Bash on the Bay 3 A Huge Success!

- Visitors Flock to the Island for 3rd Annual Concert



At the closing of the August 2018 Bash at the Bay, Kid Rock was announced as the headliner for the 2019 concert. The proclamation was met with roaring cheers from the crowd and the news spread quickly. For the past year, the anticipation built as countless people prepared for the huge influx of people to South Bass Island.

This year's concert took place on Thursday, August 29th. Beginning the previous weekend, the city docks started filling up with boaters who had arrived early to secure their dock for the day of the show. The few marinas on the island who accept dockage reservations report being booked up months in advance. By the day before the concert, finding a dock for your boat or a golf cart to rent was nearly impossible. The island restaurants, bars, and shops were also flooded with customers all week. Business owners were happy to see the increase in sales during a week that is normally a slow one on the island, especially after a rocky start in the spring due to inclement weather.

Tickets were available for sale beginning last fall, and they quickly sold out in just a few hours. However, there were tickets available from re-sellers up until the day of the concert, giving last minute fans the option to attend. Property owners near the airport were allotted tickets for the event.

Among those assisting the Put-in-Bay Police Department with law enforcement and safety on the island and at the concert were the Ottawa County Sheriff's Office, Ohio Investigative Unit, Ohio Department of Natural Resources Parks & Watercraft Division, the United States Coast Guard as well as other neighboring authorities.

Unfortunately, there were horse mounted police officers expected who were unable to attend. The police officers reported handing out some citations for underage drinking.

At least one member of the Port Authority, Rick Ziebart, was at the concert seeing how everything went. A post concert brainstorm session with the promoter, Tim Niese, was planned to go over any issues that might be rethought for the next event.

Speaking to some concertgoers, a few improvements were suggested. There was some ambiguity regarding the policy of whether professional cameras were or were not allowed. There was also mention of tickets not being checked carefully enough by security inside the venue, which allowed people to enter sections that they hadn't paid for. Some fans mentioned that their view was obscured by equipment in the sections further from the stage.

After the show, traffic was brought to a near standstill due to large crowds pouring onto Langram Road heading downtown. There was one accident near Thompson Road involving a 57-year-old female pedestrian who was struck by a truck while she walked with her back to oncoming traffic. She was life flighted off the island with serious but non-life threatening injuries. The driver, a 44-year-old man, was cited for driving while intoxicated, according to police. People heading the other direction on Langram toward the Miller Ferry had a much shorter, better lit walk and no complications were reported.

Billy Market from Miller Ferry reported some interesting facts about the ferry's opera-

tions during the event. Ferries ran 41 hours of continuous service over the course of two days. They started service at 5 a.m. the day of the concert and ran until 9 p.m. the next evening. Ferries made 109 round trips to Catawba from PIB. That's close to 700 miles covered back and forth across the lake. Approximately 3000 hours of labor were put in by the staff and crew to make this happen. Thanks for all the hard work!

We also have to congratulate concert promoter Tim Niese on his planning skills which were so important to making the event a success. If anyone wonders about his dedication to detail and making the event a success, he was seen the next morning picking up the last bits of litter left by the crowds at the airport. As with the previous two concerts, you would never have known the next morning that a huge concert had taken place just hours prior.

Like the previous two years, the 2019 Bash at the Bay was considered a huge success. Crowds and excitement for this event continue to grow each year in response to this emerging island tradition.

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

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
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Upcoming Island Events in October

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

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Joe Parker's 100th Birthday

On October 19, 1919, Joseph John Parker, eleventh child, fifth son of Jobe and Christina Riesterer Parker was born on Put-in-Bay. Joe was the lone graduate of Put-in-Bay High School Class of 1937. Valedictorian and Salutatorian! He married Anne Florence Jeanette McGinnis Thanksgiving Day November 24, 1949. For many years, he owned and operated Parker's Garage, the SOHIO filling station located across the street from the Put-in-Bay Town Hall.

Joe was also very active in island living. He held many positions in American Legion Post 542. He shot off the fireworks on the Fourth of July fireworks. At the Easter Egg Hunts, he helped hide eggs. He conducted fund and blood drives. Joe was also a PIB School Board member, and when the PTA put on the Harvest Dinner fundraisers in the Town Hall, Joe loved carving and serving the

He was the fire Chief for many years, chief or not, he every morning started the fire engines to make sure they would run that day. Joe promoted the fund drive for the new fire truck in the late 1950's. He would he be thrilled to see the present fleet!

Joe was a Navy veteran of WWII and wrote a memoir of his experiences as a Marine Corpsman in the Pacific islands. FROM LAKE ERIE TO THE SOUTH PACIFIC. For weeks in 1995, he daily wrote longhand until his fingers cramped. Many visits to the library to verify dates of those invasions (aka D-Days) and occupations. It is in Library of Congress and also the National WWII Museum Archives in New Orleans and of course Put-in-Bay Li-

brary. Because of his medical training, he became the island's one-man free EMS during our resident doctors' absences. On his discharge his commanding officer urged him to use his GI Bill to go to Columbia University for pre-med, but ice fishing was too big a lure. Besides, he had an invalid mother and widowed sister with four little boys who needed him at home.

Joe and Anne's family lived in what is now #269 Erie Street. The house was small for their family and in late 1960's they moved to a larger home on Catawba Ave. across from Cooper's Woods.

That Erie Street house was "the best location in the nation." It was cross from Tony's Place, the local ice cream place and bar, near the school and Town Hall which was also the gym, and near the Schnoor

and Fuchs Grocery, general Store and soda fountain. There was such wonderful merchandise in their drug store school supplies, notions, toys, and even shoes and boots.

Joe was interested in sports and good at any game he played, and he wanted every kid to have that advantage. In the summer of 1948, he borrowed his brother Alfred's tractor and scoop and scraped and leveled many hours and weeks for the first tennis court behind the school.

Years later when the ballfield by the Colonial was replaced by a motel, Joe got permission to put in a field (of dreams!) behind Mother of Sorrows Church. With Sunday afternoon lures of hot dogs and pop, he found plenty of rock-picker-uppers. Then a person with the only bulldozer on the island finished it off. Now it is the one the Market Family so generously maintains for islanders, island employees, visiting groups and

Joe eagerly anticipated the New Year's Eve Dances in the Town Hall. Jitterbugging was his specialty and girls (including his nieces) lined up to be flung around by him. Annie had to wait her turn, too!

Joe inspired his offspring, Colleen (Connie), Marsha, Matthew, Benjamin, Roger and David (DJ) with good island work ethic. He also made sure they all had cars!


Joe enjoyed his Florida trailer park retirement where he planted flowers all years long, swam and hot tubbed daily, bicycled, pitched horseshoes, and kept busy with woodshop projects.

In June 1999, the Put-in-Bay Yacht Club was rollicking with Joe's 80th and Annie's 70th birthdays to celebrate their 50th Wedding Anniversary, but instead, the following June, friends and family gathered for Joe's final remembrance. Joe was so excited about the Millennium, but sadly, heart surgery was not successful, and he passed January 4, 2000.

Many will not have known Joe, but those who did can remember him for his kindly, generous, friendly and welcoming spirit.

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

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Island Diary September 2019

Sun., Sept. 1st - The polka band playing at the Goat's Biergarten, Das Lokal, has to put up with some rain for those enjoying their old-country entertainment.

Mon., Sept. 2nd - JD Owen is entertaining at the Antique Car Parade potluck at the Crew's Nest Pavilion. Art Boyles leads the antique car parade for the last time in Car 54. Art is moving off the island and sold the car to Al and Marsha Ashley. The Coast Guard stops a boat in Schoolhouse Bay off Middle Bass. The boats are seen together for two hours before a squall comes through, leaving those who were watching from shore to wonder what was going on. To celebrate the season, the Crew's Nest dockmasters all jump in the club pool with their clothes on. The entertainment at the last-boat-send off at the Lime Kiln is cancelled right after a great fireworks show when black clouds dump rain on the party. Coach Criag Shuffenecker and members of the PIB School's Panther volleyball team collect donations for a suicide prevention fund before the rain hits.

Tues., Sept. 3rd - PIB School staff and elementary students and their parents meet in front of the school to celebrate the opening of the new school year with a human tunnel leading to the front door. Lots of photos were taken.

Wed., Sept. 4th - The food service tent is being set up on the east side of the Monument grounds for the hundreds of Boy Scouts who are coming for the weekend. At the Reel Bar, there's a 5-course meal prepared by guest chef Terry Galvin along with a wine tasting with six wines of the Veneto region in Italy.

Thurs., Sept. 5th - Representatives from the Ohio EPA are at a meeting at the PIB Town Hall to discuss issues concerning water service options for the island in the coming years. It comes down to the island continuing making its own at the village water plant or running a line under the lake and being supplied by the regional water system on the mainland.

Fri., Sept. 6th - Island entertainer Ray Fogg is at the Round House for a rare afternoon show. Boy Scouts arrive on the island by the hundreds and set up their tents in McCann Field rather than on the lawn east of the Monument like they normally would due to the less-than-ideal condition of the grass and ground caused by the high water this season. Lake Erie Shores & Islands mascot Wylie the Walleye arrives on the island to take part in the historical weekend parade. Bobbi Dobos has Drive in Movie night at the old farm house next to Joe's Bar.

The applicant must demonstrate financial stability and organizational capacity to make the event a success. Generation of overnight stays is highly encouraged. Organizations/events receiving funds through other Lake Erie Shores & Islands funding streams are not eligible.

"Lake Erie Shores & Islands is committed to developing and supporting local events and helping them to be a success," says Amanda Smith Rasnick, Director of Group Accounts. "We are dedicated to assisting events that provide exposure for the destination and encourage visitors from outside of the region to come and enjoy our communities.'

The Sponsorship Grant is available for community festivals, concerts, and other special events. Applications are currently available for events occurring in the next calendar year and will be accepted until October 31, 2019. Organizations are asked to submit the event's sponsorship packet/prospectus along with the application. All first-year events will be reimbursed granted funds upon event completion. Applications are reviewed by a committee and decisions will be announced by November 30, 2019. A limited amount of grant funds are available and will be dependent upon budget restrictions and collective number of applications received.

Google Video **Crew Visits** Put-in-Bay

On September 14th, a video crew from Rootwood Films of New York City was sent to Put-in-Bay by Google at the invitation of Megabits Island Internet or Mi2 (www.mi2wifi. com). Google provides Megabits with cloud services that automate control of their new LTE radio system operating the "Citizens Broadband Radio Service" or CBRS. Google was looking for CBRS customers like Megabits to highlight in a promotional video. Megabits responded by describing the "unique island setting" of Put-in-Bay and was selected as one of the three companies in the United States that Google will use in the video.

The FCC gave Google authorization to begin initial commercial deployment of CBRS nationally on September 16. Megabits has awaited this authorization for months as this means it can now provide high-speed Internet connectivity to South Bass and Middle Bass Island homeowners who currently have little or no Internet access. Megabits is one of the first companies in the nation to use CBRS LTE technology that can penetrate more of the dense foliage on the Islands. With this news, Megabits is now busy seeking residential subscribers and installing year-round wireless Internet service in homes all over South Bass and Middle Bass Islands.

Among those interviewed during the Google video crew's visit was Anita McCann in a temporary video studio set up in the Red Moon speakeasy. Tip Boyles had video taken at the front desk of the Park Hotel, and Round House bartenders were captured during a Mike "Mad Dog" Adams performance. The Megabits team was filmed performing equipment maintenance at the Bay Lodging Resort tower. Megabits has had great community and business support since its inception. The video crew traveled around the Island to record activities at many businesses including The Boardwalk, The Keys, The Crews Nest, Mojito Bay, Miller Boat Line and the Jet Express. The two-day visit ended with Trey Sheehan providing a boat ride to Middle Bass and Ballast Islands, which included taking aerial drone shots following the boat and a wonderful sunset.





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

A Message from Mayor Jessica Dress

I've had the fortunate circumstance of starting my life on Put-in-Bay by marrying an islander.

Six years ago, I moved here on the cusp of a new adventure, changing careers from journalism to the service industry, unsure of anything except that my future was on the island with my future husband.

I slung drinks and waited tables before stumbling upon a career in that little office on Langram Road, where most readers likely know me from, delivering their packages and their bills.

But something was missing until former Mayor Ruth Scarpelli asked me more than four years ago to fill a vacant seat on the village council

With extensive experience from the other side, attending more government meetings than I can count and reading hundreds of police reports during my six years as a professional newspaper reporter, I accepted the invitation. The experience I had, in my career that followed my graduation from Ohio University with an honors degree, was more valuable than I could know.

From the inside, government operates differently. It's meticulous, often appearing slow to the public. It's careful. When well done, it's accountable for every decision -- for every dollar and cent of taxpayer money that passes through its doors.

After years of closely observing the government from the outside, then having the privilege of serving on council, I'm both empathetic to the taxpayers' desire for efficiency and realistic about the prudence mayorship requires.

My time on the island may appear to be short. Relatively, my experience in village government is not. My abilities as a leader, of honesty, communication, accountability and transparency, quiet initiative, and firm decision-making, are what have led to my current position as Mayor.

They are qualities that have always guided me to the forefront in leadership.

What I want, and what I will do, are simple things. I will take action to preserve our community as somewhere our children would want to raise their children. I will do all I can to keep our community safe. Keep it well-funded. Keep our boundaries between the commercial development that makes our world go-round, and the peacefullness that preserves this incredibly unique place.

In my time working in village government I have:

-Reunited council to focus on projects, investments and legislation that move the island forward and provide the village with protection in better written policies and laws;

-Reorganized the fiscal office for better accountability and transparency;

-Invested in a multi-focused, multi-resourced law firm with full interests on public practice, rather than one with a single practitioner with limited means;

-Secured a motivated, long-term village administrator with a decade-plus experience, retained a highly-qualified wastewater superintendent, as well as hired a new water superintendent, all of whom are vested in the long-term future of the island;

-Pushed forward a transparent tri-system of accountability in docks funding collection, appearing state officials in a way that hasn't been accomplished before;

-Overseen the previously delayed execution of a \$2-million investment in the village's continued prioritization of a safe drinking water supply by implementation of the recent ozone project;

-Prioritized the police department in general funding by supporting the increase of the budget by \$200,000 a year in the past three years and authorizing, in collaboration with council, higher wages to invest in longevity of officers;

-Supported purchase of additional downtown property to also support longevity of officers, with potential additional use for future village needs;

-Facilitated participation and success in the goals of the Safe Island Task Force in preparing the village and our law enforcement to effectively manage our greatest needs during the busiest weekends of our visitor season. In addition, I've participated in one of the greatest accomplishments of SITF -- effective communication between government and a dozen-plus effective business owners.

It's with great humility that I ask for the continued support of village voters to finish what I've started. My greatest goal is for all residents and voters to have unfettered confidence that the village is, and will always during my leadership, be acting in their best interests. This is your island. This is your future.

Commerce Board for 4 years and was the past president for 2 years, helping to promote and support the fun events enjoyed by visitors and residents alike.





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Bike & Build Experience

Bike & Build, a service-oriented cycling trip to raise money and awareness for the affordable housing cause, was hands down one of the most challenging, but ultimately the most rewarding experiences of my life. The bike trip across the southern U.S. route was 78 days.

The mental push every day to finish each ride was even more of a challenge than the physical push. Finishing a ride on the hardest days (headwinds in New Mexico, 6,000 feet of climbing over into Lake Tahoe, the neverending rain in Texas that caused a million flats was a feeling unlike any other. The final ride descending down into Santa Cruz was overwhelming with emotion, and running into the Pacific Ocean with our team of 18 riders was a moment I will never forget.

On average, we would ride about 70 miles a day, with our longest day being 110 miles in Nevada on the loneliest road in America. We had two support vehicles, a lunch van that would take the coolers and food bins and set up a lunch spot about halfway through the ride, and the van and trailer that had all of our bags in it and would drive to the host each day. We mostly stayed at churches or in community centers, but we camped a few times in Zion National Park, Grand Canyon National Park and sometimes in a park in the middle of a small town. The ride into Zion National Park was definitely one of the highlights of the trip.

Overall, the trip was 3,991 miles covering 11 states from Jacksonville, FL, to Santa Cruz, CA. The days we crossed state lines were always fun and extra motivation knowing we were making progress, because some days seemed redundant to say the least. We had 13 build days throughout the trip in places like Jacksonville, New Orleans, Dallas, Santa Fe, Flagstaff and more. Those days were a great experience as well to learn more about the communities we were biking through and their efforts to overcome the affordable housing crisis.


I would like to thank everyone who made this trip possible for me! It was such an amazing experience, and it wouldn't have been possible without the amazing generosity of my friends and family.

Cell phone service to the Lake Erie Islands has degraded in the last two years. According to many the worst offender has been cell phone carrier Verizon. For two decades, Verizon has been the carrier of choice for many Island residents but the recent degradation of quality from Verizon is driving customers away

Pat Miller (Middle Bass Island), Eddie Sheller (Middle Bass), and Jim Roesch (Middle Bass) were told by Verizon that they had no plans to improve service.

One Verizon Representative was able to look at signal strength for Miller, told him that there would be no improvements of service to the 43446 zip code, and that Miller should switch to AT&T. Sheller and Roesch were told the same thing.

As a band-aid measure, Verizon offered a "mini booster that could be installed in island residences. This helped if the caller was in the residence (and had internet service). But, once away from the house, the mini booster was of no use.

I tried to reach Dave Nostrant (East Point, Middle Bass), Bud Stonerook (North Bass Island), and Dale Burris (North Bass) for comment. No luck. No cell service.

Retired Interlake Steamship Captain, Russ Brohl used to love Verizon. "I was in ports all over the Great Lakes and Verizon was great. However, in the last two years their service has been spotty at best. Lisa (his wife) and I still have our landline (285). If we have an emergency, we can depend that."

Because cell service was so strong many Island residents have given up their hard wire landlines (285). In case of an emergency they grew to depend on their cell phone carrier to connect with police or EMTs.

In the last two years, things changed and service has suffered. Recently a homeowner had to leave their spouse (who was having a cardiac event) and roam their backyard looking for reception. In this case finding a bar of service made the difference between life and death.

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Kelleys Island News

As we close in on the end of summer and we are starting to slow down in ernest. Many of the Island's restaurants close at the end of October (with the close of their seasonal liquor licenses), the library is on their winter hours, the History Museum closes on Columbus Day, but the resale shop remains open until it gets too cold in the building. Make sure you catch the changes in ferry service: October still has hourly service, but in November we go down to just a few trips a day.

Isn't it amazing? Remember when we used to see little kids driving golf carts around the Island? Think back to this summer. There haven't been many at all this year. It is remarkable how fast word gets around that tickets are being issued, although five warnings were issued last month.

The Kelleys Island Historical Assoc. announced the big winners: Rodney Rosado won the GEM car raffle and Paula Bier won the quilt. Both are from Kelleys Island.

BIRDS & BEES - The Cleveland Museum of Natural History's Bee Team issued their 2018 report. A bee survey was completed in the Huntley-Beatty Quarry Preserve and the team found 52 bumble bees of the three most common Ohio species (Common Eastern, Brown Belted and Two-spotted). That's pretty good news.

Northern Saw-whet Owl banding begins on the evening of October 14th and continues nightly through November 23rd (weather permitting), beginning at sunset each night. The weekend of November 1-3 is the Kelleys Island Owl Festival sponsored by the Kelleys Island Audubon Club and the Cleveland Museum of Natural History. There will be free programs during the day and guided owl walks in the evening. Songbird banding will be conducted at the Jones Preserve daily during the same period. Since so much is going on, there will be signs posted at the banding locations and in front of the Kelleys Island History Museum showing when and where banding is going on. There is no banding during bad weather (high winds, rain, snow, high heat, etc.) so plan your visit accordingly. The Audubon potluck will be October 17 at

6 p.m. at the school and 7 p.m. speaker. **COUNCIL NOTES** – Council meetings switch over to Saturdays at 10 a.m. for the winter. Remember

Council minutes are available on the Village website www.KelleysIsland.us. The SAFETY COMMITTEE is negotiating a new contract with St. V's. EMS had 17 runs last month. By the way, last month I reported that EMS "a whopping 274 runs in July." Yipes – that should have been 24 runs. Sure our crew is busy, but not quite

that busy! In August, there were 17 runs and they are looking into an advanced EMT course. PAVING may be in the future for Memory, Fernwood and McGettigan next year. MAYOR'S COURT took in \$11,290 last month. The TREASURER reported that the 2017-18 audit closed with just one issue - and that was timely deposits from some of the departments. This has always been a problem because part-time workers cannot always coordinate with Village office hours. Not bad. An emergency appropriation was stalled as some Councilpersons did not understand the impact on the general fund. The Treasurer explained the fund, line by line, in detail, which answered their questions. Two additional Council meetings were scheduled to get the appropriation approved. The FIRE DEPT. had two runs in August. BURN PERMITS will be available on October 1. Give it some time as they must be reviewed and approved before you can burn. A hazmat training class will be held in November, paid for by grants and Erie Co. EMA and will cover how to deal with hazardous materials and weapons of mass destruction. The POLICE DEPT. received 38 reports and fielded 413 phone calls. There were 10 arrests (underage consumption, fake ID, OVI, public indecency and criminal trespass). 17 tickets were issued (open container, stop sign, disorderly conduct, driving under suspension, parking, and no turn signal (accident). 54 warnings were issued. There were five accidents. Remember ATV, 4-wheelers etc, must be registered and plated to be on the roadway. **HUNTING SEASON** has already started (so obey all hunting laws). TARGET SHOOTING starts on November 1 – not a day sooner. Tickets will be issued to violators.

Dear Editor

The morning after the Kid Rock event I was waiting in the Miller Boat corral to leave and over heard some discussion of it. Some visitors were talking about the prior night with an island worker, who I did not know, but wore an island uniform. They had attended and were displeased in the design, where a tent obstructed their view. The concert goers had remarked how the prices were too high and they did not enjoy themselves. The worker agreed, and remarked that unfortunately, the people on the island will do anything for a buck.

Although, I did not chime in, that statement took me by surprise and truly offends me. I myself, have owned a business on the island now for 20 years, and worked here for many years prior. I love tourism and bend over backwards to accommodate the island visitors as much as possible. I believe the same is true for many other island business owners and workers. In fact, it brings me back twenty five years, to my first paycheck from Stoiber Enterprises, which was adorned with the phrase, "These are tourist dollars". That is a very special concept, which we on the island should all hold dear, as every dollar spent, earned, invested and deposited came from somewhere else. Tourism is our life blood and I believe the appreciation for our visitors shines through in the terrific improvements the island has seen over the years. Often tourists only see what is in the moment, the brief time they are here. They are unaware of the hard work, time, effort and investment that was made before they arrived to ensure they had a great visit. Regardless, we as an island never want to give the impression we are only after money, or that our visitors are a burden, and I don't believe that is the case.

We seen the long hours, multiple shifts, and job strain that would make ordinary workers quit. Yet, island workers always rise to the occasion and shine when it seems impossible. 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

This season has not been the greatest for boating for many including myself. For those of you aware of the incident with my vessel, the insurance company cleared for the repairs and I should be getting her back in time for ice fishing LOL. Until then, my on-the-water experience will be limited to patrol time.

Record high waters made dockage situations difficult for many during the season. Many of the public docks downtown where underwater most of the year. Access ramps around the island were difficult to access and therefore dangerous. Rough seas made navigation hazardous and parts of Put In Bay looked like the Lost Continent of Atlantis at times. Aside from all that, it was a great boating year. Let's hope for a better one in 2020!

Sadly, there were a record 30 Deaths in 30 days on the Great Lakes going into August and 76 deaths in total as of Sept. 01. Here's the break down so far:

Lake Michigan=36; Lake Erie=21; Lake Huron=8; Lake Ontario=8; Lake Superior=3


The reasons for the fatalities were varied but included the usual suspects. Poor boating skills, poor swimming skills and/or alcohol. The solution is always a simple one, boater education, swimming education and understanding the effects of alcohol while on the water especially in the heat of the Summer. The Coast Guard Auxiliary offers two primary courses. A safe boating class which is suitable for everyone whether your the skipper or a passenger. And a course titled "Suddenly In Command" designed for individuals who are not the primary driver of the boat but who may suddenly need to take over command and control of the vessel if the captain should become incapacitated. This is often the spouse or partner of the vessel's captain. If you are a boater I strongly urge you to look into both of these courses before the start of the next boating season.

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OEPA Water Meeting

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On Thursday, September 5th, there was an open meeting with Amy Klei, head of the Ohio EPA's drinking and ground waters department, Chief, Division of Drinking and Ground Waters - OEPA, and other representatives from the Ohio EPA to discuss options for providing water for the island in the coming years.

The representatives were there to provide information about EPA policies and regulations in the coming years, provide information about possible funding options and discuss engineering concerns about maintaining a water plant on the island or building an underwater line and connecting to the regional water system on the mainland.

> The EPA officials began with praising the current status of the Village's water plant and said that the water being produced there is some of the best in the state. They said the agency's relationship with Jaime Hernandez, the plant's operator, is very good.

> However, when it came to the future of the plant, Klei could not tell those gathered what to expect when it comes to future mandates for treatment, operations, operator certification and and on-site supervision, all of which add to the cost of producing water just like the expensive ozone treatment system that was recently required to be installed at PIB's plant.

> When it came to financing options in the future, there was no definite information about what grants and funding opportunities might be available, but the money man on Klei's team

did explain how current funding works in relation to what the agency looks for when assessing new projects.

When it came right down to deciding on whether or not an on island system or a waterline to the mainland was the best, the engineers from the OEPA and Ottawa County had concerns about providing water from the mainland, but did not rule it out. The EPA promotes connecting to regional water systems, but does not decide which option is best for a community. It is basically up to the Village of Put-in-Bay to decide which option it wants to pursue and summit a proposal to the OEPA. The OEPA

would then have to approve any proposal. Needless to say, there are pros and cons for running an island water plant or installing a line to the mainland. An aging water plant makes it important that officials at least look at both options, especially when it comes to operating a small plant with many of the same fixed costs and regulatory obligations that a large plant incurs. Proponents of installing a waterline to the mainland show initial, cost-saving projections in the tens millions of dollars over the life of a line.

It was suggested that an outline of the issues, requirements and questions be put together for both options so that Village officials could review everything that would be involved in making their choice.

When the meeting was over, everyone was certainly more informed about the issues from an OEPA standpoint, but there was no clearcut decision which option would be best for the island. Klei indicated the agency would be interested in any new studies or other case stud-

> ies that are relevant for the future of providing water for the island.

If you were in the audience and a proponent of one option or the other, you probably walked away with your position unchanged, Hopefully, all parties walked out with open minds about conducting further study of the issue.

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


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Did You Know?

Patrick was such a positive influence for everyone on the island, the kids at the school, the softball league, and as a stepfather who helped raise three children.
