Peter Huston from the PIB Chamber of Commerce figures there are around 5,000 beds for those who want to spend that night on the island. That leaves about 9,500 people who need transportation back to the mainland when the concert is over at 10 p.m.

Other topics concerned security, weather events, on island transportation and more. Having been involved in two concerts already, Niese seemed confident about handling any issues that might arise.

To date, the Port Authority must still get permission from the FAA to close the airport for the concert. So far, the FAA has approved the closure for the first two concerts and will more than likely approve the Kid Rock one in 2019. The Port Authority makes more than \$30,000 from each concert.



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
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Pelee Island Official Election Results



It begins with a few pieces of lawn furniture, or perhaps a couple window screens, hosed off, wiped down, stowed away in the garage - closing the cottage. It's an annual process for the cottager, a labor of love - packing, plumbing, winterizing, drained pipes, antifreeze, locked doors and windows, saying good-bye, another season of

There is much to do, I like to clean the screens when I take them down, wiped clean of spider gunk and bird droppings, ready to go back up with the first warm breezes of Spring. I start with a few, early in October. Then, as the days shorten, I'll do a few more. And finally, late in October, the last few screens from the bedroom, the sun porch, and the kitchen will go – when the weatherman has officially called an end to Indian Summer. I'll remember when I put up the first screen in April, excited to fill the musty cottage with the invigorating, Erie air. I will think of August, every window open, fans roaring, almost too hot to breathe. And now, too cold - watching the early sunset from the couch, inside, windows locked, the space heater humming.

Mrs. Larry has often suggested I make a list, add a more structured, thorough approach to my closing operation. But I prefer to move based on weather and whim, to chip away at my random list as the mood strikes. After all, closing for the Winter is unique to cottagers, something to be enjoyed, a way to mark the end of another year, to look back, reminisce, romance, before being swept back to the pace of the mainland.

We have little lawn chairs for the grandchildren. As I clean and put them away over the garage, I recall smiling faces around a roaring fire, roasting marshmallows, jumping up when they spot a lightening bug, then rushing back for just one more s'more! Or, circled around a table, painting rocks collected by the lake, showing off their masterpieces to an attentive Grammy, always ready with fresh brushes, a damp rag, and new supplies. Later, cleaning the grill, I'm reminded of the many meals we shared with family and friends. I think of granddaughter Emma, begging for one more lamb-bone, her favorite; or her friend, Audrey, declaring my grilled chicken to be "the best she ever had"

As days pass, the island begins to shut down, temperatures drop, wind howls, Mrs. Larry will often escape to our mainland home, beginning the process of settling back in, waiting for the next warm front to move through the islands before she returns to cover beds and furniture. pack the remaining food from the pantry and refrigerator, and prepare her flower boxes, pots, and garden for the cold. While she's away, I'll dig through the freezer, looking for whatever might remain, something that will allow me to spend a few hours in the tiny, cottage kitchen – cutting, chopping, a big pot on the stove or maybe something in the oven, soon filling the place with a comforting aroma! It might be a simple pot of chili, maybe pork chops and sauerkraut, or if I'm lucky, short ribs with my Dortmunder gravy. While dinner bubbles, I will poke around, maybe packing a few boxes or organizing some tools in the garage. But often I find myself lingering, stopping to take in the change – the personality of the cottage is different, the cozy interior warm and welcoming, almost as if it is tempting me to stay, to stretch



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

Kelleys Island News By Leslie Korenko

Winter is coming but probably not for another month or two. In the meantime, we are hunkering down in the unusually cold mid-October weather and getting ready for our ice-o-lation. The cold is a welcome relief from the unseasonably early October hot weather we had been experiencing. At the end of October, all the seasonal liquor licenses will expire and doors will close. Already some seasonal businesses are closing like the history museum. On September 26th, we were surprised to wake up to a power failure. It lasted 2.5 hours and was the result of a raccoon exploring the transformer station at Lakeside. The 4-hour planned outage on the 16th went off pretty well, with few hitches. The Fire Dept. reminds everyone that BURN PERMITS are necessary if you are going to burn and the Police Dept. reminds everyone to complete their HOUSE CHECK FORMS and their WELFARE CHECK forms. You DO want your family and your property to be safe this winter, don't you?

There have been an unusually large number of deaths recently. The one that took us all by surprise was the passing of our Mayor, Arden Cooper. Arden left his mark on this village, in a very personal and very professional way. He improved the look of all the Village buildings and property and motivated Council persons to do their best, often cautioning Council to do "due-diligence" in evaluating programs and expenditures. He chose good people to head up much needed new committees (such as the Telecom and Coastal) and implemented programs that, sadly, he will not see to completion. We will miss him greatly. Also notable was the death of former Mayor, Kyle Paine. He left many friends Island-wide.

COUNCIL NOTES

With the passing of Mayor Cooper, the President Pro Tem, Ron Ehrbar, was sworn in as Mayor. This left his Council seat vacant. After explaining the procedure for refilling a vacant seat on Council, Council elected Scot Smith to fill the remaining term. There was considerable discussion about one section of the minutes and as a result, they were tabled awaiting amendments. The POLICE DEPT. is considering the lease and

purchase of new used vehicles and will offer the retiring vehicles for sale. The Dept. received 11 reports, issued eight tickets for speeding, OVI and burning without a permit. Eight warnings were issued (stop sign and speeding). There was one accident (car vs. deer). EMS had 11 runs and continues with training. The FIRE DEPT. was unsuccessful in securing two FEMA grants, but will rework them and resubmit. Hose testing was completed. Every year two or three pieces fail and are taken out of service. With our aging hoses, some being between 20-30

years old and far exceeding their recommended lifespan, Council approved spending \$5,000 each year for the next five years to purchase new hoses. If they receive a grant, those funds will replace the Village funds obligated. LANDS & BUILDINGS will hold another meeting to determine the fate of the Golias house. WATER DEPT. will begin sand blasting the water tower in preparation for painting. STREETS & SIDEWALKS has brought to the attention of Frontier the issue of tree limbs overhanging or resting on telephone lines. The response was clear – it is not their responsibility to clear limbs, it is the owner's responsibility. They only repair damage to the lines. The 'repeater' that Frontier is installing on Pauline (which should improve internet connection speed and reliability) should be completed this year. The others will be done in early spring. The TRANSIENT ROOM TAX will have its third reading in December and will most likely pass, over the objections of the hotel and Zoning Inspector Minshall. It will go into effect in January. There are vacancies on several Boards and Mayor Ehrbar indicated he will fill many of those slots at the December meeting.

PIBIO-GLIA by Peter Huston Madeline Island get together

Over 80 people from fourteen Great Lakes islands converged on Madeline Island Oct.1st and 2nd. Madeline Island, a island in Wisconsin in Lake Superior, was this year's site for the second annual get together of Great Lakes Islands Coalition. This time we were set to formalize the group with a collective pact. We agreed to rename the coalition "GLIA"

(Great Lakes Island Alliance).

Interestingly the term "GLIA" is Latin for "connective tissue of the nervous system" which we all thought was very appropriate for the group. Islands and islanders share a unique perspective on how to self govern. Over the years islanders have been singled out by the mainland press and establishment groups as "independent" and "stubborn". I'm sure many islanders would willingly wear both those badges with honor. But the truth is that island problems are often best solved by islanders.

Mainland rules and conventions don't always fit into the island decision process. For the large group gathered for GLIA on Madeline the goal was to share our unique problems and solutions with other like-minded islanders that have the same or similar demographics.

This year's conference found us on a beautiful island in Lake Superior in the very northern section of Wisconsin. Accessed through the beautiful port town of Bayfield, Wisconsin, Madeline is the only year round island in the Apostle Islands archipelago. Bayfield Village is the gateway for the Apostle Islands, which is managed by the National Park Ser-

The day we arrived was notably "Treaty Day," a bittersweet day for the first nation Objibwe tribe. In 1855, Chief Buffalo negotiated the treaty, and it ultimately moved most of the island tribes from their ancestral homes to the mainland Red Cliff Indian Reservation.

For visitors to the island region this treaty today affords them with short-term recreational access to many of the rural and or uninhabited islands in the western region of Lake Superior. Madeline Island and their island community of La Pointe have embraced this diversity and worked to bridge the cultural gap that formed after the treaty and in fact today have all signage on the island in both English and Objibwe.

Madeline, with a yearround population of about 280, "swells" to 2500 on


Many of the other 14 islands brought similar challenges cussed issue of the weekend, economic growth planning.

The longest book in the Old Testament when measuring by chapters is the book of Psalms with 150 chapters and 2,461 verses. But when measuring by Hebrew word count, the longest book in the Old Testament is Jeremiah with approximately 33,000 words in the original language. The shortest Old Testament Book is Obadiah which uses 670 words to predict down-trodden Israel will rise again. The Gospel of Luke presents Jesus as the Messiah and Lord whose life, death and resurrection make salvation available to all people everywhere. Luke wrote the longest book in the New Testament. His writing is characterized by literary excellence, historical detail and warm, sensitive understanding of Jesus and those around him. The shortest book in the New Testament is 2 John with 298 words.




Episcopal Diocesan Convention - November 9th - 10th

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

Cleveland men face felonies for shell game

You will find this hard to believe, but three Cleveland men of questionable character are facing felonies for allegedly conning people out of money by running a shell game during Put-in-Bay's Christmas in July. Charles Willis, 38, was charged with cheating. John Robinson, 34, and Terrance Jones, 34, were both charged with complicity to cheating. The trio is accused of running an illegal shell game to cheat people out of their money.

A shell game is a gambling activity where a person bets money they can find a ball that is placed under one of three cups. The cups are then quickly moved around to confuse the player. If the player succeeds and chooses the correct shell, he wins the betted-upon amount of money. If he can't find the ball, he loses, and the game operator takes the player's money. Slick operators are notorious for using sleight of hand to rig the game. While the operator runs the game, his partners come up and act like they were winning a lot of money to entice people to play

Once a victim starts to play, the men distract him or her, so the person moving the shells can remove the ball from the board making it impossible to win.

According to reports, the Ohio Investigative Unit handling the case found security footage showing the men meeting up later and splitting the money from the shell game.

Willis and Robinson have both pleaded not guilty to the charges and had initial court dates set. They are scheduled for a jury trial on December 4th.

Jones failed to appear at the Ottawa County Common Pleas Court at the end of September and a warrant was issued for his arrest.

All this makes us wonder who the trio's customers were. We're guessing they might be challenged, too.
