

ABOVE: The Lake Erie Islands Historical Society Museum will have a special auction at the Crew's Nest on Friday, September 7th, thanks to some of the talented island artists and crafts people and a tree that was alive when Commodore Perry stationed his fleet in the Battle of Lake Erie. It also stood when island pioneer Jose Derivera came to Put-in-Bay, plus more than a century later witnessed the burning of the Colonial in 1988. Arts and crafts people took the carving scraps from the Jose DeRivera oak tree in the park and have turned them into the works pictured above. Now they can belong to you! Preview will begin at 4:30 p.m. with the Auction to be held at 6:30 p.m.

### **DeRivera Tree Art Auction**

Did you ever want to own a unique piece of real island artwork and at the same time help preserve a bit of cherished island history? Your opportunity will be here on Friday, September 7th, when about 20 pieces of art using wood from the new Jose de Rivera tree carving in DeRivera Park will be auctioned off at the Crew's Nest. Jose de Rivera purchased the island in 1854, and sold off parcels to grape growers who helped make the islands what they are today.

Curator Dan Savage got permission to collect many of the large pieces of the oak which the stump carver sawed out and was discarding as his chainsaw created the statue of island pioneer Jose de Rivera. Dan then asked some of the most talented island artists and crafts people to come up with creative ideas for the pieces he salvaged from the tree which was estimated to be about 230 years old.

Viewing of the various pieces will start outside on the Crew's Nest patio at 4:30 p.m., at the same time happy hour begins. Anyone, not just Crew's Nest member will be able to join in the fun, plus drink tickets will be available. There will also be a buffet set up

drink tickets will be available. There will also be a buffet set up for the event. The auction is scheduled to start at 6:30 p.m. In case of iffy weather, the event will be moved inside, so don't let that deter you from attending the worthwhile event.

There will be about 20 pieces to bid on, each one of a kind which can never be duplicated. Each item auctioned off will come with a certificate of authenticity.

The Jose DeRivera Stump Carving in DeRivera Park

The Lake Erie Islands Historical Society Museum is a non-profit organization which strives to promote the history of the Lake Erie Islands. It raises funds to operate through donations, admissions to its museum, sales at its Resale Shop which is supported by donation items, memberships, the golf cart trips to North Bass Island every other year, and fundraisers including its annual historical auction in August, beer and wine sales at the Put-in-Bay Music Festival in June, and the silent auction at the Wine Festival in October.

If you haven't had a chance to get to the museum lately, you should plan now to do so. There's an impressive collection of items and displays which highlight the rich past of the islands. And while you are there, ask about becoming a member.

Details are sketchy as exactly what happened, but apparently a man jumped in the water off his boat near the south end of South Bass Island and didn't come up. His wife, not really knowing how to run the boat, somehow beached the boat and got help. Put-in-Bay police responded to the call before other help arrived to search for the man's body. It is interesting to note, there have been 64 drownings in the Great Lakes this year, with 23 in Lake Erie alone. Put-in-Bay has had three this year.

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



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### On the ballot in November

The mid-term elections in November will see state and federal officials elected, but there are no local officials on the ballot in the upcoming election. There will, however, be several local issues on the ballot.

The first one is a levy renewal for the Put-in-Bay Township Port Authority. It is actually a 0.45-mill decreased renewal levy over five years for maintenance and operations. It isn't often island voters get to vote on a decrease for a levy. This is mainly because the loan for the purchase of the airport has been paid off. The airport operation is crucial for island living.

The second issue is a 1.3-mill renewal levy over five years by the Put-in-Bay Township for the EMS. For anyone who lives here, this is a very important levy.

The third is a Put-in-Bay/South Bass 1.2-mill renewal levy over five years for fire protection. Again this important levy help assure fire protection for the island.

The final levy is a Put-in-Bay Township 0.45-mill renewal levy over five years for cemeteries. There are several cemeteries on the islands.

Island voters will go to Senior Center at Put-in-Bay to vote on Tuesday, November 6th. Remember to bring your photo identification with you. If you will be off island that day, you can arrange to vote using an absentee ballot, or you can vote at the Ottawa County Board of Election on State Route 163, just east of Oak Harbor.

# **Xmas in July Task Force**

At a special meeting of the Put-in-Bay Chamber of Commerce on Wednesday, August 8th, at the Senior Center, the group's president, Brad Ohlemacher, met with members of the island business community and presented his thoughts about Christmas in July. Brad told those gathered he had talked with many in the community and put together a reason for the necessity of taking action and a plan to address the various factors which come into play in solving the growing problem of Christmas in July and its negative impact.

The necessity of changing what has happened to an event which was promoted to bring families to the island for a fun outing with holiday lights, parades, decorations and cheer, plus increase business, has changed to a weekend of anything but those things.

And it now comes down to a matter of safety and security of the islands residents, employees, guests and

Everyone is welcome on Put-in-Bay, but as we have now have experienced for the last few years, the island is physically and financially unable to support the overwhelming masses of people in short periods of time, especially when there is the need for extra security because of those who don't treat the island with respect and behave in such a manner as to keep others away who also want to come to enjoy the island.

During the meeting, suggestions were taken for how to end the Christmas in July nightmare. Just about everyone in the packed center had a suggestion or two, but when it came right down to it, everyone pretty much agreed there was no simple solution, but perhaps a variety of options for solving the situation.

For the first time ever, there truly seems to be a united voice, plus the willingness to work together to begin taking action to mitigate Christmas in July and turn it in to a normal summer weekend.

Brad talked about the four distinct areas of concern that need to be addressed when it comes to dealing with the situation....Promotion, Legal, Transportation and Protection (Law Enforcement). Four committees were set up, one for each area of concern and staffed with members.

### Big Island 5K Race set for September 15th by Bob Reuter

The Miller Boat Line 5K and 1 Mile Family Fun Walk is expected to draw somewhere between 500 and 800 runners this month. This 5K at Put in Bay® is one of the largest in all of North Central Ohio and this year will mark the 15th year for the very popular run.

The 5K is always held on the third Saturday in September. The date was chosen because it almost always ensures perfect running weather. It is also a time when tourist visits to the island are slowing. Julene Market and Anita McCann have been official "race starters" in recent years. Mary Booker will "do the honors" this year.

Race Headquarters and the Registration desk for the event has always been at the Boathouse Bar and Restaurant. Registration is open Friday September 14th from 5 until 8 p.m. and Saturday the 15th from 8 a.m. until the race begins.

Planning of the race begins in January of each year. The event requires almost 40 volunteers which includes making application to the Village and Put in Bay Police Department; working with a graphic artist who designs a unique race logo each year which appears on the front of the runner shirt, ordering and suppling over 500 long sleeved runner and committee shirts; selecting and sandblasting the island rocks which are presented as unique awards, contracting with the company that electronically times each runner, creating 1500 registration forms; and arranging advertising and publicity in print, radio and TV media. And then,

Race Week-end requires volunteers to act as: registrars, race course monitors, race course timers, water stations personnel, pick an awards emcee, a crew for awards presentation and finally setting out the bottle water, banana and other healthy food for the runners after the race. Additionally, volunteers collect door prizes from island businesses as advertising "giveaways" while the crowd waits for winner announcements.

Quite an organization and a lot of

Sponsor logos and/or business names are displayed on all race documents, on 15000 registration forms given out by race timer company at other races they manage, on www.5KatPutinBay.com, on all the race shirts, on media news releases and more. The official 5KatPutinBay® 2018 race poster with the names and/ or logos appears on another page of this month's Gazette.

Proceeds of the race help to pay building and grounds maintenance for Mother of Sorrows church here on Put-in-Bay.

### **COUNCIL NOTES**

The POLICE DEPT. had 27 reports, 540 calls and 11 arrests. There were 11 misdemeanor tickets, 4 accidents, 20 warnings were issued. The EMT SQUAD made 24 runs and will be holding an EMT class on the Island. The FIRE-FIGHTER'S Steak Fry at the VFW was a sold-out event. They will be testing their 7,000 feet of hose at the end of August. The Village is exploring RECYCLE options. Work is progressing on the installation of the 'boosters' which Frontier hopes will improve internet reliability and speed. There was additional discussion on the ordinance to sell the GO-LIAS HOUSE and the tie vote, required the Mayor to cast the deciding vote - voting no. What was so very confusing was that some members who supported the sale voted no and some who objected to the sale voted yes. There will probably be more on this. Erie County is changing their hotel tax to a transient lodging tax of 4% and the Village will likely pass legislation for a similar 3% tax, resulting in an income of \$45,000. The Erie Co. Auditor's office clarified: "All people who rent houses, rooms, and such will be required to register with us, fill out a quarterly tax form that lists their amount of rents for that period of time and pay 4% of their rents to Erie County. Your local government such as Kelleys Island could also enact their own tax up to 3% and charge you that as well." The new rules go into effect on 1/1/19.

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

### **Potential Tragedy** Averted at State Park

Last week I was at the state park cleaning my golf cart and enjoying the beautiful day. There were a good number of people (mostly tourist and some residents) also enjoying the park. I noticed three PIB teenagers (who will remain unnamed) were horsing around with a kayak. The three piled on to the vessel and headed out past the pier where in short order the kayak violently capsized three times.

About that time, Bob Gatewood (renowned island performer and owner of Water Craft Rentals) began to make his way to the end of the launch ramp to try to communicate with the teens. I joined him signaling the teens back to shore.

The kayak's body had taken on a great deal of water through a drain hole that was missing the plug.

Bob and I flipped the vessel over to empty all the accumulated water and loaded it aboard the mother's vehicle.

Potential tragedy averted.

### **Nearly Every** Violation Possible

It is rare when I see water craft operator(s) commit nearly every violation possible at one time! Let's list them:

1) Over loaded vessel. This kayak had a passenger capacity of two yet there were three people on board which is il-

**2)** Inadequate life jackets. Only one of the three had on a life jacket. While they are not required to be worn it is required that there is a life jacket on board for each person in the kayak.

kayaking skills lead directly to the vessel capsizing

**3)** No vessel registration. Kayaks are required to be registered through the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR). Non registered kayaks on Lake Erie are illegal.

4) Unseaworthy. The vessel was missing its drain plug which allowed it to take on water.

### The Good News

While this could have had a tragic conclusion the good news is that none of these kids were hurt or worse. A big Bravo Zulu to Bob Gatewood who could have just as easily look the other way but chose to get involved when he recognized that these kids where in over their heads!


### A Lesson For Everyone



they would have to go to Cedar Point to check in. That being ridiculous, they proceeded to get the app set up. The simple three- or four-minute procedure of checking in by phone, turned into an hour plus while just trying to download the app and get it set up so they could just simply check in. Fortunately, they were with their American friends, a couple from New Jersey who rent on Pelee every summer. The husband was tech savvy and went to work downloading the app after finding a fast wifi connection. It was complicated affair which required boat information, plus photos of everyone onboard. Finally, they checked in and the above notice popped up. Twenty minutes later, They didn't have their verification number and their status was still pending. We don't know when they finally got their OK to be in the U.S., but it was a very frustrating ordeal. Since then we talked to someone who goes to Pelee by boat on a regular basis. When you arrive in Canada, you make a simple call, and if you've been there before, they already know you're name. The procedure takes just a few minutes. This boater has been using the new app and says it's pretty simple to report back into the States once you've downloaded all the information about your boat and regular passengers. He says it takes about 3 minutes to get the "Your trip has been approved" notice on your phone. That's good news, but he did add he had once waited for three hours for ap-



### Recently discovered island history Finding the Ross Island Blockhouse by William Krejci

It's a little known fact that many of the Lake Erie islands have had multiple names. For instance, Kelleys Island was originally Cunningham's Island, named for an early settler named William Cunningham. Middle Bass Island was first called Isle de Fleurs, meaning Island of Flowers. Starve Island and Green Island were once respectively named Glacial Island and Strontian Island.

South Bass Island is no exception to this. In fact, it's held more names than any other island upon the lake, including Bass Island, Big Bass Island, Put-in-Bay Island, and most interestingly... Ross Island. This raises the question, who was Ross? An answer was hard to find, but after conducting much research on the subject, it was discovered that the island received this title from a man named James Ross, who was originally from Centre County, Pennsylvania.

Mr. Ross was called up by the Pennsylvania Militia in March of 1813. He served as a private in Capt. George Records Company of Col. Reese Hill's Regt. His company arrived in Erie, PA on April 20th and was assigned to guard the construction of Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry's fleet, which was being built in that town.

James Ross must have been something of an adventurous soul. As the construction of Perry's naval squadron was nearing completion, and his term with the militia reaching a close, Mr. Ross presumably found himself with a yearning to continue on and see things through. He volunteered to go aboard Perry's fleet on July 25th and was stationed aboard the schooner Scorpion, which was commanded by Perry's wife's cousin, Sailing Master Stephen Champlin.

The details of what transpired at the Battle of Lake Erie on September 10, 1813 are extraordinary and are immortal-

ized in the halls of naval glory. They need not be repeated here. What can be said is that James Ross, for his own part, fulfilled his duty that day to the fullest of his ability. His assigned vessel had the distinction of having fired the first and last shots of that famous engagement, and he assisted in the capture of the British schooners Chippewa and Little Belt.

Following the battle, and with the terms of his service drawing to a conclusion, James Ross found himself in contact with Judge Ogden Edwards, who owned South Bass Island. Prior to the war, an attempt was made at establishing a settlement. Seven families were sent out to South Bass Island with Seth Doan of Cleveland, but were chased off by Native Americans in 1812. Edwards hoped to reestablish a settlement, but needed a new caretaker and James Ross fit the bill. Thus it was decided that he would remain at Put-in-Bay.

To get a better understanding of what life on the island would have been like for Mr. Ross, a closer look was taken at the events that followed the Battle of Lake Erie. Much of this centered around two of the captured British vessels, the HMS Queen Charlotte and HMS Detroit. Both had suffered considerable damage during their onslaught against the American squadron. The day after the battle, they were brought back to Put-in-Bay as prizes. The following evening, a severe gale struck the island and unmasted the two ships. They were in no condition to return to Erie with the rest of the prize vessels. With the end of the naviga-

tion season closing in, plans were made to winter them at Put-in-Bay

A small detachment of men remained on the isolated island, but were joined that Christmas by the arrival of two more vessels that had gained fame at the engagement on September 10th. The Somers and Tigress arrived under the command of Sailing Master Stephen Champlin... Ross' former commander.

It was while reading a letter that Champlin penned to his commander back in Erie that a stunning discovery was made. The letter read thus:

Put-in-Bay January 14, 1814

Sir: I have everything in complete order at this place. I have the guns mounted in the block-house. I have mounted on board the Detroit 21 guns, and on board the Queen Charlotte 19. I have mounted those 32-pounders and 24-pounders that were left on board the Detroit. I can bring 12 guns to bear in every direction. The ice is constantly kept open. I think if they attack us they will meet with a pretty warm reception. The sailors are all well, the soldiers very sick. We have provisions enough to last till the first of April. The beef is very bad.

I have the honor to be your ob'dt servant

There had been suspicion that a structure of some sort had been erected at Put-in-Bay, but what it might have been was illusive. To learn of the existence of a blockhouse is quite substantial. Apparently, there was great concern over the possibility of the British attempting to cross the ice that winter to Put-in-Bay and recapture the prize vessels. Thus the construction of a fortification was deemed necessary. At least three more letters make mention of this blockhouse, sitting on a rocky point, close to the captured vessels. An actual description was discovered in a copy of the Cleveland Leader dating from 1858. In this article, a man named Atkins, who served with the militia, clearly remembered assisting in the construction of the blockhouse. He describes it as measuring 16 feet square on the lower level and 20 on the upper. He also mentions it as having been floored with hewn timbers

The last time it has ever been mentioned in print (until now) came in the form of an article published in The Western Magazine in June of 1881. The title of the piece in question is Our Excursion to the Lakes. A work of fiction, this short story tells of a man who takes a trip with his sister and her family to Lake Erie. The descriptions and illustrations of the many places they visit along the way are remarkably accurate to real locations. Included in this is also a mention of the blockhouse, sitting on a high rocky point, in a quiet and unfrequented part of the bay.

There's one more surprise that this article offers. At the conclusion of its columns, the author gives his name: W.D. Boyce. It turns out that this story is a previously unattributed work by the man who would later go on to become the


founder of the Boy Scouts of America.

Trying to find the exact location of this blockhouse has been something of a challenge as well. The best clues take us back to James Ross. It's known that in the few short years that he lived at this locale, the island actually bore his name. Unfortunately, James Ross met his death on July 11, 1817 and was buried on Gibraltar Island. In 1863, a writer for the Sandusky Register made an attempt at poetically describing his burial site, but incorrectly listed his death date as August 11, 1848. His headboard (not a headstone, but a piece of wood that marked his grave) was so degraded that his vital information had worn away.

In the years that followed his death, people gradually stopped referring to the island on the whole as Ross Island. According to the book South Bass Island and Islanders by Thomas and Marina Langlois (Ohio State University, 1948) the name "was later applied only to a small adjunct of South Bass Island" and was eventually used "as the site of an ice house, fishery, and boat livery." Some later maps apply this title to what would one day become the site of Miller Marina, but it seems that, according to the description given by Mr. and Mrs. Langlois, the original peninsula to bear the title Ross Island was what would eventually become Peach Point, as this is the appendage of land that contained the aforemen-

Perhaps this is where James Ross himself had resided. The blockhouse was abandoned by the military in May of 1814. It would have been the best structure on the island at that time and would serve perfectly as a residence.

James Ross' grave site on Gibraltar Island was eventually marked by a headstone that bore the incorrectly claimed date of death, but it was removed in later years. What became of the Ross Island Blockhouse remains an island mystery.

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

### You can help with the Chimney Swift count on islands

As summer draws to a close and the chimney swifts have finished raising their young, these fascinating aerial acrobats begin to congregate in communal roosts prior to their migration in the fall. Some roosts may consist of an extended family group of a half a dozen birds or so, but the larger sites can host hundreds or even thousands of swifts! Here on South Bass Island, a couple years ago, a roost of over 200 birds was recorded during migration at the OSU Aquatic Visitor Center chimneys.

As the daylight dwindles, listen for their twittering call, look up and you may see them, rapidly beating their wings, catching their last meal of flying insects before retiring for the night. Due to their declining population, these birds are on the conservation watch list. A Swift Night Out is a continent-wide conservation monitoring project that helps researchers measure the population of swifts. On one night over the weekend of September 7, 8, or 9 you can help us find their roosting chimneys and count the birds you see go in. Observe the roost starting about 30 minutes before dusk and estimate the number of swifts that enter. Report your numbers to LEIC Board Member Paula Ziebarth at paulasbirdz@yahoo.com. This is a great citizen science project to do with kids.


Those golf cart turn signals on golf carts that keep blinking left while the driver keeps going straight is an-



## **Prints and Paws**

Dave & Donna Stepanek have been coming to Put-in-Bay for over 43 years. They both fell in love with the island and its' people from their first visit. Many years ago, Dave started drawing pictures of some unique Victorian Homes. Then he started drawing some of the bars, which led to a poster he made way back when there were only 12 bars on the island. That poster later became a colorful "T" shirt which sold in many of the gift shops. Dave started to sell many of his prints in quite a few of the gift shops around the island. His most popular prints were the lighthouse located at the western end of the island, Pat Daily's Tavern in the middle of the Island (now housing the Goat Restaurant), and above all the Roundhouse Bar, sold the most of all. For several years it became an almost full-time job keeping the shops supplied with prints and T-Shirts.

Dave's real job was being the Art Director of British Petroleum (BP), and Standard Oil Com-

pany (SOHIO). He was also the Art Director of 3M Company's Decorative Products Division in Cleveland. He had 15 people working on computers with the latest Technology, and even a Genographic Computer made by General Electric, and it cost over \$750,000. It was used by BP in the development of the "Directional Drilling" capabilities all around the world. It generated animation and videos used to demonstrate how the technology worked in oil explora-tion. He eventually retired and moved to Florida and later to South Carolina, and then back to Port Clinton, Ohio.

He started producing new artwork from Annapolis Maryland. The US Naval Academy, The Middleton Tavern (oldest Bar in America) in operation since 1750,

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



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A magical journey to an island

Editor's Note: Xiling is a student from China who worked at Harriet's House this summer. Here is a story about her island experience.

Fourteen hours of the plane, two hours of taxis, half an hour of ferry, and so on, I came to Put-in-Bay from the other side of the earth.

This is not the United States I imagined!

To be honest, I was disappointed when my friend showed me around the island. There are noisy bars everywhere, carnival people, in transportation, all of which made me dislike this island, I even wanted to escape from here.

But there was always a voice in my heart saying to me, "Try to explore the island before fleeing it."

So, I decided to go to the library on the island first. When I went out for a walk, I accidentally found it near the school. I went in. It was small and exquisite. Two librarians sat in the foreground and they greeted me with enthusiasm. The books on the bookshelf are neat and orderly, with clear classifications, and there is a small space to open up to children. The entire library is both warm and full of fun. Going Xiling Song

to the end of the bookshelf, we saw three public computers with notes and pens on the computer desk. The note behind the computer tells us we can print what we need, and there was a coffee machine next to the computer.

We didn't know the library borrowing system here, so I asked about it. The librarian immediately helped us with the card catalogue and also recommended two books for me. One was to introduce the history of Ohio. The other was the original "Twilight City" of the classic movie.

Less than five minutes, we two foreigners, got our own book card at the library of the island. At that moment, the library became our paradise, and the library card became

After work, we were no longer just stayed in the dorms; we were beginning to "explore" the island.

We attended church activities for exchange students and became friends with students from different countries.

There were two respectable ladies in the church, Kate and Doraine, who became our "teachers." They taught us native culture and helped us through the most confused times.

They took us to the top of the Perry's Victory Monument. The top of the monument was very windy, almost blowing my skirt. I was ridiculed by my companions to become "Marilyn Monroe." I looked down, the island covered by green, the vast Lake Erie, sporadic ships and Canada, which is faintly visible in the distance, are

With the little bit of integration into life here, I gradually became attached

to the people here. We went to the pig roast and chatted with them and got to know more about their lives.

At the end of the island life, we had a girl's day and made dumplings at Doraine's house. Several girls from different countries packed different styles of dumplings. Candles. lemonade. American sweet and sour sauce and Chinese dumplings, the collision of Eastern and Western cultures produced wonderful effects.

I began to understand that the United States is more than big cities like New York and Chicago, more than resounding slogans like "freedom" and "democracy," and more than top universities like Harvard and Stanford. It is the Americans who made America great.

I will leave here soon, but since then, on the U.S. map, I have a home, a place that I miss from time to time: its name is Put-in-Bay.

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
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### Mossbacks By: Gordy Barr

In September of 1981, Middle Bass Islander Velva Cornor calmly dialed the number for her husband Joe's work. A slight bead of sweat slid slowly down her temple. The snapping turtle had bitten her finger to the bone. It looked at her with dead eyes. It would not let go. The receptionist put her on hold...

Common snapping turtles (Chelydra serpentine) can weigh up to 45 pounds. They are nocturnal, and eat aquatic plants and various animals including fish, birds, frogs and small mammals. During the day they burrow into mud bottoms and wait for dinner opportunity to come their way. They have a combative disposition but rarely attack humans (unless provoked or cornered).

The Lake Erie Islands are rich with swamp real-estate that is loaded with snapping turtles. Pelee is kept dry with dike works and giant pumps. Without this infrastructure it would be a 2,000 acre swamp. Middle Bass, South Bass, and North Bass have major marsh components. Even small islands like Middle Island and East Sister Island each have swamps on their western

Trapping snapping turtles has been Middle

Bass tradition for generations. Carrie Lunt and her fiancé Sonny Schneider hunted snapping turtles throughout the islands for decades starting in the 1960s.

"Sonny and I had a unique courtship. We would hunt, dress, and cook snapping turtles as a date. It was muddy business. The art of trapping is dying but recently I went turtle trapping with Martin and Linda Dieperink in South Dakota. We have also trapped in Ashtabula, Ohio. The islands are still my favorite spot to hunt.

We would keep the catch in burlap bags in the basement. It was always exciting when

Velva Corner was the linchpin that taught several generations of Middle Bass islanders the art of a turtle fry. Carrie was a keen student as was Velva's East Point neighbor Loretta

Loretta and her husband Steve were raised in the Amish community near Plain City, Ohio. In the 1980s, they discovered each other during Rumspringa, which is the opportunity for "of age" Amish teens to discover the modern world and choose between the Amish culture (horse and buggy) and the English culture (automobiles).

Steve and Loretta chose the English culture. Steve became a deputy sheriff and currently is general manager for a lab that does blood testing. Loretta chose an entrepreneurial path by starting her own residential cleaning company.

Steve used to do chores for Velva. Velva fed Steve turtle and mentored Loretta on how to catch, dress, and fry snapping turtle.

Snapping turtles are caught using mesh cage traps or "three hoop traps". The traps are baited with throttle meat (the neck of a cow), Carp, or gizzards. The bait meat has to be tough or fish and other competitors will steal it. A trap with no bail is

What does snapping turtle taste like? In late July, Loretta and Steve invited me to their annual turtle fry. Middle Bass neighbors included Bill and Shelley Hempy and Fred and Tammy Hostetler (Fred was Amish, Tammy was a city

Bill and Steve went to the same church in Plain City, Ohio. Shelley's father introduced Fred's father to Middle Bass in the 1950s.

Some say snapping turtle tastes a bit like chicken but others compare it to venison or lean beef sirloin. It is hearty and filling. I am in the venison campwhich sort of tastes like chicken..

The Beachy's grandson Eli (5) tried snapping turtle for the first time. Steve, Loretta, and their daughter Jennifer were nervous. Would he like it?

Carrie Schneider reported that her sons John and Chuck loved turtle but son Bobby was not a fan. It turned out that Eli found it delightful. He politely asked for seconds.

Preparation:

1) Render the turtle unconscious. Striking the head with a 2"X4" will stun it so that the neck can be pulled out of the shell and the head cut off.

2) Cut along the carapace line and the upper shell will separate from the

3) The back meat and leg quarters provide most of the edible portions of the turtle.

Preparing a snapping turtle for cooking can be tricky and perhaps dangerous work. Velva's husband finally got to the phone. She asked that he please come home immediately and remove her finger from the jaws of a snapping

turtle. Joe was shocked.

Velva had been cleaning a turtle for dinner, had cut off its head, and placed the decapitated remains on the sink's drain board. She was cleaning up after and was careless. In spite of being cut off from its body, the turtle still had a vengeful streak left in it. It and she could not pry it off.

Fortunately, the head being severed from the body, it did not have the leverage to bite through Velva's distal phalanx (finger bones).

Stitches (not amputation) always make for a good story. Velva was a story teller...

### **Notes on the Story:**

1) Several years ago, I was looking for beach glass on Pelee. I had to work around some trees where the shore had eroded out. I came face to face with a mammoth snapping turtle. I was in waist deep water. The snapping turtle was on land. We were both out of our elements. I ran on shore. He slapped his way into the surf. We passed each other in our respective panic. We turned around and eveballed each other after trading places. Like a submarine he slowly submerged. I picked my way gingerly back to the boat sticking to high ground.

Hmmm, once I was swimming 'cross turtle creek Man, them snappers all around my feet Sure was hard swimming 'cross that thing With both hands holding my Ding a Ling...

3) Berry's ding a ling was a gift from his mother.

4) Native Americans celebrated turtles in effigy and lore. A turtle carries his home with him (his shell). Turtles were considered a good omen/good luck. Snapping turtles could be kept alive for months insuring nutritious meat if hunting got lean.

5) A snapping turtles back shell is nearly indestructible. It was used as a collection/ storage bowl by both aboriginal people and European pioneers.

6) In the 1970's Middle Bass Island's Heinie Kuemmel and Don Hiller made turtle carapaces into clocks using AA battery quartz movements. Many are still in use today (although they might be on their 3rd or 4th clock movement and used countless batteries).

7) Snapping turtles spend most of their lives underwater. Freshwater moss (like you see at the water's edge on docks) grows on the backs of the turtles. Hence, the term mossback.

8) Snapping turtles have been around for millions of years (and have not changed much).



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


# Put-in-Bay Garden Club

Our school's attendance policy has changed considerably with House Bill 410 being passed. Instead of counting days absent, schools now must keep track of hours absent. Excessive absences will now be reported to the Ottawa County Juvenile Court. The new definition for excessive absences is: absent 38 or more hours in one month or 65 or more hours in one school year. Prior to filing a complaint with the court parents will be notified, followed by an absence intervention plan. Complete details of House Bill 410 will be sent home. Parents are advised to make appointments and plan vacations on the following dates that school will not be in session:

September 1 - 3 (Labor Day)
October 20 - 22 (Appointment Day)
November 21 - 25 (Thanksgiving)
December 22 - January 2 (Christmas Break)
February 23 - March 3 (Winter Break)
April 20 - April 28 (Spring Break)

The school day will be lengthened this year by six minutes. School will continue to start at 8 a.m. Students are asked to arrive at 7:50 a.m. Primary elementary students will begin lunch dismissal at 11:50 a.m., followed by grades four to six. Grades 7 - 12 students will be dismissed for lunch at noon. All students are to return from lunch at 12:50 p.m. to begin classes at 1 p.m. Elementary students will be dismissed after school at 3:16 p.m. instead of 3:10 p.m., while high school students will end the day at 3:21 p.m. instead of 3:15 p.m.

These changes allow us to meet state requirements for hours of instruction and to have a full week off at Easter instead of an extended weekend and to be out before Memorial Day weekend.

The date for Picture Day is Friday, September 21st; Evacuation and Lock down Drills are scheduled for Friday, September 28th; and the Health Department Screenings have yet to be scheduled.

### Sturgeon release party set for October

On October 6th, there will be a sturgeon release party in the Maumee River at the City Boat Launch along Broadway St. near Walbridge Park in Toledo. It is part of a new program funded in part by the Great Lakes Fish and Wildlife Restoration Act and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, to reintroduce Sturgeon into Lake Erie. Years ago, sturgeon populated the lake, but gradually they

disappeared. Some 3,000 juvenile will be released. The young fish are recognizable as sturgeon, yet are still as small as aquarium fish in early August, or about the size of a human thumb. Mature sturgeon can grow to 300 pounds and be seven feet in length. They won't stay in the Maumee, but will soon make the Western Basin of Lake Erie, including the island area, their home. At one time, over 5 million pounds of sturgeon were taken from Lake Erie in a single year. The fishery collapsed, largely by 1900, and they are extremely rare at this time.


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
