Miller Boat Line announces new ferry construction and vessel name

New Lake Erie Island Ferry to Honor Family Matriarch Mary Ann Market Put-in-Bay, South Bass Island, Ohio.... Miller Ferries to Put-in-

Bay and Middle Bass Island, Ohio has contracted with Fraser Shipyards of Superior, Wisconsin to build a new drive-on, drive-off passenger/vehicle ferry for delivery in fall 2019. The new ferry will be delivered from Lake Superior to Lake Erie and her new home port of Put-in-Bay, Ohio. The vessel will be christened Mary Ann Market in honor of the family matriarch and the company's late owner (1935-

The new 140 foot long, 38.5 foot wide ferry will accommodate 26 standard sized vehicles or 600 passengers and will join Miller's present fleet of four passenger/vehicle ferries. Miller Ferries operate between the peninsula of Catawba to Put-in-Bay (South Bass Island) and also to Middle Bass Island, Ohio; two of Ohio's popular Lake Erie resort islands. The M/V (Motor Vessel) Mary Ann Market will feature enhanced propulsion and maneuverability, a main deck ADA accessible passenger cabin and restroom, and a 20% increase in cargo capacity over Miller's largest vessel.

The new ferry will be built in modules and assembled at Fraser

Shipyards beginning fall 2018 and throughout 2019. Miller Boat Line President Billy Market states, "We chose Fraser due to their enduring high quality, integrity, value, and with consideration of recommendations from industry professionals including marine surveyors, lake Captains, and engineers."

About Miller Boat Line

The Miller Boat Livery was founded in 1905 in the island harbor of Put-in-Bay as a water taxi, fishing charter and ice harvesting company. The company evolved under owners Lee and Mary Miller during the late 1940's, '50's and '60's into a ferry boat line with a fleet of four passenger/vehicle ferries. William E. Market (Bill) and his wife Mary Ann of Put-in-Bay purchased the Miller Boat Line in 1978 from Mary Miller. The Markets chose to keep the name "Miller" in honor of the founding family. Bill Market oversaw the construction of four new ferries; the M/V Islander (built 1983), M/V South Bass (built 1989), M/V William Market (built 1993), and M/V Put-in-Bay (built 1997, lengthened 2010). These newer, larger vessels were designed to accommodate more passengers, carry longer and taller construction-type vehicles, as well as increased speed to maintain a more frequent trip schedule. During the 1980's and '90's the older vessels were sold to other Great Lakes ferry companies

Today Miller Boat Line is owned and operated by Bill and Mary Ann's children, Julene Mar-

Moss on the Rock

Water Snake Fungus

The once-threatened Lake Erie water snake now faces a new foe. It is snake fungal disease, a condition characterized by scabs or crusty scales, premature separation of a snake's outermost skin layer, white opaque cloudiness of the eyes, thickening of the skin, swelling of the face, skin ulcers, lesions, and other problems. While the disease appears unlikely to throw those snakes back on the threatened or endangered species list, the fungus certainly has to potential to sicken them and slow down their progress. Snake fungal disease is not limited to the Lake Erie water snake: According to the U.S. Geological Survey, it is emerging among several groups of wild snakes in the East, South and Midwest.

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






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Island Diary September 2018

Sat., Sept. 1st - Put-in-Bay Yacht Club members had the opportunity to participate in shaping club leadership with their votes at the Annual Membership Meeting. Reports from the Bridge and Committee Chairs were followed by the election of two trustees. Barry Koehler (PIBHS Class of 2000) is called to put down a fox with severe mange at the

putt-putt golf course in the morning.

Sun., Sept. 2nd - The antique car pre-parade is sponsored by the Gonzalez family from East Point. After the parade, everyone heads to the Goat Biergarten to enjoy the live polka band playing there.

Mon., Sept. 3rd - The antique car paraders gather at the Crew's Nest Pavilion for food, drink and live music after the Labor Day parade. The last ferry send off is a bust as weather with very threatening skies forces the event at the Lime Kiln Dock to be cancelled.

Mon., Sept. 4th - Mayor McCann meets with officials from the EPA in Bowling Green. The island kids are back in school on this hot day. Wow! The Crew's Nest is closed for the day, the first time in several months.

Wed., Sept. 5th - It is so hot out that Melinda Myers opens the Crew's Nest pool for island kids after school. We don't know how they do it in the heat, but there are grape pickers busy harvesting the island vines.

Thurs., Sept. 6th - The Reel Bar hosts a "Reel Fine Wine Tasting!" event with five wines picked by rockstar wine maker Dave Phinney and paired with food by Chef

Terry Galvin. **Thurs., Sept. 6th -** Island museum receptionist Cheryl Butera reports one of the busiest Thursdays of the season for visitation at the Museum in spite of the seasonal slowdown of tourist traffic. Tent trucks arrive on island and start setting up commissary tents for the Boy Scouts who are expected to be coming to the island for the weekend.

Fri., Sept. 7th - The weekend weather forecast spreads like wildfire around the island. Looks like a blow out. Fortunately, the Boy Scouts cancel out, otherwise they would have been camping in a sopping wet lawn at the Monument. Perry's Monument cancels all its Historic Weekend Events due to incoming inclement weather. The world is emptier without him. And I miss my friend.





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

News, views and commentary from a South Bass cottager ...

Twenty-five years.

In a few short weeks, I will be closing the old cottage for the twenty-fifth time – unbelievably, the end of our twentyfifth season as cottagers. Where has the time gone? I remem-

ber our first weekend as if it was yesterday. That first season passed quickly - our purchase closed in July and we didn't take possession of the cottage until September, we had just two short months to begin our journey, an unknown new chapter in our lives.

I loaded the car with clothes, towels, bedding, cleaning supplies, and food for that first long weekend. Mrs. Larry was uncharacteristically quite as we set off for the ferry. We were excited, apprehensive, and maybe a little frightened: What had we done, what have we gotten ourselves into? Two teenagers at home, both would be off to college soon; there were jobs, obligations, busy mainland lives. How would this cottage thing fit? What had we done?

As we pulled up to the ticket booth on the Catawba dock, the ferry was already loaded, the last few passengers scurried to get aboard. Fortunately, the boat was not crowded - the crew waved us down the hill and onto the ferry. The ramp closed behind us and we were off! We both climbed out of the car and looked across the water, the Monument stood tall against the blue sky, our bold experiment was about to begin.

The neighborhood was quiet as we pulled into the weedy, gravel drive next to the cottage. The grass was tall, the screens were worn, windows dirty. We left everything in the car and rushed to open the door - it was dark, musty, it seemed smaller, older. I opened windows as Mrs. Larry explored each room, finding what the previous owners had left behind, formulating a plan to clean, organize, make it our own. We would work hard that first day, but I often drifted out by the lake, watching boats and waves; listening to the birds, wind rustling through the big oak; gazing at the unknown islands in the distance, wondering.

In the evening, I cooked dinner on a small grill as the sun slowly sunk into the lake – for the first time, I realized how lucky we were – a glowing sky, then a billion stars. We slipped between crisp, fresh sheets in the bed in front of the big, open window by the lake. Waves lapped, we slept.

Our children would arrive the next day, 18-year-old Matthew driving up after school with his little sister Sarah. They had never seen the cottage, only a fuzzy, black and white photo from an advertisement in the Gazette. The look on their faces said everything: What had our parents done? The peeling paint, the cramped and dingy rooms, the 1940's kitchen, barely-serviceable plumbing, old furniture, antique appliances, old stuff everywhere - they thought we were crazy!

Soon, neighbors would arrive, seasoned cottagers preparing for the long, Labor Day weekend. I think they were curious as well: What is this young family going to do with this tiny, creepy cottage? We certainly had no idea, but as the weeks passed, friends and family filled our weekends – often we would squeeze eight or ten guests into our cramped 600 square feet, once we piled in fourteen! We hiked into town for the afternoon entertainment, we jumped into the cool lake, late dinners often came after sunset. We were quickly caught

up in a new lifestyle – racing back to the mainland on Sunday evening, hustling back to the ferry late Friday afternoon. I didn't think about where this journey would go, we were too busy, fixing, cleaning, entertaining, enjoying the ride.

As years passed, the cottage grew: There was new paint, additions, upgraded plumbing and electricity, a shed, then a garage, new windows. But through it all, Erie, the sunsets, the magical sky remained. We got to know gracious neighbors, their families and friends, their dogs, cottagers throughout the island, and islanders too. We discovered that there is a wonderful community here, that nature's wonders surround us, that an unexpected peace can be found on a rocky shore. We found that children and grandchildren can enjoy a slower pace, tossing rocks into the lake, hunting for beach glass, simple games, quiet conversation; a family cookout; sunsets and s'mores.

When I came back that first Spring, it was early April and unexpectedly cold. Late in the afternoon, I sat on the steps by the screened porch and looked out over the lake – it was still, a dark cloud approached slowly from the north. I wondered what the Summer would bring; what would it be like, our first full season as cottagers, and next year and the years beyond, where will this go? As I sat, it began to snow; big, puffy snowflakes dropping straight from above, not even a hint of wind. No one was around, no neighbors, no traffic. not a wave or a bird, not even a squirrel. I could hear the snowflakes as they landed on the dry leaves leftover from last Fall, they collected on the brim of my hat, the sound like tiny footsteps. I thought of that first trip on the ferry, the trepidation, the unknown, the second thoughts ... just the beginning of our twenty-five year adventure.

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Fake News! Fake History!

The first large vessel to ply the great lakes, the Griffon, was sailed by Robert LaSalle. He and his thirty-two men in 1679 crossed the lake just to bring back furs, they sailed in route from Queensland, Ontario to Green Bay, Wisconsin. Stopping at Middle Bass Island, Lasalle and the Belgian missionary Friar Hennepin, celebrated the first Mass in the Mid West. The island was named, Isle des Fleurs, due to all the flowers he found while there. History was made, and for the next 200 years, this name was kept.

The above is partially true. Griffon and Father Hennepin sailed the Griffon across Lake Erie in 1679, but first-hand accounts of the voyage mention going north of the islands directly to the Detroit River, and nowhere is mention of stopping at any of the islands. We think Teresa Thorndale revised history a bit in her book, Sketches and Tales of the Lake Erie Islands, published in 1898.

How many islands are there in Lake Erie?

I saw a slide recently listing over 32,000 islands in the Great Lakes, including 2,176 in Lake Erie. And it was hard to believe. Because the presenter was from NOAA, I thought they had created the slide. But the slide was actually created by Matt Preisser of Michigan DNR, using data published in "Islands of Life – A Biodiversity and Conservation Atlas of the Great Lakes." It was published by the Nature Conservancy of Canada and is the result of a joint project between the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and the Great Lakes Program of the U.S. EPA.

The previous count that most people used for Lake Erie was 36, which contains the 14 Ohio Islands in the Bass Island Archipelago in Ottawa and Erie Counties, plus another 22. The core 14 are Ballast, Buckeye, Catawba, Gibraltar, Green, Kelleys, Lost Ballast, Middle Bass, Mouse, North Bass (Isle St. George), Rattlesnake, South Bass, Starve and Sugar. Catawba Island was a real island until 1897 when it became a tied island, one permanently tied to the mainland. But most people leave it in the list and consider tied islands real islands. The list of 36, plus 11 more sometimes considered as Lake Erie Islands, is at http://middlebass2.org/IslandsInLakeErie.pdf. The report listing 2,176 is at http://greatlakesislands.info.

The count of 2,176 is actually only about 25% too high, but as counted includes 130 Western Lake Erie Islands (including 21 "large islands), 66 in the Rondeau System near Erieau, ON, 1484 in the Long Point, Turkey Point Systems and Northeast Coast, 37 in the Welland Canal – Niagara River area and 55 in the Lake Erie Southern Coast area. It also includes the St. Clair River, Lake St. Clair and Detroit River area with 403 islands. If we take out that last area to limit ourselves to Lake Erie and adjust for a small arithmetic error in the 2176 count, the final count of islands in Lake Erie is 1,752 and includes 42 "large islands".

Coming up with the meaning of this was a not easy. The report defines an island as "any land mass (natural or anthropogenic) within the Great Lakes or connecting channels that is surrounded by an aquatic ecosystem. Therefore, a particular island can be periodically connected to the mainland or part of a reef depending on water levels. Rock, shoals, shallow reefs and breakwaters can all be considered islands in this report".

But the numbers still don't seem logical. However, digging a bit further shows that the definition of the lakes includes their coastal environments. And it's not easy to find the definition of that. It should have been in the report. Here's the definition of the coastal zone on the U.S. side of Lake Erie. In the western part of the coast the boundary extends inland up to 15 miles along certain low-lying wetland and floodplain areas; in most of the eastern part of the State, areas with high bluffs, the boundary extends inland for only about an eighth of a mile, with the exception of the Mentor Marsh area.

I still need to reconcile my old list of 36 (plus 11 other island candidates) with the new list of 42 "large islands" within a total of 1,752. But none of these lists is perfect, so use any of the three numbers you choose, or come up with your own based on the available candidates. Note that the "official" list leaves out Catawba Island.

PUT-IN BAY, Oct. 9 — It won't be long now until there will be another hyphen put in Put-in Bay.


It will be put in between the Put-in and Bay, like this—Put-

The change effective Nov. 1, is a highfallutin hyphenating matter as it comes officially from a ruling by the first assistant postmaster general in Washington, D. C.

The postoffice department, since inception of the Lake Erie island postoffice, has spelled the name without a hyphen (Put in Bay), and original village records show the same spelling. Somewhere along the line someone inserted one hyphen, and it was Putin Bay to residents and all government agencies except the postoffice.

ABOVE: How do you spell Put-in-Bay? We're not quite sure what year this article appeared, but if this is official, which it appears to be, the correct spelling is Put-in-Bay. The dictionary also spells it with hypens and a lowercase "i." For some this is actually a pet peeve when they see it spelled incorrectly. You wouldn't spell New York City "New-York-City, so why would you spell Put-in-Bay Put in Bay they say. It comes down to being a purest. And with this, let's not go to how people say Put-in-Bay. That's a topic of another discussion.

It was one of those mid September Saturdays around 4:00. Our neighbors Bill and Jane Ibold, Tony and Cheryl D'Amico had gathered on Gerald Shanley's front porch for post chore drinks. It had been a hot day of painting, garden clearing, laying in snowmobile gas, and clearing house crawl spaces for winter.

We were being pestered by bees (they love the sugar in alcohol and some of the fruit and cheese Gerald had set out). I am not sure if the bee population on Middle Bass has a drinking problem (it is a light hearted summer community) but they were very pushy about wanting to join in the party, buzzing importantly around our ears and drinks.

I had a Great Lakes Brewery Dortmunder. It was cold and delicious.

Droplets of water pooled on the outside of the bottle. It was the reward for a day of completed chores. I was about to take a pull when a bee landed on the lip of my bottle.

At first the encounter was polite. It walked around the diameter bottle's mouth (twice). His body language said "Welcome. Nice to be here, don't you think?"

Then things got sour. The bee literally plunged into my open container. Jane Ibold squealed. Was the bee suicidal?!

Village Council Notes

At the September meeting of the Put-in-Bay Council, Anne Auger was appointed acting Village Administrator. Anne has worked for the Village for more than ten years and assisted former Village Administrator Dough Knauer when he held the position. The move came after some members of the Village Council became frustrated with recently-hired Doug Blessing who was hired as village administrator and operator of the Village's water plant earlier this summer. EPA officials weren't particularly happy that Blessing held both positions, plus his repeated absence from the job due to medical reasons and numerous violations from the EPA under his tenure at the water plant were part of the decision.

The day after Anne was appointed, she met with the EPA and learned of a grant that Put-in-Bay can apply for to possibly run an underwater waterline from the mainland to Putin-Bay. The cost of such a line was estimated to be about 12 million dollars, quite an expense for the island. The good news is the grant would cover 75% of the cost of the line, plus the remaining balance could be financed at 0% interest. This is certainly an opportunity to be investigated, as the island's water plant is aging and requires more and more maintenance, plus expensive replacement down the road.

One of the interesting visitors at the meeting was John Pleva, a former taxi operator on the island who now does business in China. He presented a presentation about the eBikes




which have been approved by Ohio legislators. These are bikes with have electric motor assist that can be driven without a driver's license or license plate on public streets. One of the models looks like a typical bicycle and another looks like a motor scooter. They meet all requirements for street use, yet are silent and pollution free. They can go about 20 miles per hour and we can attest first hand that they are zippy and fun to ride. A few days after the meeting, John sold one to Mayor McCann who has been seen riding his scooter-style model around town.



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

OBITUARIES Norman "Lee" Dietrich

N. Lee Dietrich, 91, a longtime Lake County resident and former summer resident of Put In Bay, passed away September 10, 2018 at the David Simpson Hospice House in Cleveland.

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He was born December 18, 1926 in Lorain, Ohio. Lee was the co-owner and vice president of Lockie Lee Dairy and Ohio Convenient Food Mart, Inc. He was a graduate of the Mentor High School class of 1945. Upon graduation, Lee joined the Merchant Marine. When Lee returned home, along with his friends the Loxterman brothers who were also returning from military service, they got together and decided to form their own dairy, Lockie Lee Dairy, in 1946. They all worked very hard and as the dairy grew, they expanded and purchased a regional franchise and formed the Ohio Convenient Food Marts, Inc. in 1961. In 1985, the partners started to enter the retirement process, selling the dairy to Dairymens, and a few years later, they returned the Convenient franchises to the parent company. While Lee was working very hard at his businesses, he was able to make time to pursue his passion of boating and anything water related. He was an excellent swimmer, never missing his morning laps at the YMCA, where he also served on the board for many years. In the early 1960's, Lee purchased his first boat, a Cruis Along. It was a real fixer upper, having been severely damaged in a fire. Lee brought the Cruis Along back to life. That boat led to another, and those of you that knew him, know that Lee had many boats over the years, of all sizes, makes and models. He loved them all and was an excellent pilot. His love of boating included trips to various ports on the Great Lakes, and trips down the Mississippi and Intercoastal Waterway to Florida. His love of the lakes and boats led him to Put-in-Bay in the early 1960's. He was one of the early members of the Crew's Nest. In the late 1970s, Lee and his wife Frances, acquired the James Poulos house on Loraine Ave, when it

> was a quaint residential street with Victorian homes and friendly neighbors. Lee and Fran remodeled the house and enjoyed their time there, but Lee knew he always wanted to be as close to the lake as he could. In 1984, Jeff Koehler helped Lee make that wish come true and acquainted him with Mildred Miskimen, who lived on Peach Point. Mildred met with Lee and Frances and decided that they would take good care of her house as she retired from the island. Lee and Frances renovated the house and enjoyed summers on Peach Point with their many PIB friends and neighbors. For many years, Lee was a regular fixture at the Wharfside, for morning coffee with his buddy, Ken Turvey. He especially liked introducing his granddaughters to boating, and really impressed them when he bought a small inflatable boat from Jimmy Buffett via his friend, who was a boat dealer in Florida. Lee wasn't exactly sure who Jimmy Buffett was but his family made sure that he had some Jimmy Buffett CD's in his music collection! In recent years, Lee enjoyed his early am coffee with his neighbors on Peach Point, and having a beer in his front yard with his buddies, watching the boats in the bay. Lee was a former member of the Grand River, Mentor Harbor and Put In Bay Yacht clubs. Lee is survived by his loving wife of 67 years, Frances; daughter Sara (David) Kobelt of Mentor, OH; granddaughters Molly of Chicago, IL and Rachel of Kansas City, MO, his beloved dog Lola;

he was a boy, he maintained a deep connection to the land; it was important to him to preserve the legacy



More Boating Tragedy

Nearly each month over this boating season there has been a tragedy or near tragedy on lake Erie. Sadly, each of them could have been avoided with the proper education. The latest occurred a couple of weeks ago near the PIB lighthouse.

There are conflicting details and the incident remains under investigation but here's what I know. A male boater near the lighthouse spotted a fender in the water and dove in to retrieve it. He immediately experienced distress which resulted in his drowning. His wife had no functional knowledge of boating and as a result drove the vessel on to the rocks. ODNR took charge of the scene from the PIB police department. The Coast Guard sent in a helicopter and divers eventually retrieved the dead boater's body.

The version of events may vary, but what we know is that: 1) A man went overboard and drowned. 2) That the wife could not drive the boat properly.

We may never know the exact circumstances of the man going overboard or if he should have, but in my experience I am unaware of any object retrieval requiring a person to jump overboard! Based on my understanding of the event, it was (at a minimum) an unusual decision by the skipper. That followed by the only other person on board being incapable of driving the vessel or using the radio (if it was so equipped).

Teachable Moment

Many of us have a far too casual attitude about boating on Lake Erie and are ill prepared to handle an emergency situation. That's a fact! In my opinion it stems from an under-appreciation of what the Great Lakes are and are not. For all

intents and purposes, what they are seas. What they are not are lakes. Think not? The extremely well seasoned crew of the mammoth 728-foot-long SS Edmund Fitzgerald which was snapped in half like a pretzel on Lake Superior might beg to differ!

The point that I am trying to make is this. Boating anywhere on the Great Lakes and especially around our islands can be great fun but trouble can happen in an instant and your maritime skills need to be up to snuff as well as your ability to make quick effective decisions. The skill required to be a good boater can not and will not happen in a vacuum...ever! It is a combination of knowledge and experience. The

United States Coast Guard Auxiliary can't help you with the experience (unless you were to join us) but we can help you with the knowledge.

Knowledge Is For Everyone

The Coast Guard Auxiliary offers two primary courses. A safe boating class which is suitable for everyone whether your the skipper or a passenger. And a course titled "Suddenly In Command" designed for individuals who are not the primary driver of the boat but who may suddenly need to take over command and control of the vessel if the captain should become incapacitated. This is often the spouse or partner of the vessel's captain. If you are a boater I strongly urge you to look into both of these courses. For more information call the USCG-AUX at 419-379-9000.





Put-in-Bay Port Authority

The Put-in-Bay Port Authority is a governmental body which oversees the operation and maintenance of the township's three airports and harbor mooring buoys. The Port Authority Board is appointed by your elected Township Trust-

Since the early 1990s, the Port Authority has worked to obtain federal and state funding for the construction and maintenance of these important township assets. Federal and state grants have provided millions of dollars of infrastructure improvements for our island community. These grants paid for 90 – 95% of the improvements, with local match covering the remainder.

Port Authority funding includes user fees, airport rent, special event revenues (such as the concert and road race), and the local property tax levy. It is important to note that the Port Authority has raised the user fees to include aircraft parking and aerial tour fees in 2018. The Board elected not to raise fees for the island charter companies as we know that this cost would only be passed on to those of you that require transportation to and from the islands. The Board is committed to minimizing the financial burden on the local community while providing the infrastructure required by our citizens.

The Board decided to place a 0.45 mil tax levy on the November ballot which marks the third levy reduction over the past 15 years. The combination of rev-

enues from user fees, special event proceeds, and levy funds ensures our community's continued ability to take advantage of federal and state dollars to support the township's important transportation infrastructure. One recent example is the federal funding obtained for the new hangar at the Put-in-Bay Airport which, along with the hangars built with private funds, will provide additional revenues over time. With winter approaching, one of the more visible benefits of the partnership between the township and the Port Authority is the utilization of Port Authority funded snow removal equipment and the efforts of township employees keeping the airport and roadways accessible during the winter season.

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
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Perry Monument requesting input on accessibility plan

Put-in-Bay, Ohio – Perry's Victory & International Peace Memorial is seeking your input on its Park Accessibility Management Plan. The Memorial has prepared the plan to guide how the park can become universally accessible for park visitors and employees. Preparation of a plan for transitioning to full accessibility is mandated by regulations under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as they apply to the U.S. Department of the Interior. The purpose of a transition plan is to address the required physical, structural, and programmatic changes needed to make facilities, programs, services, and activities accessible to and usable by disabled people. The transition plan addresses physical and structural changes needed. An action plan should address the programmatic changes (modification of policies, auxiliary aids, etc.) as not all existing facilities must be made physically.

The document will guide Perry's Victory and International Peace Memorial staff in making improvements to accommodate the public in accordance with all federal accessibility requirements for both programmatic and physical access. Recommendations presented in the Accessibility Plan are consistent with ongoing plans to rehabilitate the lower and upper plazas and repair the Memorial and seawalls.

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






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




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

In case you missed it, last month we celebrated New Years here in Put-in-Bay with a Monte Carlo night down on Delaware Ave. Noise makers, hats and a champagne toast at midnight. We even had Wylie the Walleye from Shores and Islands here.

Our New Years celebration in the street dates back nearly 40 years before there was a Jet-Express or fall events that lasted till Halloween. Back then after Labor Day, New Years Celebration was our last big weekend of the season.

The night featured games of chance played in the street run by the chamber of commerce for islanders and our faithful visitors that would stay to the bitter end. By all accounts the street was packed with players and guests and featured the majestic and elusive "big wheel of fortune" better know as "Skip's Big Wheel".

Skip Duggan and the other island business owners, along with and friends and employees loved to run the wheel. Their job was to convince people to give up some chips or cash for a chance on three to one odds.

This is a fanciful, perhaps fake news story about how the colorful 1932 Ford circus truck got here. A truck that surprises and entertains us once a year on New Years and then hides indoors waiting for it's annual outing again.

The '32 Ford Model B, for those real "old car" lovers, has a 4-cylinder engine that provided just enough horse power to move that big wheel from town to town back in the day. Its simple design and straightforward engineering has allowed it to survive for 85 plus years.

Granted it is a little rough around the edges, but our circus truck sports a cutting edge sequencing "machine" that makes the "blinky light system" work. Its simple design would have made early NASA engineers envious.

With two dollar strings of blinking lights made in some town in China theses days we would rarely think



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

These "blinky" bulbs seem to entrance the causal passer by and create the necessary enticement to gamble.

The Ford Circus truck's old system was devised with manual moving parts that would turn the lights on and off, the only problem was that the power required was enough to run a small city. So this year we upgraded the "blinky" lights and the players were again attracted to the big wheel like bugs to a flame.

This old truck was found in Florida and trucked to Ohio by Skip Duggan back in the day. It still sports Arizona plates. We figure "Dr. Lucky and the Flying Flea Circus and Traveling Medicine Show" might have owned it back then. Chances are he was vacationing in Florida with the other circus folks, spinning the wheel to make some extra cash, when the IRS caught up with him. Now it's ours!

So old traditions diehard and so does "Skips Big Wheel" which we hope will be spinning for years to come. Special thanks to Chip and Dee Dee Duggan, Island Transportation, for keeping the circus truck from falling apart. And we want to send out special thanks to spinning team Rudy Rence, Jordan, Sarah, Jake and Renee Market, Aaron Smith and Rob Hard for spinning the wheel for us this year. It was a great night.
